### New Social Security In Effect Now

WASHINGTON, July 22 (UP)—The government will begin paying the new, increased Social Security benefits about October 3, Federal Security Administrator Oscar R. Ewing has announced.

He said his agency is rushing to make sure the higher payments authorized in legislation signed last week by President Truman can be made on time to more than 4.5 million beneficiaries.

The measure raises old age and survivors insurance benefits by 35 per month or 12 1/2 per cent, whichever is larger.

### Kerr Evasive On Veep Hopes

CHICAGO, July 22 (UP)—Sen. Robert S. Kerr ducked a question on what he would do if a chance at the vice presidential nomination comes his way.

The Oklahoma senator conceded his presidential hopes have not increased since the Democratic convention got underway, but insisted that his "position has been fortified."

He was asked whether he would consider second spot on the ticket. "I've been asking people who ask me if they've got it to offer me and so far no one has," Kerr replied.

But what if someone who could get him the vice presidential position asked him?

"Then I'd have to fish or cut bait," Kerr said.

Kerr had planned to attend Monday night's convention session, but secret strategy talks forced a last-minute change of schedule. He is a delegate from Oklahoma, where he made a fortune on oil before entering politics.

After seeing "about 50" delegates during the day, Kerr said late Monday, "I don't think there has been any increase in our position today. I'd say our position has been fortified, and there are definite prospects of an increase on the basis that I have hoped it would be."

Kerr has sought second choice support in hopes of coming forward as a "unity" candidate if a convention deadlock develops after four or five ballots.

### Lone Star Gas Seeks Increase In Sales Rates

DALLAS, July 22 (UP)—Rate increases will be asked soon in all 386 Texas and Oklahoma towns served by the Lone Star Gas Co., a firm official said Tuesday.

The company Monday asked the Dallas city council for a straight 20 per cent increase in rates. Wesley F. Wright, general manager of the Dallas division of distribution, said gas rates in Dallas were reduced 14.6 per cent on May 15, 1942. The 20 per cent boost, he said, would make rates only 2.5 per cent above those in effect before that date. The company said it serves 160,000 customers in the Dallas area.

Oliver Ingram, 15, of Breckenridge, son of a colored minister in that city, was killed at 1:30 a.m. today just east of the "Y" on the Cisco-Breckenridge highway by an automobile. Driver of the car was William H. Knight of Snyder, who was enroute to Gorman, where his wife is a patient in the hospital there. She was to have been operated on at 10:00 a.m. today.

Oliver, in company with another colored boy left Eastland about 10 o'clock last night, and were walking to Breckenridge. The accident occurred some three miles west of Morton Valley at about 1:30 a.m. Mr. Knight, the car driver, came on into Eastland and notified police, and went on to the Gorman hospital. He has been in Eastland today and in company with members of the sheriff's department. He gave as his reason for not stopping at the scene, he saw the second boy, and feared it was a pre-arranged hi-jacking. He was not detained.

By Lyle C. Wilson CHICAGO, July 22 (UP)—Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson looked Tuesday like an early ballot presidential nominee of the Democratic national convention so divided by bitterness that the party's election day prospects already have been hurt.

But the big presidential break had not yet come. Party moderates were pressing the Illinois governor's cause. Sen. Estes Kefauver still was tops in committed delegate, and the man to beat. Democratic dispute blazed out of control here in the early hours of Tuesday and what would happen at the next convention meeting was anybody's guess.

Bolt or Lockout Possible It could be either a bolt by angry southern delegates or a left-of-center lockout against them. The South was whipped and humiliated when the convention, meeting long past midnight, shouted approval of a "loyalty" resolution requiring delegates to pledge that they will do their best to see that the party's presidential nominee appears on their state ballots in November.

Vice President Alben W. Barkley charged the fateful night with some moments of pure drama. The old man quit. He said self-anointed and power hungry labor bosses had done him in. Barkley told his Kentucky delegation not to present his name to the convention.

