Methodists Will Be In Ranger For Monday Meeting

Members and visitors from the First Methodist church will attend the District Conference which meets in Ranger Monday evening at 6:30 at First Methodist church, Ranger. Bishop William C. Martin will be the speaker. W. D. Raley of Dublin, district lay leader, will be master of ceremonies for the banquet.

Following the men's banquet the opening worship service of the district conference will be held in the church sanctuary for all the members, delegates, and visitors. The choir of the Ranger Methodist church will present special music under the direction of Fred Baumgardner. Bishop Martin will preach the evening sermon. Rev. Leslie W. Seymour, superintendent of the Cisco district, will preside at the conference.

Tuesday morning at 9:00 o'clock the conference will open with a devotional service. Reports and business and inspiration on the work of the church will come throughout the morning. Dr. A. Norman Evans, pastor of Austin Avenue Methodist Church, Waco, will preach at the 11:00 o'clock hour on Tuesday.

John Watley of the local Methodist Church will apply for license to preach, looking toward continuing in college for his B.A. degree, then three years study in Leaning School of Theology, Southern Methodist University.

Fair And Warmer Is Area Forecast

Although murky, overcast skies which hung over Eastland County this morning hinted that rain might be in the offing, weather forecasters continued unperturbed.

"Fair and warm" was the word from the weather bureau.

And November, which rolled in at midnight last night on the departing heels of October's bonedry 31 days, continued drouthy with little or no hope for immediate relief offered.

Highest temperatures today likely will be in the middle 80s, and it'll be comparatively mild to night with the mercury due to dive no lower than 60.

Sunday—continued fair and warmer.

Texans Ready For Waterfowl

The second major phase of the annual Texas wildlife harvest—duck and goose hunting—opened at noon Friday, October 31. Dove shooting is underway; deer and turkey begins generally November 16 and quail begins generally December 1.

According to the Executive Secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission, the waterfowl opener will be marked by a large number of hunters.

He said the only deterrent to a successful opening shoot for ducks and geese is the drought. Tanks, ponds and even large lakes have dried up.

The Executive Secretary said the number of both ducks and geese leaving the northern nesting areas indicate that only rains are needed to provide Texas hunters with good shooting.

He pointed out that recent mild weather has postponed the movement south of the main body of birds but he explained that this migration can be touched off by arrival of normally cold weather in the north.

The Executive Secretary suggested that hunters be extremely careful with fire because of the severe drought. Some states have been forced to curb shooting in certain areas because hunters started bad fires.

Other precautionary points were: Make certain to attach the \$2 Federal duck stamp to the state hunting license. Adhere to all safety rules. Observe shooting regulations generally.

The Executive Secretary warned that game wardens have no other choice but to prosecute persons exceeding the bag limits of five ducks a day or ten in possession or five geese per day or in possession. Shooting hours after the first day are from one half hour before sunrise until one hour before sunset.

A Reporter Feels County's Pulse—

It Appears Ike May Win Tuesday, But—

There is a strong possibility that Republican presidential candidate Dwight D. Eisenhower will carry Eastland County on Tuesday's general election.

This writer—unbiased, impartial, unaffiliated with any political group or organization—late Friday completed a county-wide election survey.

Over a period of six days we drove many miles, spent many hours talking—and listening—to many people, including many key political leaders.

We personally continue our state of neutrality as we present such facts as we have learned. Fear in mind, please, that this is not in anywise a prediction, nor the result of a poll. It simply is a review of sentiment, of opinion, as expressed to us—pro-and-con—during this independent survey.

If Ike doesn't carry Eastland County's precincts and if he does it'll be the first time in history this area has voted for the election of a Republican presidential nominee—the day's balloting will be another upset. It'll be a reiteration of the 1948 general election when Harry Truman, whom the nation's press, pollsters and political experts had deemed to lose, amazingly roared to a strong and overwhelming victory in the finish.

