### Hollywood-Maxwell Garment Plants Have Payroll of More Than \$1,000 Daily; 210 Women Working

The average payroll of the Hollywood-Maxwell Co. in Eastland amounts to considerably more than one thousand dollars each day. This includes holidays, Sundays, etc. This is not the largest payroll in the city, but it is one of the largest, and has much to do with Eastland's economy.

At this time three plants are in operation, and 210 women are employed. Ten additional women are to be employed within the next few days. With this full quota of 220 workers, the plants will be able to go into full production.

There have been a number of rumors that one, and even two, additional plants would be opened here. Such statements are unfounded, and for the present, at least, no other plants are contemplated.

Mrs. Stella Grigsby in a recent conversation, stated that there has been very little turn-over in labor since the opening in 1946. Many women who began at the time plant No. 1 was opened still remain.

There has been no labor trouble of any importance, for employees are satisfied with their earnings and working conditions.

Two grades of garments are manufactured here cotton and nylon. These garments, when completed are shipped to the general shipping point in Kansas City, where they are distributed all over the United States.

General Production Manager J. R. Dawson, has been in Eastland this week as well as other Hollywood, Calif., officials. No statements were made by any of them.

Mrs. Grigsby stated that she very much appreciated the attitude of the workers in the three plants. That they have always been honest and energetic, doing good work and always cooperative.

Many of the workers know nothing about the work, or as for that matter, sewing of any kind, when they began. Today many of them are excellent producers. While women are learning they are paid a very liberal remuneration. At the close of the first year they get a week's paid vacation, and during the year they get six paid holidays.

Some of the most expert workers make more than \$60 weekly, though the average is about \$45, for a 5-day week. Many women work Saturdays and draw time and a half pay.

As a whole these plants are proving to be great assets to Eastland and the community, as they furnish employment to many women in the community. Some come in from rural areas, while others reside in Oden and other nearby towns. Local merchants appreciate their patronage, and it would be greatly felt as it should cease, all at once.

Yes, the Hollywood Corset Factories are a great asset to the city.

The first plant was established in Eastland November 21, 1946. Mrs. Stella Grigsby was in charge at that time and still remains as superintendent of production, and local manager, but is aided at this time by three supervisors; one at each of the three plants. They are Mrs. Cusie May, Mrs. Charlotte Allen and Mrs. Ruby Guy.

The second plant was opened on January 27th of this year and the third newest plant has been in operation since the middle of May. In size, the new plant, in the Pullman building is the largest, though the number of employees is about equally divided.

### Polio Warfare Continues On 4th At Houston

HOUSTON, July 5 (UP)—Houston families by the scores forsook the Fourth of July holiday to continue volunteering their children for test shots of a serum doctors hope will prevent paralysis and death from poliomyelitis.

Dr. William McDowell Hammon, the University of Pittsburgh polio specialist who is directing the first mass test of the serum, gamma globulin, said Saturday he was "delighted" at the number of children who appeared Friday.

By injecting half of an eventual 35,000 children with gamma globulin and the remaining 17,500 with harmless gelatin, physicians will be able to tell if the serum works.

Many Houston parents, meanwhile, were reported buying the gamma globulin injection from private physicians, at a cost ranging from \$6 to \$40, depending on the strength of the inoculation.

Tremendous response by parents in volunteering their children for the mass test at Houston, where the nation's worst polio epidemic has been raging, will make it possible to complete the experiment in less than the 10 days set aside for it, Hammon said.

He said he expected the eight Houston and Harris county clinics administering the inoculations will begin turning away children by next week.

### One Killed; 7 Injured In Car Wreck, Borger

BORGER, Tex., July 5 (UP)—An 18-year-old Anadarko, Okla., youth was killed and seven other persons injured in a two-automobile head-on collision three miles south of Borger on highway 117 Friday night.

Bill Keeler of Anadarko died at North Plains hospital at 9:45 p.m., an hour after the accident. The injured included James McBride, 16, of Borger, and Kenneth Updike, 18, also of Borger, driver of the car occupied by Keeler and Updike.

It collided with one driven by Oscar Silas Knowles, Sr., of Borger. Knowles, his wife and three children, Oscar, Jr., 13; Sandra Sue 10, and Bobby Ray, 3, also were hurt. All were in North Plains hospital Saturday.

# Holiday Deaths Pass 200 Mark

## Varied Accidents Claim Lives Of Pleasure Seekers

### Hot Holiday Over South

The Fourth of July in the Southwest was a day hot enough to ignite a firecracker without the aid of fire.