The recap goes home Tuesday. He has fought and lost his last political fight. His withdrawal was announced shortly before midnight with the convention itself stalled by a recess calm before the storm. The political heirs of Franklin D. Roosevelt are missing their strength on the convention floor to ram the loyalty pledge down southern throats so there would be no bolting the ticket in November.

A Surprise Move Surprised southerners called for time out to caucus, and they got it. But that was all. The so-called loyalty pledge was thrust at them without previous committee consideration by simply being read by its sponsor in the convention hall.

In three hours and 23 minutes of secret huddles and public controversy, hoos and cheering the convention disposed of the rules dispute which has been boiling up within it. At 1:05 a.m., CST Tuesday the Democrats adjourned, none knowing just what to expect next.

As they return Tuesday to the hall for the third convention session, the United Press tabulation listed the front runners this way: Kefauver 266 1/2 votes; Sen. Richard P. Russell 200; Averell Harriman 107 1/2; Stevenson 77 1/2; Sen. Robert S. Kerr 50. Necessary to nominate, 616.

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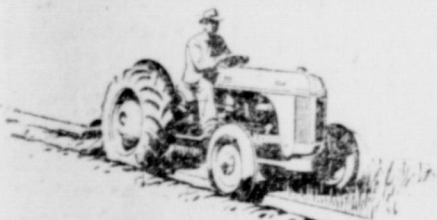

**Fly Control Is Health Problem During Summer**

AUSTIN, July 23—The control of fly menace comes at the top of the list of necessary public health measures which should be applied by every city, community, and individual in the state, declared Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer.

The most effective measure for fly control is to prevent their breeding. Flies breed in filth and about eight days are required to complete a life cycle. During her life time of several months, one fly lays from 600 to 1,000 eggs.

To eliminate flies, the breeding places must be destroyed. Manure piles, garbage, and other organic

filth furnish the requirements of warmth, moisture, and food necessary for the propagation of the fly. Flies should be kept from contact with food or drink or utensils in which such food and drink are prepared and served. Likewise, they should be kept from access to privy vaults where they pick up the infections, which they later spread to humans by contact with the food and drink, and by unwashed hands and utensils.

See that your windows, doors, and porches are screened so that the stray fly from some careless neighbor will not molest your family. See that your grocer keeps meat, vegetables, and fruit screened from flies.

The use of DDT and other sprays for the control of a variety of adult flies and fly larvae have come into wide usage. How-

**Commission Sets 1952 Hunt Dates**

AUSTIN. — The Texas Game & Fish Commission Friday voted to renew its efforts to persuade the United States Fish & Wildlife Service to zone Texas for duck and goose hunting.

The Commission recommended that, should the zoning plea fail, the waterfowl season in Texas open October 31. It recommended that, if the state is zoned for water fowl, the season open in the north zone October 31 and in the south zone on November 21.

The Commission, in considering hunters' preference for the seasons, reported "a surprising amount of sentiment" in South Texas for an early November waterfowl opening.

ever, their use should be after all trash and breeding places have been eliminated. Otherwise, spraying will give only temporary relief, and a false sense of security.

The Executive Secretary of the Commission pointed out that while the duck bag limits may not be increased from the five a day and ten in possession of last year, that the improved waterfowl conditions might warrant a longer season. Texas had a non-zoned 50-day water fowl season last year, beginning November 9 and ending December 28.

The Executive Secretary of the Commission will personally take the Texas zoning appeal before the Fish & Wildlife Service at a meeting in Washington, August 5.

The Commission recommended that the Federal authorities who also set dove hunting regulations, designate the opening in the north zone of Texas for September 1 as last year and designate the opening in the south zone for October 1, with shooting restricted to afternoons only. The south zone season opened November 15 in 1951.

The Commission recommended a white-winged dove season for the Rio Grande Valley for September 12, 14 and 16. Regular shooting

hours of 4 p.m. to sunset would prevail with a 10-bird limit.

The Commission decided not to open the antelope season in the Big Bend county because two dry years have reduced the herds.

