You can't rush a turtle in a foot race, and the same may be said concerning "vote counters." The election Saturday was a rather difficult one, in that we have a new way to vote, Texas style, (the old we grew up on) merely insists on a good "backing of all candidates you happen to oppose. Those attending the Democratic precinct conventions here Saturday seem pretty well satisfied with the leadership of Gov. Shivers, and one delegation wanted to send "instructed" delegates to the county convention, with instructions to hold out for the tieldands.

Commissioners 2 Precincts Be In 2nd Primary

There are to be at least two run-offs in the four County Commissioner races, while it now appears that at least two incumbents are safe.

In Precinct 1, T. E. Castleberry polled 1731 votes against 1562 polled by Joe Faircloth. This leaves Mr. Castleberry safe for another term.

In Precinct 2, the following vote was polled: Thurman 405, Bennett 631 and Williams 274. Thurman, present incumbent, will be in a run-off with B. M. Bennett, who led the ticket in the first primary.

There was no contest in precinct 3, and the present incumbent, Helen Carter, has been re-nominated.

In Precinct 4, Arch Birt, present incumbent, will be in a run-off with J. E. McCannies. The vote was Birt 687, McCannies 601 and Robert Tucker 464.

Conventions For Both Parties in Eastland Staged

Precinct Conventions were held here Saturday by both parties, though in both instances the meetings were of routine nature.

Democrats in both precincts selected delegates to the county convention, which will be held in August.

Conservatives were in complete control. Frank Williamson is county chairman.

Republicans for the two precincts held meeting, selected delegates to the county convention, and adjourned. Republicans here are 100 per cent behind Eisenhower and went to the State Convention as well as the National Convention so instructed. K. E. Tanner is county Chairman, Jack Chamberlains of precinct 1 was chosen to the county convention, with W. L. White alternate. In precinct 2, Blair Lewis is delegate and A. H. Johnson, alternate.

Bill Stanley To Be Principal In Killeen High

W. H. (Bill) Stanley, principal of Eastland High School has resigned his position here, and has accepted a similar position with the Killeen schools.

The Killeen position is quite a promotion in several respects, Mr. Stanley says, though he says that he and his wife regret very much to leave Eastland. He will leave within the next few days, as he will begin his duties there on August 15th. Mrs. Stanley will remain in Eastland until about September 1.

No successor has been named. This will be a job that will be handled by Superintendent Womack.

W. E. Moore, Area Supervisor Announces Old Age Assistance Increases Beginning In October

All persons receiving Old Age Assistance and Aid to the Blind will get a \$5.00 increase in their grants beginning in October, according to W. E. Moore, Area Supervisor for the State Department of Public Welfare. Exceptions will be those who are receiving both Old Age Assistance and Old Age Survivors Insurance, since the automatic increase will be received by them through Social Security. A lesser will be available for youngsters who are receiving Aid to Dependent children.

This increase in grants is provided for by recent Congressional legislation which raised the federal contribution \$5.00 beginning in October. This now makes a maximum grant of \$55.00 instead of \$50.00 available for Old Age Assistance and Aid to the Blind. Naturally, this does not mean that everyone will receive the maximum grant of \$55.00 a month more than they are now receiving the maximum grant of \$50.

COLLIE, LANE, TUCKER GAIN CLEAR TITLE TO COUNTY POSTS

Final tabulation of Eastland County votes in Saturday's Democratic primary show that only two men with as many as two opponents were able to garner fifty-one per cent of the ballots and avoid a run off.

District Clerk candidate Roy L. Lane received 4687 of some 7000 votes cast over his two opponents, John C. Nicholas, 1419, and L. T. (Lois) Everton, 1036 to win a majority.

The incumbent sheriff, J. F. (Frank) Tucker, polled 3628 votes ending hopes of either of his opponents to enter into a run-off in August. Candidate W. W. (Bill) Tackett received 2562, while W. E. (Bill) Solomon was polling 726 votes in the sheriff's race.

T. M. Collie nosed out Earl Conner, Jr., in the race for Judge of the 91st District Court, terminating one of the most active political races between any two candidates in Eastland County. The Omar Burleson-Jack Cox fight for Eastland County ballots ended with Jack Cox in the driver's seat with 3790 and Burleson trailing at 3403.

