EASTLAND SCORES SURPRISE TRIUMPH BEFORE 2,000 FANS IN THRILLER FRIDAY NIGHT

Scoring a major District 7A upset, Coach Ed Hooker's Eastland High Mavericks, shining superbly during a closely played nip-and-tuck battle, chopped down the Santa Anna Mountaineers, 41 to 27 at Santa Anna Friday night.

About 2,000 fans, including approximately 200 from Eastland, watched in awe as the light, inexperienced, underdog Mavericks, rated no chance to subdue the opening kickoff whistle, unleashed a terrific T-powered offensive, led by the pounding play of Fullback James Jessop, 154-pound powerhouse, who scored five of the Red & Black's half a dozen touchdowns.

The contest, Santa Anna's second defeat of the year, was evened through the first half, with flawless extra-point kicking by Stan Harris' talented toe being the margin for the 14 to 13 lead which the Eastlanders held at halftime intermission.

The meager one-point gap cracked into a chasm late in the third period, however, when Eastland rammed over another touchdown, and then the upset was cinched in a wild fourth quarter when the Red & Black struck three times for pay.

Scoring in the night's tilt began early when the Mavericks, starting from their own 14, rolled down to the hosts' 32, and from there Fullback Jessop smashed his way through the Black & Gold defense to score. Harris' kick for the point was good.

The Mountaineers, after taking the return kickoff on their own 15, cut 83 slashing yards down to the Mavericks' 3-yard stripe. There Quarterback Dean Bass slammed over on a quarterback-sneak. The Santa Annans' Melvin Pollock booted the point and the battle was knotted at 7-7.

Jessop again exploded over into the paydirt midway in the second quarter capping a 60-yard drive with a plunge from the 3-yard stripe. Harris again added the extra point.

In the dying minutes of the first half, taking over on the Red & Black's 25, the Mountaineers pounded down to the 1-yard line and then Left Half Charles Scarborough, 168-pounder, knifed over. But kicker Pollock missed and at halftime, it was a 14-13 game.

Recovery of a Santa Anna fumble by Right Tackle Doug Roff of Eastland set up the Maverick touchdown that began icing up the upset triumph late in the third period. Ruff fell on the leather on the Mountaineers 20, and two plays later Jessop scored from the 18. Harris again converted.

The Red & Black machine notched three TDs in the final quarter with Harris booting two of the three after-touchdown placement kicks perfectly.

On their own 33, the Mavs faked a punt attempt. Right Half J. D. Hanson stood deep and the Mountaineer defensive fanned out in anticipation of a kick. However, Jessop, playing short, hugged the snapper and was off on a dazzling 67-yard trek to paydirt. Hit hard on the Santa Anna 30, he maintained his balance and kept on churning to count.

In the middle of the canto, a pass from Vern Meroney, quarter, to Jessop for another tally climaxed a three-play maneuver from midfield. Jessop had picked up 7 yards in two ground stabs prior to receiving the aerial which he pulled down on the 21 and then toted across the double stripe.

Near the end of the final stanza, Eastland scored its last tally on a brilliant 92-yard, kickoff return gallop by Halfback Hanson who picked up the oval back on his own eight and churned down the left sidelines.

The Mountaineers last half stabs came midway in the third and in the last two minutes of the final quarter.

Scarborough steamed around right end to score from the 6, capping a 67-yard march in the middle of the third. Pollock added the point. In the closing minutes of play, the Santa Annans' cashed in an Eastland fumble on the Maverick 30 yard line on five plays. The Pollock plunger over center to score. The 180-pound full also kicked the extra point.

Rain Outlook Dim As Skies Remain Fair

The weather report for the Eastland County area, issued Saturday at noon:

The Southwest enjoyed perfect football weather Saturday, with the sun shining down and temperatures due to range in the 70s. But the weather was hard on farm lands and forests.

The region remained bone dry.

The danger of forest fires in Wyoming was increasing with every dry day, the U. S. Forestry Service reported.

