Special Sermon At Methodist Church Sunday

"Prayer For Rain With An Attitude God Accepts" will be the sermon subject of Rev. J. Morris Bailey, pastor, at the 10:50 morning service of the First Methodist Church on Sunday. "All of us can see the need for rain; that is simple and readily acknowledged," the pastor said in announcing the sermon theme. "Our attitudes as individuals, as a people, as a church, as a community must be attitudes in keeping with the conditions set forth by God if we are to be true followers of Him."

Mrs. T. J. Haley will play the pipe organ for the service and the choir will sing hymns.

Sunday evening the pastor will preach at the 7:30 worship service on the subject "Our Response to The Sacred."

Sunday school meets at 9:45 and the evening youth groups meet at 6:30.

On Monday there will be seven-teen from the local Methodist church to attend the intermediate camp at Glen Rose.

Little Progress At Panmunjom Is Reported Sat.

PANMUNJOM, Aug. 2 (UP)—A seven-day recess in the full-dress Korean truce talks ended Saturday with "second string" United Nations and Communist delegates reporting some progress in the wording of an armistice.

Chief delegates will resume their discussions at 11 a. m. Sunday, 8 p. m. Saturday CST, but with no outward sign of an early peace.

Despite the progress on wording of the truce agreement, neither side has indicated during the recess any change in position which might break the long-standing deadlock over repatriation of war prisoners.

Observers here believed Chief UN representative Maj. Gen. William K. Harrison, who called the present recess, might ask for another interruption if Gen. Nam Il, top Red delegate, starts off with another propaganda tirade.

Tyler In Tiff Over Telephone Rate Request

TYLER, Aug. 2 (UP)—A law suit hung in the balance Saturday after Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. refused to consider Tyler's revised rate hike and walked out of a meeting.

More than 150 Tyler residents attended a city commission meeting Friday on a proposed telephone rate increase which would jump bills about 33 per cent.

The company originally sought increases of about 57 per cent. When the city cut its offer to about 22 per cent Friday, Bell District Manager Ray Aker and other company employees left the meeting.

Aker said later his action did "not necessarily" mean a law suit between Bell and the city.

Hoyt A. Mulkey Accepts Call To Eastland Post

Word has been received in Eastland that Hoyt A. Mulkey has accepted the position tendered him as Music and Youth director at the First Baptist Church. Mr. Mulkey will be remembered by most people in this city as the young man who had charge of the singing during the recent Youth Revival.

He will assume his new duties early in September.

McKinney Will Top Democratic Leadership Post

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Aug. 2 (UP)—Democratic National chairman Frank E. McKinney indicated Saturday he wanted to surrender his leadership of the party organization and let someone else mastermind the coming presidential campaign.

The Indianapolis, Ind., banker also made it clear to reporters as he left an hour-long conference with President Truman that the President's role in Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson's campaign was still unclear.

The Democratic nominee asked McKinney to remain as national chairman after the national convention. McKinney agreed to Stevenson's request but it was understood that he might hold the job only on a temporary basis.

"Frankly, I don't choose to remain as chairman," McKinney said after the meeting with Mr. Truman. "I feel that I have accomplished my mission in uniting our party and producing a well organized convention."

The statement shed little light on when McKinney would ask to be relieved of his job.

McKinney and his wife stopped over here last evening to have dinner with the President and Mrs. Truman. The McKinneys were flying from Indianapolis to Colorado Springs, Colo., for a vacation.

McKinney insisted that the hour he spent with President Truman in the presidential headquarters atop the Muehlebach hotel here as "strictly social."

"We abstained from politics," McKinney said.

McKinney said he carried no message from Stevenson to President Truman. The national chairman had conferred for three hours with Stevenson in Chicago last Sunday.

Corpus Mayor, Councilman And Mgr. Indicted

CORPUS CHRISTI, Aug. 2 (UP)—Three Corpus Christi city officials—the mayor, city manager and a city councilman—were under indictment by a grand jury Saturday.

City Manager W. B. Collier was indicted Friday for perjury. He was accused of telling a Nueces county grand jury last July 28, that he did not order a subordinate to issue a building permit in January, 1951, for construction of a 20-story office building.

Earlier, Mayor Leslie Wasserman was indicted on a charge of accepting a bribe, and former city councilman Barney Cott was indicted on a charge of bribing Wasserman. Neither case has been tried.

Collier was arrested and freed on bond of \$10,000.

