Of course if we had a good rain things would be different. During wet years this country looks like the promised land. Fact is you can grow most anything that will sprout in the temperate zone, in this county, but for some reason our farmers have never learned how to grow a crop without water. We shall take the matter up with County Agent J. M. Cooper, as he seems to have all the answers. He will likely tell us this is the \$64,000 question and give us the horse-laugh.

Seriously, friends we do need just a little rain. It would stop a lot of belly-achin, whether it helped growing crops or not. It is so dry here the prohibition law can't function.

One of our friends has suggested that Baptists should adopt sprinkling, as the mode of baptism, until it rains, at least. But if he knows Baptists as well as we do, he has hubbed a problem that will not be settled until perpetual motion is considered a lost art. A sprinkled Baptist would not carry any more weight than a feather, and a very small feather at that. Why even the Campbellites wouldn't speak to them, and those boys are generally very friendly and kind-hearted. We have met several right here in Eastland and so far as we have been able to ascertain, they are good folks, real Christians, and nearly as good as Baptists—P.S. We have a few Baptists there who wouldn't have, and we don't blame them. We have to keep them whether we like it or not. Something like a carbuncle—not wanted, but its yours until it gets well. Then they wonder why we say, "Holy Mackerel!"

# New Commander Cracks Down On Koje POW's

## Well No. 1, Near City Lake, Good For 40,000 Gallons Water Daily; City Will Drill Additional Wells

With the drilling of 10 wells near the South spillway of Eastland City Lake, residents of this city feel they will not perish during coming weeks. Of course one of these wells remain to be drilled, and according to a statement made by City Manager Heck, the first well produces about 40,000 gallons of pure, fresh water daily.

Multiply this by ten and you will find a daily flow of some 400,000 gallons of water. The water will be pumped into the City Lake and then into mains.

The writer visited the scene of activities early today, and learned from W. B. Norton, the driller, that the water supply is apparently plentiful, and that it will take only a few days to drill the wells, which are to be approximately 25 feet deep. Water was found in large quantities, at a depth of 8 feet, but it was decided by going down another 15 or 18 feet through water producing sand and gravel, the supply would be better and likely have a larger flow.

The second well will likely be started today, it is thought, and it will be only a short time until all the wells will have been completed.

Nothing has been said concerning water restrictions, but should all the wells come in as good producers, water in this city will be more plentiful, even if we do not have enough for lawns and gardens. The matter will be considered at a later date.

## Hawaiian Sugar Is Popular Here

Many people do not know that most refined sugar sold in this country is American grown. This of course, includes Hawaii, an American territory, now occupying the same status that Oklahoma and New Mexico held prior to statehood.

Texas produces very little raw sugar, though the C&H and other sugar refiners do much refining in Texas and California, Louisiana and Florida are rather heavy producers, and contribute heavily to the nation's sugar supply. One of the largest refiners is the C&H Company whose largest plant is in California. During the war, when sugars were active off the west coast, this raw Hawaiian product was shipped by rail to Texas and Louisiana refineries.

For a while only C&H sugar was available in the western portion of the nation, including a portion of Texas.

## H. B. Gray Well Makes Showing

A well on the Newham, about 12 miles north of Ranger, just west of the Caddo Highway, known as the H. B. Gray, and others, on Section 44, Block 6, T&P Railway Survey, is in the process of completion, and is a potential producer. A favorable showing has been made.

The well was drilled to about 1840 feet with rotary, and then swabbed with cable tools.

Another new employe at this store is Johnny Yancey. His duties are similar to those of Mayhall's, other than he has charge of the delivery service each afternoon and on Saturday morning. He was born in Eastland county, in the Flatwood community. Finished Carbon high school and went to work.

For a long time he was connected with a local pipe line company. He lives in Eastland and has a wife and three children. He is a member of the Church of Christ.

## Congressmen To Probe Incident

KOJE ISLAND, May 15 (UP)—The Communist prisoners of war on Kojje Island got the word today, from the new camp commander.

Brigadier General Haydon Boatner told them bluntly: "Prisoners of war do not negotiate."

Boatner, a soldier of the old school, told them they might as well stop making demands right now, because under the Geneva POW Convention none of the demands hold water.

Apparently, Boatner says, the Reds "are getting this place and Panmunjom, the site of the truce talks, 'mixed up.'"

Boatner says the prisoners will get fair treatment all down the line. But he intends to punish violators of prison regulations.

Whether he plans to punish the Reds who seized the former camp commander, Brigadier General Francis Dodd, Boatner doesn't say.

But it was obvious on Kojje today that Boatner wasn't fooling.

When he drove by a group of guards in his jeep and they failed to salute him, he got out and gave them a tongue lashing. And while he was talking to newsmen, a prisoner tried to escape. Newsmen heard five shots, and an officer reported to Boatner: "we got him." The prisoner was wounded in the leg.

The Supreme Allied Commander, General Mark Clark, is giving full support to Boatner's get-tough policy. Clark has completely repudiated the concessions made for the release of General Dodd. He says the man who made the concessions, Brigadier General Charles Colson, acted without authority.

