OLD TIMER PASSES AWAY

Robert C. Fitch, born in Fleming county, Kentucky on November 24, 1848, died March 13, 1920, age 76 years, four months and nine days. Fitch, who was one of six children, spent his boyhood days on the farm in Kentucky, in a community of the little church, known as the Chapel. When a youth of fifteen, Mr. Fitch enlisted in the army and fought for the perpetuation of the Union. After the war, the family moved to Missouri, and located near Warrenburg. On the 8th of September, 1868, Mr. Fitch was married to Mrs. Josephine F. Draper, of Warrenburg. In 1870, the couple came to Texas in search of health, where they have lived ever since.

On the course of time, two daughters were born to the Union, Mrs. J. Cox of McLoud, Oklahoma, and W. R. Ewing of this place. The wife passed on nearly five years ago. Since his wife's death, Mr. Fitch gradually declined in health, developed hardening of the arteries. As a person preparing for a long journey, sometimes sends some his effects, so, Bro. Fitch imparted health sent on some mental furnishing. All that the love and devotion of children could do was done for his. The best treatment that was given him, but in spite of the wheels of his life began to turn down until they reached their stopping, and since they have stopped, are called upon to sum up his life. Bro. F. Jackson who had known Mr. Fitch for 30 years spoke at his funeral. Another of the old crowd has been buried. R. C. Fitch was one of the first men I met and learned to know when I came to Miami, 30 years ago. He was one of the first settlers of Roberts County, and we old timers had an attachment for each other, and was strong and abiding. People were scarce in those days, and we were the pioneer, life and endured hardships together and felt a dependence on each other. The dropping of these old time friends leaves the remaining ones a sense of loneliness. Bro. Fitch was for many years one of our most prominent and influential citizens. He was District Clerk for several years, and as such, was efficient and capable. We were also District Master for many years. He was uniform, courteous and considerate of all.

He was an intelligent man, and enjoyed opportunities beyond the boundaries of this country at that time. He had a strong personality and entertained decided views of his own on all questions, so that it was hard to place him on issues that came up. He was a devoted husband, father and he and his wife managed to give their two daughters a good educational advantage and raised them well for life. This office has proven to be one of the best investments. The daughters have both reflected credit upon their training at home.

The body of the deceased was shipped from Terrell to Miami and funeral services held at the Ewing residence Monday afternoon and the remains laid to rest in the Miami cemetery. R. A. Stewart.

MEETING OF PAMPA MUTUAL HAIL INSURANCE COMPANY

The regular annual Meeting of The Pampa Mutual Hail Insurance Company was held at Pampa on the afternoon of March 13th 1920. This was one of the most important meetings ever held by this Company. The School Auditorium was crowded to standing room only with interested and enthusiastic members. The Board of Directors, which has proven itself very able and efficient, was re-elected in toto.

The Secretary's Report disclosed facts that approximately 400 members carried insurance in the Mutual in the year 1919; that 12 1-2 per acre paid the total cost of the insurance protection; that 50 cent per acre, or approximately \$42,000.00, was paid into the Reserve Fund; that this Reserve Fund was now distributed among the Banks of the territory in proportion to the amount of insurance in the Mutual carried by the customers of the respective banks; that the Banks were paying 5 per cent interest on the \$42,000.00 in The Reserve Fund; that The Pampa Mutual Hail Insurance Company saved to Roberts, Gray and Carson Counties in the year 1919 alone over \$80,000.00; that every wheat raiser within the territory ought to insure with this Mutual Company and keep all the money at home.

After considerable discussion it was resolved that the old members of the Mutual would assume the same obligations for 1920 as for 1919; that new members would be received upon nearly the same basis; that is, they would sign a note for 12 per cent of amount of Insurance, or \$1.20 per acre with \$10.00 protection, and would pay 50 cent per acre of this into the Reserve Fund provided the total hail loss was less than 70 cent per acre. (50 cent plus 70 cent being \$1.20, the total of liability.) If the hail loss was over 70 cent per acre new members will pay the full \$1.20 per acre. The sliding scale assumed by old members makes them pay the same as new members provided the total loss is less than 25 cent per acre. If between 25 cent and 50 cent per acre old members will pay their proportional part of the loss and only 30 cent per acre into the Reserve Fund; if the loss is between 50 cent and 75 cent per acre they will pay only 20 cent per acre into the Reserve Fund; if the loss is between 75 and 100 cent per acre old members will pay their proportional part of the loss and only 5 cent per acre into the Reserve Fund; if the loss is between 100 cent and \$1.20 per acre old members will pay only their obligations as to the loss.

It was decided to raise the amount of insurance which a member could carry in the Mutual to \$12.00 instead of \$10.00 per acre. Every dollar's worth of hail insurance carried with this home Mutual company instead of some old line company save money to the insured in particular and to the community as a whole. Let's carry our own insurance, as a community, and save the enormous overhead expenses as well as the profits.

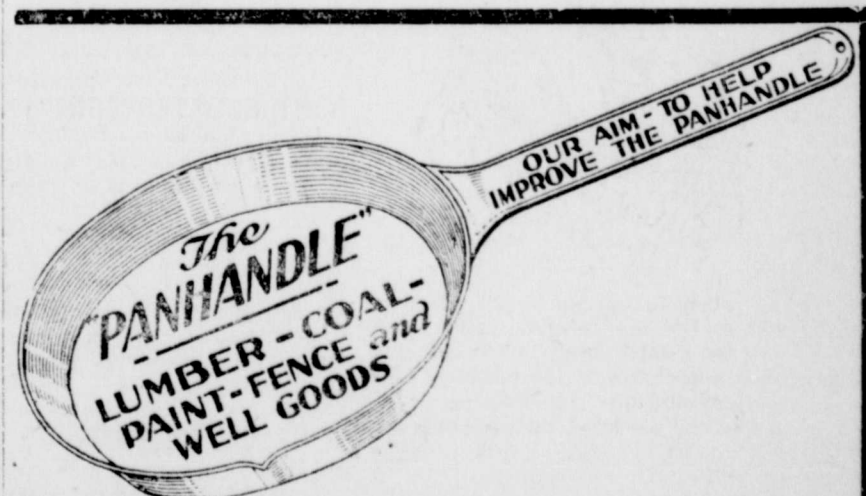

FIND SERUM TO KILL FLU GERMS

Paris Physician Meets With Success in Anti-Plague Experiments.

