Insecticides Help Stop Leaf Roller

Thanks to some recently introduced insecticides, fruit-growers are gaining the upper hand in their war on the red-banded leaf roller, which is a major pest in many orchards.

DDD as the best antidote in combating the insect, but parathion and EPN also have produced good results.

The soil scientists advise spraying orchards about 10 days after bloom to control the first brood and another dose in late July or early August to exterminate the second brood.

### Farmers Falsely Blamed For High Prices For Food

Farmers are being falsely blamed for high food prices and indulging in "get-rich-quick" schemes at the expense of consumers, J. Walter Hammond, president of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, declared this week.

The state farm leader referred to an announcement by W. B. Bein of Dallas, marketing administrator for the North Texas milk area, as an example of what often happens in the case of food prices. The announcement appeared in the April 8th edition of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

Bain reported that milk producers in North Texas will get 44 cents less per hundred weight for Class 1 milk in April than they received last month. The newspaper report stated that the April price of \$5.85 was down 77 cents, or about 1 1/2 cents less per quart, from the February price; yet, there has been no reduction in the price paid by consumers.

"This is an excellent example of what is happening to the farmer's share of the consumer's dollar," Hammond said.

"Farm prices have tumbled, but the retail prices are staying up." The Farm Bureau president pointed out that retail prices do not reflect accurately the farmer's share of the food dollar.

graduates, now underway, says that while demand is hitting another peak, the class of '53 is definitely smaller than last year, and 75 to 90 per cent of the males are eligible for military service. So "Corporation employment scouts have come to the campus still earlier this year, and are more desperate," is the way a southern university placement official sums up the situation.

In an attack on the engineering personnel shortage from another flank, many large companies are re-surveying their requirements for certain borderline technical

jobs for which they have formerly demanded engineering degree men in an effort to shift some of the work to non-technical graduates, the report says.

The recent elimination of wage and salary ceilings by the government has enabled various large companies to boost their starting salary offers, average levels for the June class of '53 will probably be 5 to 10 per cent better than last year, the report says. This means around \$209 to \$325 a month for business and liberal arts graduates, and \$325 to \$375 for engineering bachelors on a

40-hour basis; many companies work a 44-or 48-hour week and pay more in proportion.

Large employers are interviewing men regardless of military status, the survey finds; some go as far as to say it makes no difference whether the man can start work

before or after his term of service. Smaller concerns, however, filling only a few openings, seek draft-exempt men.

### Seek Opinions CIO Members

CLEVELAND, O. — Some labor unions have been attacked for being undemocratic, but the CIO Oil Workers' Union is giving its members a chance to let off steam in a scientific way.

Thousands of OWU members in Ohio, Kentucky, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin and Kentucky have been asked to fill in a 70-point questionnaire on all phases of their union — its procedures, officers, contracts, and the like.

No one need sign his name to the questionnaires which will be turned over to the University of Chicago's Industrial Relations' Center for analysis.

"This is the first time in history that an important labor union and a university have cooperated to give rank-and-file members a chance to express their opinions confidentially and to receive a scientific analysis of those opinions," said Warner Bloomberg, Jr., who is directing the poll for the university.

OWU officers call the survey an unusual experiment in union democracy and plan to extend the investigation throughout their union after the present sampling has been completed in about a year.

"This is a real grassroots affair," said Carl J. Peterson, president of Local 395 here. "When the results are analyzed and sent back to us,

every member will receive a printed copy."

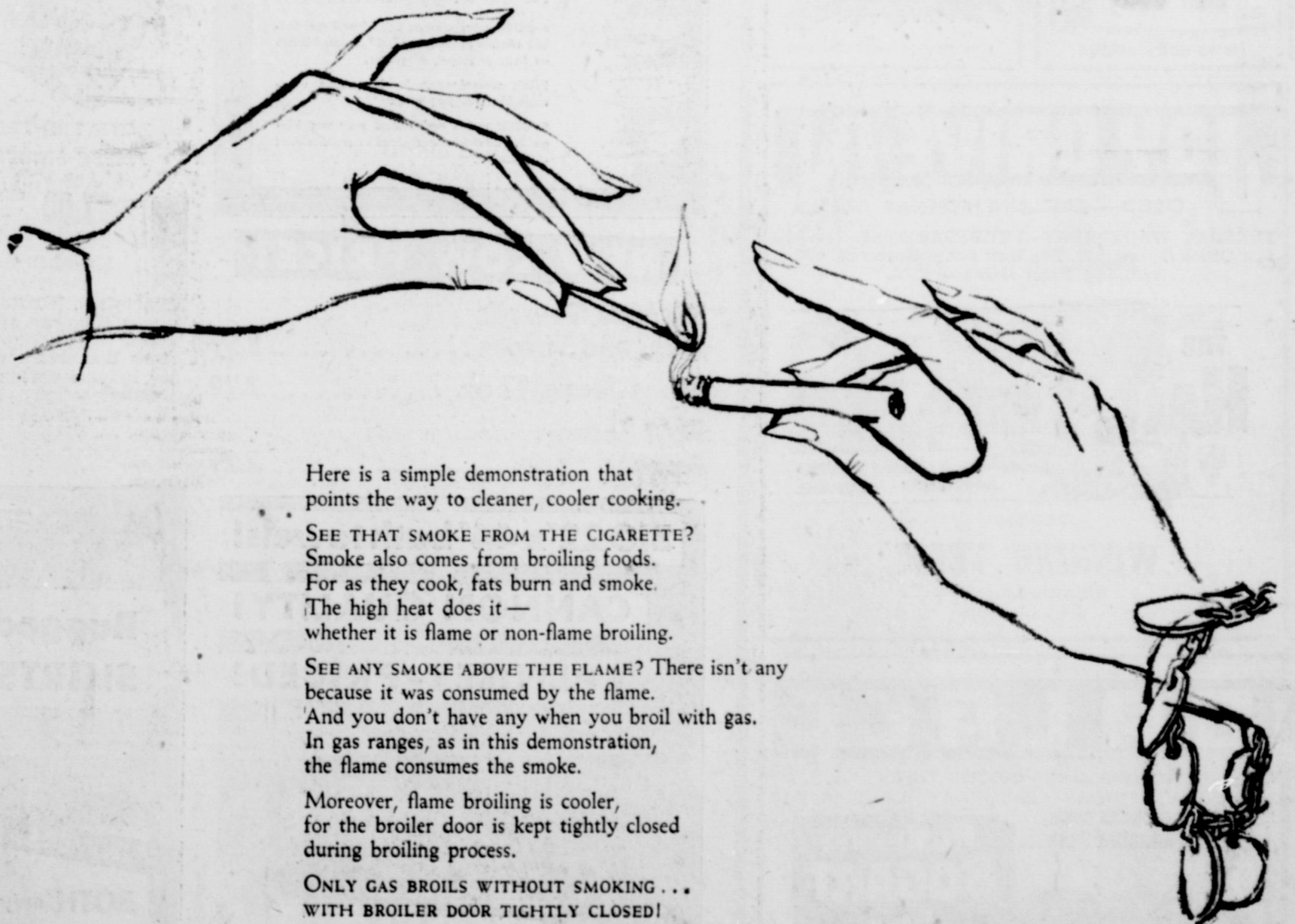
