## REFLECTIONS FROM LIFE

Usually there are two sides to every thing. We have the right and wrong, black and white, good and bad always two contrasts until we begin dealing in personalities, and here we find three. Many arguments might be ended if contending parties would only realize the truth, and the world would be a lot happier.

After a heated discussion you will hear that "there are two sides to every question." This statement is two-thirds correct, for there are really three sides—your side, my side and the right side, but we find all too many people interested in "their side" rather than the "right" side.

When contending parties are willing to accept the "right side" squabbling usually ceases.

America is described as a Christian nation, yet we have teenning millions of people who are Christian in name only. They do not love God, and have never felt any desire to serve Him. All they want is perfect freedom as they enjoy a life of sin. They have no desire to have their names appear on the Lamb's Book of God, just hope that in some miraculous way God will neglect to enter their name on the list of the damned.

This type person never realizes the comforting power of God until the cold sweat of death begins settling on their brow, and they go into a kind of tail-spin as they plead for mercy. We wouldn't care to say this type cannot be saved, but we would sure hate to risk it. When we know that they have sinned all the days of their life, that they have never taken time out to consider God, and His promises, we can't imagine "conversion"—they are simply scared.

The coldest statement we have ever heard, or maybe read, came from the mouth of our president when a statement acknowledging Stalin's death was sent to the "powers that be" in Russia. It merely mentioned that as a kind of forced state duty America would admit that Stalin is dead. No love, no sympathy, no condolence—just "dry ice." He spoke his own feeling and the feeling of America, and he spoke the truth. No kidding. To have done otherwise would have been treason, and Eisenhower will never be guilty of this.

Why should he have spilled the "milk of human kindness" on Russia when it was neither deserved nor expected?

Concerning Russian people, who are not guilty of crime, he was prayerfully sympathetic. Not because of their loss of Stalin, but rather a prayer for an improved future well being.

People and nations are responsible themselves, when they become degenerates. People around them have nothing to do with it. Russia has never cared to be considered as a nation among nations, but rather has discouraged such a thing. They remain behind the iron curtain as a matter of choice—they erected it. Their deeds are evil, and they have no desire to display them.

This is the reason they are despised by those about them. They have nothing in common with any other nation—not even their satellites.

Russia is not a building nation, but rather a wrecking nation. Her sole aim seems to be that of erasing the name of God from all mankind everywhere. They offer no better, just dispute God's word.

## Dallas Man Is Victim Of Hitchhiker—

# Police Hunt Hijacker

Area and state law enforcement officers were continuing a vigilant lookout Saturday for a hitchhiker who robbed a Dallas motorist of about \$40 in cash and took the Dallasite's vehicle at gunpoint two miles east of Ranger Hill on U. S. Highway 80 around dawn Friday.

Ranger Police Chief W. G. Pounds said late Friday that a "John Doe" warrant had been issued for the arrest of the hitchhiker on a charge of armed robbery. A description of the man was broadcast to all law enforcement agencies—city, county and state—from Ranger police headquarters over the local radio unit.

W. W. Blocker of Dallas, driving a black 1947 Plymouth sedan, was enroute to Abilene when he stopped at the traffic circle west of Fort Worth and picked up a hitchhiker who told the Dallasite he was headed for Abilene.

About two miles east of Ranger Hill, the hitchhiker, described as "well-dressed," pulled a revolver, jammed it into Blocker's side and ordered him to pull off the highway. After taking the Dallas man's billfold which, in addition to \$40, included all of his personal identification papers, driver's license, social security card, etc., the assailant ordered Blocker to get out of the car and then roared away westward.

The missing car was registered in the name of Blocker's wife, Mrs. Margaret Blocker, 4535 Potomac, Dallas.

Blocker walked two miles to the Ranger Hill Cafe and a waitress called the Ranger Police Department.

Police Chief Pounds said the armed robbery and car theft occurred about 5 a.m. Friday.

Early Saturday there were no further reports regarding the wanted fugitive.

The man sought by officers is described as about 5 feet 9 inches tall, dark complexioned with dark hair. He was wearing a navy blue serge suit and a white shirt but no hat.

## Double Service Of Naval Medics Now Questioned

It has been brought to the attention of the American Legion, of which the Dulin-Daniels Post No. 70 in Eastland, is a part, that an injustice is being done to their friends and buddies. The Legion has been shown that during World War II, twenty-two Naval medical officers were ordered overseas in the Pacific for completion of internship at a navy hospital.

Because of the wording of the present so-called "Doctor Draft Act" these men are not given credit for their overseas time for purposes of recall or obligated duty in service.

The Legion contends that "Laws are made by men, and unjust laws can be corrected by real Americans."

Only this week Dr. Jas. C. Whittington was recalled for active service, yet he spent some 19 months in the Pacific during World War II, and several months in the States. He lacked only a few weeks of serving a full 2-year enlistment when he was given his discharge, yet under the new ruling he has been recalled and will enter Uncle Sam's service in a naval hospital in Corpus Christi today.