30,000,000 IN WORLD HIT

New York Hospital Isolates Sleeping Sickness Germ—Paris Doctor Says Influenza and Sleeping Sickness Are Twin Diseases.

New York.—Three-quarters of the world's population have been affected with Spanish influenza, which is now declared to be the same disease as the sleeping sickness, and a serum has been found to cure both, according to reports. Experiments are being carried on here and in Paris.

Simultaneously with the receipt of word from Paris that a serum had been made by Dr. Charles Folley which would cure both influenza and sleeping sickness, came a report from Bellevue hospital that a preliminary report had been issued from Mount Sinai hospital of the probable isolation of the sleeping sickness germ.

To produce a serum to cure the encephalitis lethargica, as the sleeping sickness is known to science, it would be necessary to segregate the germ of the disease, as serums are made from the disease germs themselves, the live germs in the blood being killed by the injection into the blood of the dead bodies of the same germs.

The germ of Spanish influenza is said to have been isolated, but no perfect serum is known to have been produced.

Use Flu Germs. Doctor Folley in Paris produced the serum for the cure of sleeping sickness without isolating the encephalitis lethargica germ at all, but by using germs of influenza, which led him to assert that the two are twin diseases and caused by the same germ under different conditions.

The same serum with which he cured many cases of influenza was found equally effective in curing sleeping sickness. This theory of twin diseases is borne out in the famous Mrs. Mintz case here, where the sleeping sickness followed a severe attack of Spanish influenza.

At the office of Doctor Simmers at Bellevue it was said that Mount Sinai hospital researchers were not ready to state positively they had segregated

the sleeping sickness germ and that no formal announcement of the germ's discovery had been issued. A preliminary report had stated the doctors at Mount Sinai had succeeded in finding a "globoid body" of infinitesimal proportions which was believed to be the possible germ or cause of the disease.

Experiments with the globoid body are now being carried on at Mount Sinai, a complete report of the findings of the researchers there will be issued in due time, it was said.

Doctor Folley, in Paris said there are 25,000,000 cases of the "flu" annually

and 30,000,000 this year because of the world-wide epidemic.

CHILI TO HAVE PLANE FACTORY

British Firm Submits Proposals to Government, Which Are Favorably Considered.

MAKE WORK FOR MANY MEN

Peru Will Try to Solve Transportation Difficulties by Use of Airplanes—Eight Latin-American Countries Have Pilots.

Valparaiso, Chili.—Proposals to the Chilean government for the establishment of an airplane factory in Chili, by an English firm, and the organization of a postal service between the principal cities are meeting favorable reception at the hands of government officials, says the South Pacific Mail.

A detailed report on the project has been forwarded to the government finance minister by Gen. Don Pedro Dartnell, following careful study of the plans as outlined by the John Thomas Aircraft Manufacturing company. In his report the general gives detailed economic, commercial and

military reasons for favoring the undertaking. "The introduction of this new branch of enterprise into Chili would undoubtedly stimulate a number of the national industries," comments the paper, "and at the same time find employment of a skilled kind for many hands, while it would also mean the introduction of not less than \$2,500,000 capital."

Would Be Independent. "The military air service would benefit by being made independent of material imported from abroad, while the establishment of an efficient postal service throughout the country would greatly help the population."

Well organized steps to incorporate aviation in the development of their resources are now being taken by eight of the South American republics. Flying is being extensively employed for military and naval purposes and it is expected that aviation to carry passengers to outlying mines and ranches will soon be developed on a large scale, as at present transportation by rail, water and pack animals is extremely slow and difficult.

According to a foreign airplane representative, Brazil has done more than any other South American country toward the development of aviation. Plans are now under way for the establishment of several mail routes and for transportation up and down the Brazilian coast some 1,000 miles, while several planes have been sold for private use.

Air Schools Established. In Uruguay and Argentina government air schools have already been established for both naval and military pupils, while along commercial lines the former all-night trip by steamer from Montevideo to Buenos Aires has been reduced to an hour and a half by the use of the airplane.

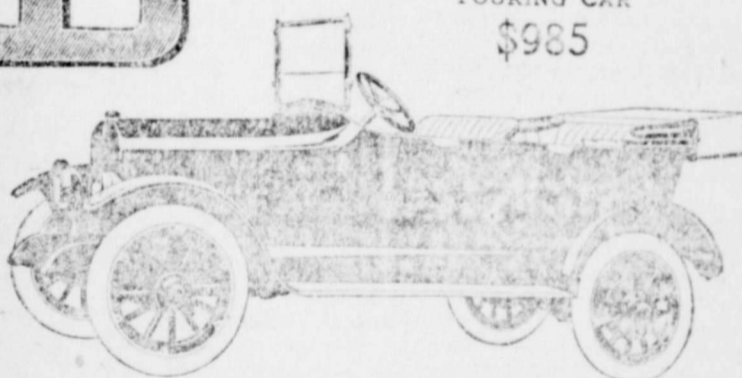
