REFLECTIONS FROM LIFE

Bachelor, 55, Is Found Dead In Ranger Friday

Funeral arrangements were pending at Rising Star Saturday morning for Odes W. Ackelson, about 55, who was found dead in bed at his home on Pecan Street in Ranger Friday.

He had been dead about four or five hours after police arrived to investigate following a phone call to the Ranger Police Department by a neighbor.

Mr. Ackelson, a bachelor, had been making his home in Ranger for about a year, reports Justice of the Peace Charles Bobo who held an inquest and returned a verdict of death caused by natural causes.

Prior to moving to Ranger he had been a longtime resident of Rising Star.

He was a laborer and farmer. Higginbotham Funeral Home, Rising Star, is in charge of burial arrangements.

Ex-Strawnite Is Laid To Rest On Saturday

Funeral services were held in Midland Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock for Samuel M. Hailey, 92, former Strawn resident and longtime Winkler County rancher and oil man and county judge who died at Odessa Friday.

Burial was in Fairview Cemetery, Midland. He and his wife, Mrs. Jess Westmoreland Hailey, 76, came to Odessa two years ago to make their home with a daughter, Mrs. Paul Slater.

Hailey, who was born in Arkansas July 7, 1861, lived in Strawn, Weatherford and Midland before he bought a 16-section ranch south of Kermit in 1916. At that time, he recalled recently, the population of the county was 8-9 persons.

Hailey was appointed county judge in 1918 and was in and out of office several times between then and 1936, when he purchased a home in Kermit and moved from his ranch into town.

Survivors include his wife and two other daughters, Mmes. F. W. Estill of Kermit, and Earl Vest of Monahan, and two grandchildren, Mrs. L. G. Mackey, Jr. of Fort Worth and Sam Vest of Monahan.

Two New Wells Are Completed In Strawn Area

Two new producers were reported in the area oil news Saturday morning.

Both completions were in neighboring Palo Pinto County. The No. 19 William Sanders, put down 11 miles north of Strawn by Palo Pinto Oil & Gas Corp., pumped 10 barrels of 38 gravity oil per day from open hole at 1,258-90 feet. Top of the pay was picked at 1,248 feet.

The same operator's No. 20 Williams Sanders will be six barrels of oil per day on pump from open hole at 1,255-95 feet. Top of the pay—1,268 feet.

Both new completions are located in Section 43, Block 2, T&P Survey.

Last Rites For T. T. Horn, 71, Held Thursday

Funeral services were held at the Thomas Funeral Chapel in Cisco Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock for T. T. Horn, 71-year-old lifelong Eastland County resident of near Cisco.

Rev. Bob Sanders, pastor of Wesley Methodist Church, officiated during the rites with Rev. C. W. Luster assisting. Interment was in the Mitchell Cemetery near his home on route 4, Cisco.

Mr. Horn died unexpectedly about 11 a.m. Wednesday. He was found dead in a pasture on his farm.

At 10 a.m. he left the house to go across a pasture to a watermelon patch. When he failed to return within an hour his family went to look for him. He was found dead near the field. A watermelon he was taking back to the house was nearby. It was estimated that he had been dead a half hour when he was found at 11:30 a.m. Death apparently resulted from a heart attack.

He was born in the area where he lived at the time of his death on October 17, 1881, and had lived in that vicinity all his life. On April 17, 1903, he was married to Miss Linda Douglas in Cisco. They celebrated their golden wedding anniversary this year.

Survivors are his wife; three sons, Rufus Horn of Cisco, Lester Horn of Colorado City, and Lewis Horn of Fort Worth; a brother, Talmage Horn of Cisco; and a sister, Mrs. Carrie Hull of Cisco. His nephews were to serve as pallbearers.

The Gorman Panthers put in an early bid for the coveted District 13-B schoolboy grid title at Strawn Friday night when they overpowered Coach Joe Van Breeman's Strawn High Greyhounds, 20 to 0.

It was the Panthers' second conference win of the newly-opened season. They whammed the Carbon Wolverines, 26-12, last week in their 13-B opener.

The Panthers, operating off the almost-antique single wing, struck pay dirt in the first, second and final quarters.

Both points after touchdown—in the initial and fourth periods—were added on line plunges by Robert Rankin, 168-pound fullback.

The Panthers opened the tilt with a 60-yard payoff drive which began with the opening kickoff. Rankin and Halfback Freddie Welch sparked the push with Rankin hammering over from the 7.

The Panthers' second score was cashed on a 65-yard run off a reverse in the second quarter. Quarterback Max Pierce beautifully paced the distance. The line smash attempt for the point was nailed at the line of scrimmage.

Failing to count in the third, the Gormanites came back in the fourth with a 70-yard stab which was capped with a touchdown plunge of four yards by Welch from the four.

