

But they were all there and filled repeatedly with the best cookies and cakes you ever tasted—hermits, almond cakes, hickorynut macaroons, ginger squares and lady fingers, every one homemade. Nearly every woman there seemed as much interested in the recipes for the cookies as she was in the talk on Victorian Art which was made by the head of a well known art school.

Bake thirty-five minutes in a moderate oven (375 degrees F.). Sprinkle with granulated sugar and cut in small squares or bars before re-moving from the pan.

This is a good recipe to divide if you only want half as much. Half of it will make a square of about eight inches

Whites 7 eggs, 1 pound pow-dered sugar, 1 pound shelled almonds, 1 teaspon salt, 4 table-spoons cocoa, teaspoon vanilla. Beat whites of eggs until stiff. Ginger Squares

One cup molasses, 1-2 cup granulated sugar, 1-2 cup shortening, 2 1-2 cups flour, 1 cup boiling water, 2 teaspoons soda, 1 teaspoon ginger, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-2 teaspoon nutmeg, 1-4 teaspoon cloves, 1-2 teaspoon salt, Bake thiry minutes in a slow oven (100 degrees E). Best whites of eggs until stiff. Put nuts through fine knife of food chopper. Almonds are not blanched. Mix ground nuts and sugar and cocoa and fold into beaten egg whites. Add salt and vanila and drop from tip of spon onto a buttered baking sheet.





Court Dispels Doubt in Hauptmann Case

The decision handed down by the New Jersey court of errors and appeals in the case of Bruno Hauptmann is worth a little study.

Hauptmann was convicted of a murder which, for the depth of public horror and anger which it aroused, was probably the most shocking ever committed in America. His trial was inevitably the center of nation-wide interest. The verdict was received with nation-wide satisfaction.

But because the conviction was based entirely on circumstantial evidence-which a popular misuaderstanding somehow conceives to be of less value than direct evidence -and because he has had vocal defenders who have in- of a grass." Anyone who has such a feeling should glance briefly at the appellate court's findings.

"Our conclusion," says the court, "is that the verdict is not only contrary to the weight of the evidence, but one to which the evidence inescapably led."

Why? Because, first and foremost, Hauptmann was caught with the goods. He had the ransom money in his possession; and the court points out that Hauptmann's own story of how he got the cash is simply unbelievable, adding that his method of handling it "makes clear his guilty connection with the enterprise.'

Secondly, it was proved to the hilt that the ransom notes were all written by Hauptmann. They were in his handwriting and they used peculiarities of spelling and language which he habitually used.

It is an inescapable inference, says the court, that the man who wrote these notes entered the Lindbergh nursery and took the child.

Lastly, there is the fact some of the wood used to make the ladder by which the kidnaper entered the house was traced to Hauptmann's own home, and that on a board in his home there was written, by his hand, Dr. Condon's telephone number.

Adding these facts together, the court concludes that this "was a circumstantial case with the evidence pointing to guilt from so many directions as to leave no room for a reasonable doubt."

All this is worth keeping in mind. No criminal trial in our generation has held American attention as did Hauptmann's.

Those who have the notion that Hauptman, after ail, might have been guilty of a monstrous miscarrage of justice should reflect on the points raised by the appellate court.

These points ought to satify them that there are few cases in which a prisoner's guilt is so firmly established as in the case of Bruno Hauptmann.