Steel Mills Strive For Full Production

Short, Rolling Quake Upsets Californians

LOS ANGELES, July 29 (UP)—A short, rolling earthquake, apparently a settling shock from last week's disastrous "killer" quake, jolted southern California early Tuesday, causing at least one fire. The earthquake struck at 12:04 a.m. It felt like a series of short choppy waves.

No damage was reported in the Los Angeles area, but the Bakersfield fire department said the shock touched off one fire there. The fire department there said the fire resulted when the quake ripped out wiring in the attic of a home. More than 200 persons who saw flashes from swaying wires during the quake called the department to report fires.

Bakersfield was jolted by another, lighter quake at 1:10 a.m. In Tehachapi, where 11 persons died in the tremor last week, Tuesday's shock was felt strongly, but the sheriff's office reported no further damage to the town.

Boggus Wins In Justice Race In Precinct No. 1

J. R. Boggus has been nominated for the office of Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, with a vote of 1015 voted against 807 received by C. C. Street.

This office is vacant now and Mr. Boggus will likely be appointed to assume his duties at an early date. E. E. Wood, deceased, was Justice of the Peace for many years, but during his last year in office he was confined to his bed most of the time. After his death Roy Jones was appointed by the County Commissioners to fill the unexpired term, but he recently resigned, leaving the office vacant again.

For this reason it is thought County Commissioners will appoint J. R. (Jim) Boggus, nominee, to take over his duties at an early date.

Work On Butler Home Has Begun

Work on the Whitley Butler home, 611 S. Green street, began Monday morning. Concrete for the foundation was poured yesterday and the foundation will be completed today, it is thought. New Search Planned At Mine Shaft

JOPLIN, Mo., July 29 (UP)—A new search was being planned Tuesday of the abandoned mine shaft where Pal, the persistent collie has kept vigil for a month. The dog stirred a new flurry of interest in the mine Monday by whining at people, then running to the mine shaft. The dog also tugged at miner's clothing and guided them to the mine.

A two-week draining project at the mine was halted last week, when a search of the shallow water at the bottom turned up only a couple of old 'porcupine' bones. Clyde Hymert and Ted Akins, lessees of the mine Tuesday opened a new hunt of their own. They have pumped out the remaining water and now plan to dig out rock timber and dirt debris—blown to the bottom when an underwater blast was made in the pit.

The blast failed to bring anything to the surface, but the mine operators think the body of Pal's master or someone else may have been covered by debris.

As the new effort started at the mine, the brown and white collie whined and watched excitedly.

State Gains Fifty More Industries

AUSTIN, July 29 (UP)—Fifty new industries employing 997 persons were opened in Texas during the month of June, the Texas Employment Commission reported Tuesday.

The number of firms was the second highest total of 1952. In May 55 new businesses were opened, employing 2,000 persons.

During the first six months of the year, 271 new firms were opened in Texas, hiring 8,937 workers. During a comparable period last year, 224 firms were opened, hiring 14,000 persons.

Dallas, with 19 new firms, led the state in June. Fort Worth set the pace for hiring new employees with 263 persons hired by seven new firms.

Rockdale had four new firms employing 50 workers, while San Antonio had one hiring 145 persons, Austin one and 15, El Paso three and 43, Port Arthur three and 56, and Brownsville one and 41.

Wholesale and retail trade, with 24 new businesses hiring 429 workers, led in both categories.

VARIED REACTION MET ON PROPOSED CROSS-FILING

DALLAS, July 29 (UP)—A proposal to run some Texas Democrats on the Republican ticket in the November general election was met Tuesday with mixed reactions from the two political parties.

Alvin Lane of Dallas, second-in-command of the "New Guard" Republicans who won control of the Texas GOP this year, said Monday the Republicans are "apt" to run some Democratic nominees.

This year for the first time, a change in Texas election laws, permits cross-filing on both tickets.

"We don't want to put anybody out against a sound Democrat when we ourselves would have to admit our candidate is inferior," Lane said.

CIO CANCELS THREATENED STRIKE OF ALUMINUM WORKERS

PITTSBURGH, July 29 (UP)—Despite uneasy rumblings over contract settlements throughout the industry, the nation's largest steel producers drove for full production at top speed Tuesday. Even though some smaller firms outside the industry's "big six" demanded a full settlement before reopening their plants, most of the larger plants had no time in recharging furnaces.

