There is no such thing as free money from the federal government. Grants-in-aid, subsidies and other such handouts can come only after the necessary withdrawal has been taken from us in taxes. The growing realization of this fact in all parts of the country is the best sign in a long time that government economy, a balanced budget, and lower taxes are possible.

The new commission of inter-governmental relations approved by congress at the request of President Eisenhower will probably recommend far-reaching changes which may do much to restore to local and state governments freedoms, rights, and responsibilities they have been relinquishing to the false god of central authority.

Area Benefits From Higher Crude Prices

Eastland County vicinity producers and royalty owners will share in the increased income due West Texas as a result of recent hikes in the price of crude oil, averaging 25 cents a barrel, according to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

The price increases will add approximately \$11,500,000 monthly to the income of area producers and royalty owners, according to WTCC estimates.

The estimate was based on production reported to the Texas Railroad Commission in March, the last month for which the commission's detailed statement of crude oil allowable, production and removal from leases has been distributed.

March production in the West Texas districts of the commission's Oil and Gas Division totaled 46,061,400 barrels. This would have added \$11,515,952 to the market value at an average hike of 25 cents per barrel.

The additional revenue by districts in West Texas, is estimated as follows: No. 7-B, \$878,734; No. 7-C, \$1,242,097; No. 8, \$7,266,860; No. 9, \$1,435,259; No. 10, \$592,402.

Mail Delivery Hours Are Being Changed In City

Several patrons of the city delivery service have been wondering why mail deliveries have been changed from morning to afternoon, or vice versa.

Since delivery to residential sections were curtailed to one delivery per day some two years ago, it became necessary for some deliveries to be made in the morning and others in the afternoon.

The new extensions that were added to the present city routes effective July 27 necessitated a readjustment of the routes and schedules. As patrons apply for service in the new territory other adjustments will have to be made. It may require taking some territory off of one route and adding it to the other. This, of course, will require a change in schedules.

Patrons are requested to cooperate and be patient until conditions become stable when definite routes and schedules can be established.

State Banks To Continue Aiding Texas Ranchers

State banks will attempt to ride out the drought with their cattle customers.

So Gov. Allan Shivers was advised in Austin Wednesday.

State banking commissioner J. M. Falkner reported to the governor that he had talked personally with most of the state bankers in the drought disaster area.

"It is their thought that where they are financing cattlemen who have a home and are not hopelessly in debt, they are willing to ride out the depression with them," Falkner said.

A state bank can lend to any one person, firm or corporation only 25 per cent of its capital and surplus, the commissioner noted. Such an amount in many instances is too small to take care of big operations. Such loans are sent to larger banks out of the state.

The state defense and disaster relief of headquarters, meanwhile, reported it had placed emergency feed orders with the FMA commodity offices for 31,560 tons of cottonseed meal, 69,105 tons of cottonseed pellets, 32,897 tons of corn, 32,197 tons of oats, and 885 tons of wheat for the drought area.

Area Expectant Fathers Must Notify Board

Men who expect to become fathers soon must notify the Eastland County Selective Service Board before August 25 to obtain a deferment or face induction into the ranks of the U. S. Army.

Present draft laws regarding deferments for fathers or expectant fathers will be changed after that date. Men of draft age becoming fathers thereafter no longer will receive deferments, a member of the board said Wednesday.

Expectant fathers must present a doctor's statement giving the approximate time of the baby's future arrival, the spokesman said. A birth certificate also must be submitted within a reasonable time.

Men who neglect to notify the board will automatically be classified 1-A on August 25.

Deferment will continue for all registrants already deferred as fathers.

The Irony of Fate— Dog for Aged Blind Man... So Near... Yet So Very Far Away

A totally blind Ranger resident, badly in need of a new dog to guide his faltering footsteps as he moves almost helplessly in a world of darkness, has been approved to receive a specially-trained "seeing eye" German Shepherd by the International Guiding Eye Foundation, a charitable institution to aid the sightless, at Hollywood, Calif.

Approval of his application has come finally after several years of repeated effort.

Put—

Morris Caudie, 63-year-old Ranger man who has been blind since he was a lad of 16, has no money. He and his mother, Mrs. Mathilda Reiser, 85, and in very ill health, reside at 1004 Haag Street in Ranger and exist frugally on their combined pension incomes.

The blind son, who does the housework, receives \$55 monthly and his aged mother's pension totals \$50. Her ill health, however, necessitates costly medical and prescription bills which stab deeply into their meager \$105 monthly income.

And so, despite the fact that he has been okayed for an official "seeing eye" dog, and despite the fact that the International Guiding Eye Foundation out in Hollywood will furnish his board and room for the four weeks' training period with his new dog, this blind Rangerite may never see this dream come true.

