Television is really coming in to its own, and Gov. Warren of California, told us last evening that it is one miracle of the age. As a rule very few people know anything about what goes on at a national convention — just a few delegates, candidates, newspapermen and ward-healers. With television and radio, especially television, 100 million Americans have seen and heard everything that has gone on in Chicago.

A man with a television set may sit in his home and get convention goings-on better than he could if he were in the convention hall. He sees every move, even to facial expressions, hears every word, distinctly, and gets vote counts before the chairman announces them in convention hall.

Could it be we have honest politicians? Yes, it is a fact, and we feel better about America's future. We saw that group of Republicans denounce "crooked politics," chicanery and "theft" in no uncertain words. We saw the committee refuse to seat a number of so-called delegates, simply because they were not honest. Praise the Lord!

For once Texas attracted attention at a Republican National Convention, and that meeting at Mineral Wells, a few weeks ago, was aired out to 100 million people. The guilty have been punished and brought down in disgrace, and Taft will lose many votes simply because he apparently condoned such tactics. Many Taft supporters voted to seat Eisenhower delegates from Texas, Louisiana and Georgia. They would rather be honest and right, than to win.

Things are really happening everywhere. To say more about the convention would be guess work, but what we have said in the past holds good. Taft cannot be elected president. It is not in the stars. Ike may be — we do not know. But even if both should go down, we still have plenty good timber. We have MacArthur, Stassen, Warren and others. Even Herbert Hoover still lives and he is more popular today than he was 20 years ago.

Republicans are not trying to defeat the ideals of democracy. They admit good Democrats are the rule rather than the exception, but they have no love for the present administration, and they propose to wipe it out. We say this without mental reservation — they will find many good Democrats willing to help them with the "cleaning."

Socialism and Communism will fade out when the light is thrown upon them. This is a two-party nation and rightfully so, but God pity a third party whose only aim is to rule or ruin. Some things in the past may have caused angels to weep, but now it is Harry's time.

### Supreme Court Upholds Action Eastland Court

The Supreme Court of Texas, has upheld the opinion of the Court of Civil Appeals in Eastland, concerning a case from Taylor county, where the placing of certain names on the ballot was contested.

The original writ of mandamus was filed by Dan Gallagher of Taylor County, Texas, praying that respondents, W. C. Ribble, Chairman of the Democratic Executive Committee, and each of its members, also respondents, be required by writ of mandamus, to place Relator's name (and 3 others) on the official ballot for the Democratic primary of July 26, 1952.

These candidates were contested upon the grounds that they hold more than one office. A man, according to law, cannot be a County or precinct chairman and hold any other office of profit or trust in the State or nation.

Judgment was rendered for Relator against Respondents, directing Respondents to place Relator's name (3 others) on said official Ballot as was prayed for. The case went to the Supreme Court in Austin, and the opinion of the Eastland Court of Civil Appeals, was upheld.

There was a similar situation in Eastland this spring when it was discovered that the County Chairman, J. C. Allison, was a deputy tax collector. He resigned his post as chairman, and the matter was closed.

Truman Signs Money Bill For Department Use

WASHINGTON, July 11 (UP)—President Truman late Thursday signed \$1,015,911,710 appropriations bill to run the State, Justice and Commerce Departments during fiscal 1953.

The amount was 18 per cent less than the President had requested. Congress chopped the most—\$217,701,424 from the \$318,408,010 requested by the State Department. It provided \$87,325,000 of the \$133,272,914 asked for the Voice of American, motion pictures and other overseas educational purposes, and knocked out \$36,727,986 requested for construction of nine new radio projects, including two more high-powered ship-borne relay bases.

The total cut was \$217,701,424. The Justice Department's request for \$189,907,000 was trimmed to \$184,293,000. The Commerce Department's request for \$707,122,499 was cut to \$586,588,586.