This, it is said, means double service.

ests—E. P. Hubble of the University of California, R. A. Alpher and R. C. Hermer of Johns Hopkins university, and B. J. Bok and P. L. Whipple of Harvard university — there was a time when

there were no matter in the universe, only blazing energy.

"The cosmic theory of these scientists declares that the universe was born in the space of a few minutes by an act of creation. How like Genesis 1:3, 'And God said let there be light!'

"The widely acclaimed expansion

ing universe of Doctor Hubble and associates suggests that there was a time when all the stars were packed into a much smaller space. The temperature of such a system would be so terrific that no matter could exist. The astrophysicist pictures the universe at this stage as made up only of closely packed neutrons. No matter, only blazing energy. 'And the evening and the morning were the first day.'

**The Second Day of Creation**

"Then the universe began to expand. The driving force behind the liberated energy was so terrific that within a matter of minutes the outermost neutrons had traveled billions of miles. This rapid expansion caused a drop in temperature. Conditions were now ripe for the creation of matter, or the firmament, as the account in Genesis is interpreted.

Elements which do not explode spontaneously like radium can be shown to contain helium nuclei also when placed in such modern atom-smashing machines as a cyclotron or a nuclear pile.

**"Dope Peddling" In Texas Must Be Abolished; Druggists Interested**

The control of "dope peddling" in Texas is in sight if 3000 members of the Texas Pharmaceutical Association have anything to say about it, according to a statement today by Thurman Gholston of Amarillo, TPA president.

Gholston announced today that the entire weight of his organization was being placed in support of narcotic legislation pending before the 53rd Texas Legislature.

"The druggists of Texas," the TPA president stated, "have long been aware of the serious problem of illicit traffic of narcotics within the state, especially in our large cities, and we feel that it is about time we have a law giving the state's law enforcement officers the power to prosecute unscrupulous 'dope peddlers' who prey on our youth and children, and put them in the penitentiary where they belong."

Gholston strongly recommends passage by both houses of the legislature of House Bill 71 and House Bill 44.

House Bill 71 amends the present Uniform Narcotic Drug Act, states Gholston, and closely follows the federal law, the Harrison Act of 1916, in setting up regulatory measures that are workable regarding narcotics. "The new law, if enacted," he said, "has some teeth in it and provides for severe penalties for offenders, especially those who sell to or utilize minors in the illegal traffic of narcotics."

"The druggists of Texas," Gholston continued, "are likewise deeply interested in House Bill

**Clue To Origin Of Viruses Is Found**

BERKLEY, Calif. — A clue as to how some virus diseases may originate has been suggested by findings of two University of California bacteriologists.

Dr. A. P. Krueger and Doris J. Ralston, a research fellow, discovered that when phages—viruses which prey on bacteria—passed from one host to another, they showed a tendency to mutate into new strains.

Such mutation could create a deadly virus out of a harmless strain, or vice versa.

Krueger said, however, that he has no evidence as yet that the host influences other types of virus than the staphylococcus phage with which he experimented.

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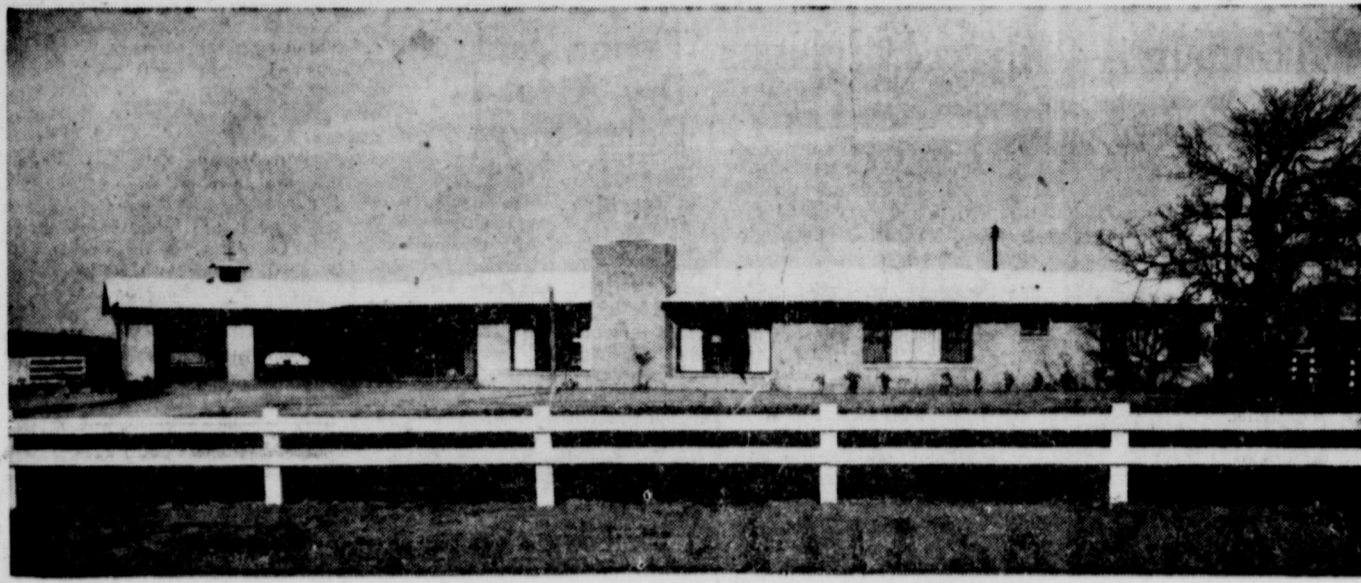

The ranch-styled home of the Homer Williamses is built on a wide angle U pattern with the living room forming the base. One of the outstanding features of the home are the walls of panels of glass, extending almost from floor to beamed ceiling.