Frank Williamson of the Staff community, Eastland County Democratic chairman, when queried about the possible outcome of next Tuesday's balloting, remarked: "That'd be stating a whole lot."

At that first non-committal, the county regular Democratic party head, said: "We Democrats will win in Eastland County Tuesday."

He meant, of course, the top party nominees—Gov. Adlai Stevenson for president and the vice presidential nominee, Sen. John Sparkman.

But Williamson, peculiarly, added to his prediction: "I'm not too confident. That's simply my own personal feeling."

Regular or "loyalist" Democrats have done little or no campaigning in Eastland County to date.

Only this week did a group of Ranger Democrats open a downtown headquarters and begin county-wide distribution of literature and campaign material for the Stevenson-Sparkman team.

But underneath all this feverish last-minute activity was a definite undercurrent—an apparent rift in harmony between labor and the white collar elements of the local Democratic party.

That late breach coupled with the prior split between Ranger (or loyalist) and Ike Demos has practically ruptured the party's leadership.

In fact, the fate of the Democratic Party in Eastland County, speaking of it in terms of the top-level candidates, now rests wholly in the hands of the people.

For, actually, the people are the unknown quantity. It is impossible to know—definitely—how the rank and file will vote. Many laborers are expected to go down the line for Stevenson-Sparkman. But there've been some switches in sentiment even among workers since 1948. The story won't be known until the Tuesday balloting are tabulated.

Party organization in the county is shot. Campaign activity on behalf of Gov. Stevenson and his running mate has been practically nil.

This is in sharp contrast to the presidential battle of four years ago when Eastland Countians gave President Truman an avalanche of 5,121 votes to GOP Gov. Thomas E. Dewey's much lesser 1,177.

Over at Cisco, an astute newsman and sharp observer, W. Sifton, editor and publisher of The Cisco Daily Press, told us:

"Lately I've been confused. One day I think it's Stevenson, the next Eisenhower."

(A month ago Sifton leaned strongly toward a Stevenson-Sparkman triumph.)

"Right now, with my tongue in my cheek, I'm inclined to say that Ike will be the winner."

Republican leaders at the Eastland County capital, of course, are confident—overwhelmingly confident. They are certain that Ike is a cinch to carry Eastland County, Texas—and the Nation—Tuesday. They are also confident that the Stevenson-Sparkman team won't carry the solid South which was cracked back in pre-depression 1928 when Catholic Adlai Smith, the Democratic nominee, lost to Republican Herbert Hoover.

And they're mindful of the conclusion that the Ike Democrats of Texas are making toward the victory in the state—and in Eastland County.

"They'll win the election for Ike in Texas," one of them said. "Their activities," another prominent Eastland Republican declared, "is helping to assure a strong two-party system in Texas in the future."

Ray B. McCorkle, another newsman who is editor of The Eastland Telegram, quite naturally credits an Eisenhower win Tuesday. He's county chairman of the area Democrats for Eisenhower re-election.

The Republican nominee, McCorkle said, will poll at least 60 per cent of the votes cast in Eastland County during the general election.

And most of that vote, he predicted, will come from former dyed-in-the-wool Democrats who have been voting 'em straight for years.

From Olden east through Ranger, he concedes, balloters will give a majority to Stevenson.

But—what's going on among the other in-the-majority elements of our population—labor (union heads say seven-eighths of organized labor will vote Democratic), working folks, farmers, small business men and ranchmen?

That's the hard-to-answer, the really double-tough, question to fathom.

And though, on the surface, it appears that Ike will handily win in Eastland County Tuesday—you never can tell.

THREE JAILED AFTER FRIDAY GRID FIGHT

Three Ranger men were arrested and charged with drunkenness, fighting and disturbing the peace as the result of an altercation after the Ranger High-Diamond Hill football game at Bulldog Stadium in Ranger Friday night.

Shortly after the schoolboy grid battle had ended, three Rangerites began a disturbance and assaulted several visiting football fans from Diamond Hill who were on the west side of the playing field.