### Rejected Suitor Goes Berserk; Kills 3, Self

HOUSTON, July 11 (UP)—An Air Force captain, rejected as a suitor by a pretty student nurse, stalked into her second-floor nurses' home bedroom late Thursday night and shot to death the girl, two hospital guards who tried to save her and himself.

Other occupants of the second floor of the swank, \$5 million Cullen Nurses' Home of Memorial hospital covered in closets and under beds as the berserk officer committed mass murder, then suicide.

The captain was released only last week by military authorities who arrested him when the nurse complained that he was forcing his attentions on her and had threatened her life.

Dead Friday were Carol Cooper, 24, the student nurse; Capt. Renard Haywood, about 26, of Ellington Air Force Base near Houston; and two detective agency employes assigned to memorial hospital as guards identified by police only as Peterson and Fair.

The guards were shot as they raced down a corridor to Miss Cooper's aid as she struggled with Haywood outside her bedroom.

The officer stalked unannounced into her bedroom about 10 p.m. CST, and demanded that she leave with him, said Lt. Joe Clark of the Houston homicide squad.

When Miss Cooper refused, Haywood grabbed her and began forcing her toward the stairway. The guards came running when they heard the noise of the struggle.

Clark said the captain swung around silently and fired with his luger automatic. Both guards fell to the floor.

As other nurses ran screaming for cover, the captain jerked Miss Cooper into a bedroom, barricaded the door and shot her, then himself, Lt. Clark said.

The shooting victims died in one, two, three, four order within an hour and 15 minutes after the grim scene was played. Peterson died instantly, Fair about 30 minutes later.

### Highway Patrol Needs More Men

Additional Highway Patrolmen are needed, according to Terry Barrett of that department. Applications are being received by the Texas Highway Patrol, in Austin, and will continue to be received until August 1.

The requirements for this position are as follows: Age 21 to 35 years, inclusive; must weigh at least two pounds per inch of height and not more than three and one-half; must be in good physical condition; must not be less than 5'8" tall, without shoes; must be of good moral character; must have been a bona fide resident of Texas for at least one year immediately prior to the filing of application; and must have a high school education or the equivalent.

All veterans of the Armed Forces, who meet Patrol requirements, will be given five (5) points in taking this examination, as required by Article 4413, Section 31 of the Texas Civil Code.

Applications may be secured from the Texas Highway Patrol District Office at 2064 Butter-Street in Abilene or may be secured by writing.

# Eisenhower Wins Republican Nomination On First Ballot

### Allies Hurl Huge Attack At Pyongyang, N. Korean Capitol

SEOUL, Korea, July 11—The United Nations hurled an armada of land and sea planes Friday against Pyongyang, the capital of North Korea, and the vital Sariwon-Hwangju road in a daylong assault, possibly the biggest of the Korean war.

The attack began at 10: a.m. 7 p.m. on Thursday and continued into the evening with rising fury. Hundreds of planes from the Fifth Air Force, American and British aircraft carriers, the South African air force, the Royal Australian air force and the Republic of Korea air force swept the target areas in relays.

**Many Points Hit**

The combined Allied squadrons smashed at antitank guns, rubber and ammunition factories, truck and tank repair shops and headquarters of the Chinese and North Korean armies in Pyongyang.

Supply buildings and vehicle repair units were leveled along the Sariwon road south of the North Korean capital.

Friday's raid promised to eclipse the former record aerial assault of the Korean war when 500 Allied planes smashed Communist hydro electric stations on June 23, short-circuiting 90 per cent of the Red power supply.

During that assault, which had political repercussions in capitals throughout the world, the general station at Suifu dam, the fourth largest in the world, was destroyed by the UN fighter-bombers.

**Civilians Warned In Advance**

A Fifth Air Force spokesman said the civilian population of the target areas was warned "weeks before" of the imminent all-out assault.

He said UN planes had dropped leaflets telling the population that "military targets in North Korea have to be destroyed."

### Ridgway Rejects Hoover Air Plan

LONDON, July 11 (UP)—Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway has rejected the Hoover-Taft doctrine of reliance on a large air force at the cost of ground and naval forces.