Temperatures arched toward the 100-degree mark throughout the area, except in Kansas and Missouri, where there was some ideal 85-degree holiday weather. Texas and Oklahoma weren't so fortunate and Friday's high temperatures in Colorado, Wyoming and New Mexico, respectively were 99 at La Junta, 96 at Moorcroft and 96 at Farmington.

Prospects for the remainder of the holiday weather were about the same, according to U. S. Weather Bureau forecasters: High temperatures and tantalizing scattered showers.

A forecaster at the Dallas station described Friday as "just a good old fashioned hot Fourth of July."

Still, forecasters believed a weak cool front earlier this week broke the back of a torrid dry heat wave in Missouri and Kansas.

Sunburned pleasure seekers, out to make the most of a long Fourth of July holiday, jammed the highways Saturday as the accidental death toll soared past the 200 mark.

Millions of persons flocked back to ball parks, beaches and resorts to resume their July celebration and enjoy the general pleasant weather.

Put the inevitable total of accidental deaths began to climb sharply.

At least 215 persons were dead, a United Press survey since 6 p. m. Thursday showed. There were 138 traffic fatalities, 51 drowning deaths, and only one fire-workers death.

While most American Friday lolled in the sun, gawked at spectacular fireworks displays or frolicked at amusement parks, the Fourth was a grim holiday for some.

At Estelle, S. D., a grandstand collapsed and dumped 1,500 persons onto the ground. At least 75 persons were injured, 35 seriously.

Rescue workers pulled the panicky injured out of the pile of splintered debris and rushed them to hospitals in Estelle, Brookings, and Clear Lake, S. D., where they overflowed into corridors and onto lawns.

At least 14 persons had broken legs and others suffered chest and kidney injuries. City officials said the grandstand was badly "overloaded."

Two men were blown out of a speeding car near Kansas City when one of them carelessly tossed a match into a grove of firecrackers. The car was almost demolished by the blast.

Herman Falke, 26, was burned by the explosion and a shower of glass fragments was imbedded in his face. His brother William, 26, suffered body burns and a lacerated foot.

A group of boys at Oklahoma City hatched a plan "to kill a lot of fish."

They emptied the powder from "all the firecrackers we could get" into a 16-inch pipe to make a bomb to stun fish in a nearby pond.

Young Tony Sidwell was trying to hammer the ends of the pipe shut when the jerry-built bomb exploded and blew his left hand off at the wrist. The flash also burned his body seriously.

We can remember Bob Taft's father, and while he never made

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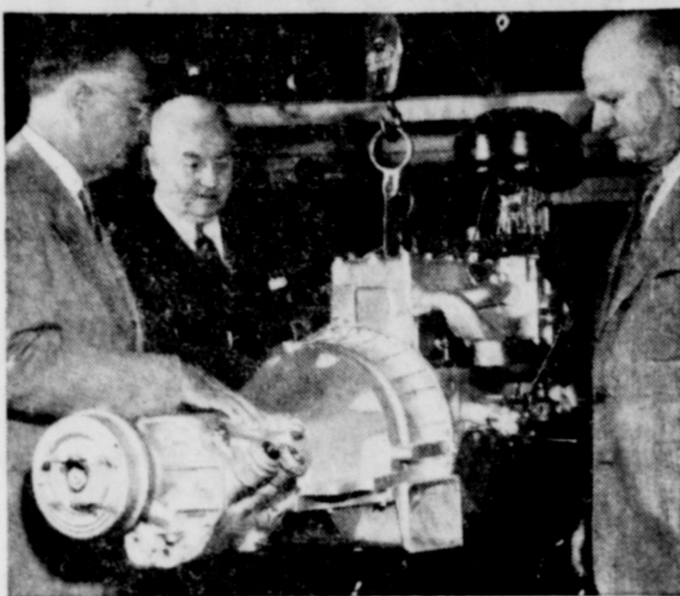
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**NEW TORQUE CONVERTER FOR CHRYSLER**

A spectacular president, nobody ever accused him of trying to steal the dome off of the Capitol building. As we feel right now, we would not like to entrust the same dome into Bob's hands—especially if any of the Bolts were a little loose.

## 82nd Congress Rushes Through Important Work

By Herbert Foster  
WASHINGTON, July 5 (UP)—The 82nd Congress, with political conventions and home in mind, rushed at its work Saturday in an all-out effort to wind up by Saturday night.

The lawmakers still had a stack of vital bills, including billions of dollars for appropriations and military bases, facing them as they began their final day. Also on tap was a controversial farm price support bill.