In Oklahoma and Texas the drought continued, and the weather bureau said there was no chance of rain over the weekend. In Oklahoma City forecasters said there was a slight possibility of showers next week, but that the showers, if any, would be light.

The weather bureau forecast a variety of temperature patterns over the weekend in the seven-state region from Wyoming to the Rio Grande.

The Texas Panhandle was due to cool off slightly late Saturday, while the rest of the state was to experience no important temperature changes. Oklahoma was to remain warm Saturday, but cool off slightly Sunday. Kansas was to be cooler in the west Saturday, with Missouri becoming cooler in the northeast.

The weather bureau said temperatures in Colorado and Wyoming were 10 to 20 degrees above normal.

Hill City, Kansas, was the hottest spot in the region Friday with a reading of 87. Other highs, by states, were: Childress, Tex., 84; Gage, Okla., 83; La Junta, Colo., 85; Rodeo, N. M., 85; St. Louis and West Plains, Mo., 80; and Cody, Wyo., 75.

Ranger Soldier Dies In Korea

A cloud of gloom hung over the 1952 Homecoming of Ranger Junior College this morning with the jarring news that Cpl. Jimmie Max Crawley, 23-year-old former RJC backfield star and son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Crawley, Sinclair Ave., Ranger, died in Korea on Monday, Sept. 15, as a result of wounds received in combat with the Chinese Reds.

Cpl. Crawley, a graduate of Gorman High School prior to attending Ranger Junior College here in 1947-48-49, was born at Gorman on Oct. 3, 1929.

The young infantryman was inducted into the ranks of the U. S. Army on Oct. 8, 1951 while a student at Midwestern University, Wichita Falls where he also was a member of the football squad. He was shipped overseas to the Pacific area in March of last spring.

Last word received from the Ranger soldier was a letter, dated Sept. 14, written to his mother, Mrs. Myrtis Crawley. No mention of any wounds was in the communication which, it was said, was written "behind the front lines."

News of Cpl. Crawley's death came in a telegram from the Department of Defense, Washington, which was received by Mayor Price Crawley late Friday. Further details, the message said, would be furnished the family later by the Defense Department.

Survivors of Cpl. Crawley include the parents at the Sinclair address; and three sisters, Miss Beverly Crawley and Miss Deana Crawley also of the home, and Mrs. W. A. Craddock of Sundown.

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Four Draw Fines, Suspensions For DWI Offenses

Several persons were convicted and sentenced following trial of criminal cases in District Court at Eastland this week, J. M. Nuesse, district and county attorney, reported late Saturday.

Zona Green of Breckenridge and Curtis Ray Sharp of Ranger were convicted of assault upon John Kimbrough of Ranger back on Sept. 1. For the offense, Green was assessed a 30-day sentence in the Eastland County jail, and Sharp, charged with assault with intent to rob, was given a two-year suspended sentence and released under a \$1,000 peace bond.

Douglas Bowman of Birmingham, Ala., was found guilty of forgery during a trial Friday in the District court. He was assessed a two-year term in the state penitentiary at Huntsville. Bowman's accomplice in preparing and passing a forged check at the Globe Men's Store in Ranger on Sept. 23, was a woman—Mrs. Helen D. Wiley, also of Birmingham. She was given a two-year suspended sentence.

Adrian Swindle of Cisco, charged with an aggravated assault upon Otis Knox in Cisco on July 16 of last summer, was found guilty and assessed a fine of \$200 plus court costs.

Deputy Sheriff Les Threat of Eastland transported three Eastland Countians to the state penitentiary at Huntsville Wednesday, Nuesse reported. Harold Dear, Nichols will begin serving a five-year sentence for assaulting a 9-year-old girl with intent to rape, and M. J. and Clinton Casey, brothers of Eastland will commence five-year stints behind state penal bars for burglarizing the Frank Stubblefield store at Gorman on April 11.