"I think the indictment is completely without foundation," he said. He said he thought his indictment and a grand jury report suggesting continuing investigation of corruption in city affairs was issued for the "principal purpose of influencing the public, and lending support to the recall petition."

A group of Corpus Christi citizens formed an organization called "The Better Government League" three weeks ago for the purpose of recalling the entire city council. Recall petitions in circulation since then have not been presented to the city secretary for action.

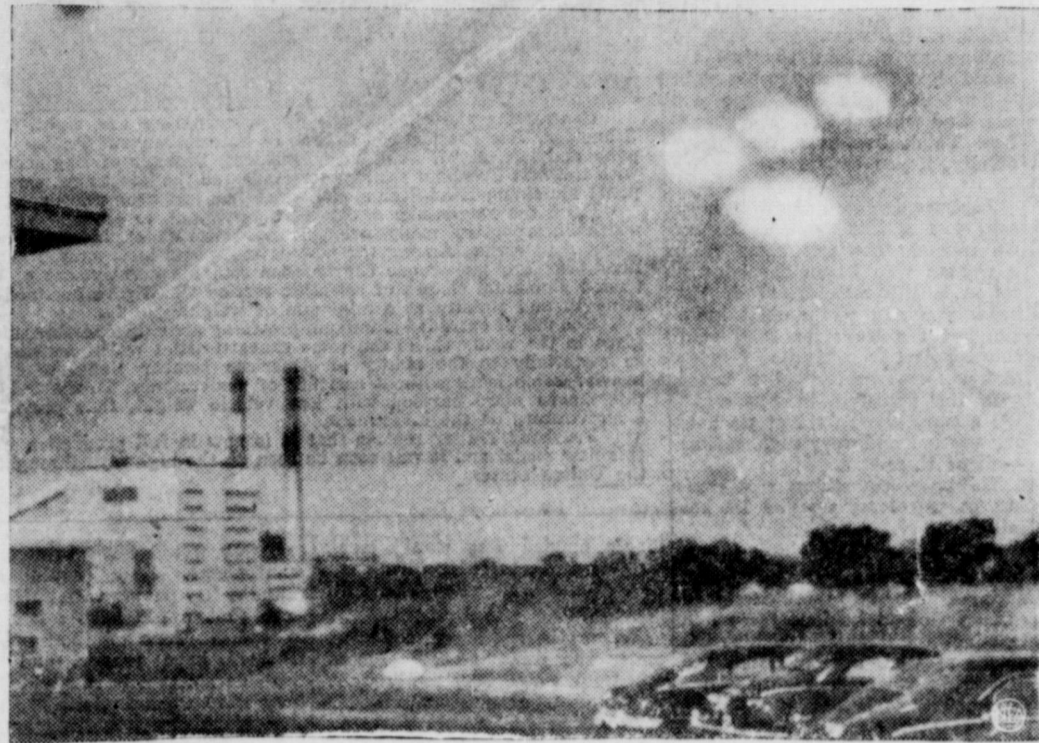
Service Planned Sunday 4 P. M. For War Victim

The deceased was making the Air Force a career and had served continuously since his induction during World War II. He was due to be rotated back to the United States in October.

Agriculture Defense Goals In Danger From Prolonged Drouth

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 2—The federal government declared Saturday that a \$500 million drouth in the Southeast and parts of New England will prevent the nation from reaching its agriculture defense goals.

The Department of Agriculture worked on emergency measures to salvage the South's livestock industry and save farmers' from financial ruin by one of the most damaging spells of the region's history.

Department officials agreed with representatives of drouth-stricken states at a government-sponsored emergency conference here that it is too late to avert a "major blow" to the nation's agriculture production.

Record Disaster Feared

"This is on the verge of being one of the most serious disasters this country ever faced," said Assistant Agriculture Secretary Knox T. Hutchinson. "It has eliminated any chance of reaching our national production goal for the defense effort."

Hutchinson presided over the fact-finding meeting called here

by Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan.

R. M. Snyder of the National Production Marketing Administration afterward held a strategy session with farm representatives of the southeastern states to organize some form of "hay lift" for the suffering livestock industry.

Disaster Areas Widespread
Disaster areas have been declared in six parts of two other southeastern states and in Maine and Massachusetts to enable cropless farmers to get emergency loan and other federal benefits to tide them over until next year.

"We can justify subsidization for a few weeks of dire emergency," Snyder added, "but we couldn't do it for more."

Hutchinson conferred with farm officials from Alabama, Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi, Tennessee and South Carolina, all designated disaster areas because of crop damage.

