HELPFUL HINTS.

Now that butter is so costly, as in fact are most fats, housewives are finding it expedient, if not necessary, to substitute the cheaper fats whenever possible. As bacon is such a

commonly-used breakfast dish the fat accumulates and unless carefully treated is not palatable as a general purpose fat. Take bacon fat, add cold water and

neat until melted and hot on the back the stove, then set away to cool. its of charred bacon, and the smoky many, is nearly removed. Such fat may be used in spice cakes, spiced uddings, fruit cookies, and in other ishes in which the flavor of spices or fruits predominates.

All meat drippings may be treated in the same way as bacon fat and they can then be used for biscuit, breads of various kinds, cookies and even for pastry. In using any washed fat or lard for shortening a good portion of salt must be used to give it the proper taste

Chicken fats after being rendered, strained and cooled, can be used as shortening for delicate cakes and in dishes where butter is used, and for the seasoning of vegetables and soups as well as in puddings.

To improve any of the butter substitutes put on the market, like oleomargarine, mix with a pound carton one teaspoonful of sugar-powdered is best, as it is smoothest in blend-

When washing bathroom rugs, lay them on the washboard after soaking them in a good suds to loosen the soil, then scrub with a small scrubbing brush and soap, looking for all without wringing on the line to dry, the rug will look like new. If very heavy it is best to dry on the grass, as the weight often breaks the warp.

Use the pointed end organs to stick into the apple, arrange the decorated apples in a baking dish, are usually relieved in one day.

Serve hot or cold, with or without cream. Sour Cream Cake .- Sift together two with and one-fourth cupfuls of flour, two and if not satisfied with the results your teaspoonfuls of baking powder, onehalf teaspoonful of salt, and one teaspoonful each of cinnamon and nutmeg. Add one and one-fourth cupfuls of sugar, half a cupful of nuts and one cupful of chopped and floured raisins. Stir into one cupful of thick sour cream, one-fourth teaspoonful of soda dissolved in a tablespoonful of water. Add to this one-fourth cupful of softened butter; stir enough to mix. Combine the flour and other dry ingredients with the cream and butter, beat together for one minute. Add one or two eggs and bake in a paper-lined third of a cupful of shortening.





PLANT AND DEVELOP TREES

Indiana Authority Gives Advice as to the Best Methods for Securing Desired Results.

A good lawn with plenty of hardwood trees, properly located, is one of the finest things to be taken into consideration in home beautification, according to C. L. Burkholder of the horticultural division of the Purdue (Ind.) extension department, Hardwood trees are always desirable for planting around the home even though they are slower in growth than the more undesirable and shorter-lived trees, such as the Carolina poplar, boxwood and soft maple. The elm, linden, tulip poplar, horse chestnut, sugar maple, Norway maple and white ash are a few of the hardwood trees which thrive under most conditions and grow rapidly after they are once well started. Now is the time to provide for a good strong growth next summer.

Every one of the above varieties of trees, up to the time it is eight or nine years old at the least, should be given a heavy coating of barnyard manure each fall and this material should be spaded in the shallow ground around the trees in the spring. A circle about each tree six feet in diameter should be kept free of weeds and grass throughout the summer season. This is an inexpensive treatment and will develop the growth of the tree each season if carefully observed. Plenty of manure will mean plenty of growth.

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



The way to make prosperity flow into any locality is to build roads that will last and not have to be done over every few years.

With good roads farmers can deliver all their products directly to towns within a radius of 50 or more miles, and by making more profit themselves they reduce the high cost of living for other people; for merchants are able to take advantage of new sources of supply to buy their stocks under favorable conditions, and sell them to their customers at a lower price.

Millions of dollars are lost every year through perishable goods spoiling on the railroads because of freight delays and complications, writes C. W. Morrison in Farm Journal, Single large firms have actually saved more

than \$100,000 yearly by using motortrucks; and the trucks will undoubtedly contribute largely to organized improvement of roads.

Good roads are a paying investment. Local authorities in cities, towns and counties should act without delay to meet the growing national and local demands before trade goes in other directions. It is almost impossible to get back the lost advantage after other districts have won it.

