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## Americans Spend Third Of Their Time Working For Tax Collectors; National Budget Must Be Reduced

In 1953, Americans won't start working for themselves until April 22.

All wages, salaries, rents, interests and dividends received up to that date will be gobbled up by taxes.

Altogether, levies by federal, state, and local governments will total about \$90 billion, or 30 per cent of the national income, according to the U. S. Treasury and the Department of Commerce.

Which is another way of saying that citizens will work for the tax collectors during the whole first third of this year. This startling disclosure is contained in TAX FACTS, published by the Finance Department of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

The Chamber is convinced that take-home pay can be increased if government spending is wise and efficient. Recently, its board of directors recommended a limit on federal spending of \$68 billion as "both necessary and possible" in fiscal 1954.

An analysis by the Chamber's staff on government expenditures shows that the \$68 billion budget could be attained provided that, on the whole, no government agency is given more money to spend in fiscal 1954 than the lowest figure for expenditures of 1952 (actual) or 1953 and 1954 (estimated). Some agencies might justify more a few, less.

To reach that \$68 billion figure the Chamber's staff checked expenditures, actual or estimated, for every major federal activity in those years against the requests for 1954. The total of the differences reached \$10 billion, which, subtracted from the \$78 billion total 1954 requests, leaves \$68 billion.

That is roughly \$10 billion less than the outgoing President asked. The staff found instances after instances where the request for 1954 ran way ahead of the lowest

expenditure, actual or estimated, for the three years checked. Which of course, helps to account for the whopping \$78.6 billion estimated expenditures for 1954.

For example, consider the item "direction and coordination of defense," a function of the office of Secretary of Defense and the joint chiefs of staff.

In fiscal 1952, the expenditure was \$60 million. The mid-year estimate for 1953, the current fiscal year, was \$48 million. Yet the request for 1954 is \$92 million. That is a difference of \$32 million between 1953 and 1954.

surplus from carry-over from previous years can be spent without new Congressional approval. The Chamber believes that expenditure of surplus carry-over funds should be justified before Congress just as are requests for new money. If that were done, vast sums might be saved the taxpayers.

Let's see what the carry-over picture for 1954 looks like. The Truman budget recommends new appropriations of \$72.9 billion. Only \$41 billion of this is to be spent in 1954—the remainder to be carried over to future years.

But added to the \$41 million of proposed new money to be spent in 1954 is \$37.6 billion carried over from prior years. This means that \$78.6 billion in cash will come out of the Treasury in 1954 if the budget is approved as submitted. It means too, a deficit of \$9.9 billion.

One of the major opportunities to slice off that deficit will be to reduce those funds carried over from prior years. But that will mean careful review by Congress to be sure that every cent is still needed.

In this connection, Sen. Harry Byrd (D., Va.) chairman of the Joint Congressional Committee on Reduction of Nonessential Federal Expenditures, said:

"In my judgment, one of the most important obligations of the new Congress is to review the un-

expanded balances of previous appropriations to each agency of the Federal government before new appropriations are made. It should be made incumbent upon each agency fully to justify any additional appropriations when huge balances are already available."

Of course, before Congress can give the federal budget the really careful combing it needs, both Senate and House appropriations committees will have to be better staffed.

The President's Bureau of the Budget has a staff of more than 500. In contrast, the two appropriations committees, with all their responsibility to the taxpayers, are staffed with a mere handful of employees, most of whom are necessarily limited to clerical duties.

Cutting government budgets is not easy. Put it can be done. The Chamber is convinced the new Administration and Congress are determined to do their best.

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### Hatching Test Gets Results

The Chief Aquatic Biologist of the Game and Fish Commission reports that Texas' own exclusive temperature controlled bass hatchery pond is operating satisfactorily.

He said the experimental tank at the San Marcos State Fish Hatchery already has produced an initial batch of 420,600 fry which have been placed in Marble Falls and Granite Shoals Lakes in the Highland Lakes chain.

This is at least six weeks early for fry large enough to be planted to be produced by the San Marcos hatchery.

The only other state hatchery producing planting size bass fry at this time is at Brownsville, in the semi-tropical Mexican border climate.

The Chief Aquatic Biologist said the timeliness of the experiment was present, including Sam Gamble, Eastland's friend and neighbor.