U. S. Steel, the industry's traditional pace setter, had nearly half of its 55,000 Pittsburgh district employees on the job Monday and expected production to reach 80 to 90 per cent of normal by the end of the week.

The company also called 8,000 men back to work in the Chicago area and joined hands with Inland, Republic, Youngstown Sheet and Tube and other producers in an effort to restock badly depleted defense and civilian supplies.

"heats" the steel companies also rushed strike frozen stocks of tin plate and other types of steel by rail and truck to consumers.

Settlement of the longest steel strike in history gave Allied Industries an economic shot in the arm Monday too. Coal miners, railroaders, automotive workers, and water transportation workers punched time cards for the first time in weeks.

In the big western Pennsylvania mining area alone, production reached 62 per cent as the general economic picture brightened.

WASHINGTON, July 29 (UP)—The CIO Steelworkers sent orders to its members Tuesday to cancel a strike, originally set for midnight Tuesday, against the Aluminum Co. of America.

The strike, which would have slashed the nation's aluminum production by 25 per cent, was averted late Monday when the CIO union and Alcoa settled their six-month-old wage dispute.

The agreement, hammered out under the direction of Wage Stabilization Board Chairman Nathan P. Feinsinger, provides a "package" 21.4 cents an hour increase for 15,000 CIO Steelworkers in 10 Alcoa plants across the nation. Sixteen cents of the "package" will be in a straight pay boost and the rest in "fringe" benefits.

Under the one year contract, the Alcoa workers will receive a 10 per cent wage boost retroactive to March 10 and an additional four cents retroactive to July 1. The agreement also provides for the reduction of differentials between workers in northern and southern plants.

The Alcoa workers now earn an average just slightly lower than the steel industry workers' \$1.88 an hour.

Alcoa plants threatened by the walkout included those at Mobile, Ala.; Bauxite, Ark.; and Drury, Ark.

Airman Stationed In Germany Shot By Jealous Wife

MUNICH, Germany, July 29 (UP)—A pretty American mother of two children faced possible life imprisonment Tuesday for killing her airman-husband after he brought home a German girl friend.

Slender, blonde Martha J. Wage, 19, of Red Wing, Minn., was charged at a preliminary hearing Monday with the first degree murder of S-Sgt. Dan P. Wage, 25, of Baldwin, Wis. They had been married two years.

"I just wanted to frighten him, that's all," Mrs. Wage mumbled repeatedly in the U. S. high commission district court.

She was ordered held at the Munich post stockade pending trial before a panel of three judges in the high commission court. If convicted, she could be sentenced to prison for life. Arraignment was set for August 6.

Teen-aged Mrs. Wage wept as Air Force Capt. Robert P. Sturr Jr., repeated to the court her confession to the fatal shooting.

He said Mrs. Wage told Air Force investigators that her husband, due home at nearby Fuerstentfeldbruck Air Base billets at noon last Saturday, did not appear until 7 p.m. and then brought with him a German girl, Elisabeth Look.

"Look what I've got here," Wage was said to have boasted.

When he went into the bedroom and began to change from the fatigues he had been wearing, Mrs. Wage asked him where he was going.

"None of your business," she quoted him. "The next time you see me, you'll appreciate me more."

Sturr quoted Mrs. Wage as saying she grabbed her husband's carbine from a closet in the nursery to "scare him." The captain said Mrs. Wage, thinking the weapon defective and unable to fire, loaded the gun and twice pulled the trigger in an attempt to frighten her husband.

But the third time she pulled the trigger, the gun went off.

YOUR LIFE MAY DEPEND ON HOW WELL YOU KNOW SNAKES

COLLEGE STATION, July—Someday your life may depend upon how quickly and accurately you identify a snake. Only four of the 103 species of snakes known in Texas are considered dangerously poisonous, says R. E. Callender, specialist in wildlife conservation for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. He urges Texans to become familiar with these poisonous snakes so that positive identification can be made quickly in case a member of the family is bitten.

The four species of snakes that are poisonous are the rattlesnakes, copperheads, cottonmouth moccasin and the deadly little coral snake. Rattlesnakes are easily identified by their rattles; the copperhead by its chestnut-brown hour glass markings over light brown or brownish gray background color; the cottonmouth moccasin is a dirty brown in color and is usually found around water—on old logs or driftwood and they can bite under water. The coral snake is the beauty of the group, but adds Callender, it's also the most deadly. Don't say the specialist, confuse it with the more commonly found king snake because the mistake could be fatal. The color rings of the coral snake are red, yellow and black and completely circle the body and if the red ring touches the yellow, you've found a coral snake. Treat him with care.

