### Around The Square

With Mack

Some of these days things are going to be so complicated that the average man won't know how to breathe, much less speak. Something is brought into the light, and the next day we have a book of instructions on this "something". Like perpetual motion, most any old cogger thinks he can invent it, but he can't run it after he brings it to light.

And the bad part, he can't tell the other fellow how to run it. It is mainly because he doesn't know it himself.

We find just as much mystery in the Texas Election laws. A day or so ago we had occasion to attend a meeting of the County Democratic Committee. We never did know very much about election laws, but we now know a lot less than we ever did. One more meeting and we will register somewhere below zero, in knowledge.

From the best we can learn the election code is a kind of annual, for we get a new system every year. Occasionally, in order to beat the printer, they make us use the same book two years in a row, but supply us with a few supplements. These supplements are what it takes to make men "go crazy". A bunch of peanut politicians who don't know any more about politics than they do pop corn, are guilty of compiling the supplements. In them you will find such useful information as this:

"Article one of section two and paragraph three of sentence four on page five says: 'twinkle, twinkle, little star.' This is all wrong, and should read, under penalty of the law it should read twinkle, twinkle, little star, on the dark of the moon." A few days later the second supplement reaches your desk, and it tells you that before the little star can twinkle it must consult the moon, sign an oath of allegiance. If he says yes, get yourself at least three good lawyers and find out for sure.

One candidate tells me there are no less than 19 different forms for each candidate to fill out and file between the first primary, or rather between the time he announces for office and the general election. Now, ain't that something? Confusion and chaos.

The simplest way to correct this "blunder" is to kill all codes and destroy all book pertaining to election laws. Get a fairly well educated citizen who is known for his honesty and integrity, and give him \$10 to write a new one. Limit him to about 2 pages, double spaced copy written on a typewriter, and have about 5 million printed copies for free distribution. Then each year reprint, without change of text, an additional million copies for high school students. This would insure honest elections and people would know what they were doing.

When a county or precinct meeting is called every member would know how to handle candidates and an election. As it now is, nobody knows, and it is so messed up it would take a special act of the legislature to clarify half the changes.

As the matter now stands it would take a man two or three days to read everything concerning candidates and elections, and then when he finished he would not know much more than he did before he began, but would be stupefied.

### Executive Committee For County Meets To Iron Out Difficulties

Candidates in Eastland county will know just about where they stand within the next few days. At a meeting held in the Court-house Monday, the executive board composed of County Democratic Chairman Frank Williamson and the various precinct chairmen, made an attempt to iron out numerous perplexing difficulties.

One candidate will have his name deleted from the list, as a result of the meeting, unless he can show cause within the next few days, why such action should not be taken. His fee was paid, and on time, and a check supports this statement yet it is claimed he did not take the loyalty oath and his name will likely not appear on the official ballot.

The question of filing expense accounts with the County Clerk was then taken up. There seems to be some question as to whether this is mandatory. Most candidates have filed their first and second expense accounts, and the matter seems to have been dropped. Some feel that there is really no law covering the case, and what is termed law, is nothing more than a rule used by the State Committee. Whether the rule is law seems to be concerning many.

Candidates, rather than take a chance, are respecting it, though others feel that it is not mandatory, that it was not made by a law making body, but rather a political group.

Later assessments were made and candidates names were drawn for places on the ticket. This will be completed before the meeting to be held in Eastland next week.

Candidate assessments totaled approximately \$6,000, though it is thought they will have a refund of at least 25 per cent.

**Army Okays MacArthur As Convention Speaker**  
WASHINGTON, June 17 (UP)—The Army has announced that General Douglas MacArthur is not subject to an Army regulation which prohibits members of the service from participating in political campaigns or conventions.

MacArthur has been chosen by the Republican arrangements committee as the keynote speaker for the Chicago convention.

