Around The Square

With Mack

It has just been called to our attention by the American Machinist, a McGraw-Hill publication, that work stoppages have increased ten times and over during the past two years. Reasons for the stoppages are always petty. Some disgruntled "birds" kicks about not having enough time (the bosses' time) for wash-up. The next one imagines there is too much draft in the building, and that it gives him a head-ache. As a matter of fact too much cheap likker the night before brought on the head-ache, and if he doesn't let up on his "refreshments," he'll find himself taking the "cure." Another complains that there isn't enough tissue in the bathrooms.

This group would be dissatisfied if they occupied the eternal throne in heaven. They wouldn't be there a week until they would begin jumping-up the angels for more over time. Union labor is one thing and union bolshevism is another.

If organized labor hopes to remain in public favor it had better check up on certain members who are bringing the union into disrepute. Right is right, and wrong is wrong, and some of the present day practices is just as wrong as wrong can be.

Collective bargaining is fair for all parties concerned, though there are times when it is abused. Unscrupulous labor leaders, and penny-pinching employers are responsible for this, and in the end both fall ignominiously.

However, we have an idea that we will continue to have labor disturbances until time shall be no more.

We have been trying to figure out some scheme to make a little extra cash. We had just about decided to raise a few good beef steers, and would likely be peddling beef roasts and steaks right now only for the fact we haven't been able to find anybody to set us up with foundation stock, and these calves and cows cost money, which we do not have. Just as well, though, for if we had the steers we wouldn't have any feed for them, and hides alone are not very profitable.

This week we got a shock. We are told that four rabbits does weighing 10 or 12 pounds each, will produce more meat in a year than a 1000 pound steer. A good cow will wean one good 400 pound calf per year, while the four does will yield 480 pounds of fryer-rabbit in the same period. At a low price of 50 cents per pound, you would have an income of \$240.00 from four rabbits.

This means the small fellow may go into business for himself. We could finance a pretty good size rabbit ranch, while we could never hope to own a cow ranch. A one-cow ranch would be pretty small, and it would be years before we could realize a profit. But with a rabbit ranch it is different. Take the same amount of money a cow would cost and invest it in breeding stock for a rabbit ranch and in three years you should have an income of at least a hundred thousand dollars annually. It takes a cow about a year to wean a calf, while one rabbit, at the end of a year would have sons, grandsons and great grandsons to tune of several hundred animals. Those animals are modern and multiply like the measles.

They make excellent food, and bring fancy prices. A man today can buy a couple of rabbits, and if he will sell only half the offspring he will be operating a 16-section rabbit ranch within just a few years. If prices should decline and you refused to sell anything for a whole year, you would have more rabbits on hand than there is pastureage in Texas. Yes sir, they would be thicker than Chinese coolies in the walled city.

GREEKS SHELL ISLAND SEIZED BY BULGARIAN REDS JULY 23

ATHENS, Greece, Aug. 7 (UP)—The Greek army shelled disputed Gamma Island in the Evros river Thursday in an attempt to drive off Bulgarian Reds who seized it July 23.

Press reports said Greek mortars started fires which shrouded the island in smoke.

A Greek general staff communique issued at 11 a.m., 3 a.m. est said the bombardment began an hour and a half earlier after a radio warning and in the presence of United Nations observers.

"So far, there has been no reaction," the communique said.

In Naples, Italy, an official spokesman said the southern European Atlantic pact headquarters of U.S. Adm. Robert B. Carney was "closely following" developments in the dispute over Gamma. Greece is a member of the Atlantic Pact and comes within Carney's command.

Saw One Bulgarian

Athens newspapers said Greek observers saw one Bulgarian on the eight-acre island at 4:30 a.m., but waited until dawn to be sure. The presence of Bulgarians on the island was established after day-break and reported to the general staff.

Athens itself was calm, but authorities issued a precautionary alert to guardarmy and army units.

Gamma Island lies in the Evros river, which for 10 miles forms the frontier between Bulgaria and Greece. The island always has been considered Greek, but Bulgarian troops landed there July 23

and seized control after killing two Greek commandos and wounding three.