Even the last act of the session threatened a scrap. Senate and House administration leaders were determined to adjourn Congress sine die—for keeps until the next Congress meets in January.

But Senate Republican Leader Styles Bridges told newsmen he might move to recess subject to call of the leaders, keeping Congress on call to come back

after the conventions if the steel strike is not settled. However, House Democrats leaders reported only scattered sentiment for a temporary recess, and Speaker Sam Rayburn was determined to adjourn.

A Congress went into its final sprint, this was the status of major legislation:

**Military**  
The 46,610,938,912 military money bill carrying funds to provide a 143-wing Air Force by mid-1955 was awaiting action by the Senate. It also includes a rider which would provide \$45-a-month combat pay for members of the armed services attached to combat units in Korea.

**Military Construction**  
A \$2,396,302,800 compromise bill awaited action by both houses. The compromise authorizes military construction around the world to give the United States a ring of bases from which to blast a potential enemy.

**Civil Functions**

A bill to finance flood control projects and rivers and harbors developments was still in a conference committee.

**Atomic-Foreign Aid**  
A bill carrying about \$10 billion to finance atomic expansion, foreign aid and the military construction program was still being drafted in a Senate-House conference committee.

**"42 For Underwood"**  
CHICAGO UP — There were 103 roll calls at the Democratic national convention in 1924 at Madison Square Garden, New York. Each roll call vote started with the same phrase: "Alabama casts 24 votes for Oscar W. Underwood."

as well as Criminal Cases brought in the District Court of our County. It is his duty to Issue All Process in connection with these cases whether Civil or Criminal, and to record and keep all the records of, and for the District Court. It has been his duty to keep the Juvenile Records in this County; to issue Abstracts of Judgments and to consider the solvency of various Bonds and to approve or reject them, and many other duties that I could mention but space will not permit.

Eisenhower Due In Windy City Sunday Morning

ABOARD EISENHOWER SPECIAL, July 5 (UP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower arrives in Chicago Sunday to take command of the Republican presidential nomination against "arrogant" politicians, who he says are trying to dictate the nomination of Sen. Robert A. Taft.

Eisenhower's special train is due at the Chicago and Northwestern terminal at 10 a.m. CST. From then on out Eisenhower is pledged to fight what shapes up as an epic political scrap down to the finish wire.

He set his theme Friday in seven speeches across the state of Iowa. As he moved toward the convention city, Eisenhower increased the intensity of his attacks on "a little group of men," who he said prized control of the Republican party above democratic principles of majority rule.

Despite a back-breaking schedule the general looked fit for the pending battle. He was an angry man, stung by what he regards as high-handed decisions taken "behind the smoke screen of a cigar-filled room." He was warning to the task, and apparently enjoying it thoroughly.

"Whether politicians are to be loyal servants or arrogant masters is the issue at this very moment in Chicago," he said at Ames, Iowa.

"It is a struggle against those who would use parliamentary procedures and legal technicalities as a smoke screen to thwart the ideals and will of the people," he said.

"It is a straight cut issue between right and wrong. It is a

struggle against a little group of men whose purpose of controlling the Republican party overrides respect for majority decisions."

The general and his backers are counting on a big July 7 hope, and confidentially expect to arouse American public opinion against men Eisenhower terms "22 caliber politicians who would thwart the will of the delegates" and dictate the nomination if they can.

Eisenhower said at Denison, Ia., that the Republican party cannot win in the fall election if it resorts to "chicanery, crookedness" in naming its own candidate. The identity of the nominee is unimportant, he said, so long as the party standard-bearer is chosen honestly and in the open.