The supreme Allied commander for Europe told a press conference Thursday night that he believed it basically unsound for any nation to depend solely on any one branch of the armed services.

Ridgway did not mention by name either former President Herbert Hoover or Sen. Robert A. Taft, proponents of the predominant Air Force theory.

He expressed his opinion when asked by a reporter about the value of a nation relying solely on a long range Air Force action for defense.

"In my personal opinion," Ridgway said, "I think the one lesson learned to date is that in modern operations you must have forces of the three great military services—land, sea and air."

"If you sacrifice one, you accept a risk of lowering the potential effectiveness of each of the forces."

A truckload of watermelons has been ordered placed on cold storage by Burleson supporters and everyone is promised their fill. Afterward speeches by Burleson and his wife, Ruth, will be heard by the crowd.

### Barber Gives 75 Year Sentence In Dallas Robbery

DALLAS, July 11 (UP)—Robert Barber, Jr., already sentenced to 50 years in prison, faced a second sentence of 75 years Friday for his part in an armed robbery of a Dallas cafe which netted \$11,000.

Barber abruptly changed his plea to the armed robbery charge, for which prosecutors were asking the death penalty, from innocent to guilty Thursday, as attorneys labored for the fourth day to fill the jury box.

When Barber announced his willingness to plead guilty in return for a sentence of 75 years, there were nine jurors in the box, and 11 veniremen had been questioned.

Barber agreed to drop his appeal from a Fort Worth conviction.

Barber was sentenced to 50 years in prison last April, for the murder of a Fort Worth detective, who went to Barber's home to question him about the robbery. He was wounded in the gunfight but later escaped from a prison hospital ward.

### Bond Brokers Take Option To Sell Dist. Bonds

The Underwood Company of Dallas, who are the bond brokers for the Eastland County Water Supply District, met with the directors of the district in Eastland yesterday and exercised their option to take the district bonds. A certified check for \$30,000 was deposited with the water district as a guarantee of their good faith.

The option calls for the bonds to be sold within the next sixty days or the \$30,000 dollars to be forfeited to the district.

This does not constitute an actual sale but is indication that the bond brokers have reason to believe that the bonds are saleable.

### New England Quads Assured Of New Home

STANDISH, Me., July 11 (UP)—Silas and Elizabeth Pinkham and their quadruplets will have a new home here in Standish townfolk get their way. A special town meeting has been called to act on a proposal to appropriate funds for a new home. The 45-year-old carpenter and his wife have been living in a two-room tar-paper-covered house far from the center of town.

Mrs. Pinkham, 35, gave birth to the quads at Osteopathic hospital in nearby Portland Monday.

The quads were reported gaining weight and were expected to be sent home late this month. Their mother was scheduled to leave the hospital next week along with her husband, who was hospitalized with a case of nervous exhaustion Wednesday night.

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### Minnesota Votes Put Ike In As GOP Presidential Candidate

CONVENTION HALL, Chicago, July 11 (UP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower captured the Republican presidential nomination Friday with a first-ballot victory over Sen. Robert A. Taft.

The 61-year-old general, who started his campaign late and lagged behind the senator in all pre-convention delegate counts, rode to triumph on a bandwagon that really got rolling only a few days ago.

The 62-year-old Taft went down to defeat despite desperate stop-Ike efforts in which his camp tried at the 11th-hour to turn the Eisenhower bandwagon into a hearse.

It was Taft's third-and, he has said, his last—unsuccessful try for the nomination. He lost in 1940 to the late Wendell L. Wilkie and four years ago to Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York.

**Was Bitter Fight**

Ike's victory climaxed the Republicans' 25th and bitterest national convention, leaving the wearied and wound-licking delegates only the anti-climactic task of picking a vice presidential nominee.

This convention's angry Taft-Ike struggle, climaxed by Eisenhower's victory on Wednesday in the battle for "stolen" southern delegates, left deep scars which the party must try to heal if it hopes to win their campaign to unseat the Democrats in November.

