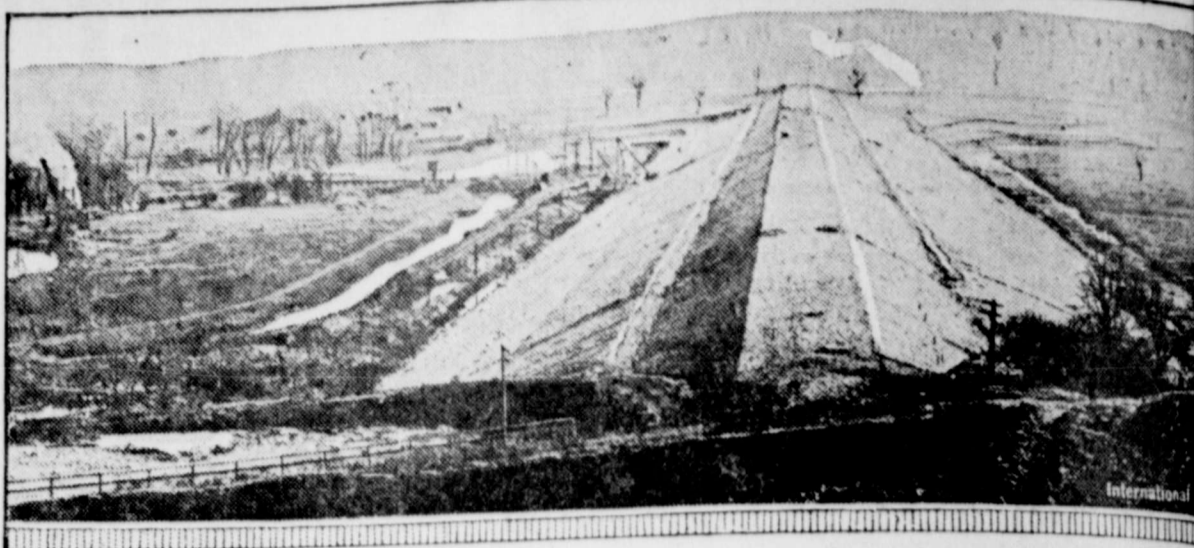

Find Athletes Good Students

Naval Academy Board Makes Report After Scanning Records of Thirty Years.

TEND TO STAY IN SERVICE

Members of Sports Squad Likely to Stick to Career Planned, Investigation Shows—Same Conclusion at Harvard.

Annapolis.—Facts as to the scholastic work of college athletes and their careers in later life have probably been developed in a more thorough and accurate manner than ever before by a board of officers at the Naval academy. These men have traced the course of every academy athlete over a period of 30 years. It has been shown that the athletes are slightly better students than the other midshipmen, and that they show a far greater permanency in the service than the others. The conclusions as to the scholarship of athletes are in line with the results of similar investigations at other institutions of learning where athletics are conducted on a sane basis. As to the careers of athletes in the service the application is more limited, but it is believed by authorities here that qualities which promote success in life in general are developed through properly handled sports. The board of officers was composed of Capt. John Halligan, Commanders Macgillivray, Milne and Douglas L. Howard and Lieut. Everett E. Taylor, medical corps. All but the last named are graduates of the Naval academy and were active athletes while there. Captain Halligan, though captain and guard in the football team and a member of the crew, led his class in studies. Commander Howard was captain and end of the eleven. As a basis for its investigations the board examined the membership of the classes graduated from the naval academy during the years 1891 to 1911, inclusive. The work of the midshipmen of these classes while at the academy was examined and their careers in the service were followed. Of the 1,761 graduates of the Naval academy during this period 592 qualified as athletes by winning a first or second letter in some branch. The scholastic work of the athletes while at the academy was compared with those who did not qualify as such. Two hundred and fifty-five of the 592 athletes of this period were included in the upper half of the class grouped scholastically, and 217 were in the lower half. A like proportion was indicated when a class was divided in order to restore the four-year course after the war. It was found that there was a slight advantage on the part of the athletes, rather more than half being in the upper group of scholars. The slight scholastic advantage extends to the midshipmen who have won letters in one or two sports, but it is notable that it did not extend to those who had won three letters, indicating that they have been in active training for an athletic team during practically the whole of the scholastic year. The average standing of a midshipman who had won one letter was 48.34 in a hundred, and that of a two-letter man 49.11. The standing of three-letter men, however, fell to 55.14. It is now the rule at the academy that a midshipman may join but two team squads during the scholastic year. A recent official investigation at Harvard has developed about the same conclusions, but it is believed that the principle that properly conducted athletics do not interfere with studies is general. The conclusions reached as to the success of athletes in the service, although not of such general application, are of much interest. It was shown that there was no doubt at all that the athletes had a stronger tendency to stay in the service than their comrades in the academy. An examination of the history of all the members of certain classes which had been in the service for from 25 to 30 years showed that 50 per cent of the non-athletes had become separated from the service, while but 40 per cent of the one-letter men and 30 per cent of the two-letter men had lost their connection with it. The board indicated its belief that, while the improvement of health and strength from athletics might have had something to do with this condition, the controlling factor was the attachment to the service engendered through active participation in sports.