Cecil Taylor, a Louisianian, drew a two-year sentence in the state penitentiary Wednesday for breaking and entering and burglary of the Leveille Motor Co., in Ranger on Sept. 23. Three other men, Taylor's accomplices, are in custody of Sheriff Frank Tucker at Eastland and have not as yet been indicted by the grand jury, Nuesse said. No losses were sustained by the Ranger motor firm, the district attorney said.

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POTPOURRI AND WORSE

Possibly politics, banquets, barbecues and the like have been contributing to our arrogance, so we will clear up the mind (if any) and take a glance at the spiritual side of life.

To say the least the things Spiritual are more easily neglected than those of worldly origin. Many of us take it for granted that God is all-powerful, and is capable of caring for Himself. In one sense this may be true, but on the other hand we find that those who live close to God are those individual who are capable of dispensing with the many perplexities of life. Some way or other, they seem to have some kind of reinforcement, that given them added strength capable of surmounting all obstacles encountered in life.

Feeling this way, we realize the importance of doing the right thing at all times. We may not agree religiously or politically, but at least we feel that we are right and so long as our conscience is clear we will go forward to battle. Spiritually, we are satisfied with our beliefs, even though we must admit that we are not blessed with excessive goodness. We are not as good as we should or even could be, though this may be brought about by affliction of the head rather than the heart. You may disagree with us, and still be right.

Sometimes we feel that religious inclinations are hereditary—we are Baptists or Methodists simply because we grew up under such an influence. But considering ourselves right according to the light we have, we feel that Presbyterians and others will be accepted by the Lord. There are religious groups that we consider almost foreign, and yet if the Bible is true, and it is, some of these people are going to be saved.

You know the Maker understood our weaknesses long before we were born, and for this reason made the plan of Salvation just as simple as can be. The Bible tells us that "whosoever will" may be saved—that those who believe in Him will be saved. God the Father made this promise, and His son, Jesus, has told us that "what the Father gives Him he cannot lose, but will raise up the last day. Sounds simple and it is.

At times we are baffled when we see those who claim to be Christians, doing the things they do. We are puzzled when we hear a so-called christian take the name of God in vain. Just how must he feel? We have wondered why men who are supposed to be children of God, go out and before their minds with liquor or dope. Does this enable them to "commune with God" in closer nearness? We have con-

sumed liquor, but we do not remember it ever prompting us to pray.

On the other hand it has caused us to do things, that we hope God did not bear or see.

And there is nothing in this world that is worthwhile, that your religion (Christianity) can not be made a part. It covers all that is good. It make good men better, and better men still better. It will go hand in hand with politics, provided your particular brand is right. But christianity may not be used to cover crime and evil-doing.

Long before the national conventions we considered our brand of politics. We were even simple enough to discuss it with the Lord, and have, in so far as possible, allowed Him to lead us. It may have caused a shift in parties, at least for the time, and it may have caused some to turn from us as enemies. The last part we regret, for we crave at least the respect, of every man.

Yet we are not ashamed to face our God, and we are quite thankful for His Divine Guidance. And regardless of what the final results may be, we shall have the satisfaction of knowing that we have not shirked our duty, and that all that we may have said and done—without promises of reward, has been done with joy.

America is suffering today because of evil and ill-timed politics, and the people of this great land are aware of the truth. To a degree America has been on her knees, asking guidance. They have spent up their petitions, asking that God give them a great leader. Could it be possible that he will first nation to do this. No the Children of Israel did this at the time they were serving as slaves in Egypt. God gave them Moses, and later Joshua. But soon they were back in sin.

Finally they demanded a king, and they got him, though they did not need him, as they soon learned. Saul was a "washout" in many respects. David was a good king, with all his sins and short-comings. Solomon was good and bad.

Right now America needs a President, and he must be strong. Then with God as his leader he may be expected to save America from communism and all other "isms" which are torturing her at this time. We feel that this man could very easily be Dwight D. Eisenhower.