Living Cost At New High

STABILIZERS POWERLESS TO HALT UPWARD COST SPIRAL

CAP Course Planned For RJC In Fall

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2—With living costs pushing to a new high, the nation's two top stabilizers claimed Saturday they are powerless to prevent the inflationary upsurge.

Price Chief Ellis Arnall predicted living costs will hit new peaks every month for a year unless Congress tightens controls.

Economic Stabilizer Roger L. Putnam agreed that higher prices are coming and joined in blaming the Republicans for weakening anti-inflation controls.

Living Cost Reaches High
The cost of living is already at an all time high. The government reported last week that the cost of living index for the 30 days ending June 15 reached a peak of 189.6 per cent of 1935-39 prices—11.4 per cent higher than just before the outbreak of the Korean war.

An indication that the cost of living barometer is still rising came Friday from the Bureau of Labor statistics, which reported that retail food prices hit a new all-time high during the first two weeks of July 1.2 per cent jump in food prices appeared certain to push the overall cost of living index to another monthly peak when the index for July is issued.

Arnall blamed the jump in food prices on Congress, which last month exempted fresh and processed fruits and vegetables from price controls.

Continued Climb Forecast
"Prices are going to keep going up," Arnall asserted Friday night over a Mutual Broadcasting System program. "Unless strong action is taken, the cost of living will set a new all-time record every month for the next year." By "strong action," he said he meant action by Congress in January to strengthen the controls law.

Aside from Congress, Arnall also took an indirect swipe at the White House, which he indicated added to the inflationary pressures by granting a ceiling-piercing price increase on steel to settle the steel strike.

When the overall effects of the steel price increase are felt by the public, Arnall predicted they will add "well in excess" of \$100 a year to the annual living costs of the average American family.

Girl's Story Of Sex Orgies Investigated

The 28-year-old bachelor who owns the farm was picked up shortly after a 15-year-old St. Paul girl told authorities Friday she had attended a wild sex and drink party at the farm.

A 17-year-old girl admitted to St. Paul police that she had sexual intercourse with five different men while at the farm.

Scott county Sheriff W. B. Schroeder said he believed farmer Clem Mares was an "innocent party" to the love nest.

Youths Took Over
Mares, an accordion-playing fiddler, said he just wanted to "show these city kids what an old time country party was like." Instead the youths took over the party and made love in every nook and cranny of his house and barn.

Schroeder entered the case after the 15-year-old girl returned to her home in St. Paul and told her mother she had been at the "barn."

The girl, who was not identified, had been missing for a week. Police later arrested Eugene V. Huddalla, 24, of St. Paul on a complaint by the girl, Huddalla, who is married and the father of two children, denied having sexual relations with the girl. Police said he would be arraigned Saturday. The charge, however, had not been determined.

The 17-year-old girl confirmed the younger teenager's story and said that about 30 persons, mostly teenagers, maintained a "love nest" at the farm. She told Lt. Gordon Blade of the juvenile division she had been intimate with five men.

Officers said every effort was being made to pick up 20 or 21 persons believed involved in the sex parties.

Blade said the younger girl told him the parties took place July 23, 24 and 26.

Blade said he had learned the farm and then "the parties got all mixed up." Couples drifted off to the barn or farmyard and engaged in intimacies, he said.

The 15-year-old girl told Blade she had gone "three days without food" at the farm. She said she lived on beer and whisky.

Lawmen Press Slain Girl's Identity Hunt

EL RENO, Okla., Aug. 2 (UP)—Law enforcement officers Saturday stepped up their efforts to identify the nude decapitated body of a young girl found three days ago, as women in Canadian county became fearful that a "butcher killer" was on the loose.

Canadian County Sheriff Tiny Royce said the girl's body was mutilated in the same manner as the dismembered body of Mrs. Lois Depeux, 34-year-old Oklahoma City waitress, found March 13.

"The slayer in each case made an unsuccessful attempt to cut off the women's feet," Sheriff Royce said. "I can't say there is a definite link between the two killings, but we are checking that possibility."

The sheriff also disclosed that another clue was being chased down Saturday. A service station attendant near where the body was found, reported gassing a car driven by two young men, which had bloodstains on the front fender.

"Not My Girl"
Discovery of the decapitated girl's head and hands Friday brought officers no closer to identification of the girl.

POTPOURRI AND WORSE

A few of them will be just plain sinners who never knew the new birth. They were never convinced that Jesus and His love was anything more than a myth. They never cared about Heaven and its glories—merely had a desire to escape the sulphuric fumes and heat of hell. This group will not be surprised when they learn of their doom.