Woman's Savings Are Repaid by Convicts

Convicts in St. Louis, Mo., through an intermediary, have presented Miss Elizabeth Sutton, at the Christian Old People's home, a check for \$62 as part payment of her savings of \$92 taken from her by a supposed employer, who hired her as housekeeper, secured her funds, and then disappeared. The prison newspaper told of the incident, and the convicts set down on their smoking in order to reimburse the woman.

KILL GRANDPA OF BIG BEAR

Immense Bruin, Believed to Be Oldest of His Kind in Alaska, Bagged by Hunter.

Seattle, Wash.—What is believed to be Alaska's oldest bear was killed by an Indian hunter near Anchorage as the skin and head sent here on a seal. The animal was of immense size, the hide measuring 11 feet 1 inch length. The height of the bear was 6 feet at the shoulder. The Indian hunter and white men who traded the pelt estimated the weight of the animal at 1,700 pounds. The fact that bruin was toothless and almost clawless leads natives who have inhabited the Anchorage section for generations to believe it one long hunted. Their forefathers held a grudge against an old bear because in an early day, more than a century ago, he is alleged to have cornered and destroyed half of the folks in a little seacoast fishing village.

RUSS CHURCHES YIELD GEMS

Aladdin's Cave of Jewels Opened by Soviet Decree.

Rare Gems Are Discovered When Russian Church Treasures Are Taken to Feed Starving—Some Famous Icons.

Moscow.—An Aladdin's cave of jewels has been opened by the decision of the soviet authorities to confiscate some of the treasures of the Russian churches and sell them to feed the famine sufferers. The decree directs the seizure of all precious metals and stones, "which would not interfere with the interests of the various cults." Most famous of the church treasures, described by the Moscow newspaper, Izvestia, is the bejeweled ikon, "Our Lady of Kazan," at the Kazan cathedral in Petrograd. It is a representation of the virgin, done in beaten gold, weighing ten pounds and decorated with 1,655 larger and 1,482 lesser diamonds, 638 rubies, seven sapphires, 1,400 pearls and 155 other jewels, and hung about the neck of the virgin is a diamond necklace of huge, first-water stones. At Peter Paul's cathedral, also in Petrograd, there is another famous ikon, known as the "Jerusalem holy lady," in solid gold. It is about two feet square, and contains thirty-eight carats of large diamonds, thirteen

carats of middle-sized diamonds and fourteen and one-quarter carats of smaller stones. Altogether, in the church, says the Izvestia, there are twenty-four almost equally valuable ikons. To St. Isaac's cathedral, Petrograd were presented on the day it was opened a total of 215 articles, including eighty-one pounds of gold and 4,788 pounds of silver and later shrine was built of solid silver, weighing 468 pounds. St. Isaac's also has one ikon twenty-one inches wide by twenty-eight inches high, done in gold overlay and bearing a wreath of large diamonds. There are a dozen other ikons of tremendous value at St. Isaac's alone. While these big Petrograd cathedrals, which were long favored by royalty, probably contain the most valuable treasures of the Greek orthodox church in Russia, nearly every orthodox church in Moscow, Petrograd, Kazan, monasteries, convents and churches contains objects in gold and silver and jeweled ikons are not at all rare, even in the smaller cities. Royal gifts, donations by pious parishioners and church taxes for centuries went largely into ornamenting the churches. Kazan cathedral was the holy of holies to the Cossacks. The Cossacks of the Don once sent to it 1,440 pounds of silver, asking that it be made into ikons of four of the Apostles.

275,000 PERSONS RODE IN PLANES

Commercial Aviation Established on Firm Basis in 1921.

Hit and Miss Flying of Former Years Has Passed, Says Aviation Expert—130 Companies Now Permanently Established.

