949 New Cases Polio Reported For Last Week

The U. S. Public Health Service reported 949 new cases of infantile paralysis for the last week, but said many of them were relatively light.

The total represents a substantial increase over the 625 cases reported a week previous, but was well below the 1,044 cases discovered in the same week of 1952—the all-time record year for polio.

The service said that during the last four weeks total polio cases across the nation reached 2,513 as compared with 2,663 for the same period last year.

The agency reported substantial increases in Connecticut, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Illinois, Kansas, Virginia, North Carolina and Tennessee.

However, in a hopeful note, the service said "many" of the states continue to report "a high proportion of non-paralytic cases."

Texas, for example, reported 22 paralytic cases, 44 non-paralytic, with 23 of unspecified seriousness. California had 22 paralytic cases, 27 non-paralytic and three not specified.

Rain Promised To Eastlanders Today, Tonight

Rain-promising skies hovered over the Eastland County vicinity early today, but there was little fulfillment.

During the early morning moderate and very brief sprinklings were reported in various portions of the area.

The U. S. Weather Bureau also was promising—promising thundershowers for the section today and Saturday. Skies, weather men said, were due to be cloudy. Today's maximum temperature—in the low 90s. Same for tomorrow afternoon.

Friday night's predicted low—about 70 degrees.

The forecast for North Central and West Texas: Partly cloudy Friday and Saturday with scattered thundershowers. No important temperature changes.

Hi School Grads Be Accepted By U. S. Air Force

The Department of the Air Force recently announces that high school graduates now have the opportunity to apply for Aircraft Observer training and become flying officers skilled in navigation, bombardment, radar operation, aircraft performance engineering and related technical flying specialties.

For the first time since World War II, a young man with a high school diploma can apply directly from civilian life for flying training.

In addition to being a high school graduate, an applicant must be between the ages of 19 and 26 1/2, single, and in good physical and mental health. Minimum vision requirement is 20-50 if corrected with glasses to 20-20.

An individual is placed under no obligation by submitting an application for training. He will not enter the Air Force until he is found fully qualified for Observer training and desires to enter the program.

The Aircraft Observer course is divided into three phases—Pre-Flight, Primary and Basic.

The three month Pre-Flight phase consists of intensive officer type training that includes drills, customs and courtesies, physical training, etc.

Upon completion of Pre-Flight, Aircraft Observer cadets receive 30 weeks of Primary Training which cover the fundamental skills and techniques common to all Aircraft Observer duties.

After completing the Primary phase, the Aircraft Observer cadet attends one of several Basic courses that trains him for a specific aircrew position on a bombardment, interceptor, reconnaissance or transport type aircraft.

After approximately a year of training the cadet will be commissioned a second lieutenant in the Air Force Reserve.

Rain Here Is Light; Total For Week .75

While last night's rain amounted to about one quarter of an inch, it was greatly appreciated. Showers earlier in the week amounted to .46 of an inch, thus making the week's total about three quarters of an inch.

In some sections of the county precipitation was considerably more. Cisco had more than an inch of rain this week, and Carbon also most as much. The 7/27 showers were lighter early this week, and we have been unable to get last night's total.

Growing crops are holding up well. Cool, cloudy weather has afforded some protection against the scorching heat, and each shower, however light, keeps crops growing, it is said.

Beef Buying Is Lagging Behind Goal For Relief

Government buying of beef to strengthen cattle prices continues to lag behind the goal of 10 million pounds a week.

The Agriculture Department reported today that purchases this week totaled 3,984,000 pounds, bringing total buying since late spring to 21,052,000 pounds.

Officials said not enough meat was offered by processors at prices in line with current cattle prices.

The week, nevertheless, brought a sharp upturn in cattle markets as livestock men reduced marketings. However, prices still average considerably below levels of the past winter and early spring.

The buying goal was set as a part of an emergency program to help distressed cattlemen in drought areas of the Southwest. The meat will be used for the government sponsored school lunch program and for shipment abroad under the mutual aid program.

On Possum Kingdom Dam TEXANS URGE SEIZURE POWER OF GOVERNMENT BE LIFTED

Two Brazos River Authority officials Thursday urged the Senate Public Works Committee to speed legislation through Congress which would throw out the federal government's right to take over such projects as Possum Kingdom Dam built by a state agency.

Under the Federal Power Act, the U. S. has the right to take over any dam built on a stream defined as navigable under law 50 years after its construction. The Brazos River Authority had to obtain a federal license to build the Possum Kingdom project near Mineral Wells, and it is subject to recapture by Uncle Sam in 1958. It was licensed in 1938. It is the only project in Texas affected by the Federal Power Act provision.

R. D. Collins, Mineral Wells, general manager of the Brazos River Authority, and John D. McCall, Dallas, counsel for the authority, testified before the Senate committee studying the bill by Sen. Hugh Butler (R-Texas) to delete the federal recapture authority from law.

"On many occasions, members of the Federal Power Commission and its staff," McCall said, "have emphasized the belief that it is inconceivable that the government would attempt to exercise the option to take one of these projects from a state or municipality . . . but the only way to protect a licensee is to remove the right from the law."

TFBF Institute Be Held Aug. 6, College Station

The fifth annual Texas Farm Bureau Institute will be held Aug. 2-6 at College Station, according to J. Walter Hammond, president of the state farm organization.

Purpose of the Institute is to afford training for county Farm Bureau leaders throughout the state. More than 200 students are expected to register for this year's training school.

Ten regular courses and three advanced subjects will be taught at the institute. The regular courses include Philosophy of Farm Bureau, Policy Development, Membership Acquisition and Maintenance, County and Community Farm Bureau, Technical for Officers, Information Program, Public Speaking, County Office Procedures, Farm Bureau Service Program and Recreational Activities.

The three advanced subjects are Extension Service-Farm Bureau Relationship, Effective Selling and Techniques in the Operation of a Farm Bureau.

Instructors will be persons who have made an outstanding success in particular lines of Farm Bureau work, or persons whose training and experience in certain other lines qualify them to make a definite contribution to the Institute.

Extra-curricular activities at the Institute include a western costume square dance, a tour of the Texas A&M College campus and a recreation party.

Roger Fleming, secretary-treasurer of the American Farm Bureau will speak at a banquet concluding the Institute's activities Thursday evening, Aug. 6. His topic will be "Membership Makes Farm Bureau."

Sharp '54 Rise In Draft Calls To Follow Lull

The state director of selective service predicted in Houston today that Texas draft calls will spiral upward again next year after the present decrease.

Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, said the decline anticipated for the next 12 months has nothing to do with any change in the world situation.

"In the fiscal year which drew to a close on June 30, Texas local boards put more than 28,000 men in uniform," he said. "In the present fiscal year it looks as if they will have to provide around 15,000 to 16,000. This will probably hold true, regardless of whether or not there is a truce in Korea."

Wakefield pointed out that the number of men drafted depends to a great extent on the number completing their two years of service and getting out.

The well has a daily flow of 36 barrels of 39 gravity oil through 1-4 choks with 150 pounds on casing and 50 on tubing from open hole at 4,205-55 feet.

In France and Germany, where large numbers of young men were out of the country during the war, the experience ran counter to the general trend, and the proportion of married young women was lower after the war than before.
