ANSWER: Ordinarily a footing is required to distribute the weight of the building over a larger area where the soil is loose. However, a poured concrete foundation does not always require a footing, especially when reinforcing is used. Such a foundation, as a solid mass, is not apt to crack at any one point, even though a corner or short length may be undermined by rain-action or seepage. This type of foundation distributes its load over the entire bearing surface evenly.

• Wash 2 pint-baskets of ripe berries. (No, don't hold them under run ning water from the faucet! That crives the sand right into them. Instead, dunk the berries quickly in a bowl of cold water, lift out with fingers; drain in strainer or colander). Hull berries after washing.



3 • Heat berries and sugar to boiling, stirring constantly; boil 2 minutes, stirring. Add remaining 2 cups sugar, again heat and boil, stirring, 3 min-utes. Add lemon juice. Pour into shallow bowl and stir occasionally while cooling. Leave overnight. (This plumps berries, keeps them from floating).





Certain restrictions are imposed upon both husband and wife in exercising and control. For instance, the husband cannot legally dispose of community property in such a way as to defruad the wife, nor can he sell the homestead without her signature and acknowledgement. And the wife's sale or motage of her separate real estate stocks or bonds is not valid unless her husband joins with her in the transaction-he must sign and execute the necessary legal papers along with her.

Such limitations appear to be a product of those earlier and nore chivalrous days in which the sheltered married woman had little or no contract with the business world. They indicated a deire to protect the little woman
