Therefore they have been turning them over to the packeries in large numbers and getting from under the load of interest they were carrying. They have thus avoided the expense of carrying them through the winter. The small man that owns his own herds and has no commission money borrowed on them will be able to keep his stuff, and they will eventually pay him for his expense and time. The price of cattle will come back, but it will never reach the proportions it reached during the war.



That Will Be of Interest to Many Communities Throughout the Country.

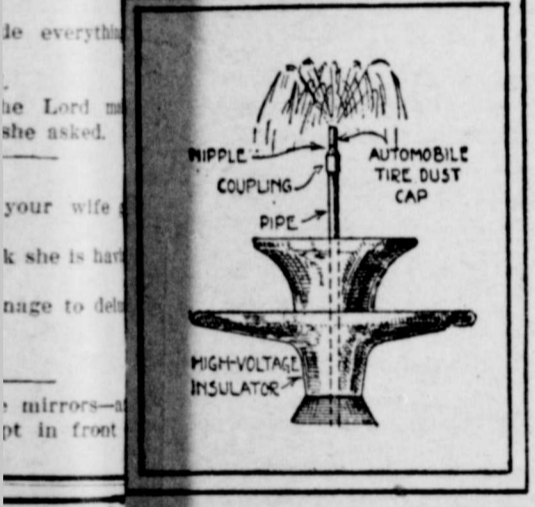
In Salem, Mass., a resident sued the town and light company for damages caused by the killing of five shade trees through the escape of gas from a leaky main. A verdict for \$1,000 against the company was rendered—\$200 a tree. The decision is said to have been awaited with a good deal of interest by surrounding towns, for tree killing from this cause is a common thing. It has happened many times in Indianapolis, according to reports, though complaints have not been heard lately with the frequency that characterized them back in the days when natural gas was piped through the streets, hastily and no doubt often carelessly.

The killing of a thrifty, well-grown shade tree is usually a distinct loss to any property, commonly lowering its value. In view of the time required for the growth of such trees \$200 is a moderate sum in the way of damages, and no amount of money, when it comes to that, can really recompense the owner of the trees. They have to him, especially if he planted and cared for them, a sentimental value that dollars cannot measure. They have added beauty to his home and he has counted them among his treasures. To a real tree lover, a beautiful tree, whether its own or not, seems almost to possess a personality of its own and to see it struggle for life and gradually die, brings real sorrow. ## GEORGETTE CREPE POPULAR FOR LATEST STYLE IN BLOUSES



WITH an assured confidence in its success, manufacturers of blouses have presented again the blouse of georgette crepe with embroidery of beads, in both overblouse and tuck-in models. Nearly all the fancier blouses are made in the first-mentioned style and cut with either kimono or set-in sleeves.

It is natural that so beautiful a fabric as georgette crepe should have an army of devotees, but there are other materials in the running which will gain as the weather grows cold. Crepe de chine and crepe satin are also wonderfully beautiful in texture and not so sheer as georgette. As a rule, they are selected for the less fancy blouses. Georgette lends itself so well to novel effects that designers like to work with it, and the demand for fanciful and novel decorative features keeps them busy. For trimming beads, embroideries and soutache braid predominate in present showings—both bugle and seed beads, give a good account of themselves, and in girdles there is a new departure toward those not made of the material in the blouse.

In this model an overblouse is made of georgette crepe and handsome, embroidered with seed beads in two colors. It has a boat-shaped neck bound with a narrow bias fold of the georgette, set-in sleeves a little longer than three-quarter length with a band set on and opened. The sleeve and hand are caught up in a few folds, held to place by a small bead motif. The girdle is made of beads and silk cord.

If one is looking for a new blouse for present wear, it may well be of black georgette crepe combined with a color, as old blue, jade-green, henna, or both blue and henna. The color is sparingly used as in a narrow band about the neck or a lining for the girdle, or an inset piece at the front. Black wool fringe is sometimes used as a finish on these blouses and single flower motifs, embroidered in two or three colors, are posed on them, some times near the girdle, and again, near the shoulder.

## IF FARM STOCK

### KEEP PRODUCERS INFORMED

Farmers Advised to Study Market Reports In and Out of Season to Keep Posted.

(Prepared by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.)

How can the farmer and stock raiser turn the live stock reports of the bureau of markets, United States Department of Agriculture, into dollars is frequently asked.

