August May Be Hotter Than July

Hot and hotter weather settled on the Southwest Friday as August opened its bid to outdo July in the unbearable weather department.

July made a determined last stand Thursday by etching temperature marks in the 90's and over 100 all through Wyoming, Missouri, Kansas, Colorado, New Mexico, Texas and Oklahoma.

Friday, weather bureau forecasters said there will be little change and in some spots it may even be hotter. The only relief is expected to come from scattered showers, forecast for the entire Southwest from Kansas City to New Mexico and Wyoming to the Gulf Coast.

Most of the rain reported Thursday was classified in the sprinkle department, as very few points in the Southwest measured over .25 inch. Victoria, Tex., was an exception. 1.25 inches of rain fell there.

Even Wyoming, which has managed to keep temperatures fairly well in check as July faded, zoomed to a 96-degree reading at Sheridan.

It was 99 at Roswell, N. M., 97 at La Junta, Colo., 103 at Fresno, Tex., and near or a little above the century mark in Oklahoma and Kansas.

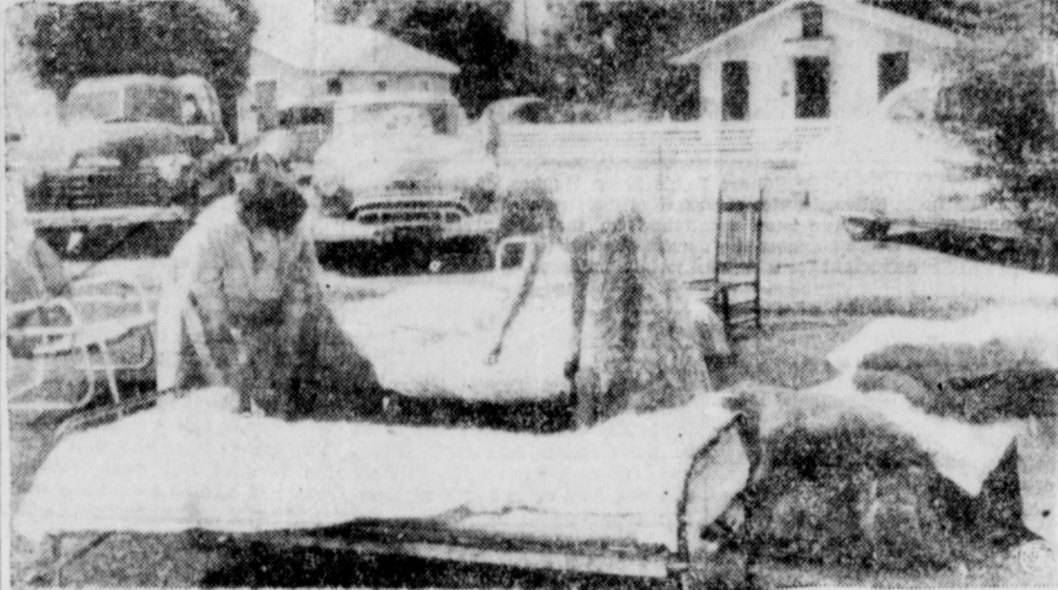
Mr. McMinn is married, and his wife formerly lived at Coleman, Texas.

Reds Dealt Double Defeat; Allies Retake "Old Baldy"

SEOUL, Korea, Aug. 1 (UP)—The United Nations handed the Communists a smashing double defeat Friday, destroying or damaging five enemy jets in an air battle and recapturing strategic "Old Baldy" hill on the western ground front.

The Allied victories came as the Communists celebrated the 25th anniversary of the "triumphant" Chinese Red army. Among the congratulatory messages announced by the Chinese was one from Soviet Premier Josef Stalin.

Three enemy MIG-15 jet fighters were shot down and two damaged in a 10-minute air battle between 32 F-86 Sabrejets and 60 MIGs just below the Yalu River in northwest Korea. It was the first Communist challenge to UN air superiority since July 23.

Out in Force Again
Credited with shooting down the MIGs were 1st Lt. Gene F.