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### Horned Toads Have Sponsor

The Horned Toads have a new sponsor. All along they have been a kind of side-line for Mr. Abels who gives them training along with his Yellowjackets.

In the future Jim Borgus will be their sponsor.

They had announced a game with Baird's Mexican team for last night, but the Baird group failed to show up.

Ike's victory was foreshadowed days before the balloting started.

**Wyoming May Change**

A tip-off that everyone was itching to get aboard the right bandwagon at the right time came from the Wyoming delegation. Its chairman, Marvin Bishop, said his state's 12 delegates would vote for Eisenhower on the first ballot if he appeared to be getting "close" to a majority. Wyoming is last on the list of states, and a majority of its delegates favored Taft before the roll call.

Sen. Robert A. Taft was maneuvered into the role of challenger, and his managers were dicker with Gov. Earl Warren of California, and Gen. Douglas MacArthur on stop-Ike strategy. Taft's second choice could be either of those men, or almost anyone but Eisenhower.

Standing of the candidates Friday before the first ballot: Eisenhower 572, Taft 500. Necessary to nominate 604.

The convention held Wednesday that Taft was not entitled to bloc of southern delegates. They were ousted and supporters of Eisenhower seated instead.

Eisenhower went into the delegate lead at once and Friday was calling on his reserves to boost his first ballot vote to 604 or more—and the presidential nomination. Chairman Arthur E. Summerfield of the uncommitted 46-vote Michigan delegation was first into Ike's front line trenches.

**Michigan Goes For Ike**

Summerfield announced early Friday that he and the delegates he controls would vote for Eisenhower on the first ballot. Ike men counted that a minimum bloc of 34 votes.

Taft's managers were looking to California and Minnesota for help. The big California delegation of 70 votes was the greatest prize still outstanding before ballot time. Warren stood fast for himself on the first ballot and to that extent fell in with Taft strategy to keep Eisenhower from going over the top on roll call No. 1.

Time was what Taft strategists were playing for—time and a chance to shift to Eisenhower, if possible, some of the unfriendly feeling boiling up here against one of the men most responsible for his political debut. That man is Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York.

Dewey had kept his head down here.

**'Sink Dewey' The Word**

"Sink Dewey" was the slogan with which Taft managers went into the final convention day.

"He is the candidate in everything but name," said a Taft broad-sheet circulated among delegates Thursday night.

"End Dewey's control of our party, eight years of Deweyism and defeat," said the statement signed by National Chairman David S. Ingalls of the Taft campaign.

They listened patiently through the speeches Thursday night and early Friday when the last man had been named and acclaimed. Before that they had adopted their platform, one of the longest in recent political history.

The planned spontaneous demonstrations went off in style. Taft's demonstrations were clocked at 31 minutes, Eisenhower's at 42. MacArthur inspired the aisle mobs to another 32 minutes of dizzy behavior, Warren to 13. Stassen's demonstration lasted less than a minute. And what were they worth? If you added them all together plus a nickel you could get a five cent cigar.

Sen. Everett M. Dirksen, Illinois, put Taft in nomination as the long night session began.

Gov. Theodore Roosevelt McKel-din made Eisenhower's nominating speech.

Mrs. C. E. Howard, a good-looking lady Republican from Excelsior, Minn., made the nominating speech for Stassen.

Sen. William F. Knowland, R-Calif., Warren's floor manager, offered the California governor in nomination.

Fred L. Coogan, an Oklahoma delegate, put MacArthur in nomination.

Russell 'Prince Charming' She described Sen. Dick Russell as "every woman's prince charming with plenty of magnetic appeal. He has a good factual mind."

Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois, she allowed, has "a popular appeal enhanced by a sense of humor."

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According to Miss Lengyel, glamour should not be confused with magnetism.

"The former is artifice created, while the latter is the radiation of a total personality. In my opinion, Franklin D. Roosevelt and Winston Churchill were two of the most magnetic personalities of our time."
