### Around The Square

With Mack

We don't think as much of that "Sun Dog" as we did a few days ago, for he sure let us down. As these lines are being typed it looks very much like rain, but we have been in West Texas too long to go in for "looks." Just because it looks like rain, and because the Sun Dog announced a general down-pour, doesn't necessarily denote that we will have rain. Might have a sandstorm before the day is over.

Well, we don't have to have rain. We will soon have a new lake, and our problems will be solved. It so happens that the watershed for our lake protrudes over in the rainy belt. It rains in Ranger, Breckenridge and other points, and surplus water will find its way into the new lake.

So let's quit worrying. It may get too dry to farm, but we hope it never gets too dry to produce poultry, livestock, and other semi-arid products.

Cheer up friends, it may stay this bad for another six months and then get worse. Even then we won't be completely done. Eastland, with a good lake, may develop into a manufacturing community. We still have plenty of hay-ite, and the world needs our building blocks. They don't do much farming up around Cape Cod, but they catch some mighty fine fish, and we notice that people up there get along pretty well. This proves that you don't have to produce mesquite beans and okra in order to make a living.

While we appreciate our agriculture, and need it, but the world would continue to turn on its axis, if there never was another seed of any kind, planted in this county. We would merely shift from agriculture to something more remunerative. We have oil, gas, livestock, manufacturing plants and other things to fall back on, should the drought continue. Of course we want rain, and need it very badly, but we will manage, some way, to get along without it, if it fails to arrive.

They have been having droughts in West Texas ever since we can remember, and we have some pretty bad ones, but we can't remember ever attending funerals for people, who starved to death.

And when you begin looking for a change, remember you can't get all the birds in one bush. We are dry in Eastland, but we know of some cities that are too wet. Kansas City for example. Floods are more devastating than droughts, because they totally destroy and wash away million and millions of dollars worth of property. Floods also leave death and pestilence in their wake, whereas drought leaves only a crust of earth that can be instantly cured with a little water.

Nothing is quite as bad as it appears on the surface. When the season had passed we will laugh at our fears. Nor is anything quite as good as it may appear. If you should change areas you will likely be disappointed, once you get there.

Take the world as it comes. During lean years, you may have to make some changes, but if you prepare for the lean years when conditions were good, you will come out smiling.

### Lone Star Men To Be Commended On Accident Free Plant Built

Recognition of the perfect safety record set by employees during construction of the \$1,500,000 McElroy-Wilshire gasoline plant will be a feature of special dedication ceremonies to be held Saturday, July 19, on the 30-acre plant site located in Upton County eleven miles northeast of Crane. The plant, owned jointly by the Lone Star Producing Company and the Wilshire Oil Company, Inc., was constructed by Lone Star and will be operated by the firm.

Officials of the two host companies have announced that the general public is invited to attend the program which will get underway at 9 o'clock with inspection of the plant and the adjacent big drilling rigs of Wilshire. The dedication ceremony at 11 o'clock will be followed by a barbecue luncheon served by the Odessa Chuck Wagon Gang. Open house and conducted tours will continue until 4 o'clock.

Starting at 8:30 o'clock Saturday morning, shuttle buses will make regular trips to the plant from Crane and may be boarded at the Pettit Grill in Crane. This transportation is provided without cost to dedication ceremony guests, officials stated.

### State Bar For Loan Law To Get Rid Of Sharks

HOUSTON, July 16—Declaring that loan sharks in Texas "in numbers and nuisance are now even more in evidence than ever before," the State Bar of Texas has thrown its support behind a proposed small loan law.

The measure, modeled from laws already in effect in almost all other states, provides for licensing and supervising the small loan industry, with both civil and criminal penalties, and for a maximum charge for loans "that will be fair to both borrower and lender."

### Blast Kills 5 Stealing Gas From Police

DETROIT, July 16—Five men were believed killed Wednesday when their 28-foot speedboat exploded while they apparently were trying to steal gasoline from the police boat pier at Belle Isle Park.

The blast rocked the nearly-deserted island park in the Detroit river at daybreak. Police said the boat was reduced to small chunks of floating wreckage.

