

## HAS WEALTH OF FIBROUS PLANTS

Decline of Coffee and Rubber Trade Brings Revival of Old Industry in Brazil.

### GOVERNMENT AIDS IN TESTS

More Than 100 Varieties Furnish Ma terial for Jute, Brushes, Hats and Cordage-Country Has Enor. mous Resources.

Washington.-Brazil, although covered with fibrous plants, imports \$5,-000,000 worth of jute and Indian hemp annually. The traveler, who watches a long line of cargadores staggering under the weight of bags of coffee in the port of Santos, has only to turn his glasses toward the neighboring hills to see some of the best specimens of fiberrielding plants.

The answer is simple. The country is so huge and at the same time so underpopulated that all of its resources will not be developed for years to come. The recent announcement that the federal government was ready to receive 40,000,000 immigrants will give some idea of the existing ratio of the population of this South American state to its area.

Lately, with the decline of the rubber industry, caused by the difficulty in competing with the rubber plantations of the far East, and since coffee raising has become less profitable beturned its attention to the commercial value of fibrous plants, and their develtion of investors. STANDARDIZING ROAD TESTS

Conference of Engineers Expected to Eliminate Confusion and Other Difficulties.

Confusion and other difficulties that have come from the use in differer states of varying tests for materials used in road construction are expect ed to be eliminated by a recent con ference held in the offices of the br reau of public roads. United States & partment of agriculture. Highwa testing engineers representing most the states attended. From their sp gestions a system of standardized test is to be evolved.

Manufacturers of road materials, as well as the federal and state high way departments, have been inconv lenced, because materials that wo meet the requirements of one sta would be rejected in another ofte because of different interpretations specifications. Much of this work is done co-operatively by the federal ar

state governments under the federal aid road act, which is one of the res sons why it has been thought advisable to set up national standards that will be in effect in all states.



SOMETHING ABOUT SOUPS.



stantial, the soup should be clear, light and hot, but not necessarily nutritious. But in meals where the soup is to form the main dish of the family it should be nutritious in character.

To make stock use bones left from steaks, roasts and poultry or the liquor in which they have been boiled; keep in the ice chest. They may be added to from day to day. The bones should be cracked so that all the marrow may be dissolved. Cover the bones and any meat with cold water and simmer gently for several hours. Skim and at the end of the third hour add any flavorings such as herbs, any of the onion family, cloves, carrot, turnip, celery tops, bay leaves and a teaspoonful of peppercorns to each four quarts of soup. The delicate flavor of soup is ruined if it is boiled, as the volatile off and other flavors pass off in the air. The stock is strained at the end of four hours and set away to cool so that the surplus fat can be easily removed. To clarify stock allow one egg white with the shell for each quart of stock. Crush the shell and beat it with a little cold stock and the egg white until well mixed. Add to the stock just brought to the boiling point and then strain through cheesecloth wrung out of cold water. In summer stock will keep better with no vegetable flavorings added.

Consomme.-Take a shin of beef and a shin of veal, wipe with damp cloth. Cut all meat from the bones. In a kettle add one teaspoonful of caramel or a teaspoonful of sugar to brown, then add half a cupful of chopped onion and the same quantity of water. Cook five minutes, then add the bones which have been well cracked, the meat, and cover with five quarts of cold water. Let simmer and follow the above directions and finish in the same way.


Either beans or peas make a most nutritious soup. Cook the vegetables until very soft, with an onion. Put them through a sieve and bind with flour and butterecooked together. Add milk and serve well seasoned and hot,

A puree is a thick soup. For the preparation of this soup a sieve and wooden spoons are necessary as the vegetables if put through the sieve beand does not sink to the bottom of the kettle. The milk is slightly thickened and holds the fine particles of vegetable in suspension.

Whip with a dover egg beater until the mixture is stiff enough to stand up and keep its shape. It will take about twenty minutes' beating. Serve in sherbet cups with a thin custard for a sauce.

Scalloped Celery .- Cook two cupfuls of celery in water to cover, until tender. Save one cupful of the stock; add to it one cupful of milk. Melt two tablespoonfuls of butter; add two of flour and when well mixed add the milk and stock. Cook until smooth and thick; season well with salt and pepper, then add the cooked celery and one-half cupful of cheese. Line a buttered baking dish with buttered bread crumbs, pour in the celery and sauce and cover with crumbs. dish may be prepared in layers of cel-

ery, cheese and sauce, if preferred. Nut Timbals .- Melt two tablespoon fuls of butter; add one cupful of soft bread crumbs and three-quarters of a cupful of milk; cook until smooth. Add one cupful of nut meats, one tablespoonful of minced parsley and two eggs, well beaten. Season with salt and pepper. Fill buttered individual molds two-thirds full, set in a pan of hot water and bake 20 minutes, covered with a buttered paper.

