## Forecast Vary From Congress To Invoking Taft-Hartley Lay

WASHINGTON, June 3 UP—The big question in Washington this morning is what will President Truman do, what course will he chart in solving the nationwide steel strike.

Top government officials believe they have an answer. They predict the president will toss the dispute into a lap of Congress in line with the Supreme Court decision that his seizure of the steel industry was unconstitutional.

C-I-O Union President Phillip Murray called out his 650,000 steelworkers following the high court ruling yesterday that Mr. Truman had invaded the lawmaking powers of Congress when he took over the mills.

And the high government officials expect Mr. Truman to send a special message to Congress perhaps today, asking for emergency legislation to cope with the strike that will cost the nation 300,000 tons of steel a day.

Some administration officials have advised Mr. Truman to invoke the Taft-Hartley Law as a temporary means to end the strike until Congress can act. They contend that lawmakers are not likely to come up with a new labor statute until the president uses the one already on the books.

The Taft-Hartley Law provides for an 80 day anti-strike injunction. Mr. Truman refused to use it previously on grounds the steel-

workers had postponed their walk-out longer than that already while the government was trying to settle the wage-price steel dispute.

There's still another course of action Mr. Truman might take. He could call for renewed union-company negotiations under White House sponsorship. Both sides say they are willing to resume bargaining but both are sticking to terms that previously have been unacceptable to each side.

The giant steel industry is almost completely shut down this morning while settlement efforts mark time.

Some steel is still being turned out, though, by a few independent firms not involved with the C-I-O Steel Union and by a handful of companies which already had signed contracts with the union before the walkout. But all told, they represent only five percent of the industry.

Meanwhile, the national production authority has clamped an embargo on all steel deliveries for civilian projects. And N-P-A officials stay construction contrains, slated to be relaxed next month, may have to be retained because of the steel production stoppage.

Basing his prediction on authoritative F.B.I. statistics, he forecasts that the American public will be burglarized more than 1,200 times every day during July and August.

As vice-president of the Mosler Safe Company, a firm which has been outfitting crooks for 104 years, Mosler urges all homeowners to thief-proof their homes with these six simple pre-vacation precautions:

1. Cancel milk and newspaper deliveries until you return home.
2. Tell your postman about the temporary change in address. A collection of unopened milk bottles, a stuffed mail box, or a pile of newspapers on your front porch is an open invitation to burglars who constantly watch for such tell-tale signals.
3. Notify your local police and tell them how long you will be away. The policeman on your block will keep an eye open for any

and phone number. Ask them to call the police if they note anything suspicious.

5. Don't have any cash, gems, or valuables in the house unless protected in an approved, burglary resistant, armored steel money chest, or visit your local bank and place your valuables in a safe deposit box.

6. Securely lock all windows and doors. Don't just slam the door. Lock it with a key so that the bolt provides added security.  
2. Cut vegetables into large enough pieces so that salt will not be mushy.

### June is Dairy Month in Texas

AUSTIN, June 1—June is dairy month in Texas and the multi-million dollar industry is seeking to focus the eyes of some 7 million Texas consumers on the greater use of dairy foods as the road to better health.

In cities large and small, in homes and on farms, consumers are being told through a 30-day industry-wide observance that butter, cheese, ice cream and milk are "roads-to-good-health-musts" on the family table 365 days of the year.

Governor Allan Shivers in proclaiming June as Dairy Month in Texas emphasized importance of milk and dairy foods as essential to the diet of defense workers.

The Dairy Products Institute of Texas, coordinating the June program, released figures citing the contributions of the industry to Texas.

Last year dairying produced more than \$200 millions in farm income for 3 out of 4 Texas farms with some 12,000 commercial Grade A dairies dependent upon milk as their chief income. Some 60,000 farm units, the Institute said, depend upon milk and milk products for income.

The Institute estimated that the dairy industry contributed \$400 millions annually to the commerce of the state with some 500,000 persons earning a livelihood from production, processing, distribution and sale of dairy products.

"Housewives spend more than 15 per cent of their food budgets for dairy products," said Floyd Jensen, State Chairman for June Dairy Month program. "For this they get 30 per cent of the food consumed in this state. And in this one-third of the family food, the housewife provides her family with three fourths of its calcium, one-half of its ribo flavin, and substantial quantities of every other nutrient vital to human development."