Other seasons in the nine-county area west of the Pecos, over which the Commission has regulatory authority, were authorized on the same basis as last year. Then hunters were allowed to take on male deer, blacktail or whitetail, from November 20 to November 25, inclusive, and to take twelve quail a day or have 36 in possession during the month of December only.

The Commission made only one change in the 28-county Panhandle area over which it has regulatory power. It left deer and turkey hunting regulations as they were last year but closed the hunting of both deer and turkey in Cottle and Motley Counties. The Panhandle big game seasons will be from November 15 to November 24, both dates inclusive.

The Commission acted on recommendations of sportsmen and

ranchers who explained that both counties lacked both deer and turkey and that some hunters merely used the area as a means of illegally taking deer from adjoining counties outside the regulatory area.

The usual deer, turkey and quail seasons under state law will be open this fall.

The Commission took under advisement an engineers' report on Yarbrough Pass dredged across Padre Island last winter. The action came on suggestions that maintaining the Pass might prove excessively costly.

The Commission voted to confer with the Fish & Wildlife Service about whether Pitman-Robertson funds would be available to purchase for refuge purposes 792-acre goose refuge now maintained privately by the community and the owner, J. C. Gambill of Paris.

This attack is a last minute attempt to mislead and prejudice the people of Eastland County in order to obtain the office of District Judge by a distortion of the truth.

**THE FACTS ARE THESE:**

The Commissioners Court of Eastland County made a contract with Horace Walker to collect delinquent taxes, which contract was approved by the Attorney General and Comptroller of the State of Texas. I, as an attorney at law, was employed by Mr. Walker to examine abstracts of title in connection with this contract; I performed those duties. I had no authority whatsoever over the tax monies collected, or the prosecution of tax suits, nor have I done anything in connection with this tax matter, which seems to have been made a political football, which has not been in the least dishonorable.



In connection with the cases against Mr. Walker, I will say this: if Mr. Walker is guilty he should be punished to the fullest extent of the law. I have had no part or parcel in these cases, except that I have been subpoenaed as a witness for the State of Texas.

With reference to the property in Limestone County: My opponent evidently is unaware that it is quite customary and usual for real estate men and Attorneys to purchase and handle property for their clients, and this was done by me in several instances. There is absolutely nothing wrong in that.

It strikes me as very strange indeed that inasmuch as investigations have been going on for several years that I have not heretofore been attacked until this late hour in a political campaign with the imputation of a wrongful act.

I have made several campaigns and in no campaign has anything unfair, derogatory or unchristian-like ever appeared against any of my opponents. I have always contended that a man who is unclean in politics will probably be unclean, unfair and unjust in public office.

It is regrettable that any person who is a candidate for such an honorable position as that of District Judge would countenance any article such as has just appeared by letter and in the press of Eastland County, and would conduct a campaign for such a high office on such a low political plane.

White House In Hopes Settlement Of Steel Strike

By ALAN ADAMS
WASHINGTON, July 22—The White House clung Tuesday to hopes for a negotiated settlement of the 51-day steel strike but moved ahead "reluctantly" with plans for partial seizure of the industry. Informed sources said Acting Defense Mobilizer John R. Steeman probably would call for new bargaining efforts by leaders of the steel industry and the CIO steelworkers if he found the parties could possibly be budged from their adamant stands. Steelman talked by telephone with both sides late into Monday night in hopes of finding some basis for resumption of across the table talks. His efforts came in the face of a statement by union President Philip Murray to his wage-policy committee Monday that the dispute was "hopelessly deadlocked." Meanwhile, the Defense Department and munitions board drew up plans for seizure of some plants

under the Selective Service Act to force resumption of essential steel production. The act allows the government to seize any plants that "fail or refuse" to fill direct defense orders. It was learned that defense officials, in meetings led by Defense Secretary Robert A. Lovett, already have "laid the groundwork for limited seizure." However, a Defense Department spokesman and other government officials insist that "no decision" had been made on "if and when" the government will act. At its meeting in Pittsburgh, the union's wage-policy group called on Murray to hold out for a full union shop. Government sources here believed, however, the union

REPLY TO AN OPEN LETTER

Dear Mr. Conner:

In your open letter published in the Sunday morning papers in Eastland County, wherein you attempted to reply to what you term a "vicious, scandalous and false" attack and an effort to mislead the voters, you state:

"I, as attorney at law, was employed to examine abstracts of title — I had no authority whatsoever over tax monies collected, or the prosecution of tax suits..."

