Better Our Schools.

S. O. S. "SAVE OUR SCHOOLS"

A crisis has been reached in the school interests of Texas. This year we needed 2000 more teachers than could be secured for the schools.

About 70,000 children did not attend school, because of this shortage. It is conceded by all that there is ONE HOPE. In the November election these will be submitted to the voters of Texas, an amendment to the State Constitution. This amendment proposes to remove the limit on the amount of taxes which the people of any district may vote to support their own schools.

It does not raise taxes; it merely permits each school district to make such provision as it chooses for the support of its schools.

The first step proposed to gain this necessary legislation is selecting May, First, as Tag Day for every city, town, and community in the State. Each and every one will have an opportunity on that day to buy a tag; proceeds to go for a general State fund to be used in carrying on a campaign for passing this amendment.

No tag will be sold for less than 10 cts., and you can pay as much as your conscience may dictate.

It all goes for better schools.

ANOTHER RESULT.

Amarillo News—Another evidence of the influence that is being exercised for the people of the Panhandle country by the Panhandle Plains Chamber of Commerce, of which F. R. Jamison is secretary-manager, lies in an announcement sent out by the Associated Press to the effect that one hundred cars a day are being sent into this territory over the Rock Island, Fort Worth & Denver and Santa Fee lines to take care of the grain shipments. The Panhandle-Plains Chamber of Commerce requested a total of 7,000 empties.

The request, urgent in tone, that these lines supply the demand, came from the interstate Commerce Commission, with which organization the Panhandle-Plains Chamber of Commerce had communication.

Thursday afternoon at the appointed hour, the ladies of the Home Progress Club, together with several invited guests, met at the Will Locke residence, to conclude the program given in the year book on educational topics of the day. Mr. Gilley gave an interesting paper on the new amendment to the constitution. A committee from the Club will have these tags on sale. Mrs. Lute Seibers paper on competent teachers was very inter-

esting, and showed plainly that if we expect the best teachers, or expect men and women to properly prepare ourselves to teach our children, that we must pay them better salaries. The teachers who have charge of our children nine months out of the year draw less than the common hod carrier. Can we as parents afford to let this calamity continue. Mr. Dyer addressed to this paper by an interesting talk along this and similar subjects. Mrs. Claude Locke's paper was on Visual Education, or teaching by the motion picture in the school. They have the motion picture in the school at Canadian, and the Superintendent offered to bring their machine to Miami on some convenient evening and thus give us a chance to see the value of it. General discussion on all these subjects by those present made the afternoon one of helpful education. After the program a social hour of Nut Sandeas, and white cake were served to seventeen active members, four associate members, and six guests.
