### Young Woman's Murder Story Proves False

OAKLAND, Calif., Aug. 15 (UP)—A mannish-looking young woman who said she was a well-known abstract artist who had murdered a friend, turned out Friday to be a telephone operator who hadn't killed anybody.

Cathy Ruth Thompson, 18, self-confessed "murderess" who identified herself as Paul Davul, 22, was committed to Highland hospital for psychiatric tests.

Police learned that Leer Larkins, 52-year-old Detroit artist, whom Miss Thompson said she had shot in the stomach, had been seen alive in Oklahoma.

They also found out that Janet Robinson, 20, of Dallas had not driven off with the "victim's" body. Miss Robinson was working as a clerk in a drugstore at Cabot, Ark.

Miss Thompson touched off a widespread search when she walked into police headquarters here and said she had shot and killed Larkins in an argument over her friendship with Miss Robinson.

Subsequent checks showed that the "body" was very much alive in Oklahoma and that Miss Robinson was in Arkansas, both unaware they were principals in the "killing."

### Cave Explorer Dies From Fall

PIERRE ST. MARTIN, France, Aug. 15 (UP)—A 33-year-old critically injured cave explorer died Thursday night 1,100 feet below ground as rescuers attempted to remove him to the surface to save his life.

Marcel Loubens, member of a scientific expedition which had been exploring one of the world's deepest caves, succumbed in the icy cavern without regaining consciousness since he fell 120 feet two days ago.

At his side was a doctor who had risked his life to descend into the precarious depths with serum and medicine for emergency treatment.

Loubens had suffered a broken back and jaw when a cable snapped as he was being hauled to the top two days ago.

### Texas Pecan Crop Gains For Year

AUSTIN, Aug. 15 (UP)—Texas' pecan crop for 1952 is expected to top the 28 million pound mark as compared with less than six million pounds last year, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reported Friday.

In a special pecan report, the USDA predicted a crop of 28.5 million pounds, of which 26.5 million will be wild or seedling types. Improved varieties are expected to total two million or twice the figure of last year when the crop was sharply curtailed by freezes and drought.

### Rhee Takes Oath For Another Term As Korean Leader

SEOUL, Korea, Aug. 15 (UP)—Syngman Rhee took the oath of office Friday for another four-year term as president of South Korea and promised his countrymen to jettison seven million Koreans "bleeding" and agonizing under Red tyranny.

Rhee was inaugurated in a ceremony before the shell-seared capitol building in Seoul, Korea's traditional seat of government. The temporary capital is now at Pusan.

Nearly 200,000 Koreans thronged the streets for the fourth anniversary of the republic's birth and Rhee's inauguration. The war raged only 30 miles north.

"Seven million of our sisters and brothers in the North are bleeding and agonizing under the Red tyranny," the 77-year-old president said, "and we cannot rest in peace until we have rescued them."

He said "our lives are not our own" until the fate of Korea is settled.

While Rhee was speaking, soldiers on the capitol roof sat behind machineguns watching a crowd of 5,000 in the capitol enclosure. The crowd was orderly and quiet.

Rhee said the first duty is to settle the war, then "to bind up our nation's bleeding wounds and to render whole again that which the cruel foe has broken apart."

"There is scarcely a family left in all Korea without its private sorrow and its own special reason for demanding that our ruthless enemy be punished for these sins and driven back from our hallowed land."

Present at the inaugural ceremonies were Gen. and Mrs. Mark Clark, UN officials and Allied ambassadors.

Rhee is the first popularly-elected president in the young republic's history. He recently forced through the national assembly a change in the constitution that took the presidential voting from the national assembly and placed it with the people. He obtained an overwhelming majority in the Aug. 5 elections.

### Location POW Camps Handed Over By Reds

PANMUNJOM, Aug. 15 (UP)—The Communist advised the United Nations Friday they have established one new prisoner of war camp, expanded two more and moved two others to different locations.

The information was contained in a letter from North Korean Gen. Nam Il, chief Communist truce delegate, to Maj. Gen. William K. Harrison, senior Allied delegate.

The letter was handed over at a brief meeting between liaison officers. The high-level truce negotiations are recessed until Aug. 19 when the delegates again will take up the problem of exchanging prisoners of war.

Nam said the Communists established a new prisoner of war camp at Yul Camps 11 and 13 have been expanded, he said, while No. 12 has been moved from Sinsiang to Jaedong and No. 14 from Kipsong to Anju.

Communist liaison officers also handed over maps showing the location of the new and transplanted camps.

### Three AFL Locals Face Ouster For Gangster Control

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Aug. 15 (UP)—Three union locals may be ousted from the American Federation of Labor on the basis of a report by a committee which investigated the alleged infiltration of racketeers into the trade union movement.

The executive council, winding up its five-day quarterly meeting here, will hear Friday the report from the three-man committee which investigated the charges.