Sgt. Hiram Phipps of the homicide squad said no bodies had been recovered. He said the blast must have made mincemeat of the victims. Neither they nor their boat were immediately identified.

### West Germans Send Protest Red Seizures

BOON, Germany, July 16 (UP)—The West German government plans to send to the United Nations evidence of 169 proved kidnappings by the Communists in West Berlin, it was announced Wednesday.

### Another Record Week Of Polio Facing Texans

Another record-breaking week of dread poliomyelitis appeared assured for Texas Wednesday. Incidence of the disease also increased throughout the South-west as five new cases pushed Oklahoma's count to 159 so far this year, 68 more than at this time a year ago, and the 1952 toll in Kansas soared to 80 with four new cases. For a similar period of 1951, Kansas had only 30 polio victims.

Houston, hardest hit city in the hardest-hit state, had 15 new cases of polio diagnosed Tuesday. At Fort Worth, the City-County hospital announced its polio ward was so overtaxed that only critically ill victims may stay past 15 days.

Tuesday's new cases at Houston pushed the number treated at its two centers so far this year to 521. Some 58 persons were under treatment for polio at Ft. Worth, five of them in iron lungs. At Dallas, 88 persons were being treated and 56 polio victims were hospitalized in the Lower Rio Grande valley.

### Virginia Sends Economy Minded Senator Back

RICHMOND, Va., July 16 (UP)—Virginia's anti-Truman Democrats celebrated Wednesday the primary election landslide victory of Sen. Harry F. Byrd as a mandate for him to carry on a fight against waste in government.

Byrd, overwhelmingly renominated for a fourth full Senate term, expressed amazement at defeating by "such a large majority" Col. Francis Pickens Miller, who had bitterly attacked "the Byrd machine" in Virginia.

### Veteran Pilots Report Seeing Flying Saucers

MIAMI, Fla., July 16 (UP)—Two veteran airline pilots added to the flying saucer lore Wednesday accounts of seeing huge discs zipping in formation at supersonic speed near Norfolk, Va.

Pilots W. B. Nash, 35, and W. H. Fortenberry, 30, of Pan American Airways, said the "glowing, orange red" saucers maneuvered too sharply for human endurance at a speed of "far above 1,000 miles per hour."

### Elks Elect New Exalted Ruler

NEW YORK, July 14—Special—Sam Stern, Fargo, N. D., banker, merchant and civic leader, was elected Grand Exalted Ruler of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks at its 88th Grand Lodge Convention here today.

Stern, who was unopposed, was elected unanimously as Convention business sessions got underway in the Waldorf Astoria following the colorful public opening ceremonies Sunday night. He is the first North Dakotan to head the Order of Elks in its 84 year history. Stern has served as North Dakota Chairman of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis since its inception, has been Chairman of the North Dakota State Crippled Children Commission for 11 years, and was a founder and for many years head of the State Elks Association's Crippled Children Program, which established Camp Grassick, an institution for handicapped children, near Bismarck. Stern will be installed at the closing convention session Thursday, July 17, succeeding Howard R. Davis of Williamsport, Pa.

### Next Move Is Probably Up To Government

PITTSBURGH, July 16 (UP)—The latest round of joint negotiations to settle the 45-day steel strike has ended in failure, and it appeared Wednesday the government would have to make another effort to get the opposing sides together again.

The industry blamed Tuesday's negotiation collapse on the insistence of the CIO United Steelworkers for a "compulsory" union shop and claimed the union would not discuss the walkout of 23,000 iron ore workers until the union shop issue had been solved.

The iron ore workers joined the steel strike on June 2. Industry sources have urged the union to permit the shipment of ore into the mills to prevent a serious shortage this winter, even if the steel dispute is settled.

Murry Terms Offer Inadequate  
Union President Philip Murray countered the company charges by terming the industry's latest offer "inadequate and unsatisfactory" and accused the industry of handing out "distorted propaganda" on the union shop issue.

Following the break up of the talks, Murray announced a meeting of the union's wage policy committee would be held next Monday in Pittsburgh to "decide the union's future course of action" in the strike.

Tuesday's counter-charges followed a two-hour meeting between the union and officials of Bethlehem Steel, who represented the big six of the industry.