Rogge, Auburn, Neb.; 1st Lt. Alfred Miller, Wichita Falls, Tex.; and Capt. Daniel J. Dennemy, Sun Valley, Calif.

The 60 MIGs came from an enemy force of some 1,300 tucked safely beyond the Yalu river border in Manchuria. The Red air force had not ventured forth in such strength since July 4, when Sabrejets shot down 12 MIGs.

During all of July, 14 MIGs were destroyed, four probably destroyed and 14 damaged. The UN lost 19 planes during the month, two of them in dogfights and the rest to ground fire or unknown causes.

Lt. Gen. Glenn O. Barrett, commander of the Fifth Air Force, challenged the Communist air force to a "slugging match." He told the United Press the Fifth Air Force, now strengthened by a new fighter-bomber wing, is in its "best shape" in a long time.

Take 'Old Baldy'

In Tokyo, Far East Air Forces announced the 474th Fighter-Bomber Wing, flying F-84 Thunderjets, has been transferred to the Fifth Air Force.

On the ground, two companies of Allied troops threw the Reds off the crest of "Old Baldy" in an eight-hour night fight. The Reds fought desperately with machine-gun, mortar and artillery.

A UN officer said Allied casualties were "extremely light." There was no immediate estimate of the number of Reds killed.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1 (UP)—Moscow Radio, trying to enlighten its listeners about the American political system, says elections in Tennessee are conducted with "filled out" ballots, dollar bills and revolvers.

The Red version of Tennessee elections was written by Vladimir Merev, former Soviet correspondent at the United Nations in New York, who has been doing a series on "the political machine of the monopolies" in the United States.

He previously has written "inside stories" for Soviet listeners on Baltimore, Jersey City, and the political conventions in Chicago.

The Moscow broadcast on Tennessee described Edward Crump as the "boss" of Tennessee politics "who does not conceal the fact that it is he who appoints and dismisses the state's governors and city mayors."

Postage stamps were then three cents each, but Uncle Tommy was a thrifty citizen, and when they were scarce he raised the price to five cents, and as our nearest post office on the way to Dallas was Stephenville, Texas we gladly paid the price.

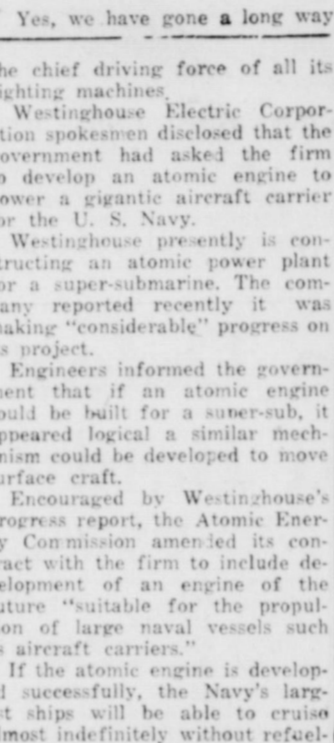

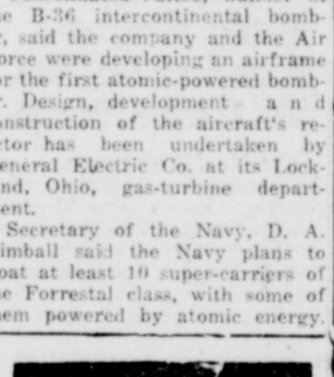

Weather Minor Factor In The Accident Rate

CHICAGO—You can't blame it on the weather!

In 84 per cent of the 32,500 fatal motor vehicle accidents last year, the weather was clear or merely cloudy. It was rainy, snowy or foggy in only one out of six fatal accidents.

According to "Accident Facts," the National Safety Council's statistical yearbook, which is just off the press, rain was the condition reported most frequently under bad weather conditions.

Unfavorable weather conditions were reported more frequently for all accidents (including property damage only) than for fatal accidents. Rainy, snowy or foggy weather was reported for 21 per cent of all accidents and clear or cloudy weather for 79 per cent.
