Family Doctor Expert on 85 Per Cent All Cases

The family doctor or general practitioner, is capable of diagnosing and treating from 80 to 85 per cent of human ills, it has been estimated. In addition, because he examines and treats the patient's entire family and because he may know the patient for a long period of time, he is often well acquainted with social, emotional, and economic factors that may have a bearing on his illness.

Occasionally, the family doctor may feel that at least part of diasis or treatment should be in the hands of someone else, in which instance, he refers the patient to qualified. Often all he needs is an orinion on whether or not the treatment he believes necessary is right. At other times he may ask a radiologist to make x-ray studies, a surgeon to operate, or a labora-tory expert to examine a piece of tissue. At all stages of examinaterested in the patient, and if the patient doesn't remain under his direct care, he asks his specialist colleagues to keep him posted on