### Rotarians Have Good Program

Bill Brown made his report on "Scouting" at the Rotary luncheon Monday, and according to his statements, "camp" this year has proven to be one of the best. The club sponsors one of the Eastland troops, that has just returned from camp. The boys report a splendid trip, and Mr. Brown feels a great amount of good has been accomplished.

The Eastland troop was just another of the 17 gathered at camp, but in contests the local boys gave a good account of themselves. They were among the top three as good "camp keepers."

Another thing mentioned was the election which will be held next Friday in the cities of Eastland and Ranger. This has to do with water contracts, and every qualified voter is urged to go to the polls and vote.

Jack Frost had charge of the regular program, and used as his subject "Legal Knowledge." He made clear the homestead law, surface rights, mineral rights, and gave warning concerning legal technicalities. Jack admitted that he was not giving "free" legal advice, but some of his hearers may have salvaged a few points anyway. The address was to the point and was highly appreciated.

Next week new officers will begin making arrangements to take over.

### WATER CONTRACT ELECTION SET FOR FRIDAY, JUNE 20

Voters of the cities of Eastland and Ranger will go to the polls in their respective cities and vote on the question of allowing their city commissions to enter into a contract with the Eastland County Water Supply District for the purpose of purchasing water.

This voting will be done on a separate basis. Eastland will vote on the question as a unit; as will Ranger voters. This is a city election called by the respective city commissions. The only common point is that both city commissions are asking their voters to approve the same question.

There is no tax question. There is no question of issuance of any bonds. These two matters were decided in an election held on April 22. This election will be to grant authority to the governing bodies of the two towns of the water district to enter into a separate contract with the district.

Only qualified voters of Eastland or Ranger may vote in their respective election. To be a qualified voter you must live within the city limits of the town of your residence. You must own and have rendered taxable property and meet the voting requirements in your town to vote in the election.

Once more: THERE IS NO QUESTION OF TAXATION INVOLVED IN THE ELECTION FRIDAY.

### Omar Burleson Tabulates Poll Taken By Mail

Final tabulation has been made on the results of the questionnaire submitted by Congressman Omar Burleson to the people of the 17th Congressional District.

- The poll taken shows that:
1. The voters do want controls relaxed (3744 to 1655).
  2. Korean veterans should get GI Bill benefits (4973 to 283).
  3. Universal Military Training is not favored (2886 to 2478).
  4. But that if you voted no to above would favor UMT in the schools, yes by a vote of (2108 to 16433).
  5. Voters are not in favor of training more doctors with federal funds. (4410 to 978).
  6. They do not believe that there should be any system of National Health Insurance operating by the federal government (4818 to 628).
  7. That an increase in unemployment compensation is not favored (604 to 4086).
  8. A Federal aid to education is opposed (4086 to 1188).
  9. Raising the national debt limit above the present 275 billion dollar limit brought an overwhelming vote of no (5136 to 292).
  10. The question: Do you believe we must operate on a pay-as-you-go basis, regardless, and not resort to deficit financing, brought an affirmative reply from the voters (3936 to 1444).
  11. A tax limitation of 25 per cent on any individual was given a yes vote (3050 to 2440).
  12. The same ceiling on corporation taxes was said to be not favored in the poll (3302 to 2440).
  13. The poll shows that taxing all cooperatives the same as other business enterprises is favored (4990 to 765).
  14. The so-called oil and gas depletion tax "loophole" repeal is not favored (3302 to 1490).

Burleson said that this poll will help him in the future in making his choice in a vote on these matters. He is a candidate for reelection.

### Midwest Heat Wave Lets Up

The nation's first spell of stifling hot weather is lifting in the Midwest.

On the west coast, in the state of Washington, "rain war" continues between two rival farm groups—the cherry growers in Yakima Valley and their neighbors, the wheat ranchers. The wheat ranchers want rain, have brought in a rainmaker. The cherry growers, who say the rain will kill their crop, hired their own expert, a man who says he can break up rain clouds.

