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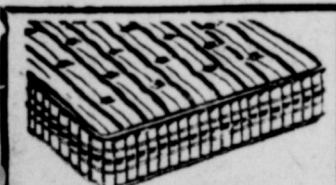

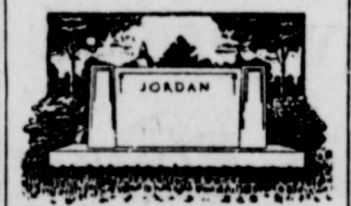

ALL PIONEER CONFERENCE CLUBS TRIUMPH SATURDAY; BUSY WEEKEND IS AHEAD

Coach Dick (Chub) Henderson's sharpening Ranger Junior College Rangers and the four other Pioneer Conference teams, with a clean sweep of five victories over non-league rivals last Saturday, are bracing for sterner tests this week against other non-loop foes.

The Arlington State College Rebels, defending conference champions, will lead off for the loop at Kilgore Thursday night when they tackle the mighty Kilgore Junior College Rangers. The Rebs established themselves as contenders again this season when they trounced the tough Wharton Junior College Pioneers, 21-13, last Saturday. Kilgore of the Big Six Conference last week flashed a warning to all future opponents by lacing Del Mar, No. 1 junior college team of the Southwest last year, 20-0. Thus the ASC-Kilgore setto should be one of the outstanding junior college games of the season.

On Saturday, San Angelo, impressive in its opener last week with a 26-0 victory over Phoenix college of Arizona, will be host to Wharton which has beaten Ranger and lost to ASC. The outcome will afford a basis of comparing the Rams with the Rebs and Rangers, other early season conference favorites.

Tarleton State's snappy Plowboys, 31-13 winners over Cisco last week, also appear to have a harder game on their schedule this Saturday. They will engage the perennially tough Paris Junior College Dragons of the Big Six Conference at Stephenville.

Another Saturday contest will be Coach Henderson's RJC Rangers and the Cisco Junior College Wranglers at Cisco. The Rangers bounced back last week with an impressive passing attack to down Allen Academy, 26-6.

The Schreiner Mountaineers, who gave their new Coach H. M. "Rusty" Russell a happy start in Junior College coaching by trouncing Texas Lutheran, 16-0, last week, line up against Victoria Junior College at Kerrville this Saturday. The Mountaineers also are

expecting a challenge from the South Texas team.

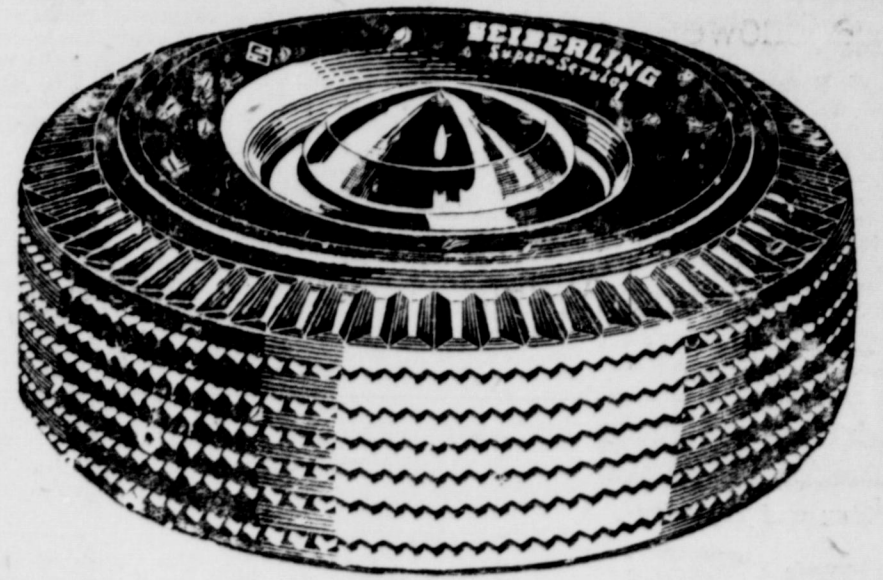

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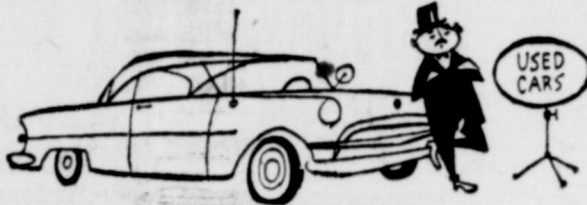
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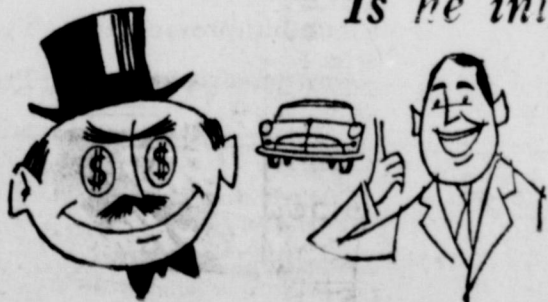