Service clubs, like Rotary, Kiwanis and Lions, are sponsoring programs in June to assist their members in a better appreciation of the services of the dairy industry. Many conventions and special meetings over the state will

### Undulant Fever Will Increase During Summer

This is the season when an increase of undulant fever may be expected, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

An undulant fever patient suffers from chilly sensations, or severe shaking chills, sweats, and high fever. The patient loses weight and becomes weak. If the illness is of mild type, the patient may find it hard to remain in bed, but if he tries to keep on with his work he finds he has not sufficient energy.

Symptoms often continue for a number of weeks before recovery occurs. Fortunately undulant fever has a low death rate. Body temperature may reach a higher mark each day than the day before for some time, and then gradually return to normal over a period of several days. Fever may be absent

for some days and come back again in the same way as before, registering higher each day and then gradually going lower. The patient's temperature chart will resemble smooth waves or undulations. The

appearance of the temperature curve in typical cases has given this disease the name undulant fever. Undulant fever is one of the infectious diseases known to be transmitted from animals to hu-

man beings. In hogs and cows, the germ produces a great economic loss because it causes contagious abortion. When this same germ invades the human body, the resulting disease is undulant fever. Pre-

vention is dependent upon (1) eradication of the disease in farm animals, (2) careful pasteurization of dairy products, and (3) avoidance, in so far as possible, of direct contact with infected animals.

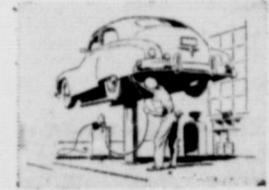

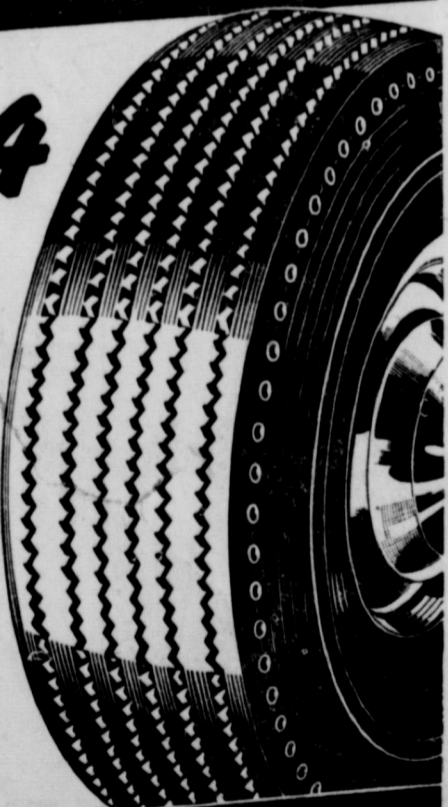

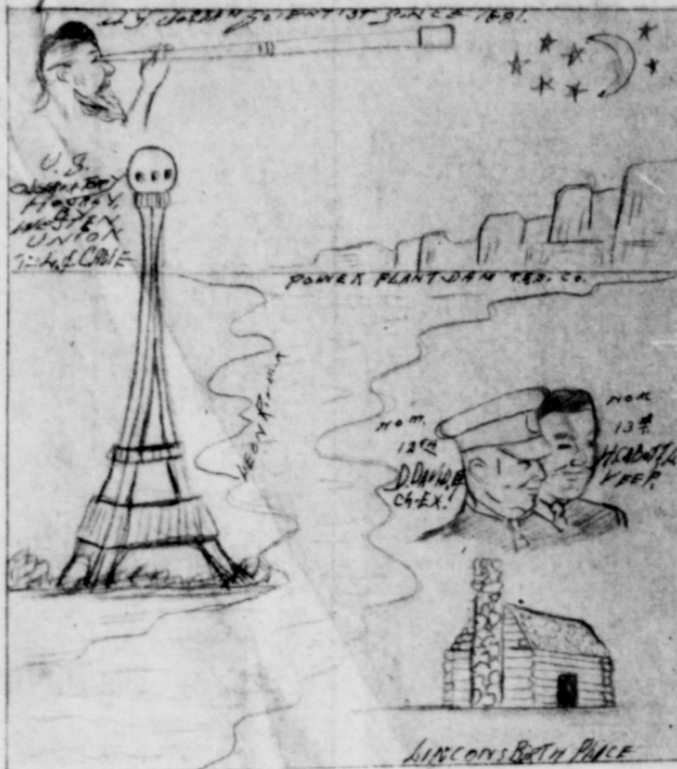