The losing Strawnites threatened seriously only twice. In the third period the Greyhounds powered down to the Gorman 4, but lost on downs when they were unable to break through the stout Panther defense.

One of the most spectacular plays of the night was unrecalled by Tudor Turner, 155-pound Strawn fullback, who took off on his own 2, broke loose and looked like a scorer sure until he was shoe-strung on the 50. He zipped off a stray lunge.

Other Strawnites looking sharp during the night's play—Eddie Morris, 150-pound left half, and defensive standouts, Joe Flinn, Larry Pruitt and Pete Galik.

In other action in District 13-B, Baird topped Cross Plains of 7-A, 12-7; Clyde walloped Wylie of 7-A, 27-0; South Taylor was topped by Eden, 26-13, and Moran eked out a 24 to 20 triumph over Carbon.

Baird's Quarterback Bullock ran over for TDs in the second and fourth quarters on 18 and 4-yard plungers respectively. Homer Robinson, quarter, scored Cross Plains' lone tally with Ken Beeler carrying over for the conversion.

At Carbon Friday night, the Wolverines dropped their second tilt of the season to the Moran Bulldogs in a close 24-20 contest. The Dogs blasted across into pay dirt in the second, third and twice in the final quarter. The Wolverines tallied one counter in the second and two in the fourth quarter.

Large Skeleton Uncovered Near Staff Community

LINVILLE, N. C. — Tourists who manage to get to the top of mile-high Grandfather Mountain near here will find a fresh, cold well in the solid granite.

In a last gesture, however, Carpenter dropped three cases of dynamite down the hole as a "good-bye kiss." The explosive produced a stream of clear acid water.

Fourth Period TD Gives Win To Bluecats

The Mavericks, who drew but 20 yards in penalties during the entire 48-minute game, outgained their Double A foes on the ground, piling up 256 hard-earned yards through the Blue and White wall. The Cats totaled 175 yards on ground plays.

The Red & Blackers also led in passing, gaining 40 yards via the air to Coleman's meager 5. In addition, the Eastlanders intercepted three Coleman pitches.

The intersectional contest, with Coleman pre-game rated as heavy favorites, was deadlocked at a scoreless tie at the half-time break.

The Bluecats broke the ice in the third period when Kenneth Stungs, 140-pound Coleman speedster, got loose around right end on a sweep which carried him over into cash country.

But, the most spectacular play of the night, only a few seconds later, tied the score at 7-all.

On the return kickoff following the Coleman counter, Eastland's J. D. Hanson, big, fast 170-pound fullback, gathered the ball on his own 14 and raced 86 beautiful yards to cross the double-stripe standing up.

The point-after-touchdown was added with Center Stan Harris hitting the bulls-eye from placement. The score remained deadlocked until the dying minutes of the final period.

Capping a desperate drive, Ken Cleveland, 161-pound Coleman backfield rambor, ripped through the Red & Black defenders from the 3-yard-stripe. The 8-AAers again converted.

Cleveland was the standout performer of the night for the visiting Colemanites. For the losing Mavericks, consistently hard-playing Fullback Hanson led a battery of plucky Red & Black secondary mates—Verne Meroney at quarter, Pearson Grimes and Jamie Jessop at the halves.

The Red & Black defense really held near the final gun. Coleman rolled down to the Eastland one. The Mavericks bowed their necks and were rock-ribbed. The Bluecatsmen took over on the 10. Hanson snaggled a pass and raced to midfield to put out the fire.

T&P MAGAZINES FEATURES EASTLAND IN CURRENT ISSUE; CITY GIVEN HIGHEST PRAISE

Progressive achievements of Eastland, Texas—individual and projects of community-wide participation—are featured in the September 1953 issue of the Texas and Pacific Railway Company's magazine, TOPICS.

In the railroad publication's six-page story there are photographs illustrating Eastland's leading businesses, including the Victor Cornelia Advertising, Horton Ceramics, Hollywood Carpet and the Texas Industries lightweight aggregate companies. Two other pictures show the construction activity at the Eastland-Ranger cooperative project that will impound from the Leon River a 28,000-acre-foot lake to encourage agricultural industry into the area.

Tribute is given in the article to the spirit of Eastland's citizens for their determination to have a modern hospital. The residents' free labor donated over a six-month period to build the year-old, 22-bed Eastland Memorial Hospital is described in the write-up as a "terrific example of what happens when a good challenge has prodded the city of Eastland's citizens into action."

There is pictorial and written coverage of the 1953 horred road race that is held annually in the courthouse square and the observation that it "had all the trimmings of a county fair." In telling of the yearly spirit of the reptiles, the story points out that it honors the memory of "Old Rip," Eastland's famous herpetologist that survived entombment in the old courthouse cornerstone for 31 years and whose embalmed body today is a tourist attraction in the lobby of the present courthouse.


