

Texas Is Host To Democratic Nominee Adlai Stevenson Today

The national political spotlight again fell on Texas Friday, with Adlai Stevenson, Democratic presidential nominee, arriving for a two-day campaign and two Republican senators preparing for major speeches.

Stevenson was to arrive at Fort Worth by plane at 4:25 p.m. His tour of the Lone Star state came just two days after the departure of his Republican opponent, Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Friday's other political developments: Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy R-Wis. prepared for a "nonpartisan" speech Friday night in Tyler. McCarthy will speak on Communism in government at a rally sponsored by the Tyler American Legion.

Sen. James Duff R-Pa., a pioneer Eisenhower supporter, arrived for talks in Nocona Saturday and Lamesa and Big Spring Monday.

Republican headquarters in Dallas announced Richard M. Nixon, GOP vice presidential candidate, would make a seven-stop, one-day flying tour of Texas Oct. 27.

No Full Story
Stevenson was challenged by Robert E. Stripling, former chief investigator for the House Un-American Activities Committee, to tell "the extent of his association" with Alger Hiss. Stripling said: "Here in Texas we haven't had the full story."

Gov. Allan Shivers who is supporting Eisenhower, said the federal government was "discriminating" against some Texas counties by not declaring them drought disaster areas. Shivers said: "Texas farmers and ranchers have lost more than \$5 million" because of a delay in designating 82 of the state's 254 counties disaster areas and making them eligible for emergency relief.

Price Daniel, senatorial candidate of both parties, rushed to Austin after his son was seriously injured in a fall with a plastic horn in his mouth. Daniel cancelled a press conference and speech in San Antonio Thursday night.

This is a splendid gesture, and the ladies will, in all probability, receive a generous response. It's for a good cause—one that will bring much happiness to our unfortunates, whose worse crime was suffering and bleeding for us. Later the Red Cross will have a drive, and we all know what America thinks of the Red Cross. They will ask for and get funds to carry on their work.

It was Quarterback Buddy Hamrick's night out at Bulldog Stadium in Ranger 20 hours ago when he led his Ranger Junior College mates to a 12 to 7 victory over the beefy North Texas State College "B" team before a sparse audience of 1,500 on-lookers.

During his stellar Thursday night performance, aided by the very cooperative efforts of his Purple & White brethren, Hamrick personally accounted for all but 48 yards of the Rangers' air and ground offensive total of 216 yards net. The triple-threatening field general, slashing off the spread, lugged the oval on 16 passes for 68 yards, and hurled a total of 17 passes, 10 of which were completed for 100 yards even.

The battle, a tightly contested affair with exception of the last three minutes of the first half, was a thriller. The coaching, too, was excellent with Assistant Coach Richard E. (Dick) Henderson handling the Purple & Whites machine during the absence of Coach Boone Yarbrough off on a scouting expedition.

Interception Sparks Scoring

As the minutes ticked away and the intermission break neared with the scoreboard displaying only zeros, Charles Blanton, 170-pound Ranger halfback, intercepted an Eagle pass on the Ranger 32 and hustled it up to the 46 to set off a terrific offensive explosion.

From there Hamrick splattered his 170 pounds over right guard for four, shot Back Kenneth Burton a spiral good for 15 yards, but failed to gain on an attempted end sweep from the 35. Blanton was thrown for a two-yard loss, and then Hamrick connected with Blanton on an eight-yard

Hardin-Simmons University's a cappella choir, of Abilene, one of the most widely travelled student choral groups in the Southwest, will be in Eastland Tuesday to present a concert in the high school auditorium. The program will begin at 2 p.m.

The 60-member organization, directed by Euell Porter, will be enroute to the Texas Baptist Convention in Ft. Worth, where it will sing Wednesday morning. The choir will appear Tuesday morning in Cisco.

Other engagements for the choir in Ft. Worth include a television appearance over WBAP-TV at 9:15 a.m. Wednesday, a radio broadcast that afternoon and a special Texas program that evening.

During the past three years the choir has sung for audiences in a dozen states. It has appeared regularly at the Southern Baptist Convention and Texas Baptist Convention, travelling more than 5,000 miles yearly. 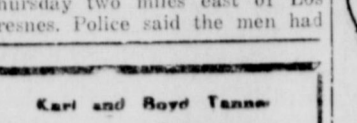

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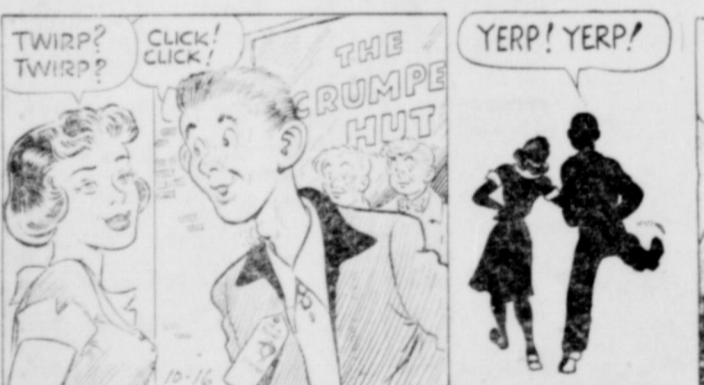
