Pampa and Woodward Ball Teams Will Play for Championship.

Saturday will be a real gala day in Miami when the American Legion's big Celebration takes place. One of the main features of the day will be the ball game between Pampa and Woodward. The Legion has gone to much expense to secure these two splendid teams. They have played two games this season, each winning one, and this will play off their tie. More than one thousand Pampa people are expected down, and near a train load from Woodward.

## TUBERCULOSIS SANATORIUM STATISTICS.

The value and importance of sanatorium treatment in the cure of Tuberculosis is shown in a report recently issued by the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium for a twelve month period ending April 30th:

On discharge or final examination all patients are classified under the rules adopted by the National Tuberculosis Association as to their progress in the cure as follows: Arrested, Apparently Arrested, Quiescent, Improved and unimproved. The average stay per patient included in this report was less than six months. Under the method of classification used the physical signs or symptoms must have been abated or stationary for a period of from three to six months. For this reason many patients classed as quiescent or improved should really come under "apparently cured" cases, however, this cannot be done until a certain period of time has elapsed from the last examination.

698 patients were discharged of whom 284 were males and 414 females. Of this number on admission five were classed as incipient cases, 380 as moderately advanced, 233 as far advanced and 80 cases not considered. Of the five incipients, on their final examination, two were classed as arrested cases, one quiescent and two improved. Of the 380 moderately advanced cases on discharge, 39 were classed as arrested cases, 19 apparently arrested, 157 quiescent, 134 improved, thirty unimproved and one died. Of the 233 far advanced cases on discharge, one was classed as arrested, three apparently arrested, 25 quiescent, 122 improved, 70 unimproved and twelve died.

247 or 35 1-2 per cent of the cases discharged made an excellent recovery and were in splendid condition. By following the daily routine and the rules taught of after "sanatorium treatment" each of these patients upon their return home will take up their former duties, continue to improve and enjoy perfect health.

Statistics of ex-patients for a number of years show that many of them are in perfect health, working every day and earning more than before they were sick. 258 made substantial improvement and with the knowledge obtained in regard to rest, exercise and diet can return home with the assurance of knowing exactly how to take care of themselves. By taking their daily rest for a period of time at home they will continue to improve and eventually regain their health. The sanatorium was not established as a home for consumptives, but for the purpose of education and instruction so that after a patient is discharged he can go anywhere and continue to take the proper treatment. 100 patients showed no improvement whatever, however, it must be remembered that more than this number or 233 were classed as far advanced upon admission. Patients cannot expect to regain their health in any sanatorium or better climate if they wait until their condition is far advanced before starting treatment. So many wait for the breakdown before they think it is necessary to enter a sanatorium. This is a great mistake and we are trying to correct this by education. This report shows that eighty-five per cent made improvement, while at least fifty per cent of this number will make permanent improvement, return to their respective homes and be an asset to the community. Tuberculosis is one of the most preventable and curable of the contagious diseases if treatment is begun in time.

The Sanatorium is now giving treatment to from 700 to 1000 patients annually. 713 were admitted during the past twelve months, 285 males and 428 females.

A bureau of correspondence is maintained by the sanatorium to assist patients and to send out valuable and instructive literature on the prevention and cure of tuberculosis.

## SLIGHT HAIL DAMAGE WITH RAIN

A good portion of the Panhandle south, east and north of Amarillo received a good rain Tuesday night. The rain reached to Miami, but a very light shower fell in town, while a good rain is reported on both the North and South plains. Chris Chisum and John Moore were in yesterday and report a small strip hail damage on the south plains. A two inch rain was reported eight miles south of town, and a good rain reported in the Greenlake community.

**MANY VARIETIES OF SHARK**

Some Sea Monsters More to Be Feared Than Others, but All Ferocious to a Degree.

There are many families and varieties of the shark. Some of these families are smaller, more cowardly and less successful as killers than other families, says the Kansas City Star. They are not especially fierce toward things that are bigger and stronger than they. The dusky sharks and the sand sharks are not believed to be man killers, but they are man eaters when the opportunity arises.

The largest and fiercest shark is the great white shark. His disposition is to kill and eat, and he is so large and strong and self-confident that he will attack anything that swims, and a man is little more than a tinnow or a hering to him. The great white shark inhabits the tropic and subtropic seas. The normal length of the teeth is one inch and they are flat, triangular and saw edge. Many of these sharks have been killed that were 20 feet long.

**Microbe Factory.**

London, England, boasts a microbe factory. Biologists in general, and bacteriologists in particular, are able to serve humanitarian interests only by a close study of authentic strains of recognized bacteria, carefully cultured in their various species and classes. Yet it is only quite recently that the needs of medical workers in this respect have been fully met. For their supply of disease microbes for experimental purposes, British scientists were very largely dependent upon the courtesy of colleagues in other countries. Before the war, for instance, a polite note to M. Dinet of the Pasteur Institute in Paris was quite the recognized procedure adopted by a medico who wished to start or add to a microbe menagerie. Characteristically an effort to commercialize this all-important traffic was made by Kral at Prague, but that source of supply was never satisfactory.