The weatherman is neutral in the fight, he predicts "a few widely scattered showers."

It was hot in Columbus, Ohio, so hot that state commissions called off some meetings till it gets cooler. It seems an air conditioning unit in the capitol building is now being installed. But it won't be ready until next winter, sometime in January.

CISCO—Some 200 to 300 4-H Club boys from Eastland, Palo Pinto, Stephens, Shackelford, Callahan and Jones Counties are expected to attend the annual encampment at Lake Cisco Park, Thursday and Friday. The 4-H Clubbers will be accompanied by their county agents.

Registration fee for the boys will be \$1.25 and each boy was asked to bring a sack lunch for the first meal, bed roll, bathing suit, towel, soap, fourth of a pound of bacon, three medium sized potatoes, two eggs, two onions, a pound of tomatoes, knife, fork, spoon, plate, cup, or glass.

A camp cook has been employed to prepare the meals for the boys, and a number of supervisors will be on hand to handle the affairs of the camp.

Recreation and instruction programs will highlight the two-day encampment. Baseball, swimming, and other athletics and a course in safety will be featured at the camp. The Eastland County clubs will be hosts of the annual affair.

Also we saw another paper manufacturing Co. where high grade stationery and school supplies are made.

Today we were escorted through the Aluminum Co. of America, which covers 58 acres and is the largest building in America under one roof.

Teachers in this section are not as well paid as they are in Texas and many of them are leaving the profession.

The Communist negotiator shouted that he had more to say. But Harrison paid no attention. The UN truce team walked out.

They say the Red leader believed to rule all war prisoners was picked up among six Communist officers from Compound 77.

These officers have been charged with engineering the murder of 16 non-Communists in Compound 77. And they're expected to be tried by the Eighth Army soon.

Houston Reports 15 New Cases Of Polio In One Day

Fifteen new cases of polio are reported in Houston today, one of the worst days on record.

They bring the total for Houston and surrounding Harris county to 167. Seven of today's cases were from the city, four from the county and four were non-resident cases.

At the same time, hospitals sought relief from crowded polio wards. Jefferson Davis Hospital and Hedgecroft Clinic reported cases at three-times last year's level.

Blind Student Leads Class At NTSC At Denton

DENTON—Although blind since he was six years of age, Jimmie Trietsch of Denton led some 450 fellow students at graduation exercises this June at North Texas State College. The youth, 21-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Trietsch, graduated with high honors. He is remaining at North Texas College to work on the master of arts degree—then, "possibly the doctorate degree," he smiles. Jimmie, adapting himself to his handicap, learned to take notes on a Braille board at shorthand speed. His mother reads the books to him at home and he takes notes from there. He plans to teach history to blind students when he has completed his college work.

The NTSC student makes his way quickly about the college campus by the use of a cane. He needs very little assistance in going up and down stairs. The way the traffic moves helps him in crossing streets. He never thinks of using a guide dog.

In a nationwide contest last year, Jimmie won first place with his essay in a program sponsored by the Voice of America. His essay was broadcast July 4 to countries behind the Iron Curtain.

Signing his essay "An American Boy," he wrote: "You don't need sighted eyes to 'see' how wonderful America is. Through my remaining senses and my mind I can see a world free from dictatorship and tyranny and hate."

**Food Poisoning Very Dangerous**

AUSTIN, Texas—Bacteria grow more readily in warm weather and this increases the danger of food poisoning, warns Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer. Since modern refrigeration public health has improved. However, cases of food poisoning do occur, in spite of the more healthful measures of storing food.

Sickness from food poisoning usually strikes quickly and explosively, and those who do not eat the infected escape. Usually in one to four hours after eating contaminated food, victims feel ill. If it is a mild case of poisoning, recovery usually begins in eight to 12 hours, but victims may feel the ill effects

for several days.

Another important safeguard to prevent food contamination is that the hands of the person who prepares food be scrupulously clean, and free from cuts and sores of any kind.

