REFLECTIONS FROM LIFE

We hear a great deal today about the "signs of the times," the second coming of Christ, and the "end of the world." To some people these subjects bring fear and trembling, but to born-again Christians all this fear is absent. We look forward to the coming of our Saviour and stand ready at all times to welcome Him back to this old world, which we feel sure, is in need of His services.

Many people have been announcing this event throughout the ages, but so far all have been incorrect. Many people talk and argue about it, but we have noticed that most of this group is not composed of Bible scholars.

Learned men appreciate the folly of such, and are willing to accept Bible truths rather than weak man's guesses.

In Matt. 24:44 we read: "Therefore be ye also ready; for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of Man cometh."

And again we are told that "no man knoweth the day or hour wherein the Son of Man cometh." In the 35 verse of the same chapter Jesus said "of that day and hour knoweth no man, no, not the angels of heaven, but My Father only." (Read entire chapter for information.)

Londoners seized all the boats and barges on the River Thames, concluding that when the conflagration came they would be safer on water than on land.

A gentleman who had neglected family prayers for five years informed his wife of his intention to resume them that same evening, but she persuaded him to put it off for another day as she was giving a big ball in her home that night.

The stock market dropped, and the captain of a Dutch ship threw all powder overboard, so that the ship might not unnecessarily be endangered.

On the set day the comet did appear according to prediction. One hundred and twenty-five clergymen were ferried over to Lambeth to petition that a short prayer might be offered, but there was not a one in the service for the occasion.

Three maids of honor burnt their collection of novels and plays, and sent to the bookstore for Bibles, and a copy of Taylor's "Holy Living and Dying."

A day later more than 7,000 men who had been keeping mistresses were legally married. And to cap it all the head collector of the bank issued an order to all fire and have a particular eye upon

Mavericks Topple Ciscoans, 7 to 0!

In a thriller heavy-laden with suspense and thrills to hold an enthusiastic packed house in awe, Coach Ed Hooker's Eastland High Mavericks, District 7A title hopefuls, opened their 1953 schoolboy grid wars with a 7 to 0 upset over their arch-rivals, the favored class double-A Lobos, at Maverick Field in Eastland Friday night.

Both clubs were evenly matched, and the non-conference duel was a nip-and-tucker which was goose-egged at the halftime intermission.

In the dying minutes of the third quarter, the Ciscoans choked an Eastland TD stab when they alertly recovered a Maverick fumble on their own 1-yard stripe. Cisco's left half, Marcus Gallegos, a fleet 130-pounder, gained only a yard to the 2-yarder before the Lobos kicked out of the hole, backing the ever-anxious Mavericks back to the 38. A 15-yard penalty for clipping against the Ciscoans moved the oval down to the 23, and from there Eastland's stellar-playing fullback, J. D. Hanson, a 170-pound wheelhorse, rammed around left end and was bounced out of bounds on the 10-yard stripe. But a 15-yard assessment for unnecessary roughness pushed the Red & Blackers back to the Cisco 25. From there, quarterback Verne Meroney handed off to Left Half Pearson Grimes, but the Cisco defense was reeked and held. Halfback Janie Jessop, fiery 160-pounder later ejected from the contest in the fourth quarter, lost five on a try around the Ciscoans' right flank. Then he shot a pass to Grimes, but his backfield mate was hammered cold at the line of scrimmage after the grab.

Jessop punted to Cisco on their own five. And then things began to happen fast. On the first play, Cisco fumbled the oval and the Mavericks recovered on the four-yard stripe. Jessop ripped into the Lobo wall for a yard to reach the three, and then Fullback Hanson slashed through the left side to cross the double-stripe standing up. Center Stanley Harris added the extra point with a perfect kick from placement.

And that was it. A see-saw battle was waged in the final and frantic fourth quarter, but neither eleven was able to jar the scoreboard. The entire Maverick crew played a bang-up game.

The Cisco and Eastland bands added flavor and color to the thrilling pigskin opener with a terrific halftime intermission program shared by the two musical aggregations.

For the winning Mavericks, Fullback Hanson blazed along with Jessop, Grimes, Stan Harris, Bobby Cooper and Verne Meroney who sparkplugged the Red & Black's offensive and defensive maneuvers which stymied their favored rivals.

For the Ciscoans standouts were Fullback Bill Smith, Halves Gallegos and Harold Phippen, Guard Jim Reynolds and Benny Edwards hulking 190-pound tackle.

RHS CREW OPENS 1953 CAMPAIGN WITH UPSET WIN OVER WOLF PACK

Coach O. C. (Stubby) Warden's roaring Ranger High Bulldogs, new potential Class A schoolboy grid powerhouse, blasted open their 1953 pigskin wars explosively Friday night at Bulldog stadium in Ranger when they humbled the mighty Colorado City Wolves of District 4-AA 28 to 27, in a suspense-laden thriller.

The RHS Maroon & Whiteners got off to a slow somewhat disappointing start, trailing 7-0 at the end of the initial canto, but three lightning TDs in the second period and a final scoring barrage early in the fourth—plus four perfect extra-points by Left Half Browning's gold-plated toe—gave the Warden charges a smashing upset triumph.