Then there is another group, who will be surprised when, after examination, they are told they must spend eternity in a devil's hell. Some of them will no doubt start an argument for that was what they did on earth. They set themselves up as an "example" and insisted that the world follow them. In many instances the world has followed them, right down to hell.

You don't have to go down to "Hell's Half Acre" to find this type of people. You'll find them out among the "high society" group, even in the churches. They are the boys who would split a church wide open, and send the members all to hell, in order to carry a point, which is more likely to be wrong than right.

They are the Pharisee type—pray long and loud and admonish others to do right, while they themselves are on better speaking terms with the devil than they are with Christ.

Their prayers go no higher than the hair on their heads, and if they saw the Saviour coming down the street, they would break all speed laws in an effort to remove themselves from His sight.

They "kid" themselves along while trying to justify themselves in the sight of God, and long before the final breath is taken they know they must spend eternity in hell. Yet they die hanging on to a hope that God is just too good to punish them. God is good and also just and truthful, and He warned them to prepare.

Yet He never promised to create a special dispensation for their particular lusts and sins. He gave His Son as a ransom to pay for their in, but they were too busy "making a show" before men, to ever accept eternal life.

They are worse than the hypocrite and unbeliever, for they not only elected "hell" as their final abode, but take a lot of weaklings with them. Its serious when you elect to run God's business. We had to admit the truth, and also the power of God, but informed her that while we could edit a paper in some sort of fashion, that "praying for rain," was out of our jurisdiction.

"Why?" she asked.

"Simply because we are not good enough, too unworthy, and lack in faith."

To this she answered "I have the faith, and certainly there must be others here who have."

She insisted that maybe we could get the preachers together, or maybe call for a City-wide Day of Prayer. We told her that we were more than willing for it to rain, but that our faith was too weak to hope for results. We told her about the old woman who prayed for a mountain to be moved and after the prayer stepped out to see what had happened. After looking at the big mountain she turned on her heel and said, "just as I expected—still there." All too many of us are like that.

We believe in the power of prayer. God told us that when we asked for something, "believing" it would be given us. But we are like the old woman—we don't believe. We honestly think we do, but in truth we do not.

If we had three righteous individuals in Eastland, who would covenant to ask God for rain, the first thing we would do would be to roll the car windows up and buy a slicker. We would get rain without a doubt. But where will you find the three individuals?

They may be here and they may not be. We do not know. We are weak when it comes to faith, and this may explain why the Saviour always spoke of us as "little children." Spiritually we are children. We may have faith to believe in God, we have faith to accept His Son as our Redeemer, and we may live spotless lives, and be saved with an everlasting Salvation, yet when it comes to praying for something like rain during a drought, or restoring the dead to life, our faith is just not equal to the occasion. Oh, for a faith like that of Moses and Elijah.

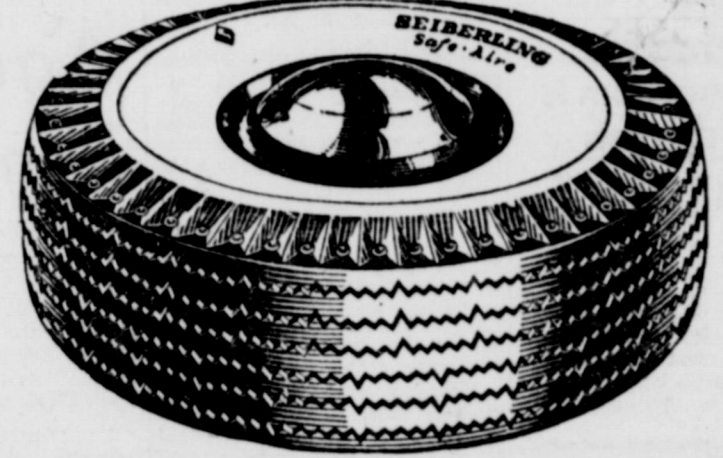

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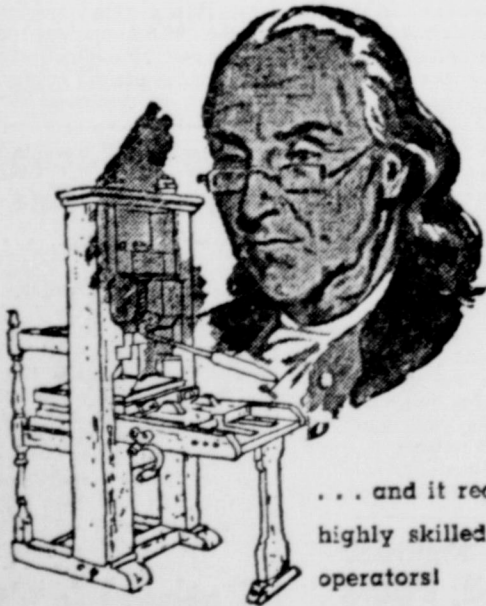