The answer is for the farmer to get so much information out of the reports that he can conduct his breeding, feeding and marketing operations a little more intelligently in the future, and therefore more profitably than in the past.

Market reports are history, and the chief value of history is the basis which it provides on which to forecast the future. In other words, what has happened in the past will probably occur again under the same or similar circumstances.

Small benefit is generally derived from reading a single market report, or one covering a short period of time. Markets move in cycles, and the man who would keep informed must follow them diligently in season and out. This is a matter of particular importance to the stockman, because his business is, to an unusual degree, a long-time speculation. He must prepare now and lay his plans today in light of what he thinks the market will be anywhere from six months to two years hence. But how will the department's reports assist him in doing this?

First of all, he should take into account potential supplies of the particular class of live stock in which he is interested. Assume that cattle is his line. The monthly report, Stock at Stockyards, gives the number of cattle and calves marketed from month to month through 68 central markets. If such movements are unusually heavy for any considerable time, it may indicate a cattle shortage during the next year or two, and a shortage of any commodity usually means higher prices.

This same report also shows the number of cattle and calves that went back to the country as stockers and feeders. If such movements were exceptionally light, it would help to confirm the belief that a comparative shortage in cattle was impending. On the other hand, heavy stocker and feeder shipments would go a long way toward neutralizing the importance of

the heavy receipts, for the stockmen would know that most of these cattle going back to the country must be returned to market during the next few weeks or months and enter consumption channels.

Having established in this fashion a broad basis for his operations, let us assume the stockman is feeding a lot of steers for the market. He must now give market reports more careful and persistent attention than before. It is quite important that he know what kind of cattle are in best demand on the principal markets. If there is a steady inquiry for heavy finished cattle, and that kind are selling at a premium over lighter weights, it will probably pay him to "feed his cattle out," unless the cost of feed is exceptionally high.

If, however, consumptive demand seems to be drifting steadily toward lighter retail cuts of meat, or, because of general business depression or some other cause, is centering chiefly on the lower and cheaper grades, he may find it more profitable to market his cattle at an earlier age and before they have attained great weight.

Abundant information along this line will be found both in the live stock market reports and the reports dealing with meat-trade conditions in the large consuming centers.

In this connection the stockman will also be interested in keeping advised as to whether the slaughter of meat is increasing or decreasing and whether the movement applies equally to all classes of meat, or whether slaughter of beef is decreasing while that of some other class is increasing. This information is obtainable from the statistical report covering the live stock and meat situation, which is based on the federal meat-inspection reports of the bureau of animal industry and is also published monthly by the bureau of markets.

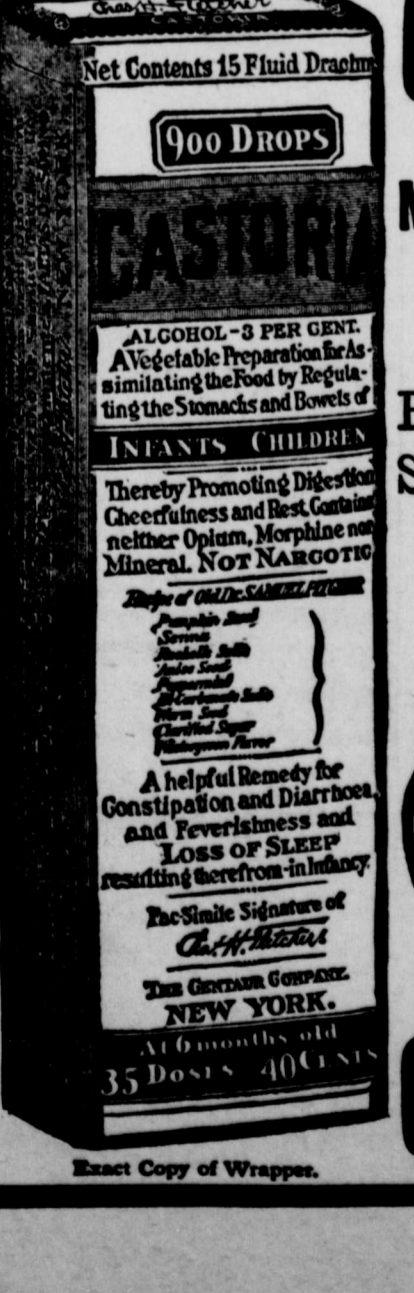