Fangs for ejecting the poison are common to all poisonous snakes. The marks left by the fangs are a sure identification sign. The venom injected by the rattlers, copperheads and water moccasins is known as hemotoxic venom because it effects the blood cells. The coral snake, on the other hand, injects a neurotoxic venom and it effects the nervous system. Antivenins, which are available at most drug stores, are ineffective for treating the bite of the coral snake.

Snakes can be discouraged from moving in on the home lot, says Callender, by keeping the place clean. Rubbish should not be allowed to accumulate and trash should be removed for such debris

about the place is usually inhabited by snakes and mice. These rodents are favorite food for snakes and unless kept under control, snakes will move in to clean them up.

Here's a word of advice from Callender on what to do in case a person is bitten by a poisonous snake. Keep the victim quiet; don't let them walk, become over-heated or take alcoholic stimulants. Don't cauterize the wound with strong acids nor inject potassium permanganate. Get the victim to a doctor as soon as possible but first aid measures will help. Apply a tourniquet above the bite and make cross cut incisions at the bite and on the advancing edges of the swelling. Apply suction with the mouth or a suction cup but release the tourniquet every 15 minutes to keep up circulation. Inject antivenin, if available, as soon as possible. After the injection, release the tourniquet and continue the suction. In the meantime have the patient on the way to a doctor or the doctor on the way to the patient.

Callender warns that hunters and campers should never go to the woods without a snake bite kit. He urges home owners to keep their premises clean and to be on the look out at all times for the poisonous snakes. All except the rattler strike without warning—and the rattler sometimes does his biting before sounding off—so the safe thing to do is stay out of the way of all snakes; and discourage them to stay out of your way.

The city champ of Fort Worth Carl Vandervoort, Jr., is signed

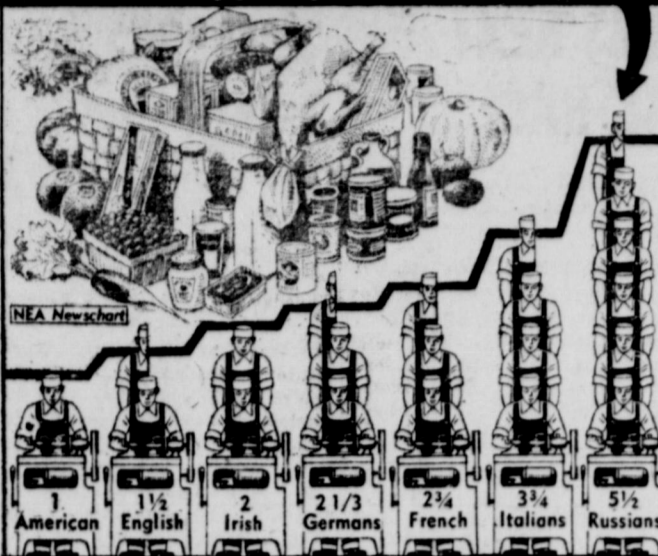

Wyoming Has Antelope For Texas Hunters

AUSTIN, July—Wyoming needs outside help to reduce an overpopulation of pronghorn antelope, reports Lester Bagley, Wyoming Game and Fish Commissioner, in a letter to the Executive Secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

Bagley writes that Wyoming is faced with the problem of reducing its antelope herd by approximately 40,000 head, and adds: "We are soliciting your cooperation in sending as many of your (Texas) hunters as you can to hunt antelope in Wyoming."

The Wyoming request coincided with the Texas Game and Fish Commission's decision to close the season on Texas antelope this year because of severe herd losses from drought.

different areas. The earliest opening is September 3; latest closing date is October 14. The season limit is one antelope in all except the Northwestern Area where two may be taken with two permits. Out-of-state permits cost \$25 each. Further information may be secured by writing the Wyoming Game and Fish Commission, Box 355, Cheyenne, Wyoming.

If the letter is to serve as an application for a permit, the \$25 fee should be enclosed. The applicant also should give his age, physical description and designate

the area in which he wishes to hunt. Permits are issued only for one of the 16 specified areas.

Season dates in most areas are either September 3-15, Sept. 15-22, or September 3 to October 3. However, the season in the big Northeastern Area, where permits for two antelopes may be secured, is from September 20 to October 14.