"To meet our obligations for roads, teacher pay, old age pen-

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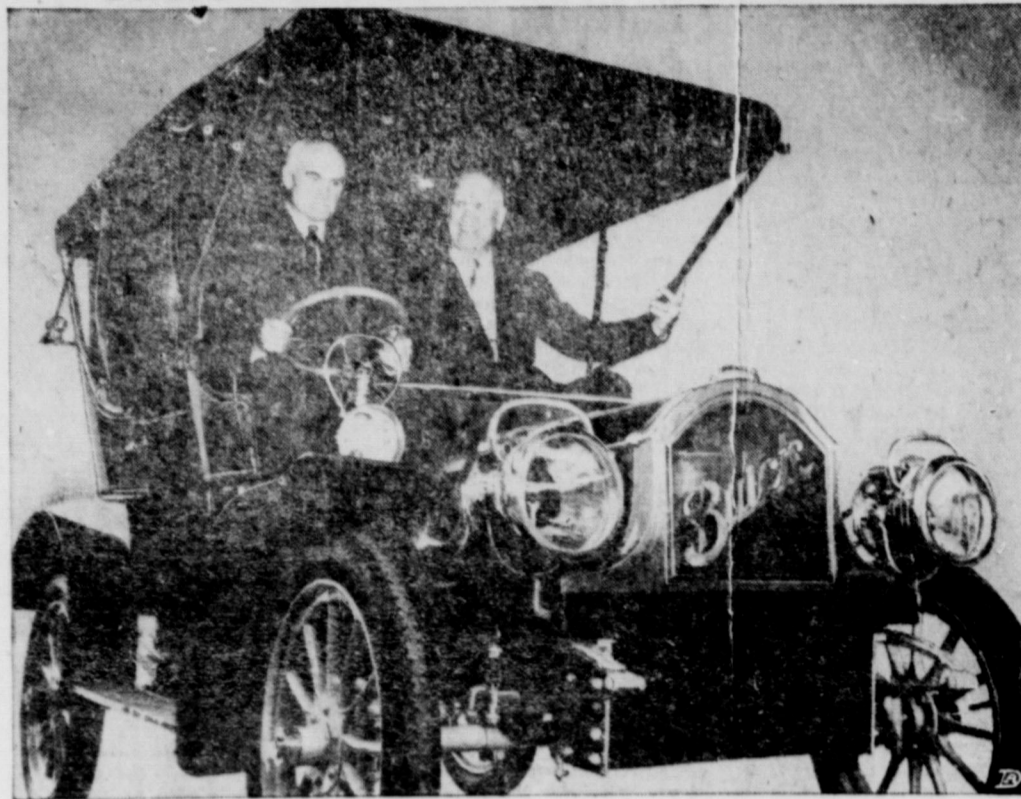

### White Hybrid Corn Has Yield Yellow Variety

L. J. Gundy, Agronomist of the Texas Research Foundation, revealed here while addressing San Marcos Rotarians, that H. Conrads, the widely known local seed breeder and hybrid seed grower, had been selected to commercially grow the seed for the Foundation's new white Texas corn hybrid known as "TRF 3". Seed will be available to farmers for the 1954 planting.

Gundy stated that this new white hybrid had been under development by the Foundation since 1944 on its experimental farms at Renner, Collin County, in north Texas. It is, he added, the first white Texas hybrid ever to equal the leading yellow Texas hybrids in yield, which it did in the 1952 official growing tests, covering what is described by A&M authorities as the "principal corn growing area of the State," comprising some 28 big corn producing counties in north Texas.

The Texas Research Foundation official explained that an ample supply of white Texas corn is so extremely important to millers and cereal manufacturers that it was they who persuaded the Foundation in 1944 to start development of a new white hybrid of greater grain size and higher starch content. "TRF 3" is the result of this 1944 beginning, says Gundy, and fills the need for a heavy yielding, fast growing, white Texas hybrid, of extra milling quality.

### Making Your Own Will Is Usually A Simple Matter

Making your own will is simple and, done properly, will make a fight over your property unnecessary. That's the advice of Albert Woodruff Fray, New York attorney, in "February Farm and Ranch."