The racketeers allegedly have been exploiting both union members and employers.

It was reported the investigation, which lasted three months, uncovered three such cases, at least one of them in New York, and that the committee probably would urge revocation of the charters of the locals involved.

The committee, headed by AFL Secretary-Treasurer George Meany, worked hand-in-hand with heads of affiliated AFL unions in its drive to root out the criminal element in labor's ranks.

Other members of the committee were David Dubinsky, president of the Ladies' Garment Workers Union, and William McPetridge, head of the Building Service Employees Union.

The executive council met in closed sessions Thursday to iron out election year plans and prepare for the national AFL convention in New York next month.

### Socialite Is Nabbed In Raid On Lucrative Call Girl Ring

NEW YORK, Aug. 15 (UP)—Crime raiders arrested one of the nation's top eligible socialite bachelors and at least eight beautiful models and actresses Friday in the most sensational big city vice raids since the days of white-slaver Charles Lucky Luciano.

Sweeping down on Manhattan's silk-stocking east side district in the early morning hours, vice squad detectives broke up at least four "dating" parties and arrested more than a dozen persons including Minot F. Mickey Jelke, 22-year-old heir to a Chicago oleomargarine fortune.

The lightning sweep was a powerful blow to the flourishing New York call-girl racket which sold lonely men voluptuousness for prices ranging up to \$500 a night.

Assistant District Attorney Anthony J. Leibler said the raids were connected and the persons who were arrested "are believed to know each other." Jelke, a publicity man, and a TV bit actress were charged with white slavery, but Jelke denied the charges.

Leibler said Jelke had used his own lavish apartment for the "dates" he arranged between wealthy businessmen and curvaceous girls-about-town for prices ranging from \$50 up.

Authorities said the scope of the cafe society call girl racket rivaled even that of Luciano, who was arrested in 1936 when police broke up his notorious East Harlem vice syndicate. Luciano was sent to prison for a 30- to 50-year term, but was released in 1946 and deported. He now lives in Italy.

Just as in the Luciano case, the early morning raids featured marijuana, unregistered loaded guns, and teen-aged girls. Police said many of the persons wanted in the case had left the city. A search was on for others whose names were learned from tape recordings of telephone conversations.

### Mother Gets Kids, Ministers Actions 'Not Plausible'

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 15 —A minister "went beyond his call of duty" when he removed his clothes while comforting an upset woman but she is a fit mother of her two children, a judge has decided.

Mrs. Ursula Erika Creel, 24, former German model, had not neglected her children, Superior Judge Lewis Drucker ruled, and was given their temporary custody Thursday pending outcome of a divorce suit between Mrs. Creel and her husband, Beverly, 26.

Creel charged that he found his wife nude in bed with the Rev. William Uphold Jr., former pastor of a Manhattan Beach church, who was wearing only an undershirt.

The Rev. Uphold said that he had been asked to come to the home by Mrs. Creel who was upset. After she went to bed, he said, he dozed off in another room but was awakened by her groans.

The Rev. Uphold said that he entered her room clad in his under clothes and that was when Creel and two friends barged into the home.

"Whether he acted as a reverend or a physiologist, Mr. Uphold went beyond the call of duty," Judge Drucker said. "The explanation given by Mrs. Creel and the reverend is one that is difficult for this court to accept as plausible."

### Oil Group Says Steel Strike Cut Production

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (UP)—The Petroleum Administration for Defense (PAD) predicts that the nation will lose about 113,000 barrels a day of planned crude oil production because of the steel strike.

Deputy Administrator J. Ed Warren said Wednesday that lack of steel has cost the oil industry vital well drilling equipment. The loss has slowed down the drilling of new wells, he said with a resulting loss in crude oil production.

Warren said PAD now estimates that only 45,000 wells will be drilled this year instead of the planned 50,000. The result, he said, is that productive capacity will climb only to 7,600,000 barrels a day instead of the pre-strike goal of 7,722,000 barrels.

### Costello Keeps Date With Jail

NEW YORK, Aug. 15 (UP)—Frank Costello, gambler, surrendered to the United States government in Room 13 of the federal courthouse Friday to begin an 18-month prison term—his first in 37 years.

He walked into the courthouse with his attorney at 10:10 a.m., 20 minutes early. The usually debonair racket boss wiped perspiration from his face and managed only a weak smile as he entered the bare room with the fateful number.

"I feel fine," he said hoarsely.

He was taken through the marshals' office to the courthouse detention pen where he will be locked in a 26-man tiled floor cell until the prison van is ready to take him to jail.

Costello was wearing a light blue, pencil-striped business suit with a white shirt and light blue, figured tie. He had no hat.

At Raleigh, N.C., Sen. Estes Kefauver said Costello finally got what was coming to him.