Had Complained to UN
The Greek government complained to the UN against the incident and the organization's Balkan commission went to the scene.

Greek Foreign Minister Sophocles Venizelos two days ago demanded the Bulgarians evacuate the island. As of Wednesday, Greek and Bulgarian troops were reported lined up on opposite sides of the river.

The Greek bombardment of the island came as a surprise. Only Tuesday night, the Greek general staff issued a communique saying "No Bulgarian troops have appeared on the island of Gamma." It also denied reports Bulgarian troops had occupied other islands in the Evros.

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Carrier Based Jet Explosion Kills 8 Men

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7 (UP)—The Navy announced Thursday that a jet fighter exploded aboard the aircraft carrier Boxer off the Korean coast, Wednesday, killing eight men.

The plane exploded in the carrier's hangar deck, setting off a fire in the below-deck space used for storing planes. Twelve planes were destroyed before the fire was extinguished.

A Navy spokesman said eight men were burned to death in the flames and that other seamen, trapped by the fire, had to jump overboard. All the men were recovered from the water by small boats and helicopters, the spokesman said.

The accident occurred 60 miles off Wonsan, in North Korea, where the Boxer is staging carrier strikes at Communist positions. The spokesman said the Boxer continued on its mission after the accident.

The Navy said the names of the casualties would not be released until next of kin have been notified.

Light Sprinkle Hits Eastland

Chicago Hammer Slayer Warns Cops And Asked To Be Caught

CHICAGO, Aug. 7 (UP)—Police patrol cars cruised through the narrow streets of Chicago's near north side Thursday searching for a hammer killer who threatened to kill again and bagged, "stop me, for God's sake, before it's too late."

The dragnet was thrown out after a man wearing a "light" suit confronted two women at a streetcar stop and told them, "I have killed a man with a hammer and I know how to take care of myself."

The killer had police scurrying all over the city Wednesday night and early Thursday when he made five phantom telephone calls to headquarters and threatened to invade two swank hotels in his quest for blood.

A Dead Man Found
Officers found the battered body of Tom Acton, 35, of Birmingham, Ala., in a dingy hotel room after a man with a voice described as "raspy with a whine" called and said they would "find something bloody" in the room.

ANADARKO, Okla., Aug. 7 (UP)—Wrinkled Indian chieftains in horsedrawn wagons and modern warriors driving 1952 automobiles are streaming into this southwestern Oklahoma city this week as the American Indian Exposition prepares for its 26th annual performance.

More than 2,000 redmen have gathered at the "Indian village" east of here where they will live during most of August as their forefathers did.

Texas Tabbed "Doubtful" Politically

AUSTIN, Aug. 7 (UP)—Texas has been tabbed a doubtful state in the November elections by Gov. Allan Shivers who said Democratic presidential candidate Adlai Stevenson's tideland stand would have "wide influence" on Texas voters.

Shivers, speaking at a news conference Tuesday, said appearances in Texas by Stevenson and Republican candidate Dwight D. Eisenhower might also affect Texas voting.

"Certainly Texas can't be written off for either party," said Shivers.

The Texas governor said he hoped to go to Springfield, Ill., for a meeting with Stevenson next week. He said he would let Stevenson decide the exact date.

Shivers had said earlier, if Stevenson's views were not satisfactory he might "go fishing" at the general election.

Eisenhower has scheduled a personal tour of the state. Stevenson has not indicated whether he will campaign in Texas. When Shivers was asked if he was going to ask Stevenson to come to Texas, he said, "I'm not handling his itinerary."

Shivers said he believed Stevenson was sincerely interested in the tidelands problem. He said the Illinois governor's invitation for a conference pointed out that he "would like to have more information and be happy to discuss it."

Officers Expect Break In Nude Woman's Murder

DALLAS, Aug. 7 (UP)—Oklahoma officers said Thursday new information which could break the Yukon, Okla., nude torso slaying "at any time" was being checked Thursday in Dallas and Oklahoma.