Deer also may be taken in the Northeastern Area where the seasons partially overlap. Deer permits are \$20 each.

STEVENSON PONDERES NEXT STEP IN POLITICAL RACE

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., July 29—Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson Tuesday shoved aside national problems or the moment and pondered the question of what to do with the governorship he is so fond of.

The Democratic nominee for president also had several hours to spend at his desk working on state business.

One problem confronting Stevenson was the question of whether he should resign the governorship to prepare for his autumn campaign against Dwight D. Eisenhower, the Republican standard-bearer.

May Resign Later

It appeared to be the prevailing view in informed quarters that he would give up the state job, which he seems to regard so fondly at some future date when the time comes for intensive campaigning to begin.

There has been talk that Stevenson would resign his state post and turn it over to Democratic Lt. Gov. Sherman Dixon or let his

administrative aides carry the burden of work while he sipped the country.

However, Illinois Democrats are presently jockeying with each other over who should succeed Stevenson as head of the state party organization and it is possible that some leaders might resent Dixon's appointment.

Stevenson returned to the Illinois executive mansion Monday after spending 10 days in Chicago during the Democratic national convention, which "drafted" him last week for the presidential nomination.

A Brief Lawn Speech

Some 25,000 Springfield citizens and state employees cheered him as he spoke briefly from the lawn of the Sangamon county courthouse.

The old building, constructed in 1854, was the Illinois capitol building when this city sent Abraham Lincoln to the White House, and it was the scene of Lincoln's famous "house divided" speech.

In his court-house talk and at stops enroute from Chicago, Stevenson repeatedly referred in wistful tones to his term as governor and to his refusal to seek the presidential nomination.

But he pledged himself to fight to win in November with these words:

"I have now been called upon to perform the most formidable task in the modern world—at the crossroads of history—I am going to do what is assigned to me by fate with all the heart and courage I can muster."

Egyptian King, Wnskey Supply, Land At Capri

ISLE OF CAPRI, Italy, July 29—Deposed King Farouk of Egypt arrives in Italy aboard the royal yacht Mahroussa Tuesday with 40 cases of whiskey, champagne and in and more than 200 other pieces of luggage, to begin his exile.

With the former monarch aboard the big white yacht as it slipped into Naples Bay were his six-month-old son and successor, King Ahmed Fuad II, and his 18-year-old wife, Queen Mother Narriman.

The Mahroussa first halted two miles off the swank resort island of Capri. Three hours later, it moved closer to Naples, where Baron Scamaccia, chief of protocol of the Italian foreign office, and Egyptian ambassador to Italy Abdel Aziz Badr Bey were waiting to greet Farouk and the infant king.

The vessel halted about midway between Capri and Naples and there was no immediate word where it would dock. The Capri harbor master, who boarded the Mahroussa immediately after its arrival, said the crew was awaiting orders from Farouk.

During the three-hour layover off Capri, two launches went out to the Mahroussa. The first returned with 40 assorted cases clearly marked champagne, gin and whiskey, and with the gold ship's bell, apparently a memento for the ex-king.

The alcoholic cargo and the bell

were transferred to Farouk's personal yacht, the smaller 130-ton Fakr El Bihar from the 4,501-ton Mahroussa, which is under orders to return at once to Alexandria after-taking the royal family to a destination of their choosing.

Farouk left Alexandria on six hours' notice Saturday on orders from Gen. Mohammed Naguib Bey, who seized power in a military coup. It also was at Naguib's demand that he abdicated the throne, in favor of his infant son.

Ceilings were increased by one cent a pound on pork shoulders, by three cents on hams, bellies, Boston butts and neck bones, and by eight cents on loins and spare ribs. These cuts account for 40 to 45 per cent of pork sales. Sausages are not affected.

The higher ceilings, effective immediately, were authorized on the wholesale level, and retailers were permitted to increase their prices by the same amount.

Pork Prices Up One To Eight Cents Per Pound

WASHINGTON, July 29 (UP)—Ceiling prices on lean pork—from hams to chops—jumped from one to eight cents a pound Tuesday.

The Office of Price Stabilization authorized the higher pork prices Monday night to conform with a provision in the new economic controls law requiring higher hog prices during the summer months. OPS said the increase was seasonal and the ceilings will probably be lowered again after October.
