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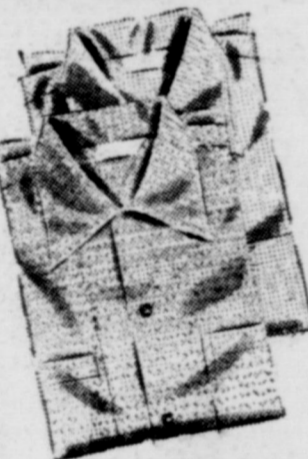

and the windows were up. The windshield on the driver's side had burst or been broken. There was "an odor of gasoline," he said.

On the rear floorboards lay Campbell's body. His pockets were empty of billfold, money or identification of any kind. There was "a large amount of blood on the floorboard," said Morgan.

Fire Capt. L. M. Moore, chief investigator for the fire department, arrived a few moments later, he testified. He said Campbell had blood on both sides of his face. Captain Moore said he removed Campbell's clothing at Parkland Hospital, and that the clothes smelled of gasoline, too.

James Savage, medical student, testified he performed an autopsy on the body that same night, and found evidence that three bullets had entered Campbell's head. (Captain Fritz later identified them as .25-caliber automatic pistol bullets.) One had entered through the left ear and penetrated into the right lobe of the brain; another was removed from between the first vertebra and the base of the skull.

Another slug evidently had torn into Campbell's left jaw, knocking out several teeth and lacerating the tongue. The cartridge's copper jacket was found partially embedded in the tongue. An X-ray picture taken later, said Savage, indicated that the lead slug lodged in the neck, behind the mouth.

Campbell's body had fourth degree burns (tissue charred) on part of the face and hands, said Savage. The legs also were badly burned.

Al E. Russ Jr., former district representative of the Pacific Finance Company, testified he had given Campbell two delinquent

Picnic Groups Warned About Plant Poisons

In the spring a young man's fancy lightly turns—if it's to picnics, let's hope a case of poison ivy or poison oak won't be the consequences.

Wise picnickers choose a spot free from underbrush. Even so, some, perhaps wearing shorts, may wander through fields of woods containing poison ivy or other annoying plants. They should shower or bathe with plenty of soap and hot water right after being exposed, being careful not to let clothes that touched the plants rub against the skin. Rubbing alcohol or a soothing lotion may ease itching. In severe cases, however, medical care may be needed.

Another annoying feature of weeds and brush is that ticks and other insects may lurk there. Certain ticks may carry Rocky Mountain ticks may carry Rocky Mountain fever; it may cause death. For this reason the following method of removing ticks is recommended: Applying ether, chloroform, or acetone to the insect or carefully holding a lighted cigarette near it may cause it to loosen its hold. Otherwise, tweezers should be used, grasping the tick as close as possible to the point of attachment and pulling gently to keep from leaving the mouth parts embedded in the skin. Every effort should be made to keep from crushing the tick thereby getting its contents into the bite. Once the insect has been removed, use soap and water on the area where it was attached.

For a bee or wasp sting, a paste made with baking soda and water can be applied after the "stinger" is removed. Victims of large numbers of bee or wasp stings may suffer terrible pain and be very ill.

Ordinary Citizens Must Be Alert, Else Fishing and Camping Rights On Lakes and Streams May Vanish

A dangerous threat to the right of ordinary Texas citizens to fish, camp and picnic on lakes around streams, is seen in an apparently developed trend of the present Legislature to eliminate the right of eminent domain in all new legislation creating new Water Districts.

Sounding the alarm for the pole fishermen and the city fathers and mothers who want to take the kids to the lake for weekend outing" is Judge J. E. Sturrock, General Manager of the Texas Water Conservation Association.

"Eliminating the right of eminent domain for those charged with running the affairs of a Water District, is in effect making it impossible for the rank and file of Texans to use the recreation facilities when a new dam is built and a new lake is created" Judge Sturrock declared.

"On the other hand, it is making it possible for a few who happen to own lands around the dam and new lake to open up private camps, charge what prices they like and make fishing, boating and picnicing a costly outlay to citizens who should be allowed those privileges without cost."

"It also makes it possible" Judge Sturrock continued, "for persons of means to buy outright these natural campsites and build their own private lodges where only a favored few can enjoy the privileges created by a dam which has to be bought and paid for by the taxpayers."

The General Manager of the Texas Water Conservation Association also showed that it is already beyond the reach of the average Texan to go hunting unless he can lease acreage or has access to lands already leased.

"If fishing and camping privileges are taken away from new dams and lakes to be created in Texas through new Water Districts, tens of thousands of Texans will be denied recreational rights they have hereto enjoyed" Sturrock said.

He urged members of the current Legislature not to "close the door for evermore in the faces of tens of thousands of Texans who need recreational facilities on our public lakes. Once the law of eminent domain is denied, the hands of those whom the voters choose to run the Water Districts are forever tied to acquire those lands for

Hogs Are Put To Sleep Prior To Their Slaughter

A revolutionary method of putting hogs to sleep prior to slaughter, devised by Geo. A. Hormel & Co., Austin, Minn., meat packer, won for Hormel the honor of making the most outstanding current achievement in food technology. This painless killing process has been accorded the biennial 1953 Food Engineering Award by a committee of 26 outstanding food technologists headed by Dr. Samuel Cate Prescott, MIT food scientist.

The award, which is sponsored by Food Engineering, a McGraw-Hill publication, will be presented to Hormel at the annual meeting of the Institute of Food Technologists in Boston, June 22, by Frank Lawler, editor of the magazine.

Hormel's award-winning process involves the use of carbon dioxide gas to immobilize the animals as they are conveyed through a tunnel before slaughter. Previously, the animals were killed without the use of an anesthetic. In addition to enabling a more uniform and efficient movement of the animals, the new technique also helps produce uniformly high meat quality.
