Cost Of Living Reaches All Time High

Average Family Now Paying Twice As Much For Its Needs

Drought Stricken Farmers May Get Financial Help

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22 (UP)—Price officials Friday foresaw no immediate end to the inflationary spiral which already has shoved the cost of living to an all-time high.

At best, all they could foresee was a slight flattening off of the inflationary curve in the months ahead.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics reported Thursday that the cost of living jumped six-tenths of one per cent last month to reach a new peak. The rise, paced by sharp advances in food prices, put the consumer price index at 190.8 per cent of the 1935-39 average. That means the average family now is paying almost twice as much for its needs as before World War II.

The government's cost of living index has been climbing steadily upward for the past five months. Price officials stuck firmly to the disputed prediction of Price Administrator Ellis Arnall that the upward trend will continue for months to come.

Arnall has based his prediction on the combined effects of the weakened Price Control Law, the steel strike settlement and the drought. His gloomy outlook, however, has not been shared by other government officials, particularly Economic Stabilizer Roger L. Putnam, Secretary of Commerce Agriculture Charles F. Brannan.

Because of some slight declines in food price in the past month, price officials said the cost of living index for Aug. 15 may hover around the July 15 record high.

But after that, price officials forecast the inflationary price spurt would be off again. They pointed to two factors whipping up the inflationary tide—food and steel.

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Eisenhower Receives Reaction To Foreign Policy Statement

DENVER, Aug. 22 (UP)—Dwight D. Eisenhower getting ready for his big political invasion of the East, heard the first reaction Friday from fellow Republicans on his latest statement on foreign policy.

Only Sen. Bourke B. Hickenlooper of Iowa seemed willing to take issue with Eisenhower's statement that the United States had no alternative but fight in Korea even though the Democratic administration's "terrible blunders" had laid the groundwork for the Red attack.

to adequately support anti-Communist China."

Sen. Irving M. Ives of New York said "there is no argument about our blunders."

Views Given at Regional Meet

The GOP nominee's views on foreign policy were expressed at a regional meeting of Republican leaders from seven states in Kansas City, Thursday. Eisenhower returned here from Kansas City Thursday night.

His associates braced themselves for expected criticism from

Republicans whose ideas about the war in Korea do not coincide with Eisenhower's.

The GOP nominee, in answer to a question from K. B. Cornell, candidate for Congress in Oklahoma, said he thought the administration had made "terrible blunders" before the outbreak of the Korean war. But he said that once the fighting was started, he didn't see how the United States could stay out.

"I believe there would be a great danger if we had not reacted against the Communist forces," he said. "We would already be involved in a very much greater and more serious thing than we are today."

Crosses Bombing of China

Eisenhower lined up with administration policy also by opposing the bombing of Chinese bases in Manchuria.

"No one yet, no one that I know of, has presented any feasible military plan for attacking China," he said. "It is not a country particularly susceptible to weakening through massive bombing, a place where we would presumably have a greater advantage than anyone else."

President Truman's 1948 campaign tactics came in for some criticism from Eisenhower, too, although indirectly. The Republican candidate said that "one of the great tragedies in a government such as ours is when cooperation completely fails between the legislative and executive departments due to a lack of respect on the part of the executive for the great functions of the legislature."

"I think it is indefensible for any member of the Executive Department to go up and down the land to criticize a Congress which is after all the people of the United States," he said.

In 1948, Mr. Truman, during his own presidential campaign, many times referred to the Republican-controlled 80th Congress as one of the worst in American history.

Heat Continues In Texas; More Deaths

The Southwest weather picture was mixed Friday, with Texans continuing to swelter in a blistering heat wave, while the mercury dropped a bit in some parts of the six-state region and rose slightly in others.

Showers and thundershowers were widely scattered over the area from Wyoming in the north to the Rio Grande in the South.

Three more heat fatalities were reported in Texas—W. G. Price, 52, and Mrs. E. J. Thomas, 31, of Mexia and H. J. Miller, 70, of Vernon.

In Oklahoma, the state cotton exchange reported nearly 50,000 bales of cotton had been lost in the Sooner state over the last two weeks because of the drought.

Water shortages were common in Oklahoma. Pauls Valley pumped water from the Washita river because its wells were low and its auxiliary supplies were dry.

In Wapanucka the population of 600 relied on 75 private wells for drinking water and the Oklahoma Health Department sent a tank of water.

The high temperature in Oklahoma Thursday was 111 at Hollis, while Frederick had 110 and Hobart 109.

In Missouri, the high was 90 at Mallen. The low was 68 at Kirksville and St. Joseph. The Kansas top temperature was 86 at Chanute, while the low was 63 at Garden City. Friday was expected to be fair over both states and a bit warmer than Thursday.

Rains in Colorado were expected to keep temperatures down Friday. Thursday's high was 83 at Akron. In Wyoming, the high was 90 at Sheridan. Wyoming forecasts were for generally clear Friday.

In Texas the mercury reached 106 at Childress. Victoria had the state's low maximum, 85.

Clemency Asked In Rape Case

AUSTIN, Aug. 22 (UP)—The Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles Friday had before it a request that Foley Ford Gephart, 39, convicted of raping an 8-year-old girl, be imprisoned for life, rather than executed Sept. 5.

Hobart Huson, Jr., of San Antonio, Gephart's attorney, asked the board to grant clemency to a man "who might possibly be innocent."