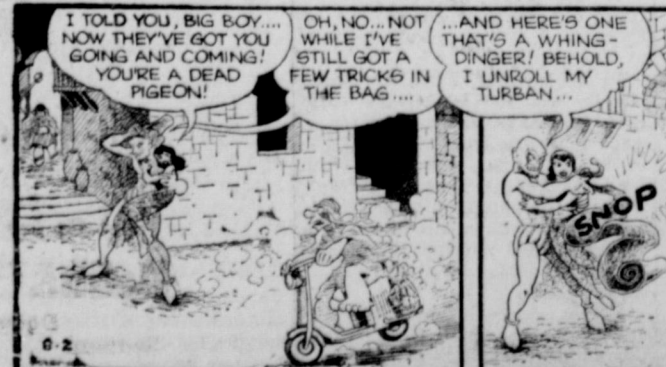

LEGAL NOTICE CITY ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE USE OF CITY WATER FOR WASHING AUTOMOBILES, WATERING LAWNS, SHRUBBERY OR GARDENS, EXCEPT WASTE WATERS, FIXING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS: SECTION I. That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any person within the City of Eastland, or without the City of Eastland, if using City of Eastland water or water system, to use such water for washing automobiles, trucks, or any other vehicles, or for cleaning floors, or driveways of buildings, or for watering lawns, shrubbery, gardens, trees, or other vegetation, save and except the use of bona fide waste waters after domestic use thereof.

SECTION II. Any person violating this Ordinance shall be fined not less than \$5.00, and not more than \$100.00. SECTION III. The fact that the municipal water supply of the City of Eastland is diminished by drought to the point where water will not be available for lawful domestic purposes unless conserved and the use thereof restricted to the individual minimum requirement, and the fact that the unrestricted use and consumption of said city water will immediately endanger the public health, and create a situation destroying the effective fire prevention and fire fighting methods of the City of Eastland, creates an emergency requiring the suspension of the rule requiring ordinances to be read at three several and separate meetings of the Board of City Commissioners, and that this Ordinance be put into effect immediately upon final passage.

Stevenson Picks Campaign Head; Ike Be Own Boss

Democrats

STEVENSON — Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson picked Wilson Wyatt, former mayor of Louisville, Ky., and one-time federal housing expediter, as his personal campaign manager with headquarters in Illinois. The Illinois governor meanwhile was reported considering jumping off to an early campaign start so voters will have a chance to know him.

SPARKMAN — Sen. John J. Sparkman pledged to "work wholeheartedly for the Democratic program" but refused to give "blanket assurance in advance" on every controversial measure that

may arise. The vice presidential nominee made the statement in answering questions from Negro Congressman Adam Clayton Powell, D-N.Y., whether he would campaign for a compulsory FEPC or for anti-filibuster rule for the Senate.

Republicans

EISENHOWER — Dwight D. Eisenhower emphasized he would be his own "boss" in his presidential campaign in which he expects the "great issue" to be a sound program for world peace. Sen. Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois, a pre-convention supporter of Sen. Robert A. Taft, meanwhile pledged he would work "with vigor" for Eisenhower's election.

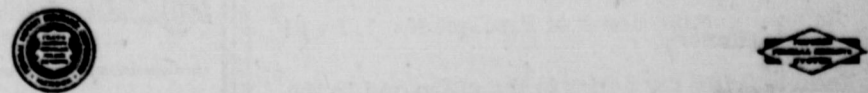
Mowing Pastures Aids In Controlling

Weeds And Helps Grasses Spread

A farmer mowing his pasture to control weeds was agreeably surprised to find that buffalo grass spread from 10 percent to 75 percent of his pasture. Mowing was started when enough weeds were in bloom to prevent them from producing seed, and he was successful in reducing the stand of such weeds as bull thistle, broomweed, careless weed and poisonous bitterweed. "Most plants are weakest during the blooming period and cutting weeds at that time usually kills them," he explains. When his pasture grasses become too rank, he mows to start new and tender growths.
