REFLECTIONS FROM LIFE

As little as you may think about it, the Gospel is the most conspicuous thing in this world. This does not mean that all the world has accepted it, nor is it universally appreciated. Yet people do know about it and it is heralded in a manner that makes it quite noticeable — even conspicuous.

And concerning this Gospel let's see what the Bible says about it. In Isa. second chapter, second verse we read, "And it shall come a pass in the last days, that the mountain of the Lord's house shall be established in the top of the mountains, and shall be exalted above the hills; and all nations shall flow unto it."

The very fact that it shall be established in the mountains and in a high place above the hills, would indicate its prominence. Also note the last clause, "and all nations shall flow unto it."

But let us move along and consider present day activities. Let us vision the coming glory of the church, and when we say Church we have in mind Christ's church, rather than the numerous worldly bodies.

People may get certain reflections from the worldly bodies that mean a great deal. Among other things we note the great "Back to God" movement which is now in progress. We dream of the universal brotherhood of man, and today we note a great turning in this direction.

Modern day achievements in various and sundry lines, have been largely responsible for this, but those of us who accept God's word without question, can see a movement guided by God. And although there are wars and rumors of wars (last day signs) we note that most all men seem to be looking forward to a day when there shall be a reign of love right here on this earth.

Truly we are going through an age of progress, just as the Bible pointed out, so we realize that God still lives and all is well.

We shall not try to give a group of special signs concerning the early return of our Lord, but a born-again Christian can see these signs on every hand, and without special effort. However, no man knows the day or the hour when the Son of Man will return.

So let us be satisfied and even comforted by the knowledge that everything is working out just as the Saviour said.

And while we have entirely too many backsliders and luke-warm Christians, we note the Church (even worldly Sects) are more popular today than they have been at any other time in history.

People have heeded the great command — they have gone out and preached the Gospel, and fruits from their labors are very noticeable. Men, who 20 years ago would not have mentioned the word God only in a profane manner, now use it carefully and respectfully. This is a wonderful sign, for the Saviour said that he would draw all men to Him.

We feel that many men are being drawn to Christ, who have not fully realized just what unseen power is doing the drawing. They know something is happening to them that they can not explain, but when they are asked to make the final decision they seem ready to do so. The conspicuous Gospel and the Church, of course, are responsible.

This is very encouraging, and each day as we meet now converts our hearts are thrilled. The Gospel is most powerful, and men can't escape or overlook anything that is on the mountains.

However, after accepting this Gospel, and when we have placed our trust in Christ — have been saved with an everlasting salvation, we still have work to do. There is that period of development — we are to Grow in Grace. And to do this we must have an increase in religious knowledge. At the moment we were saved we were as an infant. But as we grow and become stronger in the faith increased knowledge will be necessary and very useful.

This knowledge will spur us on to higher religious attainments. It will increase our faith in Christ

Hot and Dry Weather Due For Thirty Days

It'll be hot and dry. Rain—practically nil. That's not only the weather outlook for the Eastland County vicinity over the weekend.

For Saturday and Sunday, weather men forecast partly-cloudy skies with scattered thundershowers possible during the afternoons of both days.

The maximum mercury readings for Saturday afternoon and Sunday afternoon—100 degrees or hotter.

The Saturday night low—around 75.

For North Central and West Texas: Partly cloudy Saturday and Sunday with widely scattered thundershowers in the afternoon and evening. No important temperature changes.

Last year there were two or three missing members for the opening, but Supt. W. G. Womack has announced no vacancies exist at this time. Most of the teachers and other faculty members were here last year. In fact only two new faces will be seen.

O. R. Scott is the new Junior High School principal, and he comes to Eastland from Corsicana, where he has been Educational Director at the State Home for some years. He is highly recommended and with an excellent teaching background. He is married and has one child eight years old.

The other is Carol R. Shelton, who hails from Itasca, Texas. He is single, and has served in the army as an engineer. Last year he coached in the Cooling school in Eastland. He will teach science and serve as assistant coach.

Final assignments have not been made as yet. It is known where a majority will be placed, but the superintendent is still undecided as to a few assignments. However, decision will be made at an early date, and our readers will be given first hand information.

Everything seems to be in perfect readiness for the opening. Concerning sports we learn the football field is in better shape right now than it has been in several years. Coach Hooker has not returned from his summer vacation, but upon his arrival we shall give a complete line-up of players for the coming season.