Industry Reveals Offer  
An industry statement revealed the union had been offered wage increases averaging 16 cents an hour, six paid holidays, improved vacations and increased shift differentials. The statement claimed the package deal would cost about 25 cents an hour.

Meanwhile, the longest and costliest strike in the history of the nation's steel industry continued, with daily plant shut-downs and layoffs in allied industries swelling the number of idle workers to the 1,250,000 mark.

## Truman Bemoans Congress' Cut Spending Bill

WASHINGTON, July 16 (UP)—President Truman took another swing at "exceedingly dangerous" congressional economy cuts Tuesday night as he signed the \$11,795,776,339 "catch-all" appropriations bill.

The measure provides funds for foreign aid, atomic expansion and construction of a global network of secret air bases during fiscal 1953 which began July 1.

Mr. Truman said in a statement he was particularly concerned about slashes in appropriations for civil defense, anti-inflation controls and mutual security.

The president said Congress repeated "the gross error of the last two years" when it chopped requested civil defense funds by 90 per cent. He said the appropriations for economic stabilization agencies were "another case of reckless slashing without regard to the consequences to our people or to defense."

Here are the main features of the bill, representing a 15 per cent cut from Mr. Truman's original requests:

1. \$6,031,947,750 for military, economic and technical aid to free nations. Mr. Truman had requested \$7 billion.
2. \$3,039,988,000 for atomic expansion. Mr. Truman had sought \$3,191,000,000 for this program.
3. \$2,228,794,840 for improvement and construction of about 250 military bases in this country and abroad, including a worldwide ring of air bases from which to "saturate" an enemy with atomic and other bombs. Mr. Truman had sought \$2,990,487,740.

## Truman Enters Hospital For Complete Check

WASHINGTON, July 16 (UP)—President Truman was admitted to Walter Reed hospital Wednesday for a checkup following a four-day bout with what the White House described as a "mild virus infection."

Press secretary Joseph Short said the chief executive might be in the hospital for "two or three days."

"But it won't be for very long," Short said.

Mr. Truman entered the hospital on the recommendation of White House physician Maj. Gen. Wallace H. Graham.

Short said the president entered the modern Army medical center because Graham "wanted to do some checking out there where they have equipment."

Short said Mr. Truman had no temperature Wednesday morning for the first time in several days. Graham said, however, there was a possibility that some "slight" fever might develop during the day.

The president has been confined to his personal quarters on the second floor of the White House since Monday. He canceled all engagements and spent most of his time in bed. While confined, however, he has been able to work on the hundreds of bills left for his signature by Congress.

White House staff members said it is quite doubtful that Mr. Truman will be able to see Thomas J. Gavin of Kansas City, his alternate on the Missouri delegation to the Democratic national convention, who is to vote for the president's choice.

Gavin arrived here Tuesday and planned to fly back to Missouri late Wednesday. He did not see the president Tuesday.

## Collie's Vigil Continues; And Workers On Job

JOPLIN, Mo., July 16—Volunteer workers determined to solve the mystery of a water-filled mine shaft and the homeless Collie dog who has guarded it for 17 days Wednesday learned their task would be a difficult one.

Old diagrams of the mine, found Tuesday, revealed the shaft has three horizontal drifts, which meant there was "hundreds of yards" of water, 70-feet deep, which must be drained.

But volunteer workers were convinced the Collie's vigil at the mine shaft means his master had met with an accident down the deep hole. They said they would go ahead "at any cost."

Meanwhile, H. C. Schildnecht, head of the Joplin Humane Society, told authorities he had received a telephone threat that the dog would be killed unless the abandoned mine shaft and its mystery, if any, was left undisturbed.

The Joplin Machine & Electric Co., which furnished a large electric pump after the Rural electric

Administration completed a special power line to the mine shaft earlier this week, estimated it now would take four to five days to drain the shaft and the cost would run into "thousands." There are "hundreds of yards" of water in the deep hole, the electric company manager said.