The Bulldogs were stunned two minutes and 15 seconds deep in the first quarter when Hollis Gainey, a 145 lb. halfback, brown-haired 142-pound right half for the Wolf pack, brought a near-full house to its feet with a dazzling 74-yard touchdown sprint

from his own 26. Quarterback Billy Williams, C-City flinger, passed to Left End Don Flippin for the point to put the double A crew out front 7 to 0.

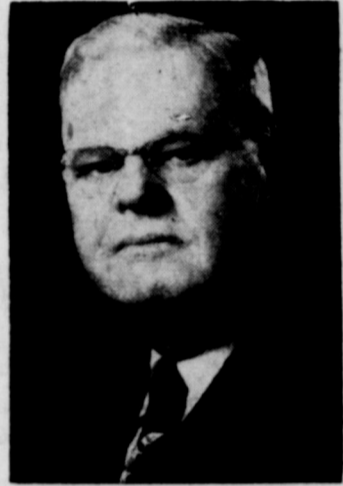

Widely Known Educator Dies Friday in Austin of Heart Attack

Final Rites For Mrs. Galloway Pending Today

Funeral services are pending in Ranger today for Mrs. Robert L. Galloway, 29-year-old daughter-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. R. V. (Rip) Galloway, 1207 Desdemona Blvd., Ranger, who was killed in an automobile accident near Rangely, Colo., Friday afternoon about 3 o'clock.

Mrs. Galloway, the former Miss Constance Fisher, daughter of Mrs. R. Berenger of Chicago, Ill., was born in Tennessee on Dec. 15, 1923 and she and her husband were united in marriage at Nashville, Tenn., on April 19, 1944.

Mr. and Mrs. Galloway and their three children had moved to Rangely from Fort Worth in April on transfer by the Stanolind Oil & Gas Company, with whom he has been associated for several years.

While he served as a fighter pilot overseas during World War II, Mrs. Galloway spent much time in the home of her parents-in-law in Ranger. Her father-in-law is secretary-manager of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce.

Funeral arrangements are incomplete pending arrival of Mrs. Galloway's body from Colorado, but the final rites will be held in Ranger and interment will be in Evergreen Cemetery, Ranger, according to the family.

Survivors include the husband of Rangely; two sons, Bobby, 8, and Myles, 3; one daughter, Leslie, age 2, all of Rangely; her mother, Mrs. R. Berenger of Chicago, Ill.; and two sisters, Mrs. George Cramer of Cincinnati, Ohio, and Mrs. J. N. Gortner of Rivera, Calif.

Gorman Whips Carbon, 26 to 12, In 13-B Opener

The Gorman Panthers opened District 13-B play with a 26 to 12 victory Friday night over Carbon Wolverines at Gorman.

The Panthers struck twice in the first quarter, with Max Pierce going six yards after a drive from Carbon's 32-yard line where Gorman recovered a Wolverine fumble. Later in the same period Freddie Welch skirted end for 15 yards Gorman converted after each on line plunges. Gorman's third tally was in the second, following an 85-yard drive with Welch getting the last 45 yards on a scamper through the line.

Carbon got its first score in the second when Harold Hendricks took a pass from Jimmy Mangrum on Gorman's 40 and raced 60 yards to paydirt.

BOOM STEADY BUT TO FADE BY NEW YEAR

Industry's expansion boom will begin to fade a little in the next three months from its present all-time peak, government agencies reported.

For the full year, nevertheless, the outlays of business for new plants and equipment, as reported to the government, will reach a record total of \$27,821,000,000.

This will top 1952 by 5 per cent and continue the unbroken annual rise since 1950, the year of the Korean invasion when capital investment was \$20,605,000,000.

The forecasts, collected from industrial firms by the Commerce Department and the Securities and Exchange Commission, indicate

plays later —after only slightly more than a minute of action had elapsed in the second go-around—Colorado City recovered a Ranger fumble on their own 4. From there Gainey again ripped loose on a long dash—81 yards—down to the Bulldogs' 15. Then Williams again hit Flippin for an aerial TD. Frank Mackey added the point from placement.

Trailing 14-0, the RHS machine suddenly shifted from low to high gear in the thrill packed second quarter.

Taking over on their own 47, the Bulldog aerial attack was unleashed with a beauty from Quarterback Scott Forney to End Chico Mendoza paying off to the 30. A gain of six yards on two ground slashes was capped off with another pass — Forney to End Tommy Hinds — for the Rangers' initial tally of the night. Browning expertly added the point and the fans went wild.

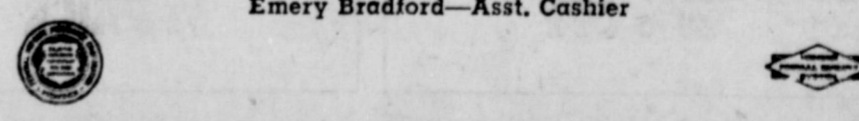
