## New Trailers Are No Longer Rolling Shacks

Trailers aren't what they used to be. The two-bunk shack on wheels is now a streamlined version of a modern home that has attracted a population of 2,000,000 persons, according to the Trailer Coach Manufacturers Association.

Among the newer features are air-conditioning systems, a trailer coach built in two sections that may be towed separately, and two-story mobile homes.

E. L. Wilson, the association's managing director, said the basic design of trailers now includes a living room, kitchenette, bedroom and bath facilities. Larger ones often have two bedrooms.

Trailers can be had with knotty pine kitchens, glassed-in tubs and showers, built-in television, built-in fireplaces, automatic washing machines, radiant heating, step-down living room and an attic.

Wilson said that by summer 2,000,000 persons will be living in the mobile homes, and, with new and improved trailer parks, he thinks more trailers will be sold

## Weeds Can Make A Farm Wealthy, View Expressed

EMMAUS, Pa. (Special)—Farmers are proving that abandoned farms worth \$20 an acre can be this year than 1952's \$300,000,000 worth.

built up to a value of \$400 an acre, without chemical fertilizers, reports an article in the May issue of The Organic Farmer.

An Iowa organic farmer, Parker E. Stone, bought just such a farm back in 1948. It was considered almost worthless.

By using only natural fertilizers — weeds, crop residues, animal and green manures, and ground rocks — he is making an eroded, farmed-out 200 acres into a highly productive farm.

Much of the land was densely covered with weeds and brush, and some of it had been in corn continuously for seventeen years. Gullies were rampant.

Stone reasoned that land that would grow such a fine crop of weeds would produce profitable crops of equal luxuriance if it was handled right.

He tackles about 40 acres a year, first plowing under the thickets of brush and weeds and anything else that will decompose into organic matter.

Organic matter holds plant nutrients and also makes a favorable air circulation and drainage structure in the soil. The soil on most American farms has only one-fourth as much organic matter as it needs.

Many of the weeds, being deep-rooted, also bring up valuable nutrients from the subsoil. Plowing

them down adds these to the topsoil. Stone uses all the manure he can get, and applies ground rocks to supply phosphorous, potash and other plant foods as needed. He prefers clovers for pastures, hay and green manures. They store up nitrogen and their vast root systems rot into a great deal of humus.

Poor land, says the article, is a challenge to Stone. Already some of his reclaimed land has yielded over 80 bushels of corn per acre.

Says Stone, "For actually building soil, organic farming is the only answer. You can't make soil out of chemicals."

There are now nearly 50,000 organic farmers in the United States. They use no chemical fertilizers because they believe such materials destroy the microbial life, structure and nutrient balance of the soil.

## Nylon Kneecaps Helps Arthritis

A nylon membrane inserted into the kneecap has proved helpful in improving knee motion in arthritic patients, according to four surgeons who developed the technique.

Drs. John G. Kuhns, Theodore A. Potter, Robert S. Hormell and

William A. Elliston of the Robert B. Brigham Hospital in Boston described the operation at a meeting of the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons.

The nylon membrane is fastened to the bone by small stainless

Work which led to isolation of steel staples. The nylon membrane is ideally adapted, they said, because it does not absorb water and is resistant to chemicals.