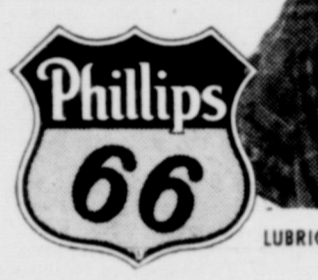

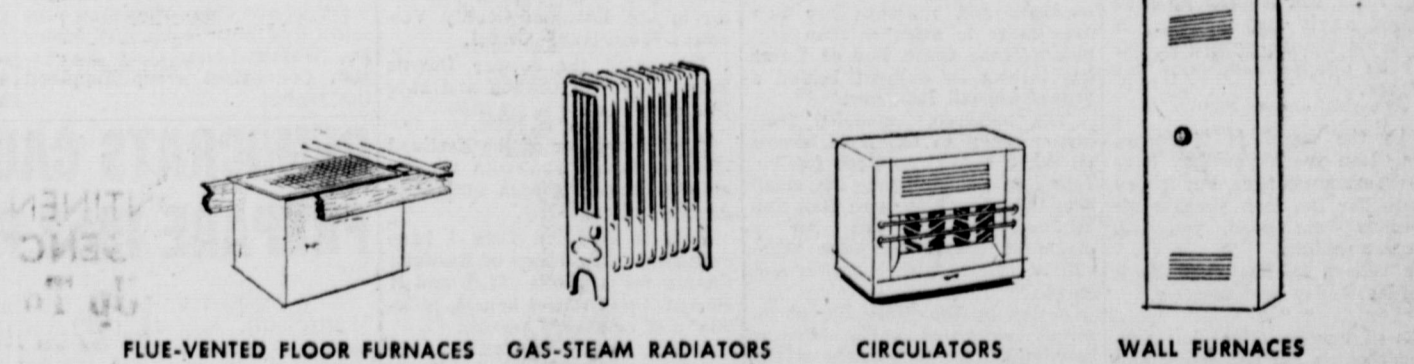

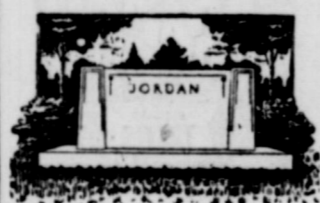

Doctors Fight To Save Baby Left In Weeds

HOUSTON, July 16—Doctors fought Wednesday to save the life of a newborn, premature baby found abandoned in a weed-choked vacant lot, blue from cold and covered with a swarm of ants.

"Believe me, it's a miracle that little baby is still with us," said a policeman who rushed the infant to a hospital.

The night supervisor at Jefferson Davis City-County hospital, who asked not to be identified, said early Wednesday the little boy was "perking up wonderfully with a little tender love and care."

Doctors gave the child, who weighed four pounds, eight and one-half ounces, a "fair chance" to survive. They estimated he was from two weeks to one month premature, but said the baby was perfectly formed.

Eugene Yargo, 15, heard a whimpering noise Tuesday as he walked by a vacant lot some 50 feet from the nearest house and about 40 feet from a railroad track. The youth said he investigated, thinking a kitten was lost in the brush.

He found, instead, the infant. The child was covered with dry leaves and brush which struck to his naked body. Ants still swarmed over the baby's skin when police investigator H. R. Coats arrived at the scene.

Coats brushed off the ants and wrapped the child in a blanket. He laid the baby on the hood of his police car and started the motor to warm the infant rushing him to the hospital.

U.S. Broadcasts To Russia Will Be Stepped Up

WASHINGTON, July 16 UP—Transmittal power of Voice of America broadcasts to Russia will be increased to counter Soviet "strangling" of the magazine Amerika, State Department officials revealed Wednesday.

"The Soviet government can't control the airwaves," Dr. Wilson Compton, chief of the Department's international information administration, told a reporter. "We are doing everything we can to make the Voice of America more effective in reaching the Russian people."

The Voice of America is the sole remaining U. S. information link between the American and Russian people.

The only other information contact, the State Department's Russian-language magazine Amerika, was suspended Tuesday after the Soviets had steadily reduced its Russian readership by intimidating tactics. The department at the same time ordered the Kremlin to suspend all Russian publications in this country, including the Soviet embassy's slick-paper magazine, the USSR Information Bulletin.

"The strangling of the magazine Amerika, regrettable as it is, is not the end of our effort to tell the Russians the truth," the Voice said in its first broadcast to the Soviet Union following the suspensions.
