Thorough cooking and the right proportion of cornstarch to milk are the real secrets of a de-licious cornstarch pudding. Ex-cellent prepared puddings are on the market and require only the addition of milk, according to the

Should Hold Shape
A cornstarch pudding should be stiff enough to hold its shape when unmolded, but not hard and solid. Its texture should be perfectly smooth and tender and its flavor delicate but not insipid. The following rule for vanilla cornstarch pudding can be varied in several ways by adding two squares of melted chocolate to the cornstarch and sugar before the scalded milk is poured over it, or by putting in nuis. Should Hold Shape

Cornstarch Pudding Two cups milk. 3 tablespoons whipped cream or a sauce such as sensetarch, 6 tablespoons sugar, is served over ice cream.

If eggs are used in your pudding, remember never to add them to the hot cornstarch mixture. The heat will cook the tiny particles of egg almost immediately and a speckled mixture will result. 

The midriff surplus, Dr. Kerr said, is primarily a postural defect caused by improper breathing. An erect carriage, coupled with breathing methods that permit the full play of the diaphragm will do much toward returning the Apolloike figure of youth, he said.

Dr. Kerr recommended an abominal belt for those who found it difficult to maintain proper

Speaking on hemophilia, Dr. Roger I. Lee, of Boston, advocated queezing the juices from meat on an open cut as an effective stoppage of bleeding.

The meat juice method, Dr. Lee reported, has proved far more effective than the use of other agents, such as snake venom, where bleeding is external and

reachable by this means. The best means of combatting internal cases is by blood transfusions from persons with normal

blood platelets, he said.





JOHN HENRY MILBURN Many of the now greying vetrans of the World war can reount in detail their big moments during the conflict. Ofttimes tragin its greatest sense; often a jaw-breaking comedy; and even more often, a comforting let-down from a most precarious situation.