Congressmen in Washington are calling for an investigation of the Kojje Island incident. Democratic representative Mike Mansfield of Montana says he will introduce a resolution today asking for an investigation by the House Armed Services Committee.

QUESTION: After driving or prolonged rains the antique brick veneer finish of my home becomes saturated and water runs behind the veneer to the sill and eventually into the basement. Should I apply a sealer to the brick, or provide drip holes at the sill line?

ANSWER: Using a sealer on the brick is good practice to preserve them against deterioration. Also, "weep holes" are a good idea to prevent rot of the sill. These may be drilled through the brick at the sill line, squared off with a cold chisel. Air admitted through these holes will help dry up the dampened wood.

QUESTION: Can you tell me of a preparation to clean a discolored bath tub? The stains are apparently just on the surface, but mild abrasive cleaning powders do not seem to remove the stains.

ANSWER: First try some of the bleaching liquids such as ammonia used straight, chlorine solutions, lemon-juice-with-salt, trisodium phosphate, or sodium citrate. Wet a cloth with these, press over the stains, let stand a while, then rinse. A poultice of any one of these mixed with whiting and glycerine and spread over the stains and let stand until dry may do the trick. Finally, try powdered pumice scrubbed over the area with a few drops of water as a lubricant. These should work on porcelain tubs—but may wear through the enamel-on-metal style tubs.

QUESTION: I wish to replace a rotted sill in an attic window. Can this be done without removing the whole frame?

ANSWER: It is possible to do the job this way, but since sill and frame are usually nailed together at several points, removal of the frame and starting over is the quickest and best way.

The Russians say they are searching for a counter-bid, the Allies say they are putting the pressure on, to scare West Germany out of its pact with the West.

Power of Attorney Explained  
By Bar

There are only two ways to get a thing done. You do it yourself or get someone to do it for you. When you get someone to act for you he is your agent. This right to represent you may be given orally or in writing.

It is best to have the agency relationship carefully defined and written down. When written, the document often takes the form of a "Power of Attorney."

Any person legally competent to act for himself may give to another power of attorney to act in his place. With the growth and expansion of business it is difficult for one man to handle the variety of complex tasks that come his way. It is more expedient to delegate power and responsibility to others, thus giving such persons authority to make binding contracts in his name.

The person who delegates the power is called the principal, and the person to whom the authority is given is the agent. Third persons can deal with a properly authorized agent with the knowledge that the law will enforce

the obligation against the principal.

The law sets up two broad classes of agents—special and general. Most agents are special agents—that is, they have specific authority to do only certain things. When a person is named in a power of attorney as a general agent, he is authorized to act in all proper cases as if the principal were acting in person.

For example: A citizen-soldier leaves home to go to war. He needs someone to represent him while he is away. He names such a person—usually a parent, wife or trusted friend—in a power of attorney, giving this person specific powers or a general power to act in his behalf. If the soldier wants to sell his home while overseas, he can give such agent the power to sell the home, and limit the agent's authority to this one matter. When this agent begins negotiations for the sale, the prospective buyer can, by an examination of the power of attorney, know exactly what authority the agent has.

If the person is given a general power of attorney, he can transact all the serviceman's business as though the soldier were home to act for himself. Suppose the soldier owns a store and wants someone to run it while he is away. He may authorize this person through a power of attorney to buy, sell, extend credit, collect bills, deposit and withdraw money from the bank, and, in short, do business on the same basis as the serviceman could if he were present to run the store himself.

