GRANTLAND RICE WILL HEAD SPORTDOM'S ACTIVITIES TO AID BIG ANTI-POLIO CAMPAIGN

Grantland Rice, dean of American sportswriters, again heads national sports drive for MARCH OF DIMES, January 2-31, and urges all sports promoters, athletic directors, graduate managers and everyone connected with sports to lend a helping hand. Bills To Ask Return Rights To Texas

Congressman Omar Burleson, 17th District representative in the U. S. Congress, is going to ask the national legislative body to return to his state some of the rights the Republic of Texas held when it entered the union in 1845.

Representative Burleson of Anson said Thursday that he plans to prepare two bills for introduction shortly after Congress reconvenes in January.

One, he told reporters in Washington, would reaffirm the right of Texas to split itself up into five states. This right was retained by the republic in entering the

Quick Settlement Of ECWSD Land Cases Sought In Hearings

J. A. Fox Asks \$60,000; Final Decision Today

Final disposition, so far as the appraisal commission is concerned, will be announced sometime today, in the hearing of the Eastland County Water Supply District vs. J. A. Fox. The hearing was held Thursday morning, but at the conclusion lawyers indicated that a settlement was in sight, and asked for additional time to work out certain differences.

The commission granted the request, and if an agreement can be reached, no verdict will be rendered. Otherwise, if agreement is not reached today, the Commission may make its ruling.

Fox, who owns a small farm in the Staff community, a major portion of the acreage being in the "lake area", has asked for \$60,000. He claims he will be damaged to this extent. The Water Board feels that the amount is excessive, but has offered to compromise. Just what will be done can not be said at this time. The Water Board will make an offer and Fox may accept or reject it. If he rejects the offer it will then be necessary to appeal, and he will have ten days to make a decision.

Another hearing, scheduled for Thursday, was settled out of court, and other hearings are likely to follow unless a kind of blanket settlement is agreed upon.

In their season opener against the Howard County Junior College Jayhawks here at the Recreation Building Monday night, the Purple & White protégés of Coach Yarborough bowed to the rugged HCJC quintet by an 81-59 count.

And out at Abilene last night the Abilene Christian College Wildkittens spotted the Rangers a 17-8 first quarter lead, then roared to a close 57-52 victory at Bennett Gym.

The RJCR's foes held a slight 25-21 edge at halftime and were out front, 43-37, at the end of the third period.

High pointer for the Purple & White was Dave Anderson, 6 foot 3 inch forward, who racked up 19 points. Runners-up in RJC scoring was Frankie Massey, six-footer, who accounted for 10 of the Rangers' 52 points.

Sau Walden of ACC was high pointer for the foes with a total of 19.

Next contest on the Ranger's cager slate is an encounter with Cisco Junior College next Tuesday night.

PENNEY EMPLOYEES TO GET SPECIAL YEAR-END BONUSES

J. C. Penney Company, nationwide department store organization, announced in New York today that its directors have authorized a special year-end payment for more than 50,000 associates in the Company's 1,629 stores, offices and warehouses throughout the United States.

The payment will be an amount equal to two weeks' pay for all full-time associates who have been employed for the full year 1952, and proportionate amounts for extra and part-time associates and those employed less than a year.

All Penney associates, including employees of the branch J. C. Penney outlets in Ranger and Eastland, will share in the payment except management staff members whose earnings are determined largely by the company's long-standing profit-sharing plan. It will be made December 15 at each associate's December 15 rate of pay.

In a letter to the firm's associates, A. W. Hughes, president, said the payment was based upon the Company's results for 1952. "We are particularly happy to be able to make this payment as a result of what has been accomplished in our 50th anniversary year," he said. "The possibility of future payments of course will continue to depend upon year to year results."

The payment is in addition to the regular Company provisions for associates' benefits, including Sick benefit, Gratuitous Death and Dismemberment benefit, Thrift and Profit-Sharing Retirement plans, discounts on Company purchases and others. It is the sixth to be made since the end of World War II.

French Really Imbibe Wines

Frenchmen don't drink wine today as they did before the war—but they're working on it.

Liquor tax statistics showed the nation downed only 45,000,000 hectoliters (1,188,000,000 U. S. gallons) this year compared to 50,000,000 hectoliters (1,320,000,000 gallons) in 1938.

The tax office noted, however, that it's still a lot more than just after the liberation and a comforting increase over last year's 42,000,000 hectoliters (1,108,800,000 gallons).

The 1952 average Frenchman drank 107 liters (28.25 gallons). Consumption goes up when the wine is good and down when the wine is bad, the tax people said. This year's crop, which will go into next year's statistics, is particularly good.

Nation's Fire-Losses for 1951—

... are way up according to report of National Board of Fire Underwriters just released. Three quarter billion dollars went up in smoke, an increase of 12.3%, and more than 11,000 persons lost their lives. The causes are listed as about the same as previous years with careless use of matches and smoking accounting for 27%. Misuse of electricity, overheated chimneys and flues, lightning, spontaneous combustion and explosions are others in order.

Four Yankees Named To Play On All-Star 9

Announcing its twenty-eighth annual all-star team for the major leagues, The Sporting News, named a stellar squad headed by Robin Roberts of the Phillies and Sam Masial of the Cardinals, who were almost unanimous choices of 191 members of the Baseball Writer's Association.

Roberts, the Phils' 28-game winner, was included in the preferred lineup of 184 writers, drawing one more vote than Masial. Stan the Man was chosen an

all-star for the eighth time, putting him one back of Ted Williams and tied with Joe DiMaggio for the honor of being named most often to the dream team.

Except for a close contest at third base, with George Kell of the Red Sox edging Al Rosen of the Indians, the positions on the roster were filled without real competition. The other players selected for the infield were Ferris Fain, Athletics, first base; Jackie Robinson, Dodgers, second base, and Phil Rizzuto, Yankees, shortstop. With Masial in the outfield, the writers picked Hank Sauer of the Cubs and Mickey Mantle of the Yanks, both of them selected for the first time.

Yogi Berra of the Yankees won the backstop berth, while Roberts' pitching partners were Bobby Shantz of the Athletics and Alie Reynolds of the Yankees. This mound trio accounted for 72 victories, against only 22 losses, and had a collective earned run average of 2.41 for the 1952 campaign.

Excluding the hurlers, the batting average of the team was only .298, reflecting the general decline in hitting in the major leagues and one of the lowest marks for any all-star team since The Sporting News began its selec-

tions. With four Yankees on the squad, the world's champions not only led in all clubs in players chosen, but also helped give the

American League a 7 to 4 superiority over the National League. Last year, the N.L. placed six of the 11.