Officers declined to disclose the nature of the newest lead. O. K. Bivins, Oklahoma Crime Bureau chief said, "It looks good—and officers at both ends agree it's the best information we've had."

"I am expecting this thing to fall in Texas," he said.

Bivins was mum on whether an arrest was expected in the fiendish killing of 21-year-old Betty Jack Stevens, Dallas waitress whose beheaded and handless body was found in a dry creek bed near Yukon eight days ago.

The letters R-A-T were carved across the victim's stomach, and pathologists said she was tortured before her death.

Homicide Capt. Will Fritz of the Dallas Police department said only that police were checking all leads and have found nothing pointing to Miss Stevens' murderer.

Bivins explained the secrecy of the new lead saying, "We can't come out with a spread on what we have. If we do, the guy is gonna have an alibi."

Officers said they "had had luck" Wednesday in "tying the loose ends together."

The story of a Lawton, Okla., woman who said the murder victim called at her home two weeks before the killing and begged for protection from a man with whom she shared a Dallas apartment was not accepted by Fritz and Bivins.

Experts Working To Identify The Remaining Dead

WACO, Tex., Aug. 7 (UP)—A suit for \$400,000 was on file against Southwestern Greyhound Lines Thursday as identification of victims burned in a flaming two-bus crash Monday stalled.

The crash, south of Waco, claimed at least 28 lives, and investigators said Thursday, the toll may climb before identification of the remaining bodies is completed. Experts have identified 18 of the victims.

The suit filed in 74th district court at Waco, was brought by the four children of Hailia Zamoudia and his wife, Lenor. Both were killed in the accident.

Each of the four children sought \$50,000 actual and \$50,000 exemplary damages. The suit alleged the bus carrying the Zamoudias was traveling at a high and dangerous rate of speed.

Mrs. Zamoudia's body has been identified. That of her husband was among ten charred and dismembered corpses still not identified by fingerprints, dental work and other clues.

Zamoudia and six other persons are also known to have been definitely placed aboard the ill-fated buses by testimony of relatives and friends. However, the remaining corpses are so badly mutilated, their bodies are unrecognizable and unidentifiable among the ten.

Three other bodies are completely unidentified. Authorities said there is no way of learning who they are. Buses do not carry passenger lists and no relatives or friends have offered clues to the identity of the remains.

The two latest victims identified were M. Sgt. John Papke, of Fort Hood, Tex., reported as being the son of a Chicago Sun-Times employe, and M. B. Herring, 24, of Waco, driver of the north-bound bus. B. C. Malone, driver of the south-bound bus has not been identified.

Two others identified Thursday were Mrs. Estelle Whitbeck, 55, of San Antonio and Oscar G. Peterson, 63, of San Antonio.

UN Sabrejets Down Four MIGs

SEOUL, Korea, Aug. 7.—Swift American Sabrejets knocked four Communist MIG-15 jet planes out of the skies and damaged five others Thursday in high altitude air duels over North Korea.

On the ground, hard-fighting South Korean infantrymen pushed Chinese troops off vital "Capitol Hill" on the central front. It was the sixth time the height has changed hands since Tuesday.

Seventy-six Sabres clashed with 120 MIGs in seven air battles, several of them taking place near Shinju, only a few miles south of the Yalu river boundary between North Korea and Manchuria.

Nine MIGs shot down or damaged Thursday brought the toll of enemy jets for August to 41.

During the day, allied fighter-bombers and artillery kept up a nerve-shattering series of attacks on the Chinese to keep them from counter-attacking the UN defenders on Capitol Hill.

Allied planes made 10 separate air attacks against the beleaguered Red defenders.

Earlier Thursday, the Communists had won control and had driven on to the UN's main line. However, they were driven back.

The attack that brought the Reds temporary possession of the hill was preceded by a 24-hour mortar and artillery barrage, during which the Reds fired 9,000 shells. It was one of the heaviest barrages of the Korean war.

The attack cost the Reds 192 casualties.

