Survivors include her husband, Doyle L. Hughes, two sons, Sammie Joe, 21 months, and Leonard Wayne, 7 months, of Ranger; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Stribling of San Antonio, and a sister, Mrs. Billy Lyman, also of San Antonio. William K. Lyman, Jr., and Kathryn E. Lyman, a niece and nephew also survive.

Mr. Hughes and the two children were injured in the accident in which Mrs. Hughes lost her life. The husband was on his way to Ranger this morning where he will be placed in a Ranger hospital. The two sons are still under the care of a doctor in San Antonio, but are rapidly recovering.


### Reds Blame US Government For Midwestern Area Flood

### County Water Situation Gets Much Attention

The following letter written by Clyde Garrett, temporarily in Waco, and addressed to the News paper explains itself. The letter follows:

"It is with great degree of satisfaction that I have just observed from the press the overwhelming majority vote given the Water Bond Issue yesterday by the citizens of Eastland and Ranger.

"I not only want to congratulate you on the splendid publicity given regarding the need and importance of providing an adequate water supply for the above cities but also the voters for taking this worthwhile and progressive step. Incidentally, nothing but hours of downpour rain and 'high waters' prevented my driving out there yesterday afternoon for the purpose of casting my vote in favor of the issuance of the bonds."

### Principal's Son Admits Robberies

PHOENIX, Ariz., April 24 (UP)—The teen-aged son of a Phoenix school principal is being held for investigation of armed robbery after admitting he took part in 2 to 30 robberies.

Police say 17-year-old Charles Soule, a high school senior, told them he committed so many robberies in the last four months he couldn't remember them all. He is quoted as saying he had accomplices in some of the robberies, but refused to name them.

Young Soule was arrested last night as he tried to hide in an alley near a liquor store which police say he had robbed of 200 dollars a short time earlier.

The lad told police he became involved in the robberies to pay for damages to his car in an accident because he didn't want his parents to know about the crash.

The parents, collapsed when they were told of their son's arrest.

### Higher Prices Registered At Auction Sale

Visitors at the Sig Faircloth Auction Sale Tuesday found a very active market. Rain may have cut down the number of head just a little, as it has been too muddy for some growers to make the trip. Also some may decide to keep their stock for a while since the water problem has, to some extent been solved, and range conditions have been greatly improved.

Animals offered for sale Tuesday included 700 head of cattle, 150 hogs and a few horses. Prices were high and bidding very active. Fat Bulls brought from 22 cents to 25 cents; medium bulls, 25 cents and 24 cents; fat calves and yearlings 32 cents to 35; fat cows 22 cents to 24 cents; canners and cutters from 15 cents to 21 cents.

Stocker steer yearlings, 32 cents—33 cents; stocker steers and calves 34—37 cents; heifer calves, 33 cents—36 cents plain cows with a calf at side, \$175—\$250.

Hogs, toppers, 17.25. Many out of town buyers were on hand and spirited bidding was noticed on every side.

### Twin Brothers Enlist In U. S. Army Air Forces

Gerold Lee and Derold Lee Harris, twin sons of Mr. and Mrs. James A. Harris, of Eastland, have been accepted for enlistment in the US Air Force, according to T-Sgt. James Hendrick. Gerold and Derold attended Eastland High School and are presently employed by the Clover-farm stores in Eastland.

Enlisting under the Air Force policy of keeping brothers and buddies together if at all possible, the boys will be assured of an identical Air Force career. Both want to gain further formal education in the service and also attended an AF technical school for specialist training.

It is expected that in about two weeks Derold and Gerold will be shipped to the Air Force Induction Center at Lackland Air Force Base, San Antonio to begin their 8-week phase of basic training.

### Sabine River Expected To Leave Banks

The Sabine river in East Texas is fast reaching its high water mark and may flood some areas in a few days.

At Mineola in Wood County the Sabine is expected to reach a little more than 18 feet of water by Saturday. The flood stage there is 14 feet. And the river is expected to reach 35 feet at Tatum in Rusk County by May 5th.

However, if flood conditions do occur, they are not expected to do heavy damage because at the flood points the area is scarcely populated. Weathermen say the Cypress and Sulphur Rivers in East Texas are also high and may spill out over the lowlands.

Rain has been reported in some parts of the state, notably at Presidio which reported more than one-third of an inch.