According to Dr. Strickland Goodall, a noted heart specialist, it is a physiological fact that hearts do break. POOR LEAD TO OBTAIN SPLIT

Attempt to Arouse Indignation Over "Horror on the Rhine" Proves Diemal Failure.

"The Germanophile attempt to arouse American indignation over the horror on the Rhine" and thereby to lead to a split, spiritual rather than diplomatic, between America and her recent allies has failed of its purpose in precisely the same way that German propaganda in this country failed in every one of the years between 1914 and 1918," says an editorial in the American Legion Weekly.

"Dr. Von Mach has proved himself a poor servant of his country, whether he regards his country as America or Germany. He is a poor American for having tried to win America over to the point of view of the unrepentant nation to defeat whose government 100,000 Americans gave their lives, for attempting to resurrect a hyphen that was theoretically buried just three years ago.

POST WINS ON GOLDEN CALF

Two-Headed Animal Aids in Raising Organization's Funds From \$100 to \$1,500.

The Golden Calf of the Twentieth century has been discovered by the American Legion post at Fredericksburg, Va., which owes an increase in its working capital from \$100 to \$1,500 to a two-headed juvenile cow, in full title to which the post invested its scant \$100 last fall.

Having induced a Westmoreland county farmer to part with the freak animal for this sum, a special levy of various small amounts was made upon the treasury to buy nourishment for the calf.

The Fredericksburg post put him on exhibit, charging a suitable fee. When the fair was over and the dust had settled, the post treasury contained \$1,500—the accrued earnings of

the calf—and all this for doing nothing but standing still and being inspected.

It was recently that the representative of a large circus made his offer of \$150 for the animal and it was accepted. There is a rumor that the excitement of travel and late hours have affected the calf's health and that he is a poor insurance risk.

Legion Men Among the Miners.

The activity of the American Legion in the mining districts of southeast Kansas is another pertinent proof that the misunderstanding between labor bodies and the ex-service men's organization has been dissipated.

LEGION ROLLERS UNDER THEM

Ex-Service Men Promptly Halt Exploitations of Pro-German Troublemakers.

In response to the warning issued by their national commander, F. W. Galbraith, Jr., American Legion members in many parts of the country have been active in fighting against efforts of pro-Germans and other hyphenated persons to drive a wedge between America and her allies in the World War.

Twenty-five thousand patriotic citizens of New York attended the "All American Meeting for God and Country," which was held in Madison Square Garden under the auspices of the Legion, as a protest against a previous pro-German meeting, said to be for the purpose of creating sentiment against the alleged "Horror on the Rhine."

When word was received in Philadelphia that Dr. Edmund von Mach, notorious German propagandist, was planning to hold a meeting in that city, Legion members and other patriotic citizens opposed the proposition and succeeded in blocking the scheme.

Similar action was taken by the Legion and various societies in Indianapolis. Among the organizations co-operating with the Legion was the national executive committee of the American Gymnastic Union, composed of a large membership of citizens of German extraction, which insisted upon unhyphenated citizenship and scored Von Mach and George Sylvester Viereck. On the same day the Indianapolis board of public works announced it would not permit the use of its large convention hall for the proposed Von Mach meeting.

Learning that Louisville was on the proposed itinerary of Doctor Von Mach, the Kentucky department of the Legion instructed posts to use "every lawful means practicable to stop the threatened invasion of Boche propagandists." The Kentucky Legion's bulletin also warned against the activities of Viereck.

Legion posts have also opposed the hyphenates in Chicago, Cleveland, Omaha, Cincinnati and Milwaukee.

THREE VOICES AT ONE TIME

Minneapolis Legion Man Can Sing Tenor, Bass and Baritone Parts Simultaneously.

Wonder voices have been heralded the world over, at least since the inception of the press agent. But it was left for Joe Kaufman, a former army sergeant and an American Legion member in Minneapolis, Minn., to sing the first male trio simultaneously, carrying the parts alone with the same harmony and control of three singers.

Kaufman is a government music student. The secret of Kaufman's unusual accomplishment has baffled voice experts as well as himself. Several years ago he discovered his ability to produce overtones which gave the sound of more than one part. He entered the MacPhail school at Minneapolis as a government student and, as his voice strengthened and became clearer, he developed the curious trio.

The only cause remotely similar to that of Kaufman, according to his instructor in the government school, is that of a woman singer in whose voice could be distinguished one separate overtone, over which she had practically no control. The former soldier in some way has separated and controlled tenor, bass and baritone parts simultaneously.

LEGION MAN BUSY WITH B'S

Buckeye Boy Bends, Bows and Bows Bad and Beautiful Bonus Boosting Babbie.

"Apt alliteration's artful aid" was not neglected when an Akron (O.) member of the American Legion spun the following bonus yarn:

"Burt began to bitterly berate the 'bull' about the bonus bill, bewailing the benighted bigotry of the belligerent birds, badly blocking the bonus by bombastic blusterings and brabble, and branding the busted bucks who bore the brunt of the battle as badgers and booty-burglars of billions in bonds, believed by big, bald business brow-beaters to belong buried in banks.