St. Louis, Mo.—Some 275,000 persons traveled by air in 1921, although a year ago many persons believed that the present generation would not accept the flying machine, according to a paper by Samuel S. Bradley of New York, general manager of the aeronautical chamber of commerce of America, read at the commercial air conference here. Commercial aviation "survived with no appreciable encouragement other than the hard work and relatively meager funds which its supporters put into it," the message said. "Such was 1920. Then the next twelve months witnessed the most interesting development in our transportation history. Hundreds of persons flew. The public has changed its mind. "The hit and miss flying of former years has passed, together with the aerial tramp, the side show performer and the self-styled 'dare-devil' of the air." The gipsy flier is being absorbed by the established companies. "Approximately 130 companies are permanently established and operating about half of the civilian planes in the country. In other words, they operate between 500 and 600 of the aggregate 1,200 machines. They report to us that in 1921 they carried 122,512 passengers and 123,221 pounds of freight. They traversed air routes and made short flights aggregating 2,907,245 miles. The average cost per passenger was 55 cents a mile as compared to 65 cents the year before. The average charge per flight was \$9. "Half of the activity of 1921 was carried on in the region between the

At the summit of the majestic
palm tree is a single flowering bud.
Under the great plan of life transmis-
sion the flower falls, the fruit
swells, and the seed drops. The
flower is but a brief incident of life.
The tree itself is but a brief of time.
In the sacrifice of the flower, the
tree by propagation goes on forever.
The incident of a man's presence
among us for the allotted span of life
may close, but his memory and his
deeds go on forever. When we have
lost our bravest and best, when we
bow o'er the inanimate clay that was
once full of life and hope, we yearn
to search beyond the impenetrable

curtains of time, and, groping blindly for the unattainable, our hearts keep beating out the love-gram. Why, why?"

When reason returns and sits enthroned again, a still small voice tell us that he is not dead, that God will continue a richly endowed soul whose building he must have found so difficult.

We want our loved ones, our friends, back again. The future looks desolate, and faith wavers as a flickering light. We miss that voice whose sound to us is sweeter music. Enthroned by all that makes life a great program of endeavor, of ambition, of the enjoyment of home, of love and laughter, a cloud obscured the noonday sun of life; the agency of death entered and claimed a harvest, and our beloved past president, L. G. Waggoner, took back to its Maker, the soul of a mortal man. The flower of manhood was transplanted in the perennial gardens of Paradise, there to bloom forevermore. The radiant, vibrant hope of a life well spent on earth is now nurtured under the imperishable sunlight of a never ending day of God's eternal love. 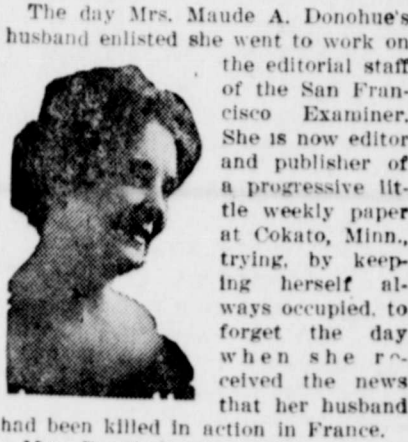

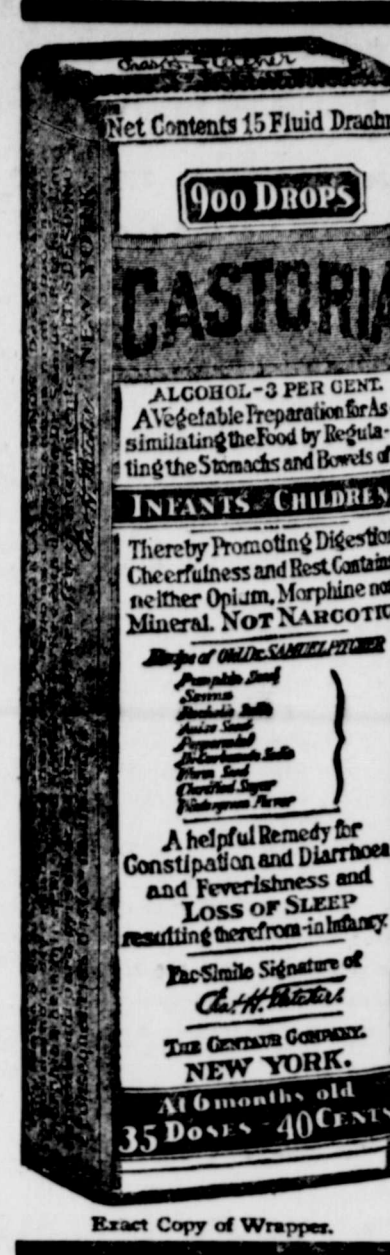