A few seconds after the disturbance began, however a group of indignant Ranger citizens interceded in behalf of the visiting Fort Worthians, succeeded in quickly stopping the attacks, and a short time later escorted the Ranger instigators of the assaults to Ranger police headquarters at City Hall downtown.

There the three Ranger men—Barton Perry, George Mack Perry and Neil Langford—were immediately arrested and jailed.

Charges of fighting, disturbing the peace and drunkenness were filed in the Ranger Justice of the Peace Court by city officials Saturday morning, Chief of Police W. G. Pounds announced.

The schoolboy grid juggernaut of DeLeon High School virtually clinched the 1952 District 7-A pigskin title at Maverick Stadium in Eastland Friday night when it steam-rolled out a 33-0 win over the Eastland High Mavericks before a crowd of 2,500 fans.

The powerful Bearkat eleven, starting a smashing offense, blazed over into pay dirt twice in the initial quarter, and added touchdowns in the second, third and final cantos to pile up their overwhelming triumph.

Ace backfielder Don Stacey scored a pair of the DeLeon TDs on long, dazzling sprints and hard-driving Curtis Cosby, Stacey's mate in the Bearkat secondary, lunged over the game but out-classed Eastlanders for three touchdowns after power-housing drive had engineered the oval into scoring position.

The underdog Eastlanders were badly outweighed, but a show of statistics of the night game shows that they put up a game fight, offered stiff resistance.

First downs were charged at six and six even. But in the offensive yardage department, the Bearkats held impressive margins of superiority.

The 33-0 debut of Eastland's first conference loss of the year. Prior to last night's encounter they had vanquished Cross Plains and Santa Anna.

Quarterback Van Meroney and James Jackson, other Eastland backfield stars, took lots of punishment along with their other linemen and both were taken from the field on stretchers in the fourth quarter. Their hurt, however, were not unusually serious.

Halloween Is Quiet Affair

Most of them were busy playing football from 7:30 until 9:30, and then they had the midnight show to care for. After that it was just one late to steam up for other activities.

Interest Of Citizens In General Election Is Mounting By Hour; Area May Okay Republican Leader

With presidential balloting due to begin in Eastland County, in Texas and over the nation in little more than 48 hours from now, interest of citizens—men and women, rich and poor, urban and rural dwellers, in all walks of life—is mounting by the hour.

And in Eastland County officials today predicted that 7,000 or more qualified voters may cast votes during Tuesday's general election in the area's 25 voting precincts.

Weather Outlook Encouraging

Although not definite nor implicit, indications are that the weather for election day in this area will be fair. It is not likely that there'll be rain or inclement weather conditions to hamper the county's rural voters from reaching their polls to register their choice.

Observers in this section say that no presidential election in history has aroused such a fervent interest in the electorate of Eastland County.

At stake in Tuesday's balloting will be: (1) The decision on the future course of Texas' Democratic party—whether it'll be controlled by conservative or liberal political powers.

(2) The fate of Texas' highly-prized 24 electoral votes which could, in the event of a close contest, be the deciding factor in the triumph of either of the nominees for the Presidency—Democrat Adlai Stevenson or Republican Dwight D. Eisenhower.

(3) The political future of Gov. Allan Shivers and other Democratic leaders who have switched to support the national Republican ticket.

Always Votes Demo

Eastland County, normally a solid five-to-one Democratic stronghold, is being watched with great interest. Never has Eastland County gone Republican in any presidential election. Despite the fact that Texas as a whole went Republican in the contest of 1928, Eastland Countians gave New York's Alfred E. Smith, the Democratic candidate, a majority over his Republican opponent, Herbert Hoover.

History, of course, could repeat. But Eastland County's decision in this fateful election year of 1952 remained shrouded today in a haze of uncertainty.

The county, despite much local opposition to administration policies of the national Fair Deal four years ago in 1948, voted overwhelmingly in favor of President Harry S. Truman who scored a national upset over Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York, the Republican candidate.

