HIGH HEAT LINGERS IN SOUTHWEST

Temperatures continued above normal in the Southwest Wednesday, with only a few scattered showers providing any relief from the late summer heat.

The rampaging flood waters in southern Texas appeared to have moved seaward. The floods on the Guadalupe and San Marcos rivers—and on numerous small streams—were touched off by torrential rains in Central Texas last week.

The less dramatic, but far more costly, drought wore on Wednesday, with parched and withering crops needling rain in many parts of Texas, Oklahoma and the states to the north.

No rain fell Tuesday in Wyoming. Scattered showers were reported in Colorado, including 0.9-inch at Denver. Light rains were reported in both Kansas and Missouri.

Farm Group Has New Officials

T. D. Wheat, Eastland, Agricultural Representative of a local utility company was named president of the Eastland County Agricultural Workers Association at the regular monthly meeting of the group there recently.

J. W. Lee, Rising Star, Soil Conservation Service was elected vice president; B. S. Dudley, Jr., Ranger, vocational agricultural teacher was voted secretary-treasurer and J. M. Cooper, Eastland County Agent, was named reporter.

The group will meet at Carbon for its October meeting with Emmett Powell, Eastland, administrative officer of the FMA, explaining the 1953 soil conservation practices applicable to the county. The November meeting will have Wheat and Cooper on the program in discussing irrigation practices as they found it on a recent visit to the Lubbock area.

The organization is one of the oldest of its kind in this section of the state. Many inquiries and questions concerning it have been received in the past few years according to the various officers.

Wheat replaces M. D. Fox, former Eastland Vocational Agricultural Teacher who is now with the U. S. Department of Agriculture in India.

More Cash Comes For Polio Work In This County

A March of Dimes check for \$2,200 has been received by the Eastland County Chapter of National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis to help provide care for polio patients here, it was announced today by James Hendricks, Chapter Chairman.

Mr. Hendricks explained that when March of Dimes funds are raised each January, half of the total amount remains with the local chapter and half is sent to National Headquarters to finance scientific research, professional and public education and to provide emergency aid such as that just received.

This is the second emergency advance received by the local chapter this year. The first was for \$5,500.

Although the once-impregnable barriers surrounding polio are toppling one by one before scientific attack, the tide of polio continues to rise higher across the nation, leaving ever-increasing burdens on the chapters of the National Foundation.

The Eastland County Chapter at present is providing funds, in whole or in part, for the care of five patients stricken this year, in addition to four who contracted polio in previous years.

Wake Island Damage Estimated At Ten Million From Typhoon

Emergency rescue planes flew out the first survivors of Wake's disastrous 148 mile an hour typhoon Wednesday and eyewitnesses said the battered island looked like a "lost continent."

Damage, estimated at \$10 million, was "much worse than bombs could inflict," one survivor said.

The first evacuees from the typhoon-battered island landed at Kwajalein Atoll Wednesday night Pacific time. They described the ordeal as a nine hour "nightmare of howling winds and flapping tropical rains."

Air Force Sgt. Thomas A. Barker, 24, San Antonio, said steel from quonset huts and other debris was "scattered all over the island."

Houston Man Kills Two; Wounds Three Others; Then Kills Self

HOUSTON, Sept. 17 (UP)—Police Wednesday sought the reason for a wild shooting spree in a tavern Tuesday night by a 68-year-old Houston man who killed two of his friends, wounded three others and then shot himself to death.

George Cordary "apparently had been brooding over family troubles," police said. He went berserk in a small tavern he once owned.

After a .45 caliber automatic pistol slipped from his pocket and clattered to the floor, he picked it up and began firing. Each of five bullets in his gun found a mark.

He snapped the trigger at two other terrified bar patrons, but he was out of ammunition.

Two of the three wounded persons were in critical condition Wednesday in Houston hospitals.

CONTRACT LET FOR EASTLAND-RANGER TWO-LANE HIGHWAY

Contract was let in Austin yesterday by the State Highway Department for the paving of the two-lane highway connecting Ranger and Eastland. Ernest Lloyd of Fort Worth was low bidder, and his bid calls for an expenditure of approximately \$730,000. Indications at this time are that his bid will be finally accepted by the Highway Department and that contract will be awarded him.

Prospects now indicate that work will begin about the 15th of October, and that dirt work will be done by Hanson & Gilbert, contractors. This firm, it is understood, employs considerable local labor.

The contract calls for a two-lane highway, very similar to the highway between Eastland and Cisco. Sharp curves and corners will be eliminated.

It will take from 12 to 18 months to complete the program, it is said.

Court's Ruling Marks Victory For "Loyal" Stevenson Backers

AUSTIN, Sept. 17 (UP)—Insurgent "Texas Democrats" Wednesday abruptly dropped their battle to place Dwight D. Eisenhower on the ballot as their party nominee.

The action marked a court victory for "Loyal Democrats" backing Adlai Stevenson as their presidential candidate.

C. C. Renfro, Dallas attorney for the conservative "Texas Democrats" announced no appeal would be made from a district court ruling barring the party label from Texas' general election ballot.

He said printed election ballots would be in the mail to the 254 counties of Texas before final decision on the court contest could be determined.

There would be no sense in appealing, he said.

Allen Wright of Dallas, chairman of the organization's state executive committee, said Tuesday the "Texas Democratic" party would continue its fight before the third court of civil appeals.

Renfro's announcement apparently meant the end of the new splinter group in Texas.

"We were just trying to give these Democrats a chance to vote for Eisenhower under the Democratic ticket," Renfro said.

Renfro said he didn't know whether party member would offer their service as Eisenhower supporters to the Republican party, or actively join the "Democrats for Eisenhower"—a group recognizing Stevenson as the legal nominee of the party but renouncing any obligation to vote for him.

"Whatever they do will be a matter of individual decision," Renfro said.

Tuesday state District Judge Jack Roberts barred the new group from certifying Eisenhower as its nominee. Time was a major element in the dispute, since Texas ballots were to go to the printer Thursday.

Leaders of the "Texas Democrats" said they would carry their appeal to the third court of civil appeals Wednesday. But attorneys said a final decision would probably require a prolonged trial, lasting long after the ballots are printed.

The order against the new party was secured by "Loyal Democrats," backing Adlai E. Stevenson, the regular Democratic candidate.

The disgruntled conservative faction had sought to have Eisenhower named as the regular Democratic nominee in Texas, but failed at the state convention.

Gov. Allan Shivers, himself a bitter foe of the Truman administration, urged that Stevenson be named because the party was "morally and legally obligated" to back the national candidate.

Shivers, however, told Democrats to be guided by their conscience in voting and his office has given its unofficial blessing to a movement of "Democrats for Eisenhower."