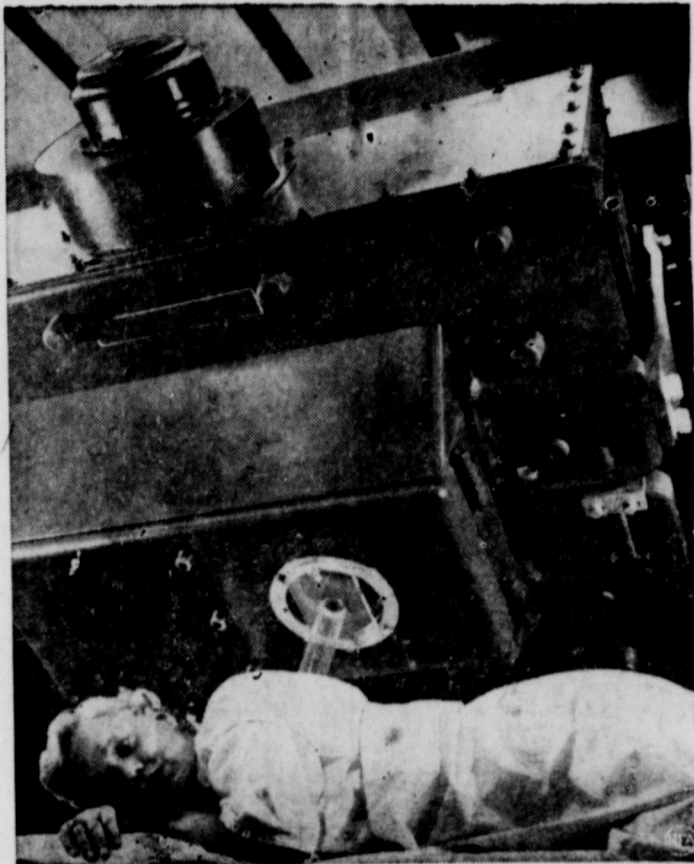
"Anyone 21 years or older can make a simple will for the disposal of his property at death," the lawyer says.

Although newspapers report court contests over wills, such controversies are rare, according to Fray. For one legal battle over a will, thousands of wills are accepted as valid without question, he says.

Gray presents the form of a simple will adapted for use in any state, and recommends these steps in preparing it:

1. Decide to whom you wish your property, money, land, or other possessions to go after your death. List the name, address, or relationship of each and the amount of money or description of property you would give each. Should you wish to leave money to a church or charity, get legal advice. Some states limit the amount or manner in which money or property can be left to churches, hospitals and like institutions.
2. Make some bequest, no matter how small, to each of your children, to any child who might be born after your death, and to your wife or husband.
3. Name a "residuary legatee" to receive property left after the amounts for which you have made specific provision are paid.
4. Name for executor someone in whom you have confidence—wife, husband, son, daughter, friend, or a bank. Use your discretion as to whether you wish your executor to file a bond as security for his or her honesty.
5. Ask three acquaintances or friends who will not receive any money or property under your will to be witnesses.
6. When the will has been completed, give it to your executor.

hailed President Eisenhower's first moves to de-regiment wages and prices.

The Chamber of Commerce of the United States and other business organizations have contended that the government should steer clear of direct controls in its efforts to combat inflation, particularly in periods of comparatively normal business relations.

They claim it has been shown conclusively that the natural law of supply and demand can work efficiently in the present period because the nation has been able to meet the needs for increased defense production while raising the consumption of civilian goods.

Business economists argue that government price decrees—except in situations where there are drastic shortages—are bound to upset the normal interrelation of supply and demand in the open market. They claim the result brings into play unnatural economic forces which could end in rationing and blackmarkets.

The problem has been illustrated for the Chamber's new economic study program in a pamphlet entitled, "Demand, Supply and Prices."

The example supposes a free market equilibrium price of 75 cents for a dozen eggs and assumes that 1,000 dozens are sold each day. It then suggests that by law a ceiling of 65 cents a dozen is placed on the eggs. At that price, the owners of only 900 dozens want to sell. Some farmers reduce their egg production. High cost producers—farmers who need 75 cents to make any kind of a profit on their eggs—drop out of the market.

At the same time, there is an upsurge in demand because of the 65-cent price. People who do not feed they can afford as many eggs at 75 cents a dozen, are willing to buy at 65 cents. Now 1,100 dozens are wanted. The supply is

dropping as the demand climbs. So what happens? Before long, there is a shortage of eggs, a blackmarket and perhaps an elaborate system of egg rationing by the government.

