Wylie Thumps South Taylor Eleven, 25 to 13

District 7-A's Wylie Bulldogs, first member of the nine-team loop to see action during the now-opening 1953 school year grid campaign, pounded out a 25-13 win over the South Taylor Flying Tigers at Wylie Thursday night.

It was a non-conference tussle. The losing Tigers are members of the lower District 8-B circuit. Eugene (Genkie) Beyer paced the Bulldogs and figured in all the scoring for the Wylie eleven.

The 140-pound dynamo tossed three passes, all good for touch-downs, scored the final Wylie counter on a four-yard sprint, and passed for the lone extra point chalked up by the 7-A club.

The Bulldogs, who'll battle Eastland County's three 7-A grid aggregations (Ranger, Eastland, Rising Star) this fall, scored their fourth TD in a wild second quarter. South Taylor piled over their 13 points in the third period.

Oil Leader Is Named To U. S. Senate Group

M. D. Bryant, president of the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association, was appointed Wednesday by Senator Homer Capehart (R-Ind.) to serve on an advisory committee of the U. S. Senate's Banking and Currency Committee.

Purpose of the advisory group, as stated in Capehart's letter to Bryant, is "to make a thorough study of the operations of the Export-Import Bank and the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development and their relation to expansion of international trade."

In accepting the appointment, Bryant, for many years an independent oil operator and rancher, pledged the full facilities of TIPRO's extensive research in imports issues as they affect the oil industry.

The 84-member committee will meet for the first time on Sept. 15 in Washington.

Deep Wildcat Test Spotted Near Mangum

A completion and three new locations for the Eastland County area were announced today. One of the new tests, a deep 5,200-foot rotary wildcat, will be drilled one mile southwest of Mangum by Clark P. Chandler et al of San Angelo.

It'll be the No. 1 Ethel Hitson Coates.

Drill site is 2,294 feet from south and 330 feet from west lines of Section 9, Block 3, H&TC Survey.

A conglomerate discovery well has been completed two miles northeast of Ivan, Stephens County, at The Hunter Co., Inc., of Shreveport, La., No. 1 A. Rickles Estate, Section 8, Block 2, SP Survey.

During the daily potential test the well gauged 121 1/3 barrels of 44 gravity oil. Flow was through a 16-64-inch choke with 1,250 pounds casing and 650 pounds tubing pressures. Production is from 48 perforations at 3,996-4,001 feet with the casing set at 4,120 feet. Having a gas-oil ratio of 1,500-1, the well is bottomed at 4,533 feet.

Chester Imes, Abilene, staked location for No. 4 Robert Jackson in the Jackson Strawn Field eight miles south of Caddo.

Site for the 1,900-foot rotary project is 610 feet from the south and 710 feet from the west lines of Section 77, Block 4, T&P Survey.

Pete Hall Drilling Co., Wichita Falls, No. 1 Watson is a wildcat four and one-half miles southwest of Palo Pinto in Palo Pinto Co. Site for the 1,850-foot rotary test is 1,900 feet from the north and 1,050 feet from the west lines of Section 38, Block 2, T&P Survey.

CJC Expected To Field Large Team For Opening Grid Game

Coch Red Lewis of the Cisco Junior College Wranglers will field a team with an average weight of approximately 185 pounds per man when his team meets the Hardin-Simmons "B" team at Chesley Field here in the opening game for both teams Saturday night.

After a full week of practice Lewis announced his probable starters for the contest would average 197 pounds per man on the line and 164 pounds per man in the backfield.

At end positions Bud Miller and Don Denard appear to have won starting positions. Both are lettermen from last year's team. Denard played full on the 1952 team and has been shifted to end this year. Miller weighs 195 and Denard 195. Harold Cheves, 165, and Don Cannon, 165, were still in the running for starting posts and they will play a lot of ball this season. They were members of the 1952 team. Other ends who will see action during the season are Daris Forter of Decatur, Earl Strothers of Diamond Hill and Bob McClelland of Kosse.

Frank Howeth, 190, of Glen Rose, and Wayne Adams, 225, of Diamond Hill will probably draw starting assignments at the tackle slots, however, Arnold Strain of Tulia and Richard Baack of Wylie were still in the running and will see a lot of action. Strain weighs 210 and is a transfer from West Texas State. Baack weighs 185. Other tackles expected to play during the season are Charles Roden of Alvarado and Arnold Hunter of Roscoe.

Probable starting guards are Wendel Battle, 195, of Midway, and Norman Poggs, 195, of Cisco. Poggs is a returning letterman. Burl Shetter, 180, of Irving, and Frank Ferrin of Decatur will see a lot of action, as will Truman Commons of Whitharral.

Three men were fighting it out for the starting spot at center. Baggy Tipton, 205 pounder from Cisco, will probably start the Saturday night game, but Dale McFarland, 180, of Borger, and Ben Robinson, 190, of Sudan were nipping at his heels. Both McFarland and Robinson were suffering from colds.

Pilly Witt, 165, of Midway, and Bob Lynch, 155, of Sudan, were a toss-up for the starting position as the man under in the winged-T formation used this year. Both are good passers and handle the ball well. Billy Joe Hawk of Clyde will also see action during the season.

He Hutson, 185, of Tulia, a transfer from West Texas State College, will be in the fullback position Saturday night. Jimmy Adams, 180, of Kosse, is running him a close second and will see a lot of action. Both boys made all-district teams.

Bobby Means, 150, of Diamond Hill, and E. E. Reid, 160, of Andrews, will probably start at the two halfback spots. Johnny White, 165, Pridenport, and Del Wright, 170, of Peecos, will be ready to back them up. Other halfbacks to see action this year include Gene Thomason of Azle, Donald Daniels and Frank Smith of Midway, Donald Connor of Irving, B. D. Trice and Don Brenthall of Anson and Jodie Shetter of Irving.

Reason For Strong Observance of Americanism Week Is Explained

WORTHAM, Sept. 8 — To many GI's don't know what they are fighting for, Mrs. Van Hook Stubbs of Wortham, State President of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, explained the why of her organization's 100,000-woman strong observance of Americanism Week.

"We feel that is emblematic of a country that no longer appreciates what it stands for," the TFWC head explained. "That is why 1,200 Texas Clubs belonging to the organization she heads are backing state-wide observance of Americanism Week, Sept. 13-15.

Gov. Allan Shivers will join Texas Clubwomen heading the Americanism emphasis on Saturday, Sept. 12, at 1:30 p.m. on a radio broadcast over the Texas Quality network that will initiate Americanism Week.

With Mrs. Newell Waters of Weslaco as chairman, the Texas Federation will sponsor observance of the week with programs and talks, both in their own clubs and before other civic groups. Clubs are asked to enlist ministers in the launching of Americanism Week September 13, from the pulpits.

Faith in God is the foundation from which respect for the rights of the individual and democracy's boundless opportunities for achievement rise, the clubwomen sponsoring the week, point out. Altogether, 6 million American clubwomen are mobilizing to back the

For each and every incident it must be presumed that there are survivors and every possible effort must be made to find, aid, and return these survivors to safety. Hence, it is the code of an Air Rescue man, placing duty before personal desires.

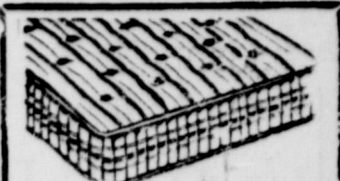