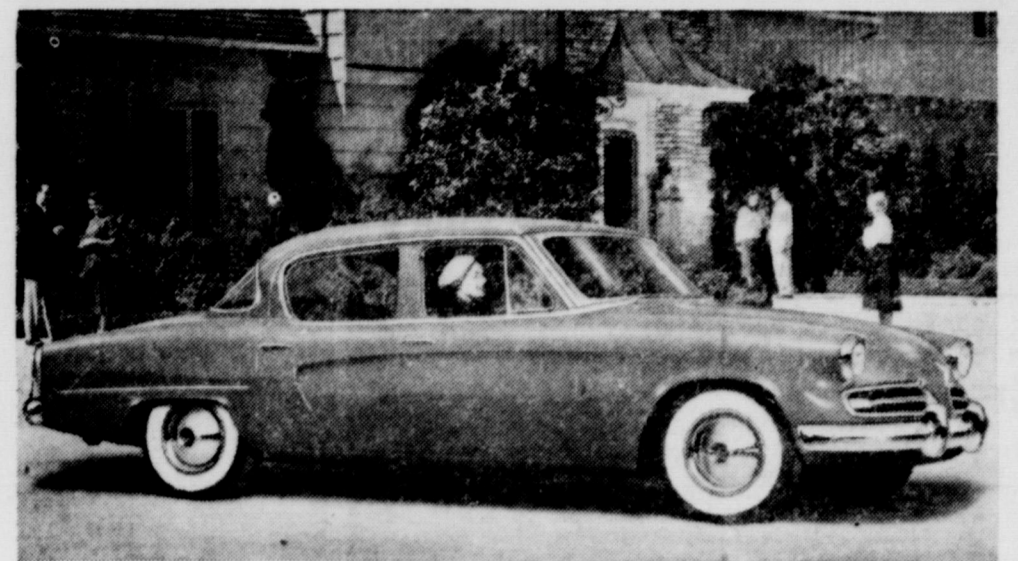

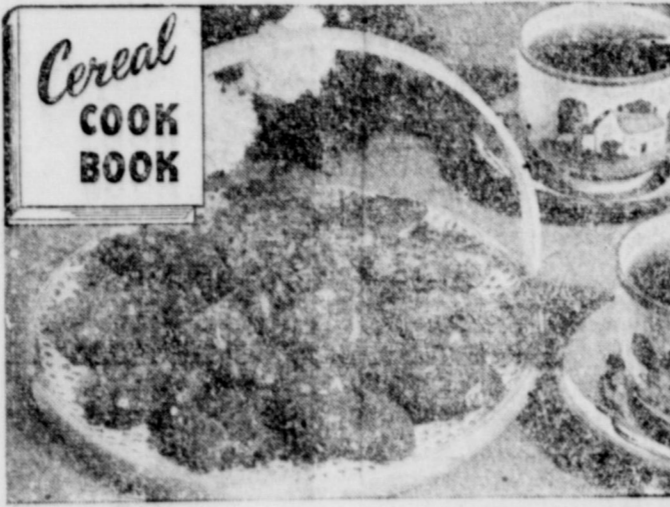
South Ward.

Especially during the Lenten season, when the nutrients consumed should be so carefully watched, do cereals make planning easier for you. Use them to coat fish for frying, use them to top casseroles, for making pie crusts, muffins, and breads.

This is one of many recipes which affords you the opportunity to use nutritious and thrifty breakfast cereals as an ingredient.

- Oatmeal Apple Surprises**
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
  - 1 cup sugar
  - 1 egg
  - 1 1/2 cups sifted flour
  - 1 teaspoon baking powder
  - 1/2 teaspoon soda
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - 1 teaspoon cinnamon
  - 1/4 teaspoon cloves
  - 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
  - 2 tablespoons cocoa
  - 1 cup rolled oats, uncooked
  - 1 1/4 cups ground raw apples
  - 1/2 cup raisins
  - 1/2 cup chopped walnuts
- Cream butter or margarine until soft; add sugar and continue creaming until light and fluffy. Add egg and beat well. Sift dry ingredients, add to first mixture alternately with ground apples. (Apples should be put through food chopper using medium blade.) Add rolled oats, raisins, and nuts. Mix well. Cover bowl and chill 1 hour. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto greased cookie sheet. Bake in moderate oven (375°F.) 12 to 15 minutes. Yield: 4 dozen cookies.