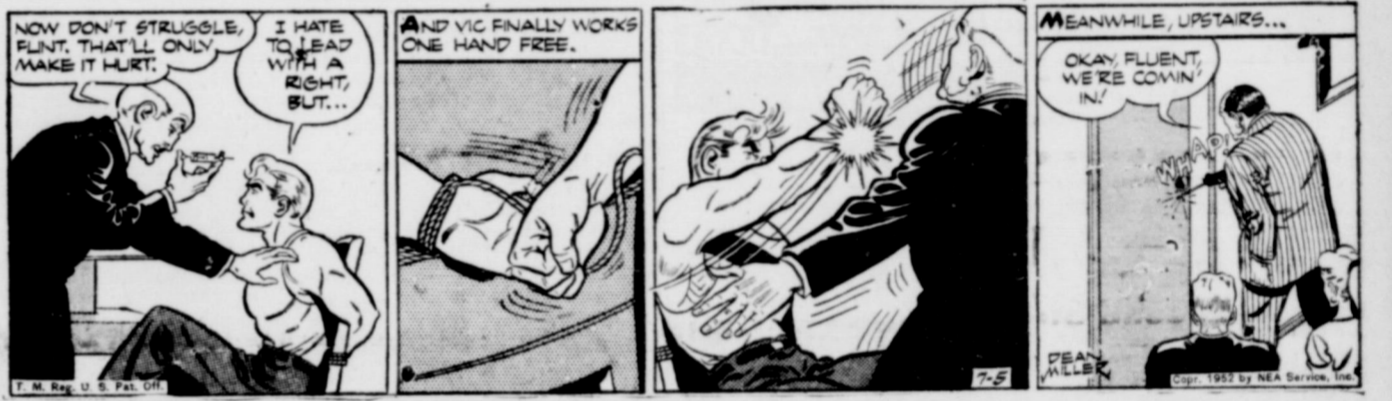

# MacArthur For Vice President Boom Sweeps GOP Convention

By Lyle C. Wilson

CHICAGO, July 5 (UP)—The "MacArthur for vice president" boom was thundering in this convention city Saturday as Taft managers maneuvered for a first ballot nomination.

Sen. Robert T. Taft's associates in public and private were speaking well of MacArthur as a running mate. Former President Herbert Hoover was believed to be a key man in plans for a MacArthur-Taft ticket.

But nothing was in the bag. Eisenhower strategy was to play

the corruption and vote-stealing issue against Taft to the limit before taking the delegate contest Monday to a showdown on the convention floor. Both sides were full of fight.

Kemen planned a spectacular "Dixie Indignation meeting" Saturday in the Blackstone theatre across the street from the Conrad Hilton hotel convention headquarters. They were whooping it up for a standing-room only meeting which would jam 1,500 persons into place.

Feuds Endanger Party

In bitterness and political impact Eisenhower's charges of corruption made against Taft in connection with selection of Louisiana, Mississippi, Texas and Georgia delegates has exceeded all expectations. It not only has

shocked the voters but it has jarred Taft's pre-convention campaign and many believe, seriously damaged party prospects in November.

"Cheap little deals," is what he called the methods by which 76 of 96 contested delegates were awarded by the Republican national committee to Taft and only 20 to him. Lodge abruptly rejected all compromise Taft proposals and brushed aside Mr. Hoover's offer to referee the disputes.

Lodge said the national committee had become "a puppet for the ruthless steamroller tactics of the Taft machine."

The committee's actions on contest dispute reminded Sen. James H. Duff, Pennsylvania, of "Stalinist tactics." They hope for better luck before the convention credentials committee.

Someone Will Cost Hurt

Under this barrage Taft's attitude stiffened to one of give 'em nothing and ask no quarter. The battle is on and someone is going to get hurt here next week.

Taft strategy was toward a first ballot blitz when the roll is called next Wednesday or Thursday. He had about 100 more pledged votes than Eisenhower on the United Press tabulation but was about 75 short of the 604 necessary to nominate.

The national committee's contest hearing ended Friday with another Taft triumph, but this time on a compromise basis dictated by the senator's supporters.

The contested Texas delegation was divided, Taft 22, Eisenhower 15. Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge, Eisenhower's campaign manager, had rejected the 22-16 compromise proposal but the committee forced it on him.

Of the 96 contests among seven states and Puerto Rico, the committee decided 76 in favor of Taft and 20 for Eisenhower. The United Press tabulation now gives Taft 530 first ballot votes and Eisenhower 425 of the 1,206 total.

## Army Paratrooper Sets New Twenty-Four Hour Jump Mark

GRAND PRAIRIE, Tex., July 5 (UP)—An Army paratrooper who set a new world's record of 124 parachute jumps in a single day said Saturday he planned to stay grounded for a while.

Tough, wiry Neal Stewart set the new record by an eyelash Friday night when he floated to his last landing at 11:49 p.m.—just 11 minutes before his midnight deadline.

The 27-year-old daredevil from Birmingham, Ala., was a bruised and battered man with a headache after his ordeal.

"I don't expect," he said in his soft southern drawl, "to do any more jumping for a while."

He hadn't eaten in 48 hours when he tumbled out of a small private airplane at 500 feet over Grand Prairie airport for the 124th time.

He never eats when he's jumping. And during those last five or six jumps, he said, his head hurt so "I didn't even know where the field was."

Stewart, who is on 30-day leave from Fort Bragg, N.C., also had little confidence his new record would stay long on the books.

"He'll come back and beat it," the new titleholder said of Iowa stuntman John W. Swedish, an acquaintance, who set the old record of 123 jumps.