Otherwise, Texas is enjoying a sunny spring day. Weathermen say it will be fair through tomorrow in most sections of the state. The high temperature yesterday was 87 degrees at Presidio despite the rain and the maximum low was 61 degrees at Amarillo. Temperatures ranged from 40 degrees at Dalhart to 66 degrees at Brownsville.

LONDON, April 24 (UP)—A London police magistrate has placed the parents of 18-month-old Tommy Kavanagh on probation for one year for giving the boy to American movie actress Jane Russell for adoption.

Magistrate Sir Lawrence Dunn said the case was brought to trial only to serve as a warning to others who might seek to break Britain's strict adoption laws. He said Miss Russell seemed like "A very nice woman."

# Michigan Prison Riots Will End Friday Morn

## TAFT AND HARRIMAN LEAD IN PLEDGED DELEGATES IN RACE

### Radio Stations Will Work With AF Defense Plan

WASHINGTON, April 24 (UP)—The Air Force said today that more than 1,000 radio stations will take part next Saturday in emergency control broadcast tests under a simulated air attack.

The stations will test a system for operating under emergency conditions such as those involving an enemy air attack.

The system was devised by the Federal Communications Commission and the Air Defense Command.

The nation-wide test will be conducted from 1:30 a.m. to 5 a.m. local time for each area. The stations will operate as they would during an actual enemy attack in order to broadcast emergency Civil Defense instructions, the Air Force said.

The Air Force said all stations taking part will remain unidentified and will broadcast over channels on the broadcasting band of either 640 or 1240 kilocycles.

Throughout the test period, there will be half-hour broadcasts explaining that it is a special exercise being conducted.

Similar tests have been made on a regional basis, the Air Force said, but this will be the largest of its kind ever attempted.

## Congressmen Report View Of Big Shot

WASHINGTON, April 24, UP—Congressmen who witnessed the "Big Shot" atom blast last Tuesday report that the explosion melted the Nevada Desert sands over a radius of 500 yards from "ground zero"—The point over which the bomb went off. The Congressional witnesses say that the heat was so intense that sage brush was set on fire three miles away, and that one building that was thought to be a "safe" zone, was burned to the ground. Five Congressmen watched the test from a neck-high trench, only three-and-one-half miles away from the explosion.

## Allied Planes Hit Red Tanks; Truce Men Meet

KOREA, April 24 (UP)—Allied planes have destroyed nine enemy tanks in Korea, eight of them within striking distance of UN lines on the west-central front.

At the same time, UN planes and ships have combined to sink or damage 23 Communist junks off the Korean Coasts in an effort to cut the movement of enemy supplies by sea. The latest reports on the fighting came as Korean truce men appeared to be at a critical point in their prisoner exchange talks. They held two recesses during the day. It was their first meeting having more than one recess—a device often used when one side wants to consider a new idea submitted by the other.

## Houston Clerk Wants Son Freed From China Reds

HOUSTON, April 24 (UP)—An oil company clerk says he is going to ask the State Department to help him have his son freed from the Chinese Communists. Delbert T. Kanady said he got his idea from Mrs. Lucile Vogeler whose husband was held by Communists in Hungary. Mrs. Vogeler is in Houston where she spoke at a meeting of Latin-American businessmen sponsored by the National Association of Manufacturers.

Kanady's son, Dilmus, was arrested by the Communists in Shanghai on April 27th, 1951, one year ago Sunday.

And Kanady, after talking to Mrs. Vogeler, believes all Americans who have relatives imprisoned by the Communists should bank together and go to Washington. He believes the State Department is much more likely to listen to several persons than they would to one or two people.

## Four Jurors Are Chosen In Dallas Murderess Trial

DALLAS, April 24 (UP)—Four jurors have been chosen for the murder trial of 52-year-old Mrs. Rebecca Doswell who is charged with shooting her wealthy husband.

Roy D. Clark of Pleasant Mound in Dallas County was the first juror chosen yesterday. Forty-three members of the 150 man panel were excused or disqualified.

Mrs. Doswell is accused of the pistol slaying of Thomas W. Doswell as the two sat in an automobile outside their apartment hotel in Dallas last August 20. Her attorneys say they will prove that her husband was shot accidentally.

Dallas District Attorney Henry Wade is asking life imprisonment for the defendant but attorneys who are opposed to the death penalty are being disqualified.

## Austin Residents See Pink Objects Over Town Skies

AUSTIN, April 24 (UP)—Some strange objects have been reportedly seen in the sky over Austin. Several persons reported that they saw strings of glowing pink objects, all of them moving in a northward direction, in the sky.