"Before our bewildered Burt boarded a boat to become a battle-scarred vet beyond the borders of our bright, beautiful, big country, he became a benedict; and, back from the battles, busted and barren of bullion, our benighted boy here became beautifully bored because big bibulous bunco men breathlessly built a bunch of back-hand lies to bribe him by a bunk promise of a bonus.

"But Burt isn't badly brow-beaten by the bedraggled babbie of a bonus. Blythe, buoyant and bubbling, bidding his time, Burt, the benedict and battle buddy, and Beulah, his bride, believe the bully and bumpfious idea that a beneficent bunch of birds will be brought to believe that big battles beat the Boche and busted bucks need bread; and before beaucoup belated years pass a bonus bill to bring the bacon back to our buddy, Burt.

BETTER ROADS

SAFETY FIRST FOR CHILDREN

Many Requirements Furnish Variety of Topics for Essays and Oral Discussion.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture)

The many requirements for safety will furnish a variety of topics for school children's essays and oral discussion. The dangers of railroad crossings at grade, the economic justification for abolishing them, the importance of an unobstructed view up and down the track as a vehicle approaches, and the disadvantage of sharp turns, etc., are suggestive subjects. Similarly there might also be mentioned the questions raised by street intersections and turns.

Another question, in solving which the engineer and economist will need the help of enlightened public opinion (and this enlightenment should start in the public schools), is that of the relation of the public highways to railroads and canals. The advantage of long hauls by rail and short hauls by motor truck; feeding into main terminal points by radiating systems of highways; a division of the transportation burden by parallel systems of water, rail, and road transportation, are some of the subdivisions of this general heading.

This listing of topics is not intended to be complete or exact, but merely suggestive. Those which refer to construction could best be utilized when construction work is in progress in the vicinity of a school.

Many of the other topics may be studied from maps, of which the students might be required to make tracings or free-hand sketches showing the particular features for which emphasis is desired, or regarding which the exercise is being written. State highway departments often feel the need of a better popular understanding of the problems of road construction, and their officials would doubtless co-operate in a hearty manner. Looking ahead, it is easy to see an actual shortage of men qualified to carry on the work of highway development, so rapid is the growth of the good-roads movement. Highway in-

struction in high schools offers opportunity to state highway departments to develop a body of future citizens equipped with a better understanding of the need for roads, and the problems likely to be met in building them, and, at the same time, to stimulate interest in the profession of highway engineering.

State departments and county engineers can help teachers (1) by furnishing occasional lectures, simple in text and preferably illustrated with lantern slides; (2) by furnishing photographs of highways and construction work for classroom or reference use; (3) by assisting teachers in the explanation of work in progress which can be inspected by classes of students. Many states also issue bulletins or reports which are valuable for reference.

Determine Road Cost.

Some of the things which determine the cost of road construction are: Cost of right of way; cost of clearing and grubbing; amount and kind of material to be excavated and amount of filling to be done; amount of ditching for surface drainage and tiling for sub-drainage; number and size of stream crossings necessitating culverts or bridges; cost of securing and placing material.

Indorsed by President.

Cost of Maintenance. The annual cost of road maintenance in New York state, which includes merely the lighter repairs, aggregates about \$3,500,000.

**BUY COAL SUPPLY EARLY**

Will coal be cheaper in the fall? Misled by rumors not based on fact, the consumer is delaying his coal purchases in the hope of buying for less later in the season. These rumors are based on the assumption that coal freight rates will be reduced, that the cost of producing coal will be less, and that the coal mines can run to capacity during the summer and pile up vast stores of coal.

Chairman Clark of the Interstate Commerce Commission has informed J. D. A. Morrow, Vice-President of the National Coal Association at Washington that no program of general reduction of coal freight rates is before the Commissioner nor does he know of any such proposal which is to come before the Commission. All the information the National Coal Association has is to the effect that coal consumers must expect to buy their coal this summer and fall on existing basis of coal freight rates from the mines.

The cost of producing coal will not be less, say the operators. They say the present contract with the miners has yet another year to run. It expires in April 1922. The present wage scale of miners, in other words, will continue another year.

Nor have the mines storage capacity great enough to keep the mines running to capacity, if the consumers of coal delay buying till fall. The normal production of coal, according to the Association, is about eleven million tons a week. But the demand has fallen off until the production during the last few months has dropped to about seven and one-half million tons a week. The underproduction is already more than 45,000,000 tons because of lack of demand and storage facilities.

A serious coal shortage is indicated in the fall unless retailers and consumers buy and store coal without delay. It is economy to buy coal now. The dealers have plenty of time to make deliveries. The railroads are in position to move coal from the mines promptly, equipment being plentiful. In the fall crops will be moving to market and coal will have to take its turn.

The wild scramble for coal in 1919 has evidently been forgotten, but it will be repeated in the fall of 1921 unless dealers and consumers arrange for their coal supply without further delay.