Chicken a la Reine .- Melt four tablespoonfuls of butter, add three tablespoonfuls of flour, and when well blended add three cupfuls of milk; stir and cook slowly, then add two cupfuls of diced chicken, one-half cupful of mushrooms, one cupful of asparagus tips, one-fourth cupful of pimentoes minced, one teaspoonful of salt, a dash of mustard and paprika. Keep hot over hot water until ready to serve.






# FARM ANIMALS

KILL ALL HARMFUL ANIMALS

Annual Loss Wrought by Predatory Wild Beasts and Rodents Mounts Up Into Millions.

Live stock and wool valued at \$20, 000,000 are lost annually through the depredations of wild animals. The value of farm produce and forage destroyed each year by rodents is approximately \$300,000,000. It is estimated that the households of this country sustain an annual loss from rats and mice of \$200,000,000.

These figures sum up certain of the larger losses due to destructive wild life which the biological survey of the United States department of agriculture is engaged in reducing as rapidly as possible. A force of between 400 and 500 experienced hunters was employed by this bureau during the past year to kill predatory animals, many of which were infected with rabies;

this disease often is spread from the wild creatures to domestic animals, and frequently endangers humans. In this work of extermination the states and numerous private organizations have had an important share.

The work of killing rodents-prairie dogs, ground squirrels, jack rabbits and cottontails, pocket gophers, native mice, wood rats, cotton rats, etc.-is also carried on with the co-operation of the states. During the past fiscal year ground squirrels were poisoned to 95 per cent of the prairie dogs found | many fair women. on a total of 2,200,000 acres were destroyed.

### BANK FAVORS BETTER SIRES

Concern at Fond du Lac, Wis., Urges Its Patrons to Improve Quality of Stock.

With the publication of a four-page farm news leastet, of which a current copy is a "Duroc Sale and Pig Club Number," a bank at Fond du Lac. Wis., is encouraging its patrons to improve their live stock. The editor of the sheet has the unique title of "bank agriculturist," and his activities are devoted largely to financing farmers who wish to acquire well-bred animals or to become joint owners in valuable

In a letter to the United States department of agriculture the bank agriculturist calls attention to the support being given hog-cholera control, pig-club work, and other activities in which the government is active. The leastet contains a "For Sale and Want Column." relating especially to live stock, gives current news among breeders, and contains discussions ranging from the cure of cattle to the handling of bees. An expressed purpose of the bank's activities is "to make Fond du Lac county a land where milk and honey flows."

### RATION OF COTTONSEED MEAL

One Pound Per Day for Each 1,000 Pounds Live Weight Is Most Satisfactory.

One pound of cottonseed meal per day for each 1,000 pounds live weight is the most satisfactory quantity to feed work animals, according to recent experiments conducted by the United States department of agriculture. A test in feeding cottonseed meal to work horses and mules at the government farm, Beltsville, Md., was begun in 1918, and continued last year. When the meal was fed in large quantities harmful effects were apparent however, indicating that cottonseed meal, like any other high-protein feed must be fed with care to horses and mules,

### BLACKLEG VACCINE IS FREE

Department Report Shows That 3,339,-815 Doses Were Distributed During Last Year.

Vaccine for immunizing cattle against blackleg is still in great demand. A report of the bureau of animal industry, United States department of agriculture, shows that 3,339,-815 doses were distributed free to stock owners during the last fiscal year. The vaccine sent out by the bureau is in the powdered form.

POINT FOR HOME BUILDERS

Value of House Is Greatly Enhanced by the Presence of Trees and Shrubbery.

If at all possible, say specialists of the United States department of agriculture, the house should be located near good trees, the shade of which may be used and enjoyed by the family every day during the summer. It takes so long to grow good trees that those already available should be cherished and utilized to the fullest

Another thing that should be carefully considered is outlook. The house should be located so that the windows of the rooms most used look out upon attractive views. The living-room and the kitchen are entitled to first consideration in this matter. The near view should be over an unbroken lawn, and there should be some object of interest beyond. ### Loop and Elevated Aerials.

An extensive research on radio transmission and reception with various types of aerials has been in progress at the bureau of standards, Washington, D. C., says the Scientific American. One of the most interesting questions at the present time is as to the relative advantages of the antenna, or usual type of elevated aerial. and the smaller coil aerial or "loop." This question is answered by the studies of the bureau. The small coil aerial has many advantages, but is usually not so powerful a transmitting and receiving device as the antenna type of aerial. It may, however, have so much lower resistance than the antenna that it is equal to it in transmitting and receiving value.