Round-trip plane fare to Hollywood—where he would be met by a representative of the Foundation—figures \$191. Then friends and neighbors think he should have some clothes for the trip. That would mean more money. And the total to an old blind man—well, utterly fantastic and impossible.

But to one of his neighbors, Mrs. Wilson Robinson, who lives nearby, it's not so impossible.

"I believe there's help—somehow, somehow—for this man," she told a newspaper reporter.

And the newspaper reporter agreed.

Now—

How about the dog Mr. Caudie now has?

Well, for 13 years a small and faithful canine has been devotedly guiding his blind master around. Friends gave it to the Ranger man when the animal was but a tiny frisky pup. And the blind son and his mother patiently trained the dog for the helpful and important responsibility which he has carried out so faithfully for more than a decade.

But the failing canine now is so aged that he can hardly walk the distance from the Caudie home to town without weakly flopping down, breathing tiredly, his little body completely exhausted. And in cold weather, he can't venture outside.

The faithful animal may expire any day. He may not be able to withstand the rigors of the winter ahead.

Then what?

Isn't there some help—somehow, somewhere—for this blind man and his aged mother?

Yes, though brief, this is a heart-touching story.

But maybe some folks with mighty big hearts will read it. And—maybe—understanding, kindness, and help will come. And the strong will help the weak and the helpless.

Then a heart-touching story may wind up with a happy ending!

Is Weatherman All Wet? RAIN IS FORECAST FRIDAY FOR EASTLAND AREA

Scattered shower activity Friday.

That was the shaky promise of the weather man to Eastland County vicinity residents today.

There also was a hint in the current forecast of the U. S. Weather Bureau that there might be welcome, cooling showers late this afternoon.

Otherwise, the report calls for the usual fair to partly cloudy—and hot—weather for the area today and Friday.

Not much change in temperature is due, and the mercury will hit its peak today and tomorrow afternoon around the torrid 100-degree level. The low for tonight, according to weather men—about 75.

For North Central and West Texas—Partly cloudy Thursday and Friday with widely scattered evening and afternoon thundershowers. Little change in temperatures.

96,000 Killed In Accidents In U.S. In 1952

The casualty list for 1952—96,000 killed and 9,600,000 injured! That isn't the Korean war toll. It's the nation's accident totals for last year announced by the National Safety Council.

"Accident Facts," the Council's statistical yearbook, which is just off the press, shows that one person was injured accidentally every three seconds during 1952. Deaths from accidents occurred at the rate of one every five minutes.

During the year, motor vehicle accidents killed at the rate of four persons per hour and injured at a rate of 150 per hour.

State Teacher Shortage Over 5,000 Forecast

The State Teachers Association estimated there will be only 2,550 new teachers available for approximately 8,000 vacant teaching jobs in Texas in September.

Research Director E. L. Galyean said the 8,000 figure is an estimate based on previous records. A survey just completed showed there were 3,508 vacancies as of June 1, but Galyean said the total usually doubles by Sept. 1 "because so many teachers find new jobs during the summer."

He said the survey showed the annual turnover in teaching personnel nearing 25 per cent.

Answers to the survey questions were received from 944 city and county superintendents, including virtually all of those in the larger cities.

Galyean said the teacher shortage is less critical in large cities which pay salaries considerably higher than the minimums required by state law.

"School districts with less than 2,500 students reported the greatest percentage of teaching vacancies," he reported.

By subjects, the shortage of primary teachers was described as the most critical with 354 schools reporting a deficit in personnel. Galyean said mathematics teachers are needed by 290 schools, science teachers by 287, English teachers by 166, physical education teachers by 156, music teachers by 150, and home economics teachers by 148.

"A great many schools will be forced to go on half-day schedules next fall," the researcher said, "because of the critical teacher shortage."

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Grand Jury Has Adjourned For Present Term

The grand jury was in session for a short time in Eastland Wednesday, and several witnesses were questioned, though no bills of indictment were voted.

Their final report to Judge Turner Collier was signed and delivered and he, at their request, released them for this term of court.

A parade Friday formally opens the convention. U. S. Senator Price Daniel will be the principal speaker. Texas Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd, Lyon W. Brandon, Jackson, Miss., National vice commander, and U. S. Senator Lyndon Johnson are to speak Saturday.

Officers will be elected Sunday.

Ex-Gormanite Writes Book On Ghost Towns

Just off the Naylor Company presses, San Antonio, is a book by a native of Eastland county.

The work, "Ghost Towns of Texas," was written by Dick King, who was born in Gorman. Containing 140 pages and pictures, the work describes in detail 43 Texas towns that were.