You are not being persecuted, Mr. Conner, as much as you may wish to appear so. The Walker matter is a serious issue. The taxpayers of this county are still holding the bag for over \$100,000.00, according to the Auditor's Report.

It is difficult to see how any one could be associated with Mr. Walker as his attorney, for a period of several years, and still know nothing of his affairs.

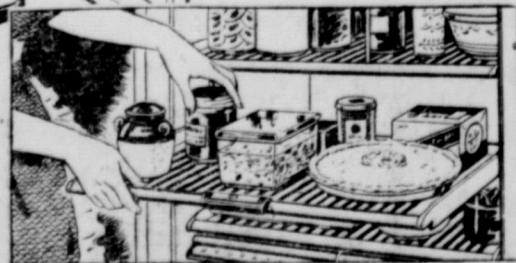

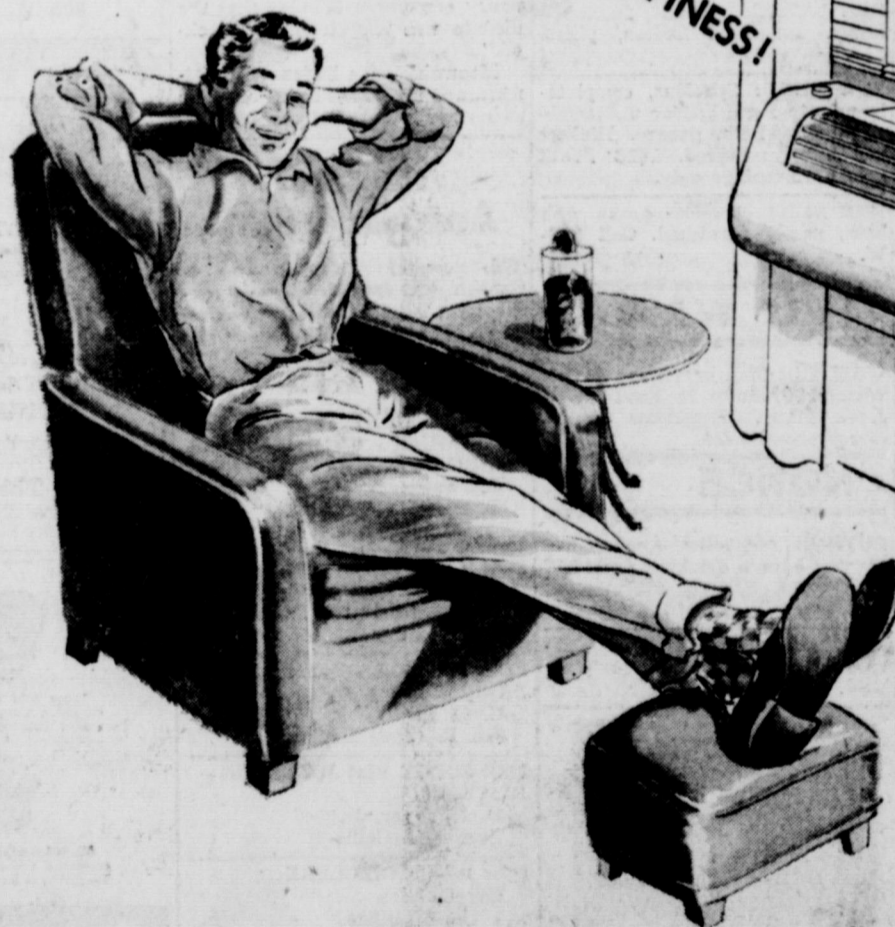

SEOUL, Korea, July 22—Savage Communist Chinese, attacking under cover of a murderous artillery barrage, drove UN troops from bloody "Old Baldy" hill Tuesday in the fifth day of fighting for the strategic heights.