Two Amendments

County officials today were mapping final plans for stinging Tuesday's election which also will determine the fate of two proposed amendments to the State constitution.

One would authorize the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages; and the other would provide for the establishment of a state medical education fund, from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine.

Area Ranchers Meet In Eastland Thursday

About 200 members and guests of the West Texas Ranchers Association are expected to attend a semi-annual meeting at 7:00 p.m. Thursday, November 6th, at the Sig Faircloth Auction Barn in Eastland, President Sam Kimmell of Cisco has announced.

The program feature will be the showing of colored movies by Murray Cox, Radio Station WFAA farm editor. The pictures were taken by Cox on a recent tour of livestock and farm projects in the East and in Canada, on which he conducted about 200 Texans.

The association, which was formed a year ago, has members in five counties—Eastland, Callahan, Stephens, Palo Pinto and Shackelford. A Texas Ranger has been employed full time as a means of stamping out cattle rustling.

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POTPOURRI AND WORSE

Next Tuesday we will go to the polls and select officials for the next two or four years as the case may be. This year we elect a full state—from president to constable, but so far as Texas voters are concerned it is the national ticket they are worried about. 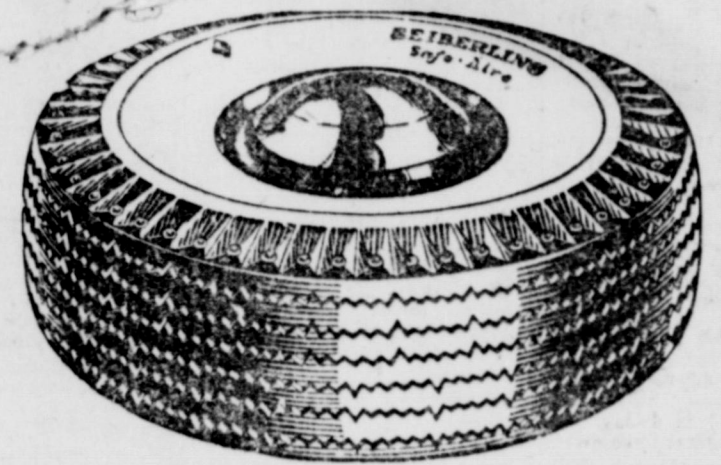

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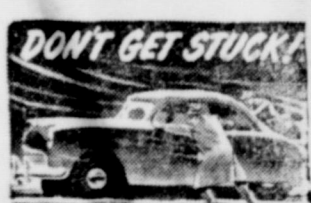

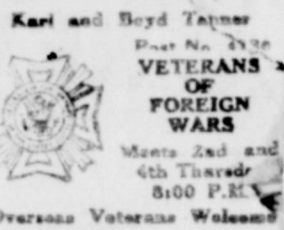

Cattle Growers Oppose Truman-Stevenson Plan

Six former presidents of the 76-year old Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, in a message addressed to all farmers, cattle raisers and feeders in Texas, today blamed the drastic decline in cattle prices on the Truman administration's controls and propaganda which have "undermined confidence and put fear in the cattle industry."

"The Truman administration has worked to lower the prices of your product at every opportunity," the statement said. "There never has been an Administration that has exerted so much political power against the best interests of the cattle raisers and feeders."

The six ex-presidents who issued the statement are Ray Willoughby, San Angelo; Bryant Edwards, Henrieta; C. E. Weymouth, Amarillo; Holman Cartwright, Dinger; Claude M. Can, Victoria, and Jay Taylor, Amarillo.

Recalling the repeated attempts of the Truman administration to impose additional rollbacks and slaughter quotas on cattle, the six ex-presidents stated that price controls are still on cattle even though they are far below ceiling price.

The statement said that the consumer is benefitting very little from the lower cattle prices. "Even though cattle prices have declined drastically," the statement continued, "the price of
