How many households ever eet oysters anyway but in stew scalloped, creamed on toast or oc-casionally fried? Yet there are innumerable other fascinating recipes for preparing the bivalve. Oyster Turnovers—Luncheon Main Dish

Eight fine large oysters or 16 small ones, 11-2 cups flour, 4 tablespoons lard or other shortening, 6 tablespoons butter, 1 teaspoon salt, 4 tablespoons ice wa-ter, 4 tablespoons grated cheese, on, few gratings nutmeg. salt and pepper.

Drain oysters from liquor Mix for and salt and cut in shorten-ing and butter Add ice water. Roll on a slightly floured board and cut into rounds four inches in diameter. On each round place one or two oysters, sprinkle with salt, pepper, nutmeg and lemon juice. Brush edge of pastry with cold water and turn over, press-ing edges together with a fork. Prick the top with a fork and brush with milk Sprinkle with grated cheese and bake in a hot oven (425 degrees F.) for ten to fifteen minutes, until a light brown. Serve hot with





#### \$5,000,000,000 Is Collected In Gas Taxes In 17 Years

NEW YORK, N. Y .- Motorists of the United States have paid more than \$5,318,615,856 in state and federal gasoline taxes since taxation of motor fuel to finance highways was inaugurated by Oregon on Feb. 25, 1919, it was reported today by Baird H. Markham, director of the American Petroleum Industries committee. Declaring the tax was producing

larger revenue every year, with 1935 income exceeding \$800,000,-000, Mr. Markham said it now is possible to give the taxpayers relief, without curtailing funds available for highways, by reducing excessive state gasoline tax rates, by eliminating the duplicating federal gasoline tax, and by confining expenditure of the revenue to the original purpose of the levy, high-

ly 18 billions of gallons of gaso-line annually," said Mr. Markham, 'will produce more than \$500,-000,000 yearly revenue from a three-cent gasoline tax. Since every dollar expended upon highways starts a trade movement which results in the ultimate distribution of \$3.15 in business activity and in wages, \$500,000,000 spent upon roads would distribute \$1,575,000,000 in trade and wages among 24 industries. Every four men put to work on highways make jobs for seven additional workers in industries whose products are used in highway construction, improvement, and mainten ance. Certainly this method of creating employment and distributing wages is preferable to spending endlessly and indiscrimnately from gasoline tax funds for other state expenses, especial ly since it gives those who pay this special additional tax for roads the roads for which they are paying.

#### France Honoring First Balloonist

PARIS .- To commemorate the 50th anniversary of the death of Pilatre de Rozier, first man in the world, with the Marquis d'Arlandes, to attempt a balloon flight, the French government has ordered the issue of a stamp bearing the portrait of this pioneer.

In November, 1783, a few months after the first Mongolfier balloon had risen from the public place of Annonay, Rozier and the Marquis d'Arlandes left the park of the Chateau of the Muette in a balloon. Twenty minutes later, they landed in the outskirts of Paris, at the Butte-aux-Cailles.

In June, 1784, Pilatre de Rozier renewed his attempt with Proust, the chemist, and in three-quarters Versailles to Chantilly, about 40

Channel Flight Fatal

Encouraged by the success of his first attempts, Rozier decided to cross the Channel. In June, 1785, he had built an apparatus, composed of two superimposed bal loons, one of which contained hydrogen and the other hot air.

On the morning of June 15, Rowent up, but pushed by contrary winds, the balloon flew over the shore, and to complete the disaster, the taffeta of the hydrogen balloon ripped open, and caught Rozier and his companion were hurled out of the basket and crushed to death in the fall to earth, Pilate de Rozier was 29 and Romain a little younger.