Good roads bring trade and increase property values in a community. They attract homeseekers and industries.

ROAD PROJECTS AUTHORIZED

Plans Involving Improvement of 12,159 Miles at Estimated Cost of \$181,143,644 Ratified.

States department of agriculture approved 1.345 road projects, involving the improvement of 12,159 miles, at an estimated cost of approximately \$181. 143,644. Of this sum approximately \$78,592,167 represents federal funds. Since the passage of the federal aid road act 1.927 projects have been approved. These call for the construction of 18,596 miles of road, at an essimpled cost of \$225,267,847, of which about \$95,498,140 will be borne by the federal government. Gratifying progress also has been made in connection with the national forest road work. From July 1, 1918, to November 1, 1919, 74 projects, involving 923 miles of road, were approved, and plans were completed for the improvement of 50

others, aggregating 946 miles. These facts are brought out in the annual report of the secretary of agri-

Release From Bondage the City Man as Well as Farmer-Solve Living Cost Problem.

To both city man and farmer the good road means release from bondage. Counties and states where good roads have become a part of a progressive program of legislation have seen values rise, and this again has brought home the fact that good roads pay for themselves. More important to the city dweller, however, is the fact that eventually good roads will prove the solution of the high cost of living problem.

COST OF ROAD CONSTRUCTION

Some of Determining Factors Are Right of Way, Material and Culverts or Bridges.

Some of the things which determine the cost of road construction are: Cost of right of way, cost of clearing and grubbing, amount and kind of material to be excavated and amount of filling to be done, amount of ditching for surface drainage and tiling for subdrainage, number and size of stream crossings necessitating curverts or bridges, cost of securing and placing material.



NEED QUALIFIED SHEPHERDS

Important That Sheep Raising Be Encouraged Where Conditions Are Suitable for It.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

"I am not convinced that a general campaign to increase the number of small-farm stocks of sheep is thoroughly wise unless the field for such an effort is first prepared," said Dr. J. R. Mohler, chief of the bureau of animal industry, in an address before the More-Sheep-More-Wool association. "There must be established a popular understanding of principles which experienced sheepmen are likely to take for granted.

"With dairy herds we find that best methods of production seldom prevail when only a few animals are kept. The owner of a very small herd is not often interested in better breeding, eeding or disease control. He is not a dairyman. But when he has a herd of a dozen cows or more he become a real asset to a great dairy business.

"So with sheep. We must aim, it appears to me, not so much for an increase in the number of flocks as an increase in the number of sheep kept by men who are real shepherds or have the qualifications and desire to become shepherds. Nor should we forget that farmers in general may not be versatile enough to add a profitable

MANY ASSOCIATIONS FORMED

Fifty-nine live-stock breeders' associations, with a reported membership of 1,524, were organized during the last fiscal year with the help of the United States department of agriculture extension specialists. In addition numerous calf clubs were organized among the boys and girls. Much of the work is being done in regions where the beef-cattle industry is practically new.

One of the purposes of beef-cattle extension activities is to eliminate scrub bulls and replace them with purebreds of good quality. The federal workers co-operate with the state agricultural colleges through their extension divisions and particularly with county agents,

SILAGE FOR LITTLE CALVES

Heavy Ration Fed to Young Animals Has Tendency to Cause Repeated Scouring.

Young calves under a year old do not benefit from a heavy silage ration, because on such young animals it has a tendency to cause repeated scouring. It can, however, be satisfactorily fed to calves between six months and one year old, provided it is limited to a small part-say not more than one-third-of the weight of the entire ration.





> Docks Said to Have Had Gratifying Success.

The varnish is warmed by heating its container in boiling water till the varnish becomes sufficiently liquid, when it is spread 1-16 to 1-8 of an inch thick on pieces of straw board or thickish cardboard, measuring about 15 in, by 12 in. A margin of about 1 in, is left clear of varnish and balt placed in the center of the board, where it adheres to the varnish. Bags of 60 at a time have been secured.