He and Ray Stevens, an Austin lawyer, presented a petition signed by 200 residents of Llano county, Gephart's former home, asking for commutation of the sentence.

Gephart was found guilty in Travis county of raping an Austin schoolgirl in November, 1949. Assistant Travis county District Attorney Tom Blackwell presented the board with an affidavit from the girl in which she said she was raped.

Gephart's lawyers offered an affidavit from the girl saying she had not been raped. They also presented documents and testimony from persons living on the premises where the attack was supposed to have taken place. They said they had seen no children there that day.

B. Todd Added To H-SU Staff

Bobby Todd has accepted a position as an instructor of Radio courses at Hardin-Simmons University for the 1952-53 school term.

Todd is a former employee with the Far East radio network in Tokyo, and will in addition to the radio course, instruct a class in speech.

A 1951 graduate of HSU, Todd is of Abilene, formerly of Eastland. While in Tokyo he wrote and edited news from over the world for short broadcasts to troops, missionaries, foreign business communities and English speaking peoples in the Far East.

Todd served a year and a half in the army as an attaché of the Public Information office of the University Military Training experimental unit.

He travelled and spoke before civic organizations, Parent-Teacher Associations, American Legion groups and other organizations explaining military programs.

The H-SU radio station is a member of the Southwestern Collegiate Broadcasting System. Courses offered by the radio department include announcing, continuity, drama, planning, production, and studio practices.

He is the son of Mrs. Obera Todd of Abilene, formerly of Eastland and is the grandson of Mrs. S. M. Hager, 412 W. Plummer. He graduated from Eastland High School in 1946.

Heart Disease Drug Undergoes New Tests

Peritrate, the drug made from explosives, and used in the preventive treatment of angina pectoris, the dangerous and painful heart ailment, is reported to have benefited materially 84 per cent of a group of patients suffering from the coronary disease.

Reporting in the current issue of the New York State Medical Association Journal, Dr. Milton Plotz of the State University of New York and of Bushwick Hospital, Brooklyn, concludes that "The results in a cautious clinical experiment in more than forty cases, seemed to indicate a high per cent of beneficial results."

Peritrate was developed, and made available to the medical profession earlier this year, by Chilton Laboratories, Inc., of Morris Plains, New Jersey, a division of Warner-Hudnut, Inc.

Dr. Plotz found that 30 out of 36 patients suffering from angina pectoris were materially benefited by the administration of the drug. He notes that four patients with mild angina were able to discontinue the use of nitroglycerin, the older agent used to fight the disease which caused side effects in some patients including

headaches, and that the dosage of nitroglycerin in other cases was reduced considerably.

Nitroglycerin, unlike Peritrate, is not a prophylactic agent. It is administered after attacks of angina pectoris have occurred. To test the preventive power of Peritrate, all of the patients had been encouraged to engage in more normal daily activities, Dr. Plotz reported.

Angina pectoris, characterized by severe spasmodic chest pains, is caused when not enough oxygen reaches the heart muscle. Its treatment requires the use of a drug capable of easing the constriction of blood vessels responsible for the oxygen supply to the heart, without causing other undesirable and uncomfortable reactions in the patient.

In earlier reports, appearing last February in the Journal of Angiology, by Drs. Travis Winsor and Patrick Humphreys and by Drs. Abraham Perlman and Thomas H. McGavack, Peritrate was referred to as the drug "of choice" in the treatment of angina pectoris.

These investigators had found the agent to be effective in 75 per cent of angina patients.

Dr. Plotz's study showed that most gratifying results with Peritrate were experienced by those patients with a form of angina known as angina decubitus. In angina decubitus, severe chest pains

occur when the patient reclines, thus causing insomnia. The investigator found that these patients were able to enjoy reasonably sound sleep after taking the drug.

In five patients with prolonged status anginos, who required large amounts of nitroglycerin day and night, Dr. Plotz reports that Peritrate gave considerable relief, reducing their nitroglycerin requirements by half or more, with one patient being able to dispense with this agent entirely.

Peritrate was found to have little effect on arterial circulation; on marked changes in blood pressure were observed. The only side reaction noted by Dr. Plotz was minor nausea in six patients, lasting only for the first few days of treatment. In at least one case the nausea was thought to be of psychogenic origin.

Chemically a nitrate, Peritrate is of a group of chemicals that have long been used in making explosives. During the past three years, however, the non-toxic compound has been tried extensively for its clinical value in heart disease.

Oversight Costs Horses And Mules \$20 Million

OKLAHOMA CITY, Aug. 22 (UP)—Oklahoma's horses and mules didn't know it Friday, but it has just been discovered that they were done out of \$20 million by an oversight in 1913.

Adolph Melzer of Evansville, Ind., gave \$1,000 for the state's mules and horses, to draw 4 per cent interest in an Oklahoma bank for 250 years, after which it would amount to about \$20 million. But Melzer forgot to deposit the money, so the animals will have to go on working for a living.

Fiery Cross Termed A Prank MILWAUKEE, Aug. 21—Four teen-aged boys admitted Wednesday they planted a fiery cross on the lawn of a Negro family's home and broke a window. They said it was "a prank."

I am proud of my record, which has no blemishes.

- SPIRITUAL:** Elder in the First Christian Church.

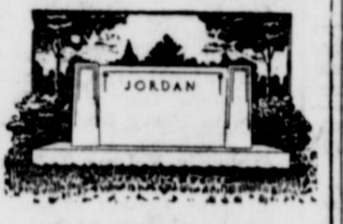
