## Suspect, 19 Faces Hearing In Fort Worth

A 19-year-old suspect, jailed in Breckenridge Tuesday night in the \$3,000 burglary of Breckenridge High School, was scheduled to go on trial in Fort Worth today on the robbery charge.

Stephens County Sheriff Tom Offield said he was informed by Tarrant County Sheriff Harlan Wright that the suspect, Bobby Lott of Fort Worth, also faces two counts in Tarrant County of assault with attempt to murder. Lott had been under bond in Tarrant County when he was charged at Breckenridge.

Whether Lott is found guilty or acquitted in Fort Worth, he will be returned to Breckenridge to face prosecution concerning the high school burglary, Offield said.

Meanwhile, a 90th District Court grand jury was to meet at 10 a. m. today to investigate the burglary charge Lott faces at Breckenridge. The charge was filed Tuesday in the court of Justice of the Peace L. T. Woodall of Breckenridge.

Woodall fixed Lott's bond at \$3,000 Wednesday morning. The youth arrested Sunday afternoon in Ada, Okla., has denied participation in the burglary, Offield said.

The sheriff said two other men are being sought in connection with the Breckenridge burglary.

More than \$3,000, including \$2,000 in receipts from Breckenridge-Graham football game Friday night, was taken from a vault Saturday in the office of School Supt. John Culwell.

The vault door was pried off after entry was gained through a window. Police found chisels, crowbars and other tools scattered about the office.

## REV. H. D. BLAIR RESIGNS AS MISSIONARY OF ASSOCIATION

Rev. H. D. Blair, for 26 years Missionary for the Cisco Baptist Association, made his final report at the association Tuesday, when that body met in Breckenridge for its annual session.

It has been known for some time that he was planning to resign, and this was done at the association. His resignation was tendered and accepted, effective immediately.

Rev. Blair, or better known as Brother Blair, was ordained as a Baptist minister by the Carlton (Hamilton County) church, in September, 1912, which means that he has served as an active minister for more than forty years and during this period he has witnessed many ups and downs.

His first pastorate was at Honey Creek Baptist church, near Carlton, and his last was at Moran. After this he entered the mission field, and since that time has served as Associational Missionary for this association.

Twenty-six years ago Rev. Blair was a comparatively young man. He took his work seriously and has been an untiring worker, to which many Baptists in this county can testify. He has been an active minister for just 41 years, and he is not quitting now. Of course he will no longer be missionary, but his services as supply pastor and study course teacher will be in demand.

He looked very much as usual when he entered this office early today, though he mentioned the fact that when he got up this morning he didn't have a thing to do. For 26 years his daily custom after arising, was to shave, put on a fresh white shirt and go out to serve Baptists and others over the three-county area. He didn't have to do that today, although he hadn't overlooked the shave or white shirt.

He was in this county when most of its churches were rural. He knows what it means to preach in a school house or under a brush arbor. He knows how to lead people to Christ, even if they were picking cotton or branding calves. Didn't have many varnished pews or vested choirs in the early days.

but according to Brother Blair, many people had religion that was strong enough to make rough benches comfortable if they might only hear a sermon.

He has sided in the organization of new churches, and has held many meetings where souls were saved. He has visited the sick, married the young and buried the aged. And most of this was without charge. Early day missionaries were not very highly paid. Most of them were pushed on and on by the power of desire to be of service to mankind.

Brother Blair, like many missionaries, will have to wait until they reach heaven before they begin to collect their wage. Yet, it is thought that many find many stars in their crowns once they gather there to spend eternity.

During these years of service Brother Blair delivered no less than 6,234 sermons and addresses. Assisted in 176 revivals where he was either preacher or singer, and aided to the church no less than 659 by baptism, and another 685 by letter or statement. Which means that under his ministry there was a total of 1,345 additions to various churches.

He has taken part in the ordination service of no less than 32.

## Discovery Well Is Completed At Rising Star

A completion and a new test highlighted the oil news in Eastland County today.

One mile south of Rising Star a discovery well has been drilled in by O. M. Evans Drilling Co. of Fort Worth. The successful venture is the No. 1 Della Bender, Section 27, Block 3, BBB&C Survey, which pumped 27.8 barrels of 41 gravity oil in 24 hours from perforations at 985-990 feet and 1,022-26 feet.

Casing was set at 1,057 feet. Gas-oil ratio, 100 to 1.

The No. 1 O. P. Wesier, a 1,200 foot cable tool project, has been staked three miles south of Cisco by McClung & West of Cisco.

Location is 1,563 feet from west and 1,084 feet from north lines of south half of Section 64, H&TC Survey.

# Mavericks Face Stern Test Against Bluecats

Eastland's 1953 Mavericks get a double-tough test at Maverick Stadium Friday night when they do battle with the mighty Coleman Bluecats, a classy Double A machine, in a non-conference contest.

Although the Colemanites were knocked off, 12 to 7, by the highly-rated Anson Tigers in their season opener at Coleman Friday night, they're doped to have an advantage over the spirited Red & Black proteges of Coach Ed Hooker.

The Mavericks' stock soared upward in brisk fashion after their 7 to 0 upset win over the Double A Cisco Lobos at Maverick Stadium last Friday night as they blasted the lid off their 1953 schoolboy grid campaign.

The Hookerman, as usual, will go into their second battle of the season out-weighted and out experienced.

The Bluecat explosive offense is paced by the spectacular all-around play of Kenneth Cleveland, one of the tri-captains and mastermind as well as master performer in the Cat secondary. Cleveland, a versatile back, is stellar in all departments. He weighs 161 pounds.

Billy Davis, 145-pounder, is quarterback and is a top ball-handler. He's also sharp in the passing department.

Hard-driving Charles Thompson, another Cat backfield ace, tips the beam at 165 and Scatback Bill Johnigan, 155, is the fastest jet in the Blue & White secondary.

The Cat line is rugged and heavy. Six of the CHS linemen weigh more than 185 pounds, and Straughan, one of the tackle blocks, is a solid 206-pounder.

Coach Hooker will taper his Mavericks off with a light drill tomorrow afternoon, winding up a stretch of four sessions. The Monday, Tuesday and current this afternoon's workouts have been long and tough.

The EHS mentor is hoping to field a much-improved squad against the invading Double A powerhouse Friday night.

## Railroads Now Offer Family Budget Rates

Family plan fares for Pullman passengers on the Santa Fe Railway System will go into effect Sept. 21, according to an announcement made by R. T. Anderson, general passenger traffic manager today. Plans are being made to extend the family plan to all coach trains in the very near future, probably by Oct. 19.

Santa Fe is the first Western railroad to propose extension of the family fare plan for coach trains. This will include the famous economy streamliner to the Coast, El Capitan, the Texas Chief to Galveston, and the Kansas City Chief.

Pullman passengers on the famous Super Chief and Chief will benefit by the new plan as well as all other Pullman passengers using Santa Fe trains.

The plan provides that one parent pay full fare, the other half fare, and that half fares be paid for all members of the family between the ages of five and twenty-one years. The extra fares on such trains as the El Capitan, Super Chief and Chief will also be subject to family plan reduction. Departures are limited to Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday.

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

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