Usual symptoms of food poisoning are diarrhea, nausea, vomiting, abdominal cramps, and weakness. Whenever you feel symptoms, be sure to call your physician. Do not wait, hoping it will wear off; sometimes food poisoning is fatal!

The staphylococci organism grows best in foods which are slightly fatty, such as fat meats, salads, with rich dressings, cream pies, cream puffs, or any food with custard fillings. So if anyone in your family takes his lunch to work during the coming hot months, be careful of the foods you put in the lunch, and don't include any of these foods.



### Payne Wins Primary Vote In Maine; Politicians Active

From governor's mansion to a seat in the senate, that seems to be the path Governor Frederick Payne of Maine will take in September.

Payne has won the Republican Senatorial nomination over his primary opponent, Senator Owen Brewster, a veteran of 30 years in political office, was elected to the United States Senate in 1940 and again in 1946.

Payne's primary victory is taken by political observers to mean he'll win the September 8th election, since no democrat has been elected to a major office in Maine in 18 years. His victory over Brewster was close, three-thousand votes separating the two men.

There will be a presidential primary in the Nation's capital today, between democratic candidates Averell Harriman and Senator Estes Kefauver. The 12 district of Co-

lumbia delegates have six convention votes. It's Harriman's first presidential primary contest and Kefauver's 16th.

State's rights Democrats in Mississippi meet at Jackson and nominate six more convention delegates. The state caucuses are aiming for a solid 22-man delegation, supporting Senator Richard Russell of Georgia.

Russell's campaign manager, Senator Edwin Johnson of Colorado, says the Georgia Democrat has "a mighty good chance" of getting the nomination. Elsewhere in Republican politics, Dwight Eisenhower is putting his golf clubs away today at Denver, getting down to the business of meeting with republican state delegates. First on the Agenda are the delegates from Colorado, Wyoming and Utah. Tomorrow, Eisenhower will talk to delegations from

Oregon and Arizona. The United Press tabulation of G-O-P delegates shows Senator Robert Taft leading Eisenhower, 470 to 404. It takes 694 votes to win the nomination.

At Washington, Republican leaders from both the Taft and Eisenhower camps are reported to have agreed to give John Foster Dulles an important convention job, a key role in writing the foreign affairs plank in the 1952 platform.

### Johnson Blasts U. S. Defenses

Senator Lyndon B. Johnson has declared Soviet Russia may outrun the United States in the armament race. Speaking in Carthage, Johnson said America has more blueprints than bombers.

Added Johnson: "We have more paper work than preparedness." He said we must not hide from ourselves or the rest of the world the extent of our peril.

### San Antonio Garbage Men Strike Ends

San Antonio's one-day strike of garbage workers has ended. Street department superintendent E. L. Hansen said the workers are coming back 100 per cent. But the charges and counter-charges that precipitated the strike continued full-blast.

A spokesman for the workers declared: "We didn't win. We'll just go ahead and go to work. A lot of these boys need the jobs and we don't want the city to leave them off the payroll."

The strike began after the third resignation within a week of sanitation superintendent Ed Marceau. Marceau has blasted the consolidation of garbage collecting and other functions in one department.

Marceau advised the workers to return but hit back at statement by city officials that the strike had been planned as a political plot against the new city government.

Marceau said the walkout began spontaneously. City Manager C. A. Harrell has announced a pay hike for pickup men and drivers. It will be six to 11 cents an hour.

### Fish Decoy Is Made By H-SU Lad In Abilene

ABILENE—Larry Cunningham, associate coach at Hardin-Simmons University is now marketing a fish decoy.

The decoy is a plastic egg shaped device, which is designed to attract fish with live and artificial bait.

The device is designed to contain minnows or blood bait. Vibration caused by the minnows in the egg shaped device, which comes in two sizes, six and eight inches, serves to attract the fish in both muddy and clear water.

A float controls the depth of the fish decoy.