State Firemen's School At A&M Last Of August

COLLEGE STATION, (Spl).—Almost a thousand persons from all parts of the U. S. and at least two foreign countries are expected to attend the 23rd Annual Firemen's Training School to be held at Texas A and M. College during the last week in August. Industrial and military specialists from New York and California, in addition to several other states, between, have already filed reservations. During the week-long school, selected firemen from Texas and out-of-state cities are given intensive practice and instruction in fighting almost every known type of fire.

Special equipment available to every city and town is used in fighting fires of the type for which it was designed and every fireman learns about that equipment by using it.

This year about \$30,000 worth of combustible materials will be used so that techniques for fighting such fires may be shown. Several commercial fuel and equipment companies will furnish the bulk of such materials along with specialized equipment for different types of fire-fighting.

Co-sponsored by the Texas Engineering Extension service and the State Firemen's Fire Marshals Association of Texas, the annual school is highly regarded by professional fire-fighters.

Most of the teaching is done right in the field while the firemen students handle the equipment and fight the fire.

This year most of the bigger blazes to be staged will be held in a 26-acre plot just north of the main campus at Texas A & M. Brayton said that a new water line, complete with seven fire plugs, has been laid to the area, in preparation.

Registration for the school will be held Sunday, August 24, with firemen selecting one of four major courses of training. Registrants will be quartered in dormitories on the campus and fed in the college mess-halls.

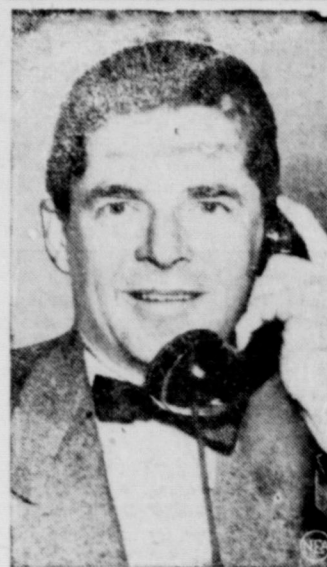

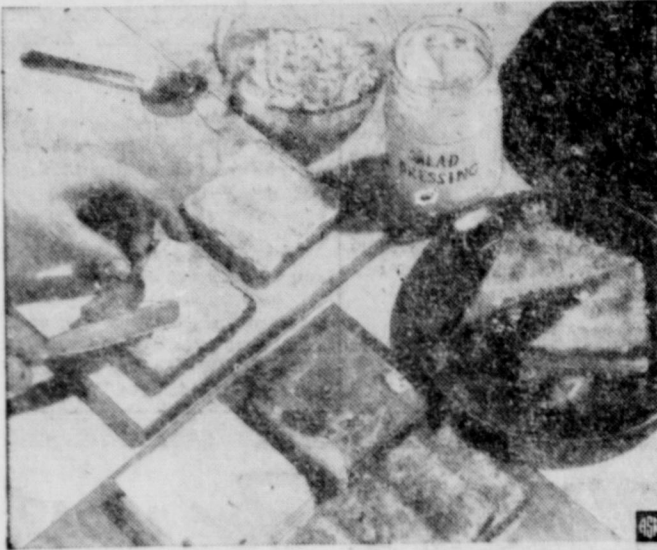

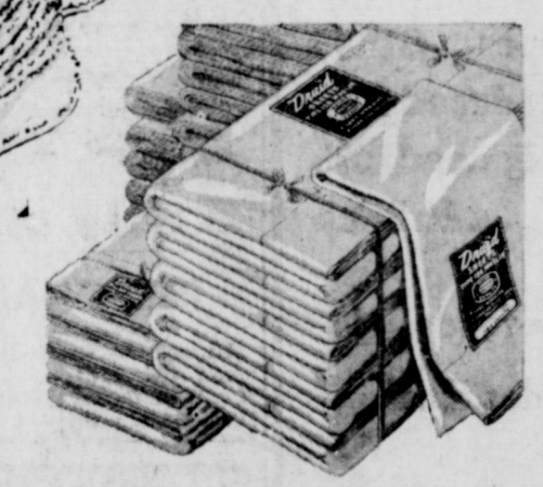
