College Prof Seeks Dignity For Law Office

Versatile Robert E. Stockdale took over as sheriff of Portage County, Ohio, the first of the year with the idea of revitalizing the office.
The stocky, 36-year-old World War II Marine Corps veteran ran on a reform ticket, as a Republican—although he was shunned by the party regulars—and resigned his job as assistant professor of speech at Kent State University when elected.

Stockdale, who has worked with "good-government" groups for several years, explained his venture into politics as a desire to "raise the level and dignity of this county office to the prestige it should command."

"I have no political ambitions. . . . And I don't intend to make the job of sheriff a career," he added.

Stockdale is also a lay preacher for the Methodist Church and intends to hold the post until a permanent replacement can be had.

3-City Commuter Runs Up Mileage

A Louisville, Ky., resident, who

works in Pittsburgh and New York City, is believed to be Pittsburgh's No. 1 "commuter."
Theodore E. Mueller, president of American Radiator and Standard Sanitary Corp., has traveled millions of miles by railroad on his jaunts between the three cities.
Mueller's schedule goes like this:

Sunday night he leaves by train from Louisville to Pittsburgh and arrives there Monday morning. He stays until Thursday night when he departs by train for home 15 miles from Louisville.

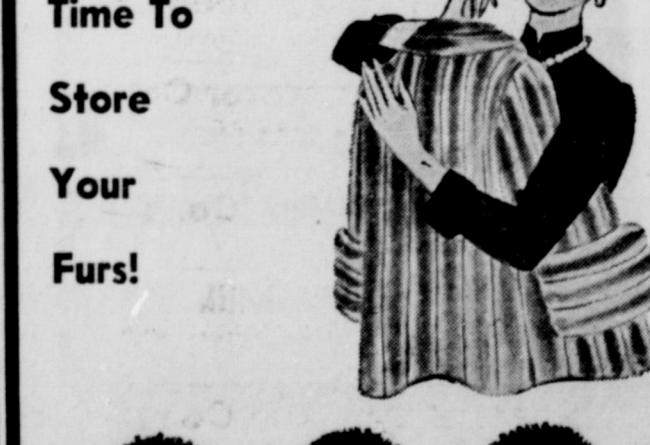
