J. B. Blackwell is having to take things easier since his check-up in Fort Worth some time ago. Neighbors have been helping with his plowing.

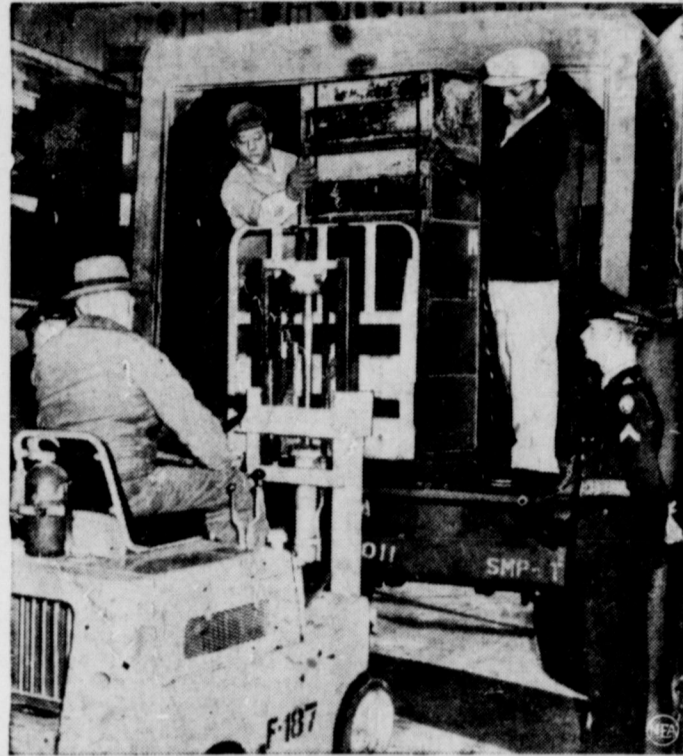
