Civil Identification File Grows Nearly 6,000 persons sent their fingerprints to the Federal Bureau of Investigation during December 1935, to be placed in its civil iden tification file. These persona identification records came from such far away points as Yokoha-ma, Honolulu, England, Puerto Rico and Alaska, as well as from all sections of the United States The value of having a permanent and reliable means of identification on file is rapidly becoming apparent, officials said.

All personal identification records are filed apart from the criminal records. The fact that the stigma of criminality is being d vorced from fingerprints denced by the receipt in the bu reau on Dec. 10, 1935, of 25 sets of fingerprints taken at a meeting of the Parent-Teacher Associa tion, Yakima, Wash.

Depression's Legacy, Fear of Life

When the battle smoke of a long depression begins to lift a little bit, most of us jump to the conclusion that any P. L. Crossley, district clerk of man who wasn't actually knocked off his feet by unemployment and poverty is a very lucky man indeed, one who didn't for melection ought to be going his way without a care in the world.

This idea would be perfectly sound if human beings just didn't have any nerves. Unfortunately, they do have them-and the depression can do terrible things to them, even where a man has held his job right straight through

Margaret Culkin Banning, author, touched on this point in a recent address before a Catholic club meeting in New York. She took occasion to point out that the security which protects a man from actual hunger and cold does not begin to be enough.

Now it is precisely this fear of life-this uneasy feeling that the modern world has ceased to be the ordered, predictable place we always supposed it to be-which is the most damaging legacy of the depression.

In the old days we assumed that certain things were natural and enduring; that the world would always have a place for an embitious young man, that honest work and fidelity to duty would always reap a suitable reward, that the man who applied himself to his job intelligently and energetically would never need to worry about his future.

These things were pretty argely true, in actual practice. Knowing that they were true, we could shape our lives accordingly. If we got panicky over our prospects, it was because we were worried about our town shortcomings. The outside world itself was not a blame.

But the depression, for a great many people, ended this comfortable old conception. When there are no jobs at all, an embitious young man can hunt himself blind without finding his place. When businesses are going broke in droves, honesty and fidelity may not do the individual worker any good whatsoever.

And a man's prospects for the future may not depend in the least upon himself but instead may hang on forces which he cannot hope to understand or to foresee.

It is this kind of insecurity that has hurt the most. We need to make our country depression-proof, not only because we must save people from actual want, but because this feeling of uncertainty and doubt is clouding the Amer-

Great Task Well Done By King George V.

The reign of King George V stands as one of history's most striking testimonials to the fact that the simple force of human character can be one of the greatest powers in the world.

Here was a man who occupied the throne of England during one of the most critical periods any ruler anywhere ever had to face. It was his job to keep his throne safe and his country reasonably contented, and to do it he had hardly so much as the shadow of real power.

And yet he succeeded, as far as success was possible in "those trying years, while his fellow monarchs who had the power which he lacked failed miserably.

Wilhelm of Germany, who was war lord and all-highest in fact as well as in name, bungled things hopelessly and fled over the borders to Holland. Nicholas of Russia, a genuine autocrat, died miserably in a squalid cellar in a provincial town. Francis Joseph of Austria died in the full a consciousness that his polyglot empire would inevitably fall apart in the hands of his successor.

But King George V of England, who reigned but did not rule, kept his throne and handed his heritage, unweakened, on to his son.

How did he do it? His kingdom went through a war that bled it white. It survived a semi-revolutionary general strike. It passed through the civil war out of which the Irish Free State was born. It saw Socialists in power in Downing street. It went through the world depression that killed the foundling democracy of Germany.

Altogether, the times were difficult enough to jar any king from his throne—particularly a king who held the shadow of power and not the substance, a king who was a mere figurehead, a symbol of the idea of royalty.

And yet the outpouring of public affection that floodod George V in the final years of his life was without parallel in English history. His people honestly loved him, as far as human beings can love a ruler.

At the close of his reign his throne rested on the firmest ase a throne can occupy—the sincere affection of the ordinary man in the street.



In the Gay Nineties, when the seven or eight rich, elaborate courses usually sent the guests away from a party suffering vari-ous degrees of discomfort, clever cooks used to make a point of

cooks used to make a point of fritters served as an entree.

Now fritters are back again and highly thought of as an accompaniment for meats or for dessert—say peach fritters with red raspberry sauce or apple fritters with fresh maple syrup.

Meat fritters use up left-over meats and are served with tomato or celery sauce.

Vegetable fritters go well with creamed vegetables of contrasting flavor, cauliflower fritters with creamed carrots, for example, or corn fritters with maple syrup. Chicken is the meat for these.

Fry at 360-390 Degrees In making fritters the material the material wanted or dip pieces is added to the batter or it is dipped into the batter. Both are fried in deep hot fat. If the fat is too hot a hard crust is formed which acts as a non-conductor of heat and the outside gets harder and darker while the inside remains doughy and uncooked.

If, one the other head is the material wanted or dip pieces into batter until they are completely coated.

Sometimes the added material is such that more flour will be necessary, as is the case of left over canned corn. The milk used in the first preparation of the vegetable naturally thins the batter.

Whenever fresh into batter until they are completely coated.

If, one the other hand, the fat is not hot enough, the fritter sinks to the bottom of the kettle, absorbs too much fat and turns out pale and soggy and untempting. The right temperature is between 360 and 390 degrees F. Better use a thermometer, but if you haven't one, drop an inch cube of bread (not crust) into the hot fat. It should turn a golden brown in sixty seconds.

To test fritter batter, drop a teaspoonful into the hot fat. If it holds its shape and rises quickly to the top in a round ball, it