It was the third time since Friday that the bomb and napalm

blasted hill west of Chorwon on the west-central front has changed hands.

Allied troops, forced off the height at mid-morning by what appeared to be a company of Chinese Reds, backed down slowly to



the bottom and awaited their chance to launch a counter-attack. UN fighter bombers zoomed in on the victorious Reds, and softed them up for the forthcoming attack with bombs, rockets, machine gun fire and napalm.

Allied artillery, zeroed in on the embattled hill, lobbed in shells on the Chinese.

Eight Army officials estimated the first four days of fighting cost the Communist 1,993 casualties. For the first time, Okinawa-based B-29 bombers were brought in to the UN's plan to wreck the Communist power system. The superforts blasted the Gassen reservoir hydroelectric plant No. 2. It was the third straight day that UN warplanes hit the heavily-damaged plant. On two previous

Princeton and Bon Homme Richard bombed, rocketed and strafed the installations.

All three attacks caught the Communists as they attempted feverishly to repair damage to the important plant, first hit June 23 in the same series of bombings that wrecked the Suho power plant on the Yalu river.

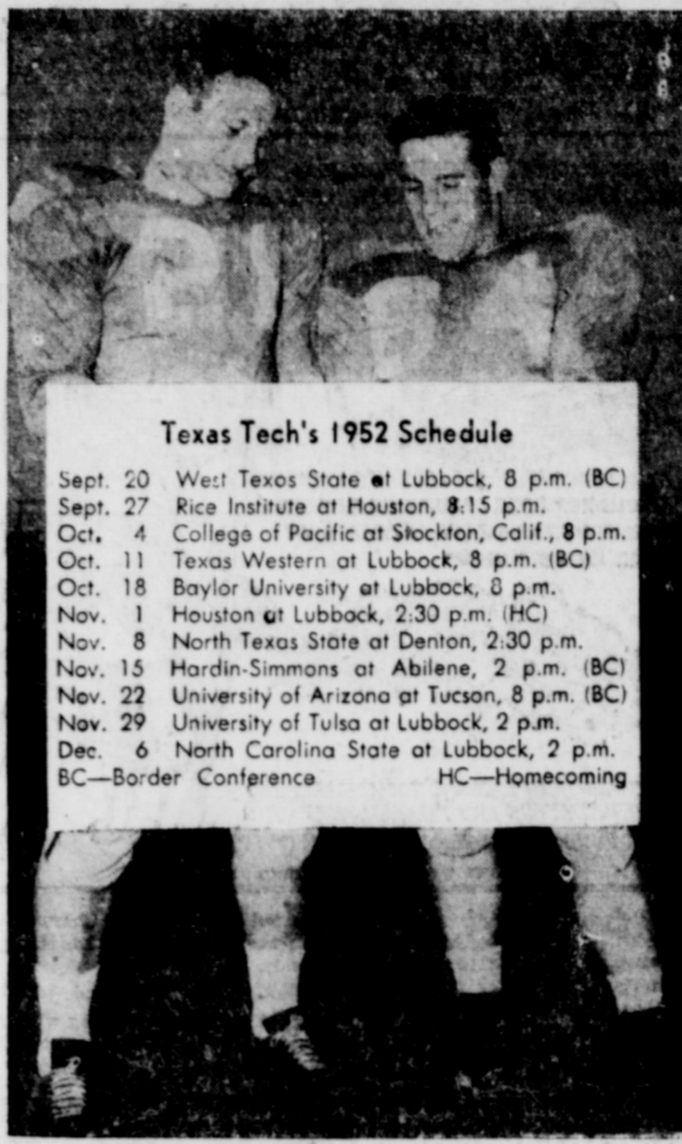
