ough for Me." Anything that has been added to pure dress, and while God most likely will not send us to hell for it, He most certainly must disapprove.

In the last chapter of Matthew we are told to go into all the world and preach the gospel. He told us to teach people to observe all things "whatsoever I have commanded you." But while delivering this Great Commission Christ didn't say a word about "gathering in the Goli." We realize it takes some money, quite a little, to keep missionaries on the field, but we feel there is a trend today where the horse is following the cart—we turn too much attention to our financial statistics and not enough to the spreading of the gospel. People won't like this statement, but it is true just as sure as God lives. And if God is with us we are not going to worry about what people say or think.

A man asked us a day or so ago, why we didn't quit our church if we were not in harmony with its program, and it took us less than 60 seconds to tell him that we are completely in harmony with its principles and teaching—that we couldn't be anything but what we are now, but that some of this modernist trend needs to be swept out of the back door, and we plan to stay and help to do the sweeping. We shall never go out and throw rocks, but stay on the inside and try to teach others that we should watch as well as pray. If modernism creeps in, we would like to serve on the committee to throw it out. After all it is God's church, and we are put here to care for it.

Several letters have been received from people back home regarding the so-called McCarren-Walter Immigration Act. The measure was passed in the last Congress. The general purpose was a strengthening of the immigration laws and restricting the admission of undesirable.

I supported the measure wholeheartedly and do not favor its repeal. The so-called "liberal" and "do-gooder" groups are opposed to the law, and they have put out a lot of propaganda against it which has influenced many good people to believe it is bad. If anything, I favor strengthening it more.

Another matter of interest to a great many people is the method of appointing postmasters and rural letter carriers. Until the change in the administration, it was my responsibility to recommend persons to these positions. Since the change in the administration, naturally are party in power reserves this privilege which is commonly referred to as "patronage."

Those interested in such positions when they become vacant must either qualify on a Civil Service examination or be transferred from a position they hold under Civil Service if their status permits.

As vacancies occur in these positions, it is suggested that anyone interested contact the County Republican Chairman as to the method to be used in filling the vacancy. It should be known that the person in position to make recommendations has considerable limitations to his actions. In other words, he cannot simply go out on the street and touch a man on the shoulder and say he is "it."

Neither had the Congressman any such latitude in the past. The Civil Service Commission gives an examination for these positions. Regardless of the number who participate in the examination, only three can qualify. From these three, a recommendation can be made, but even so, there are limitations in connection with provisions of law favoring veterans. It should also be said that neither the Congressman nor, as the case is now, the Republican County Chairman, has anything to do with the examination or the grading of papers by the Civil Service Commission. If this were not true, there would be no need to hold an examination.

It is my hope that this brief explanation may be of help to the Republican County Chairman, who I understand will have this responsibility from now on.

Hunter Deaths Show Decrease

The Chief Clerk of the Game and Fish Commission said that an incomplete tabulation of accident reports from the last hunting season indicates a sharp drop in casualties.

He emphasized that this occurred in the face of a record number of hunting licenses issued, and suggested safety measures might be responsible.

The Chief Clerk said tabulations from gunfire compared to thirty to date show only fifteen deaths for the previous year. He explained that this total doubtless will be increased by belated statistics from the state's 254 counties.

Significantly, according to the Chief Clerk, the present reports include the killing of only one person when mistaken for wild game. And this happened before the legal season opened.

The Chief Clerk said principal causes of fatalities last fall were the old mistakes. One man died when he pulled his shotgun, muzzle first, through a barbed wire fence. Another died when he pulled his shotgun, muzzle first, toward him in a duck boat. Another killed himself while using a gun to dispatch a crippled duck. Another was fatally shot by his own rifle when he stumbled and fell while chasing a wounded deer. One

man killed himself while hunting rabbits when the trigger of his cocked gun caught in some brush. A dove hunter suffered the same fate.

Curbing Dogs Is Suggested

The Executive Secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission suggested that Texans try to restrain their dogs for the next few weeks while wildlife concentrates on its young.

He said that roaming dogs often

cause great damage to birds and animals in the spring of the year. "Even house pets like to stray when spring comes," the Executive Secretary observed. "And they invariably get into the woods and brush and sniff out the birds and beasts when they should not be bothered."

"Game birds flushed from their nest during certain stages of incubation may not return to their eggs. Some dogs eat the eggs or destroy the nests. Maudling dogs, especially when they gather in packs, can create great harm when they press pursuit of a doe

deer carrying her fawn. They are definitely harmful when they chase newly born fawns."

He said that cooperation by dog owners now will mean a better break for wildlife and naturally a break for the hunter when harvest time rolls around next fall.

In case you've forgotten, a star border is an individual that eats more than he pays for. There are many of them in chicken yards, dairy stalls and pig pens. A check of their records will point them out.

Hens that do not lay more than ten dozen eggs in a year are "boarders" that do not pay for their keep. "An egg a day will keep the axe away," should be sufficient warning. Cows that won't give two gallons of milk a day or 5,000 pounds a year are not worth their keep. Runt pigs making poor gains are "boarders". Here are good places to reduce the inventory.