Stewart made his mark the hard way.

During daytime hours Friday, he jumped into 100-degree temperatures and often into wind gusts up to 23 miles per hour. The sun baked his plowed 100-yard-square landing area into hard lumps and a harrow had to be run over the section once

during the day.

He had to call a halt to his marathon three times to rest up or to wait until the wind died down.

Stewart estimated he wasn't jumping during 17 of the 24 hours between 12:01 a.m. and midnight.

Stewart made his first jump at 12:16 a.m. He had to use his emergency chute twice in early jumps and his wife, who was watching, fainted the second time he had to use the spare after falling 200 feet through the air.

## He Forces Plan Meet

CHICAGO, July 5 (UP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's supporters from below the Mason-Dixon line will hold a bit "Dixie indignation meeting" Saturday afternoon to protest the loss of Eisenhower delegates in their area to the forces of Sen. Robert A. Taft.

TOKYO, July 5 (UP)—The American Army is training 500 officers of the Japanese national police reserve in the use of tanks and heavy artillery, it was disclosed Saturday.

## Troops On Guard In Mexican Vote

MEXICO CITY, July 5 (UP)—Steel-helmeted troops and police mounted guard throughout Mexico Saturday as a bloody election campaign closed with the government apparently certain to crush left-wing and Communist opposition at the polls.

Administration candidate Adolfo Ruiz Cortines claimed he will sweep at least 70 per cent of Sunday's votes in the four-way presidential race, while the political machine that has kept his party in power for 26 years was expected to roll up a lop-sided majority on Congress.

His leading opponent, Gen. Miguel Henriquez Guzman, was conceded the support of less than one-fifth of the 4,925,000 Mexicans who will go to the heavily-guarded polls.

Troop Guard Poiss

Two other candidates, Communist backed labor boss Vicente Lombardo Toledano, and Efraim Gonzalez Luna, head of the Catholic party, were not considered in the running.

The army detailed 60,000 troops to guarantee "peaceful and democratic" balloting and prevent recurrence of violence that already has cost 22 lives.

Military patrols, armed with carbines, tear-gas grenades and sub-machine guns, were ordered to break up political meetings and guard against sabotage or violence at power plants, water systems, newspapers, radio stations and other public utilities. Tanks and artillery were held in reserve.

Police and secret agents also were mobilized in the unprecedented security measures.

Roadblocks were set up to confiscate illegal firearms. Cantinas and liquor stores were closed. All private aircraft were grounded.

As the army enforced the uneasy pe-election calm, Communists and leftists alike accused Ruiz Cortines' Party of Revolutionary Institutions PRI of plotting fraud and possible violence if the election goes against expectations.

Ruiz Cortines, 61-year-old former interior minister who was selected by President Miguel Aleman as his "natural successor", closed out his campaign with an appeal to "avoid agitation—on the pretext" of the election.

## Reds Indicate Truce Talks At Crucial Stage

PANMUNJIM, July 5 (UP)—The Chinese Communists indicated Saturday that the Korean truce talks have reached a crucial stage on the last issue blocking an armistice—repatriation of war prisoners.

With a news blackout cloaking the progress, if any, of the negotiations, Radio Peiping had this to say of the talks:

"Now that the talks have entered executive session, there is no reason why a final agreement could not be reached if both sides faithfully carried out the agreed principles and do not engage in unilateral action disposing of war prisoners while negotiations for settlement are in progress.

"Results of the executive sessions will show whether the American delegates are really willing to negotiate a settlement on equal terms."

The broadcast again attacked the United Nations for "detaining" 100,000 Chinese and Korean war prisoners, but in milder terms than heretofore. The 100,000 prisoners are those whom the UN contends would forcibly resist repatriation.

Radio Peiping also broadcast a fantastic propaganda story.

The Chinese Communist radio said it was "believed in Washington" Britain intends to test new types of atomic arms on Korean war prisoners in Australia.

## Romanian Purges Top Woman Red

BUCHAREST, Romania, July 5 (UP)—Mrs. Ana Pauker, one of Romania's most powerful Communist leaders until stripped of her party posts a month ago, was fired Saturday as foreign minister.

A government decree announced that Mrs. Pauker has been "freed of her functions" and Buchi Simion, Romanian ambassador to Moscow, recalled to Bucharest to take over the foreign ministry.

Observers in London said the announcement meant that Mrs. Pauker also had been dismissed from her more or less honorary additional post of vice premier. Diplomatic sources in the British capital predicted that the dismissal would be followed by her arrest and trial together with other recently-purged high-ranking Romanian Communists.