One man said he saw about 100 of the flowing pink objects traveling very fast. Another said they looked like a cloth under water.

And another man said they looked like a mass of birds except they were moving too fast. However, both the U. S. Weather Bureau and the Austin airport traffic control tower reported no unusual phenomena.

## Prisoners Still Hold Hostages

JACKSON, Michigan, April 24 (UP)—Another guard helped by mutinous convicts at the southern Michigan Prison has been carried out of barricaded cell block 15 on a stretcher. Apparently the hostage, James Akins, was suffering a nervous collapse.

The 172 convicts have agreed to surrender, but say they won't give up and release the other guards they're holding until tomorrow morning. They signed a pact with authorities which guarantees better conditions at the prison and no reprisals for their holdout which began Sunday night after they took over a cellblock housing desperate criminals.

The trouble is completely over at three other strike-torn prisons. The warden at Ionia, Michigan, reformatory reports all quiet after a wave of unrest which broke out after this week's riot at the Southern Michigan Prison in Jackson. In New Jersey, state prison farm authorities at Rahway are making Major repairs on a dormitory shattered by 251 convicts during a five-day riot which ended Tuesday night, and five ring-leaders of a hunger strike and demonstration at the Delaware County Jail in Muncie, Indiana, are in solitary confinement. Authorities say the disturbance which broke out yesterday is under control.

A National prominent criminology expert says the recent prison riots in New Jersey and Michigan were caused by "some set of conditions which make it impossible for men to live without exploding." The penologist, Dr. Negley Teeters of Temple University, says the riots resulted from what he calls a "100-year-old bastille type of prison which makes necessary the development of a fear psychosis on the part of officials and guards."

Sandra, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Stoker was given the grade of Excellent with a grade of 93 and was awarded a State pin and certificate. She played seven selections from memory.

Linda, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Huckabay played eleven selections from memory and was awarded a grade of Excellent with a grade of 92. She was given a National gold pin and a certificate.

Fifty piano students entered and were judged by W. B. Berggren of the University of Minnesota.


The Horace Walker case, called for trial in the Federal court in Abilene, this week, has been continued.



Don't let anyone tell you, that you can not sell your excess peanut production. There will be plenty of buyers. Insist on your PMA Committee to furnish you a marketing card for a SPECIFIC number pounds peanuts that can sell at support price, based upon your farm history, and your 1952 allotment. They have this information in their files.

HR 3546, passed by Congress (77th) and approved on April 3rd, 1941, provides for a penalty of 3c per pound upon EXCESS peanut acreage production. Why pay more? There is not any penalty applicable to allotted acreage production. Congress fixed the rate, and no one has authority to change it. If you want to keep some of your excess production for seed and feed, you should have a marketing card where in you could keep your own seed.





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### AUTO PLANTS BUILD VARIETY OF WEAPONS

#### SOCIAL SECURITY TAX ON HOUSEHOLD WORKERS EXPLAINED.

April 30th is the deadline on which social security payments for household workers for the first quarter of 1952 are due at the office of your Collector of Internal Revenue.

The federal law bringing household workers under the old-age and survivors insurance system went into effect January 1, 1951. However, lawyers say that many persons who employ help in their homes are still in the dark about the requirements of the law.

Here are some provisions everyone should know. Household workers covered by the law include maids, laundresses, housekeepers, cooks, nursemaids, gardeners, handymen, valets, footmen, grooms, chauffeurs of privately owned cars, practical nurses, and others.

Whether or not a household worker is included in the law depends on how many days she works and how much money she is paid. If the person works 24 days and earns \$50 during any one of the three month periods into which the calendar year has been divided, a tax report must be filed and payment made.

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### Tech Professor Gets Ford Grant

LUBBOCK, April —Dr. Ernest Wallace, assistant dean of arts and sciences and professor of history, has been awarded a grant of approximately \$6,000 from the Ford Foundation Fund for Advancement of Education.

Dr. Wallace was one of 10 Texas educators to receive a grant from the \$1,400,000 fund, which was divided among 246 scholars in the U. S.

The Tech professor will use the grant to study at Harvard in 1952-53 with a view of using the knowledge obtained in improving Tech practices. The purpose of the Ford Foundation fund is to enable recipients to become better qualified to teach in their fields, which include the humanities, social sciences and natural sciences.