# FARM AND RANCH PROSPERITY IS THE BASIS FOR ALL WEALTH

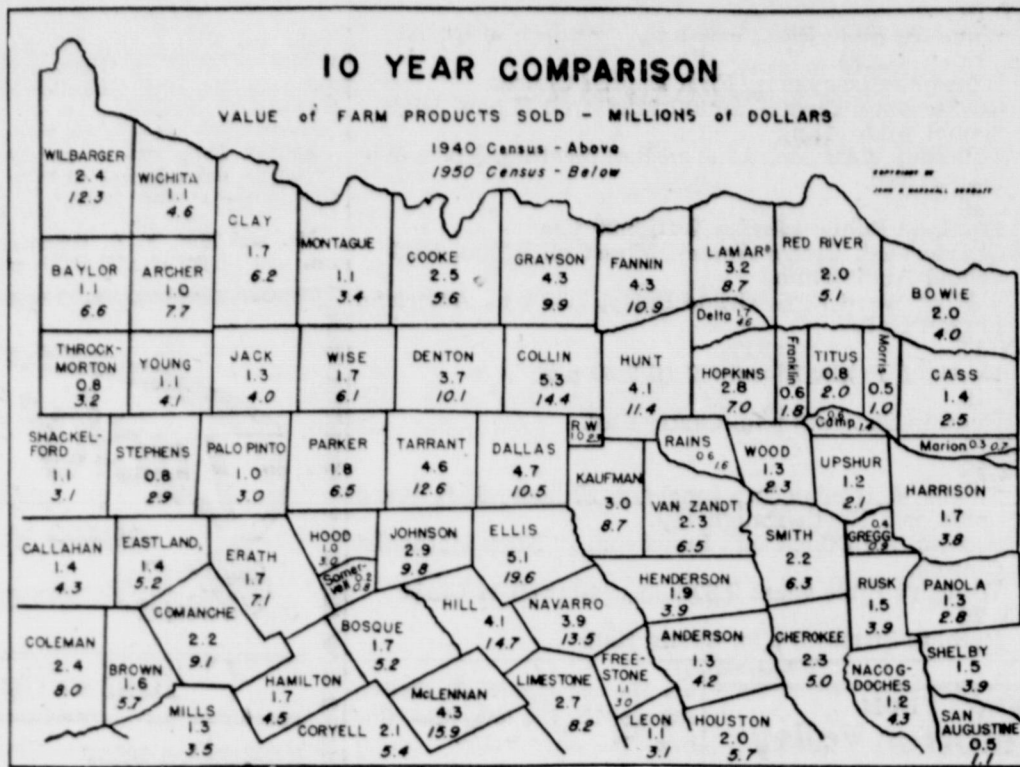

Upon the request of newspaper publishers and editors of this area, this map on farm and ranch income has been reproduced for you, the men and women, boys and girls who build your home community may have a better understanding of where we are going, where we can go. Ordinarily, statistics are dry, dull reading. The writers and your edi-

tor are trying to make these statistics on the accompanying map alive, truly vital facts that will give a clearer understanding of what is happening and that will inspire the young people to want to build better and finer home communities. Special permission has been given your editor to publish the copyrighted map.

We, the writers, have as our work the building of cities. But we are convinced that cities grow only as the farm and ranch family prospers. And we are equally convinced that whether we go up or down depends upon our young people and the inspiration which we can instill in them.

These figures on the map merit your careful study. And although they are in millions of dollars, they do not indicate that the farmer is getting rich at the expense of the rest of us. In fact, such prosperity as is enjoyed by the farmer or rancher and his family is the basis for such wealth as comes to the rest of us. Admitted of course that the rest of us

have been in recent years also wrapping temporary war-contract dollars in some communities, and in this part of the country enjoying the relatively temporary oil and gas production dollar.

The figures on the map show sales from all farm and ranch products during the year reported at each census—including crops, dairy products, poultry products, other livestock products including sales of livestock and timber and nursery sales from farms.

Sales from agricultural products for all the 71 counties of North-Central Texas shown on the map rose from \$137,985,000 at the 1940 Census to \$416,573,000 at the 1950 Census. For the rest of Texas this was \$301,079,000 at the 1940 Census and \$1,336,479,000 at the 1950 Census. The ten year increase for this area was 292 per cent, compared with an increase of 344 for the rest of Texas.

In reviewing the accompanying map the reader should keep in mind the fact that between these two Census dates there were price changes which accounted for most of the dollar changes shown on the map. Production has actually dropped on some farm products.

Comparisons of farm commodity prices, as reported by the U. S. Department of Agriculture for the years covered by these two Censuses, disclose increases as follows: Cotton, 215 per cent; wheat 172 per cent; corn 113 per cent; oats 113 per cent; grain sorghum, 97 per cent; sorghum forage, 117 per cent; peanuts, 206 per cent; watermelons, 154 per cent; fresh tomatoes, 111 per cent; hogs, 142 per cent; pecans 92 per cent; milk 136 per cent; cream 151 per cent; milk cows, 247 per cent; other cattle, 284 per cent; sweet potatoes, 194 per cent. Even higher prices were paid for farm products during some years between the two Censuses and since the latest Census.

Put with these increases in prices of farm products were greater increases in farm expenses, the expenses going way ahead of increases in the prices of the things which the farmer had to sell.

On the single item of hired labor the total cost to the farmers of all the counties of North-Central Texas on the map was \$16,379,000 at the time of the 1940 Census. Ten years later, \$62,596,000 was the amount these farmers paid out for hired labor. Every other expense for the farmer went up in like manner.

Dairy farming faced great obstacles during war years, with price controls on dairy products and greatly increased feed and

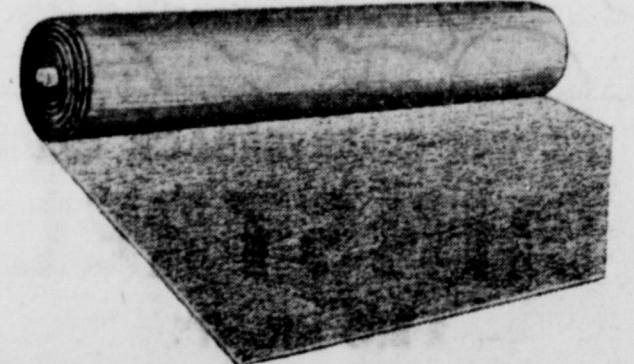
