



AROUND the SQUARE

If holiday fishers who plan to spend the 4th on the lake or some creek or river, don't have any better luck than our professional crew they may just as well stay at home and fan themselves. They will be more comfortable and the chiggers won't be so bad. This appears to be an off-year for fishing they just don't bite. One of Eastland's most successful fishermen spent three days with the snakes and spiders on the Brazos river last week, and the only that even looked at his was an alligator gar. Some of them have accumulated what is known as a 3-hour sun tan, more commonly known as a blistered face. Of course these will heal up in time, though you may experience some suffering while this is being done.

Being a fisherman of some fifty years standing, we know most of the answers. Since we were a small boy we have been trying to cheat the fish market; out of its legal and rightful business. We wanted to catch fish so we could say they didn't cost anything, though during recent years we have discovered that the best and cheapest fish come from the fish market and not the creek.

You may now find good fish—most any variety you want, at a very reasonable price—25c to 60c per pound. Those you bring in from the creek probably cost several times that amount, and were not half as good.

A few days ago we took time out (Dick and Joe's time) to figure out just about the price of the average pound of fish we have caught really cost us. It took quite a little figuring, and we know that we failed to include all the expenses, but to the best of our knowledge our "creek caught" fish have been costing us something like \$13.29 per pound. This does not include what the game warden hooked us for, when we tried to sneak home with an under-sized bass.

Since coming to Eastland we have invested in two complete fishing sets. Trot-lines, throw-lines, bank hooks, bait, including those imported worms (too dry to dig them here), and so far when we catch this fish and another one, that will be two since our arrival.

We have good canes, new hooks and every known kind of bait. Evidently we don't have the proper wiggle, for the fish pay no more attention to our baits than a hoot-owl pays to a brush arbor revival. Just not interested.

We drove up to Ringling Lake a few days ago for a little fishing spree, and of course took the wife, the kids and grandkids along. After fighting snakes and chiggers for an hour or so, baiting hooks for the kids, we managed to fall into the water. One of the children did catch a big perch, almost two inches long, and while we were trying to get it unhooked a fellow came along and asked, "how's fishing?" We told him the truth—that it was bum, and after looking at the little perch he suggested that we might do better if we would use larger bait. Here we exploded. The only fish that had been caught all the afternoon, by the entire group was considered too small for bait.

Ye, gods, we made a bee-line for home. That night we figured the money we spent on the trip. This of course included the ice cream, cold drinks, new bait, lunch for the crowd, oil and gas for the car, half a day lost time and our trousers had to be pressed again. The total amounted to \$4.87 which included the two nickle cigars we took along with us, but did not smoke as we dropped them in the lake. Actual value of fish caught, 3 mills.

The next time we feel a desire for fish we are going to buy a 5c can of sardines as a compromise. We will live longer and get more fish.

Don't be surprised if you find us on the creek Saturday. Fishing is a habit that is harder to control than the morphine habit. And you never live long enough to out-grow it.

Fair And Hot 4th!

Fair and hot. That's the weather outlook for the Eastland County vicinity for the July Fourth holiday period.

Temperatures of near and over 100 degrees are due for the area today, Saturday and Sunday, according to the U. S. Weather Bureau. Tonight's lowest mercury reading won't be very low—about 78.

For North Central Texas weathermen forecast generally fair weather for Friday and Saturday. Not much change. The West Texas outlook: Generally fair-Friday and Saturday, except widely scattered thundershowers in the Panhandle region. In temperature.

Navy Offers New Plan; Young Boys May Avoid Draft

Young men of draft age who would rather serve out their military obligations in the Navy can now guarantee themselves a two-year hitch in the Navy blue, if and when induction notices are received.

A new policy, announced this week by the Dallas Naval Air Station, guarantees members of its Naval Air Reserve a 24-month tour of active duty when selective service moves to induct them. Under the plan, young men 17 to 18½ years of age join the "Weekend Warriors"—so called because reserve squadrons meet one Saturday and Sunday of each month.

They retain civilian status until they receive selective service notice. They may then request, and be assured of receiving a superseding call to active duty in the Navy.

Traditional Navy popularity has made it increasingly difficult for those who prefer Naval service to be enlisted. Regular Navy recruiting stations, bound by quotas, have long waiting lists of men eager to take the Navy's Regular four-year hitch rather than the draft's two-year service.

Dallas Naval Air Station's new plan offers a two-year Navy hitch after induction notice, fulfilling selective service requirements, and starting its recruit of on the road to earlier completion of the eight-year reserve obligation that all draft eligible youths now face. Men who go active from the Reserve usually do so with a higher rank and pay scale than any draftee.

Eastland county banks are in very fine condition at this time, despite the big drought and other back-sets.

The Eastland National Bank at the close of business on June 30, had \$3,731,234.56 on deposit. On the same date loans were listed at \$819,762.09. Cash on hand and in Government Bonds totaled \$3,094,127.24.

This means that deposits today are \$500,000.00 more than they were at the same time last year. During recent months there has been considerable oil activity, which in a way, is responsible for this healthy report.

Astronomists Tell How Space Folk To Look

"We need an observatory outside earth, on a space platform," says Nobel Prize winner Harold C. Urey in a colorfully illustrated article in the current issue of People Today Magazine.

"The 200 inch Mt. Palomar telescope," continues Dr. Urey, "could spot an object the size of the Pentagon Bldg., on the Moon. But further telescope improvement is hampered by shimmer of the earth's atmosphere." Once the "space observatory" is built, scientists will come close to answering the profound questions, "does life exist in various areas of space?" If so, "in what form and stage of development?" According to the article, organisms may thrive in environments which would be poisonous to us, such as the methane and ammonia atmosphere of Jupiter. Dr. Urey pointed out that thousands of bodies in space support highly developed organisms such as the earth-like plant life known to exist on Mars.

Now, however, since the recent spectroscopic discovery of water vapor on Mars by Dr. G. P. Kuiper (Yerkes Observatory), a new light has been thrown on the possibility of animal life on Mars.

Dr. I. M. Levitt of Philadelphia's West Planetarium told the magazine that water is one of the three requirements of higher forms of life as known on earth. The other two are temperatures which are not too extreme and an atmosphere with some oxygen.

Thus, discovery of water on Mars indicates the possibility of life as we know it, modified by adaptation to Mars' rarefied atmosphere.

The Mars man would live in cold no lower than the -72 Admiral Byrd's men endured in underground shelters at Little America. He would breathe extremely thin atmosphere, roughly corresponding to that at the top of a hypothetical 10-mile mountain on earth.

How can we get more definite information about Mars? Shy of going there, which scientists do not envision for the near future, an observation platform outside earth's atmosphere would be best. Such a platform, revolving around the earth as an artificial satellite, is now a prime project of American scientists. It may become a reality within two decades.
