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Cats Produce Record Spawn

A record spawn by channel cats in the Jasper State Fish Hatchery was reported by the Chief Aquatic Biologist of the Game and Fish Commission.

He said Supt. F. P. Garrett of the deep east Texas hatchery recorded forty-six separate spawns by his brood cats.

The hatch averaged about twenty-five thousand catfish per spawn

or a total of well over a million young channel cats. The Jasper hatchery usually gets from twenty-five to thirty-five catfish spawns each season.

Garret said the unusually high production by his two hundred and fifty brood cats apparently resulted from the mild winter.

"They didn't have to hibernate," he said. "So they kept on eating all winter and thus were in better condition than ordinarily."

Garrett said the cat fingerlings will be consigned to waters in nineteen counties ranging from Nacogdoches County on the north

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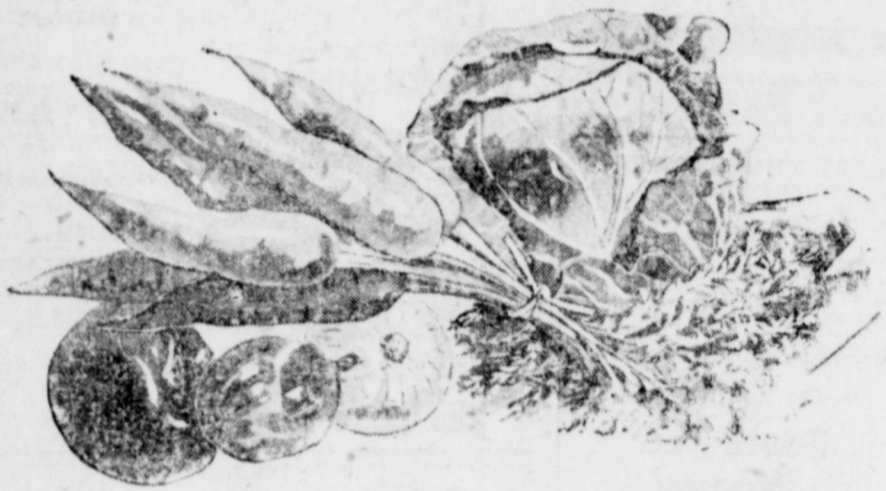