Of the book, the publishers write, "Alive as Texas is, its surface is pitted with ghost towns of great schemes that went sour. These plans were the result of dreams spurred on by men ambitious in industry, by those devout in religion or by those eager to experiment with government and those having dreams of finding Utopia."

"In many instances these towns no longer exist or at the present are but bit players who have been steller performers in the formation of the Lone Star State; in other cases they have been the mobs in scenes, adding color and excitement characteristic of pageantry, but speaking no lines, and then becoming has-beens, deserving, or getting little mention in reviews."

Now a member of the East Texas State College faculty, the author writes on the jacket of his book that he was born in Gorman "a little too late to know any of the romance of the oil boom which my parents and grandparents like to recall." He has been director of publicity at Mary Hardin-Baylor college in Belton and acting instructor in English at John Tarleton college, Stephenville.

He holds membership in the Commerce Kiwanis club, Texas Press association and Texas State Historical association.

The author's grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Neill and Mr. and Mrs. W. R. King, were Gorman pioneers.

Eastland County Leads Area in Retail Sales

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WTCC Survey Reveals Buying Power of Ranger, Eastland, Cisco Territory Is \$26,762,000

Business is best in Eastland County.

In fact, the prosperous Cisco-Eastland-Ranger area is the brightest spot in this section of West Texas, according to a detailed retail sales and buying power survey recently completed by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

A comparison of figures for Eastland and the seven other counties surrounding its borders—Brown, Callahan, Shackelford, Erath, Palo Pinto, Comanche and Stephens—reveals that the Cisco-Eastland-Ranger area's total retail sales are nearly two million dollars greater each year than second-place Brown County.

Eastland County's retail sales in 1952, the WTCC survey reports, were \$29,153,000.

Here's how Eastland's neighbors sales totaled for the same period:

Brown County—\$27,665,000.
Shackelford County—\$4,926,000.
Erath County—\$18,057,000.
Palo Pinto County—\$16,741,000.
Comanche—\$14,205,000.
Stephens—\$13,961,000.
Callahan County—\$5,103,000.

In buying power, according to the WTCC analysis, Eastland is second in the eight-county area. Brown County leads with \$32,959,000. Yet Eastland tops Brown in retail sales by nearly two million!

Eastland's total buying power is listed at \$26,762,000—about two and a half million less than its retail sales for 1952.

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86 New Polio Cases Reported Over State Area

The state health department today reported 86 new Texas polio cases for the week ending July 26, the same as the week previous.

"A sound program of home and community sanitation" has helped reduce polio this year, state health officer George W. Cox said.

Counties reporting polio for the first time this year were: Hale, Henderson and Sabine, 2 each; and Cherokee, Coryell, Parker, and Williamson, 1 each.

Other counties reporting last week included Galveston, 7; Taylor, 6; El Paso, Potter and Reeves, 2 each; Bell, Bowie, Brazoria, Gray, Kendall, Rogan, Tom Green, and Wichita, 1 each.

Total for the year now is 853, almost two-thirds fewer than for the comparable period a year ago.

Car Inspection Begins Sept. 15; Deadline Apr. 15

The new state auto inspection law goes into effect on September 15.

And Eastland County auto owners along with millions of other Texans have plenty of time to have their autos inspected. Final deadline for the inspection, according to State Public Safety Director Homer Garrison Jr., is April 15.

This time only brakes, lighting equipment, horns, rear view mirrors and windshield wipers will be inspected. The last Legislature trimmed the old law to those five items.

Garrison said the seven-month inspection period should be ample to handle every car in the state without the logjam that developed under the old law.

The old law expires at midnight, Aug. 25. Garrison said no inspections will be made from then until Sept. 15.

F. M. Prock, 78, Will Be Buried This Afternoon

F. M. Prock, 78-year-old former resident of Ranger, will be laid to rest in Evergreen Cemetery, Ranger, this afternoon at 4 o'clock following brief graveside rites.

Funeral services for Mr. Prock were scheduled earlier today—this afternoon at 1:30 p.m.—at the Elliott Funeral Chapel in Abilene.

Bro. Dan McClain, minister of the Church of Christ, will officiate during the Abilene rites.

Mr. Prock, a resident of Abilene for the past seven years, died at his home, 334 Forest Ave., in that city, Tuesday morning at 1 o'clock following a long illness. He had been in critical condition for a week prior to his passing.

He was born Jan. 14, 1874 in Missouri. He moved from Ranger to Abilene seven years ago. The family had lived at Ranger and Olden for 30 years. He was a retired oil field worker.

Mr. Prock was married Sept. 25, 1891, at Tishomingo, Okla., to the former Rosa Bell Wilcox. They have 80 living descendants. Two sons and three daughters preceded him in death.

He was a member of the Plum and Wilson St. Church of Christ. 