"I think the courts have spoken," the Tennessee senator said. "We of the Senate Crime committee felt he was in contempt and deserved what he is getting."

Costello, now 61, lost a lot of respect for bootlegging, gambling and political fixing—but he could not beat the one Senate Crime committee hung on him for just going home.

He last went to jail in 1915, a 24-year-old hoodlum who was caught with a gun.

**Home Buyer's Attorney Performs Varied Functions.**  
When the real estate sales contract provides that the seller is to furnish to the buyer an Abstract of Title, when it is up to the later to employ an attorney who will examine the abstract. After the examination, the lawyer will give the buyer a written opinion as to whether or not the seller has a good marketable title. If the title is defective, then his opinion will state what action is necessary to bring it up to par.

In addition, the attorney usually advises on important matters not revealed by an abstract. He will ascertain whether any delinquent taxes exist against the property. He will check on the possibility of some third party being in possession, claiming the property as his own. He will determine whether a survey has been made so that the buyer may know that required

footage is there and that the neighbor's fence, driveway, etc. is not encroaching upon the property being purchased. He will explain the practical effort of each legal paper which you sign or accept in closing the deal.

If the contract of sale provides that the seller is to furnish the buyer a Title Insurance Policy, then the latter should employ an attorney to examine the policy offered and advise him on other details in closing the transaction. The fact that an attorney designated by the Title Insurance Company examines the title is not sufficient to protect the purchaser in every respect.

A title insurance policy is similar in principle to a fire insurance policy. Just as you insure against damage caused by fire, so you can insure yourself against damage caused by failure of title. As is also common with fire insurance policies, you must be named as the insured in the policy, in order to collect the proceeds. You cannot recover more than the amount stated on the policy even though the damage caused by the fire or the title failure is greater than that amount. The property insured must be accurately described in the policy. There are exceptions to the coverage which may cause harm to a particular buyer who is not aware of their meaning, or even of their existence.

Insurance companies, in order to stay in business, cannot afford to accept to great a risk in proportion to the premium charged. A fire insurance underwriter decides whether your property is a risk for his company in view of the coverage provided by the fire insurance policy. An attorney hired by the title insurance company de-

termines whether your property is a safe title risk for his company in view of the coverage provided by the Title Insurance Policy. Making such decision is the sole obligation of that attorney in the transaction. He is not in a position that enables him to advise you as to the quality of the title you are acquiring—his only duty is to his client, the title insurance company.

It might also be said that an attorney who passes on the title for the mortgage lender is in the same position. His main obligation in the transaction is to advise his client on whether your title is adequate security for the loan, which is for quite a different purpose than if his client was buying the place, as you are doing, for use as a home.

DALLAS, Aug. 15 (UP) — Funeral services will be held Saturday in Dallas for Noah Roark, 73, who died in a Dallas hospital Thursday.

Roark was a fiery lawyer who once killed a man and served seven years in prison for it. He practiced more than 40 years in Dallas and Denton.

In 1933, Roark killed Justin Stein, manager of the building where Roark had his offices. Roark was sentenced to 40 years for the shooting, but received a full pardon from Gov. Coke Stevenson after serving seven years.



As the dean of fiction's detectives, Holmes still is reverently admired by the "purists" among modern mystery authors. But as a competitor of their own mystery novel characters—well—

First Story Ready "I am going to protect Holmes from the charlatans who have been trying to capitalize on his reputation," said the son of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, Holmes' creator who saw to it that a copyright would protect his hero after his death.

"The first new Sherlock Holmes story is already completed," Conan Doyle continued with a note of triumph in his voice. "My collaborator, John Dickson Carr, and I intend to do 12 short stories, the same number as my father included in his first Sherlock Holmes book, and then follow it with a novel."

The two men will work in Conan Doyle's home in Tangiers, a setting far removed from the foggy London streets outside Holmes' famous study. But the mystery tales will be set in the time and place of the original.

### Camping Out Is Not All 'Rosy'

When someone mentions "camping," memories of bacon frying in the pan, a leisurely day of fishing, or some vision just as tempting comes to mind. Chigger bites, ticks, and mosquitoes are too soon forgotten. A sting or bite is nuisance enough, but disease such as malaria, Rocky Mountain spotted fever, and undulant fever may result from a bite by an insect infested with the specific disease germ. Also, hives or nettle rash may come from sensitivity to insects and their products.

It is by an "ounce of prevention" that such unpleasant conditions as scabies (the "itch"), pediculosis (infestation with lice), and malaria (caused by the bite of an infected mosquito of a certain type, the Anopheles mosquito) can be avoided.

### HD Association Convention Be At Kingsville

KINGSVILLE, Texas, August 11—A major item on the agenda of the Texas Horse Demonstration Association's convention in Kingsville this month will be reduction of the organization's 14 districts in the state to 12.