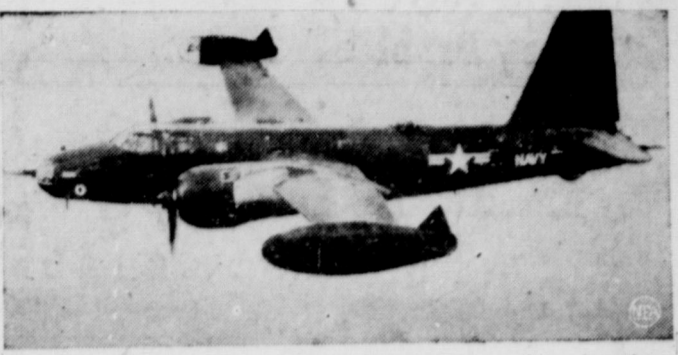
By the same token, if the government places a price of 85 cents on the eggs, the demand falls off to 900 dozens while the supply increases to 1,100 dozens.

At the higher price, production becomes more profitable and more and more farmers go into the egg business. The result of this is a surplus. So the government is forced to move in and artificially stimulate demand through school lunch program, foreign aid buying and storage measures.

The President's action, which lifted some controls of this type, was taken under his own executive powers. Congressional authority for price and wage restrictions expires on April 30 and the administration has not asked for their extension even on a stand-by basis.

Most business men are opposed to a stand-by control program under which a temporary agency would be established. They point out that any stand-by organization would, of necessity, have to be staffed with less efficient personnel because competent workers would not seek employment in a limited, emergency bureau.

In such a situation, the stand-by personnel would advance to positions of authority and complicate the efficient operation of the contingent organization if it was

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### More Room For Beef Animals Cuts Coccidiosis

Beef producers who want to avoid coccidiosis troubles and get more profitable gains may simply need to give their young animals more room, a spokesman for the American Foundation for Animal Health reported today.

The Foundation cited the fact that calves have much less coccidiosis infection on the range where they have lots of room.

"Crowding the animals into small lots or pastures increases the danger," the report said. "Small feedlots become quickly contaminated and cattle can become severely infected."

The cause of coccidiosis is a tiny parasite similar to the one which infects chickens. However, the disease cannot be transmitted from chickens to cattle, nor can chickens get it from cattle.

The Foundation said farmers should be alert for such coccidiosis symptoms as weakness, scours and loss of weight. Calves coming down with this disease may also have a rough hair coat, drooping ears and sunken eyes.

Feedlots should be cleaned as often as possible to avoid trouble. Elevated feed and water containers, designed to prevent contamination, should be used because coccidiosis usually is spread by dirty feed and water.

The Foundation said prompt diagnosis is important. Herd treatment by a veterinarian will protect the rest of the calves and may help cattle already showing symptoms of the trouble.

**IT'S THE LAW in Texas**  
A Public Reading from the Statute Book of Texas

Made your will? If not, the State of Texas may wind up as owner of your estate upon your death. Under our statutes, the estate of persons having no heirs who die intestate revert, or "escheat," to the State.

Such provisions have been carried over from the English common law. There, under such circumstances, the estate escheated to the British crown. The theory of the process is that the sovereign (or State), having been the original owner of all lands before they were parcelled out to individuals, is entitled to a return of such lands when the possibilities of legal inheritance have been exhausted.

This idea has been expanded to include personal property as well as real estate. It also applies in the case of a person absent for a term of seven years and not known to exist who leaves no heirs and no will.

Presumably, there is hardly a person who does not have some individual or charity that he would prefer to have his estate, rather than have it go to the State by default, so to speak. Yet, surprisingly, estates worth many thousands of dollars do escheat to the various states from time to time.

Now, before you shrug the matter off with the idea that these statutory provisions could not possibly apply to you, better think a minute. Suppose you and your spouse have no heirs besides each other and your children. Many people do fall into this category.

In event of a catastrophe resulting in death for you and your entire immediate family, no legal heirs would remain. Therefore if you had no will, your property would go to the State. In preparing a will, it is possible to provide for such an eventuality.

In this hypothetical case, you would probably want to designate some friend as executor, to take

care of all necessary arrangements and then distribute the estate according to your wishes.

On the other hand, if you have plenty of possible heirs, a will could be used to designate which of the shall participate in the division of the estate. And, even if you wish your property to be distributed entirely in accordance with our statutes as explained in previous columns, a will can perform useful functions. Among other uses, a will could provide for an orderly and economical partition of your property, preventing any waste of the assets by heirs impatient of settlement.

What happens to property which escheats to the State? Following certain required legal formalities and court proceedings, all escheated lands are set apart to the Permanent Free School Fund of the State, and may be leased and sold by the Land Commissioner under certain regulations. Escheated personal property is sold by the local sheriff under a court writ and the money received therefrom paid into the State Treasury.
